### NAME CHANGE AGREED FOR BOTANIC GARDENS



### The Committee of Tamborine Mountain Botanic Gardens Inc have unanimously approved a change of name for the Gardens.

The new name is Tamborine Mountain Regional Botanic Gardens in the Scenic Rim.

The decision to change the name was approved at the annual general meeting of members in August. The motion called on the Committee of the Association to decide the final wording of the name that must "include significant reference to the Scenic Rim; that the name continue to include the words Tamborine Mountain."

The change was announced to the volunteers working in the Gardens and greeted with approval.

Tamborine Mountain Botanic Gardens Inc President, Denby Browning, said the change reflected a strong desire by the organisation to emphasise that the Gardens were truly regional and that they were deeply embedded in Tamborine Mountain while being an important part of the entire Scenic Rim.

"We are pleased that the name reflects our wide appeal across a broad community while prominently retaining the name Tamborine Mountain," he said. "The name may appear long, but the committee felt that it had to encompass three important elements: Tamborine Mountain, Scenic Rim and the fact we are a regional garden.

"A substantial part of our funding each year comes from ratepayers across the entire Scenic Rim and it is important that everyone from Eagle Heights to Aratula feels a sense of ownership.

"The Gardens are registered with Botanic Gardens Australia and New Zealand Inc (BGANZ) as a regional botanic garden. "It is unfortunate that a few people chose to speculate and misinform the community about the process and the final decision. We would prefer that all people interested in the activities of the Botanic Gardens contact members of the committee for details before making public statements.

"We look forward to continuing our task to constantly improve the Gardens for the entire community. Of course, we welcome new volunteers whether they come from our immediate community or further away. We already include members from as far away as the Gold Coast and Aspley in Brisbane. We hope that more concerned members of our local community also put their hands up to help build the future of the Gardens."

## **PLANETS ALIGN FOR TM UNIVERSE**

The members all agreed that this state-of-the-art science venue would be a great addition to our community, to the economy, for jobs, and to the education of old and young. Space and astronomy will be centre stage in decades to come and Tamborine Mountain will be 'right up there'.





### WINE CHAT with Witches Falls Winery Older is better ... or is it?





there is a certain sort of romanticism around old, cellar-aged wines.

Whilst the quality of a well-aged wine is undeniable, what you might not know is that almost 98 per cent of all the wine the world produces is made to be drunk immediately. The fast-paced and dynamic nature of the world in which we presently live has in many ways, compromised our ability to be patient. As a result, the vast majority of wines you might find on the shelf at Dan Murphy's are designed to be at their best as soon as they enter the bottle. In fact, many of these wines will actually begin to 'die' after a shelf life of three to five years.

This is by no means a bad thing and is in most cases an intentional move on the winemaker's part. But how can you tell if a wine is best drunk immediately, or left to age? Here's a few pointers.

Generally, a good indication lies in a wine's price-point. Bottles that sell for under \$30 tend to taste their best while still young. The reason for this is that almost all wines that fall into this price bracket are consumed within the first 24 hours following



their purchase. Winemakers are, of course, very conscious of this fact, and thus create wines that are designed to taste their best while still in their youth.

Another handy indication lies in a wine's colour and varietal. As a general rule of thumb, lighter whites and rosés are best drunk within the same season in which they were first purchased. Having said that, there are many white varietals which do age beautifully. Notably, Chardonnay, Riesling, Fiano, and high-end, vintage Champagne. For varietals such as these, price-point provides valuable insight into their capacity to age well.

When it comes to red wine, varietal is also a good guiding principle. Grapes with consistently higher tannins, such as Cabernet Sauvignon, Shiraz, and Merlot not only age well, they often require at least a little age before they fully develop. On the other hand, there may be something to be said for the health benefits of a young red. Tannins decrease and soften as a wine ages, and so too do the antioxidants that they contain. One such antioxidant is resveratrol, a powerful polyphenol that exists to fight off bacteria, fungi, and other microbial attackers in both human and plant cells. Present in much higher levels in younger reds, resveratrol has been linked to the known cardiovascular benefits of red wine.

By and large, how, why, and when to age a wine is almost entirely a matter of personal opinion. A trick we like to use at the winery is to buy two bottles of the same wine, one for now, and one for cellaring.

Unfortunately, quite a lot of historical information was apparently lost during the floods of 1974 so we're putting out a call to the community of Tamborine Mountain to help us fill in the gaps with any information, documents, stories or photos that can help us to uncover and preserve the history of our Club. ## SUPPORTING LOCALS

Friday 11 September sees the launch of the 2020 Tamborine Mountain Scarecrow Festival by the Shadow Minister for Tourism, Gold Coast colleague, David Crisafulli. It's not something that depends on government organisers – it is largely put together by a team of locals whose goal is to enhance both the community, grow business and keep employing people. It's this type of initiative that sets the foundations for keeping communities strong when things get tough – well done to all involved.

### LET'S GET QUEENSLAND WORKING AGAIN

Our economy is doing it tough right now. COVID-19 has seen our nation slip into recession. Queensland's debt bill will break through the \$100 billion barrier in less than 12 months. That's a \$17 billion blowout since December last year, but even before COVID-19 the Queensland economy was suffering sluggish growth, the worst business confidence in the nation and second worst unemployment. Many have pointed out the Premier's blatant inconsistency and mixed messages when it comes to border exemptions, and the special treatment given to celebrities, AFL officials and others in business, compared to some seeking urgent medical assistance, people in border communities, farmers working across borders etc.

I want to give you local examples. There is a small business in our area, not far from Tamborine Mountain, which is facing the prospect of sacking 10 people because their next project is in Lismore and to go there, do the work, come back and quarantine for 14 days just will not work – the numbers don't add up, and nor is it practical.

A local from the Boonah region, who works in Central Queensland but also runs a farm just across the border in NSW, is selling his farm because the inflexible border restrictions and exemptions scheme will not give him an exemption to travel as required to keep the wheels of his livelihood turning. In both cases, the nearest COVID-19 cases in NSW are hundreds of kilometres away – in fact, both groups are more likely to acquire it in Brisbane, Ipswich, Logan or the Gold Coast than they are in northern NSW.

It is this inconsistency, lack of common sense and inflexibility that undermines public confidence in all health directives and it must stop. As I see it, there is a general support for restricting border movements – but the whole system is undermined, including public confidence in other, unrelated health directives, because of these extreme inconsistencies and special treatment meted out to some groups above others.

## **JOBKEEPER EXTENSION**

COVID-19 has been a wrecking ball through the global economy.

That is why, as part of our economic plan, the Morrison Government is providing an unprecedented \$314 billion in support to keep businesses in business and Australians in jobs.

Temporary telehealth items have played a critical role in the Government's response to COVID-19. They have allowed patients to access essential health care while minimising the risk of community transmission of the virus.

### **JOBS TASKFORCE**

The Government knows the importance of taking a local approach and supporting people to take advantage of new job opportunities emerging as the economic recovery gathers pace.

We have moved to establish a new \$62.8 million Local Jobs Program to be rolled out in 25 regions across Australia. This will mean 25 local jobs taskforces with local knowledge and expertise to help jobseekers find the right work.

Taskforce members will work with local employers to identify what they are looking for and build pathways for unemployed people to train for and enter into industries with jobs in demand.

### BOTANIC GARDENS NAME CHANGE A POSITIVE MOVE

I have read, with interest, comments regarding the proposed name change to the Tamborine Mountain Botanic Gardens and am sad at the tenor of some of these comments.

I preface my comments by stating that for many years I was a volunteer at the Gardens, have served on the committees of both the Garden Club and the Botanic Gardens and my last three years at the Gardens I held the position of manager.

Due to personal reasons, I resigned from the Gardens and am also no longer a member of the Garden Club. As such I have not attended any meetings that have discussed the proposed name change, and therefore have not taken part in the voting regarding the name change, or the matter of the Gardens leaving the Garden Club and adopting a stand-alone position.

One of the major problems I found when managing the Gardens was "uncertainty".

There is uncertainty about the weather/rainfall, uncertainty about the number of volunteers we can attract, uncertainty about the age of the majority of the volunteers, and the major uncertainty is in regard to funding.

During my time as manager we would spend over \$100,000 to keep the Gardens looking good, maintaining existing infrastructure, adding new features, and supplying the necessary tools and equipment to make the job easier, and safer, for those who willingly give up their time to work at the gardens.

The money came from many sources, the major ones being Springtime on the Mountain, donations collected from the various donation boxes placed around the Gardens, plant sales, grants, and lastly from Scenic Rim Regional Council.

With the separation of the Gardens from the Garden club, the Botanic Gardens will no longer be getting the large amount of funds we did from Springtime on the Mountain, via the Garden Club.

There is also no certainty regarding the grants we apply for. For example, I am aware that four applications have been made for a grant to put a new bore in to supplement the existing bore used for irrigation. There were three knockbacks prior to a successful application.

There is no certainty with donations or plant sales either. If we have bad weather, both of these income streams are affected.

Before I became manager, an agreement was reached with Beaudesert Council, to provide some funding to the Gardens. This was in addition to the two council workers and a truck that they already supply to assist the volunteers on their Thursday morning workday.

The agreement with the council continued following the formation of Scenic Rim Regional Council and is renegotiated on a regular basis.

This financial assistance has been fantastic and has improved the ability for the Gardens to purchase essential plant and equipment so much easier.

In the past few years the Gardens have been able to build a new potting shed, replace a very old tractor and ute with new ones, plus buy an additional Gator to move gear around the Gardens. The roadways and paths have been resealed, the wedding lawn area has been completely made over, the volunteers' morning tea area done up and a new shelter built, the orchid house has been extended and the Sooty Owl Walk constructed. Two of the sheds for storing equipment have also been extended and an aeration system put into the lakes in an effort to improve water quality.

These are just some of the areas that have been worked on, most of which would not have been possible were it not for the contribution made by Council.

All councillors vote on the allocation of funds to the Gardens and in my time working at the gardens, all were enthusiastic supporters of the Gardens. Many of you are probably aware that prior to being elected as Councillor, Nigel Waistell became a garden volunteer and is still a vital member of the volunteer work force today.

Council give the Botanic Gardens Committee total autonomy in the running and planning of the Gardens and their only stipulation is that we abide by the Council By-laws and Health and Safety Regulations.

To acknowledge Council's contribution by including Council's name in the wonderful attraction that the Gardens are, will not detract from the Gardens at all. It will not suddenly see the Gardens move to Beaudesert, will not change the operations of, or the management of, the Gardens from the way they operate now.

What the change will do is show public appreciation to Council for the support and assistance that they give the Gardens. It could also in some way, contribute to Council's ongoing future support.

The backbone of the Gardens are the wonderful volunteers, especially some of the long serving people such as Roger and Margaret Bell, Bobby White, the late Eddie Fenton, Sandy Silabon, Dawn Hooper, plus Sue and Bob Stewart to name but a few.

I also put the contribution of Council as being just as important as that made by the volunteers.

Changing the Gardens' name to include Scenic Rim Regional Council is a positive move, in my view.

## WINE TOURISM OFFICER WILL ASSIST SCENIC RIM

The Scenic Rim's wine and beverage industry has been given a strategic boost following the Queensland Government's appointment of a Wine Tourism Recovery Officer with more than 30 years' experience in many facets of the Australian wine industry.

Jan Douglas is employed by the Department of State Development, Tourism and Innovation and funded by the Queensland and Australian Governments' Bushfire Community Recovery Package for the Southern Queensland bushfires that impacted the Scenic Rim region in September last year.

Scenic Rim Regional Council Tourism Advisory Committee member, Cr Virginia West said that through sharing her expertise across the Scenic Rim and Southern Downs regions, Ms Douglas' focus would benefit the 17 wineries and range of other boutique breweries and distilleries scattered across the region.

She would work with industry associations to strengthen capability and linkages between the wine industry and the broader tourism industry.

Under the Disaster Funding Recovery Arrangements, a Wine Tourism Advisory Committee has also been established to guide the efforts of the Wine Tourism Recovery Officer and program of work, with representation from both industry and Council.

Tamborine Mountain-based Witches Falls Winery owner Kim Heslop, who is the Scenic Rim industry representative on the committee, said the wine and beverage businesses were an increasingly important part of the tourism offering in the Scenic Rim.

"As visitor numbers to the region have been impacted by the recent bushfires and now COVID-19, these businesses have an important part to play in attracting visitors back to the region.

"Having a more co-ordinated and consistent offering across the sector can only help to enhance the appeal of the Scenic Rim as a tourism destination and we are happy that someone with Jan's experience has come on board to help deliver this," Kim said.

Industry engagement is key to Ms Douglas' program of work, and since starting earlier this month, she has travelled across the region to meet with local wine and beverage operators to understand the challenges they are facing.

Shane O'Reilly, Managing Director of O'Reilly's Canungra Valley Vineyards, said he was pleased to see the industry's growth being viewed through a strategic lens. "We've all been impacted by bushfires and COVID-19, and we know current history shows growth can be phenomenal when done well," he said.

"This time last year and for several months following, our numbers dropped significantly as people were told not to come to the region."

## FOR THE PEOPLE

The SRRC planned town revitalisation program for Beaudesert has now well and truly been exposed as a flawed development and waste of both ratepayers' and taxpayers' money. Moreover, it is something that the people neither want nor need – a bit like the failed town by-pass before it.

We have the reality of a failed consultation process, a proposed library twice rejected by the people, an independent consultant's report rejecting the proposal, and proposed \$4.5 million in new debt at the ratepayers' expense. This new proposed debt comes on top of the existing \$41.1 million ratepayers have been burdened with, and you may very well ask what do we have to show for it? Compounding this is the disputed Helen Street Saleyards, with no solution in sight from Council. It now also has the cloud of heritage listing hanging over it and goodness knows what other significant matters that Council has failed to deal with or plan for.

Davidson Park lies at the centre of Council's development dreams and it is interesting to note that in 1937 the Clerk of the day, Mr A L Lane, said that considerable assistance in connection with the Railway Park had been received from the then Queensland Railways Commissioner, James Davidson, and suggested that as Mr Davidson was retiring shortly it would be an appropriate gesture to name the park after him. Mr Davidson was considered the best "railway man" in Queensland and a great friend to the people of Beaudesert for his work in advancing transportation via the railways within the region.

The suggestion to name the park after Davidson was met quite favourably by the people, but other suggestions by Council, such as the moving of the RSL Memorial to Davidson Park was rejected by the people. That's right, the Beaudesert Town Council actually consulted with the people of Beaudesert and represented their concerns and wishes. Hence the memorial remains at its original position.

This historical snapshot opens a gaping window into the inadequacies of today's Council – a total lack of vision, business acumen and knowledge with regard to representation of the people.

Sadly, the only private enterprise and business success connected with Council lies in our Division 5 and 6 councillors: one a pastoralist, the other a long-standing dairyman. There is no other successful business experience on or in Council. Yet, Beaudesert has an abundance of leadership and successful businessmen and women to engage with – SRRC please engage with our "brains trust" along with the rest of the people of this region.

If Beaudesert wants to increase its visitation by tourists and travellers alike, it should consider a Centre of Excellence to showcase the region's products and produce, including exhibits representing the region's finest industries – our equine industry, timber industry, beef industry, dairy industry, agriculture and horticultural industries, our leather products, wine and spirits, processed delicacies and so on.

We have an abundance of community hubs in Beaudesert: Jubilee Park, Beaudesert RSL, and none bigger than the Beaudesert Kingfishers.

We don't need another community hub, but we do need vision and sustainability that is in keeping with our rural lifestyle, economy and heritage.

We do not need more debt and a dead duck library building! How about investing in the content of the existing library and bringing it into the 21st century for the people, as opposed to glorification of the ever increasing SRRC administration.

### THERMOMETER OR THERMOSTAT?

Have you ever spent time in the company of an intense person whose emotions are on obvious display?

Did you find yourself impacted by their mood, partially absorbing their emotions? Studies show that if you put several people of normal emotional state into a room with an agitated person, they all become more agitated. Put them in a room with a depressed person and they all become more depressed.

Alternatively, if you put them in a room with a person who is extremely happy, they all become happier. That's because strong emotional states are contagious. In an otherwise neutral environment, stronger feelings



affect people with milder feelings.

The same can happen in our relationships. Someone close to you is having a bad day. They might be frustrated, angry, sad or non-communicative. Or perhaps you are in a workplace where the high demands have led to an environment of stress, complaints, discontent and general unhappiness. It's easy in these situations to succumb, follow suit and react the same way. However, there is another option. To illustrate, let's consider the difference between a thermometer and a thermostat.

A thermometer reflects the temperature of the environment. It simply reacts to what's happening around it. It's a responsive instrument that doesn't contain intelligent functionality. It has one purpose – to respond to the environment. A thermostat, on the other hand, regulates the environment. It sets the desired temperature of the room and actively works to maintain it within a given range.

If the environment rises above the desired temperature, the thermostat works to cool the room down. If the environment becomes too cool the thermostat kicks in to warm the room up. The thermostat is intelligent in the sense it's always monitoring the environment and correcting the situation.

It's relatively easy to read the environment and detect the temperature. If we respond like thermometers, we will reflect the atmosphere and be influenced by it. When things go well, we are a vision of calm but when things start heating up, we lose our cool too, becoming a product of our environment. Instead of being influenced by the current temperature, we can choose to be a thermostat and be the influencer! It requires becoming proactive rather than reactive. To be a thermostat means to work in ways to bring the current environment to where you want it to be.

What do you desire for your home, your workplace, your friendships? You can establish your own climate everywhere you are, and others will be impacted. Don't lose sight of your values and the person you want to be. Determine to be the shaper of your environment rather than letting your environment shape you.

## Councillor's Comment

DEREK SWANBOROUGH DIVISION 1

### BOONAH MAIN STREET PROPOSED TREE REMOVAL

This week was an especially important one for the Scenic Rim with the Ordinary Meeting of Council on 7 September. The hot topic was the Notice of Motion to be considered concerning Council's removal of four large trees in Boonah's main street, planted 30 years ago to give the street shade. Council has forged ahead with its main street upgrade, but it appears the consultation and community engagement were not effective.

Now a petition has been signed by 1800 people to save them. It will mean a revamp of the plans and I am not sure when the dust settles whether they will be saved or not, because the Notice of Motion proposed calls for a review to be undertaken. If the motion is carried, we will have to wait for the results of the review before we will know if the trees are safe. I personally think the trees should stay and the job redesigned to ensure they stay. This is the largest petition I have witnessed in Boonah. The last one I presented in my first term as a councillor, with around 1000 signatures, was to stop Council shutting down the Wreck or Mend Panel business which fortunately succeeded.

### PIG AND CALF SALEYARDS BEAUDESERT

This comes off the recent petition of approximately 1250 signatures I presented to Council on behalf of concerned Beaudesert residents to save the pig and calf saleyards, which was also to be a casualty of the Beaudesert Town Centre Upgrade. We are now waiting for Council's response to that and to the Heritage Council's investigation of the application to list and preserve them on the heritage register. (These are my own personal views. I do not purport to speak on behalf of Council. Decisions of Council are made only by majority vote, legislative authority or under authority delegated by Council.)

Combining the two petitions, in a matter of six weeks we have just over 3000 persons objecting to Council plans. WHY IS THAT?

### Policy on Councillors - Confidentiality of Information to be considered at Ordinary Meeting 7 September:

I have grave concerns for the transparency of Council if councillors pass this proposed policy. I will await the outcome and report back to you. Councillors are empowered to determine what is information that is *"Confidential to the Local Government"*: This policy delegates these powers to the CEO and the policy we are being asked to adopt has the CEO making almost everything confidential unless it comes out of the Ordinary Meeting. That means we are effectively muzzled as councillors and sets councillors up to prevent them consulting on issues with their residents in a timely manner. I will have more to say on this next column.

This is in my view quite extraordinary. Does Council have a culture of transparency or secrecy? It will be a test of Council's recently adopted Customer Charter Commitment and whether it believes in what it says i.e.:

### "WE'LL BE OPEN AND HONEST ALWAYS"

## FIREFLIES

For a brief time during spring evenings you may notice small bright lights flashing and flying erratically through the air; these are fireflies. What makes this little insect so enchanting and spectacular is bioluminescence – the ability to glow.

Fireflies are actually carnivorous beetles of the family Lampyridae.

There are some 2000 species worldwide; about 25 have been described from Australia.

This species usually favours damp areas with undergrowth and leaf litter. The life cycle of the firefly is egg, larvae, pupa and adult. All have luminous qualities, but the adults, particularly the males, emit the strongest light. Larvae use light to deter predators and adults use light to find a mate.

The firefly creates its bioluminescence through a chemical reaction between luciferin (a waste product), luciferase (an enzyme), and a reactant. In fireflies this is adenosine triphosphate (ATP) and oxygen. This chemical reaction produces energy in the form of light. The fireflies are able to regulate the emission of light by controlling the amount of air supplied to their cells; this light pulsing may be used to communicate. Some tropical firefly species gather in large numbers and synchronise their flashes in a spectacular light show.

The larvae are terrestrial carnivores which live in leaf litter where they prey upon snails, slugs and earthworms by injecting toxic digestive enzymes into their prey, which liquefies the flesh, allowing it to be easily consumed. In spring the adult male beetles take flight and flash their light signals as a mating display to the females, which remain on the ground. The females flash back a weaker signal to attract the flying males. The adults only live for a few days, they do not have mouthparts and so cannot feed. Their short lives mean that it is urgent that they find a mate quickly.

Unfortunately, global firefly populations are dwindling, in some places dramatically, due to loss of habitat, pesticide use and light pollution which interferes with their ability to produce and see light signals.

If you have a dark, damp bushy area on your property, have a look during early spring evenings – you may already have fireflies. If you want to create your own firefly haven in part of your garden, avoid pesticides, plant native species including groundcovers, let the grass grow, provide some water and keep the area dark by excluding artificial light.

Brown Antechinus – Antechinus stuartii, Palm Grove National Park



The brown antechinus is mainly found east of the Dividing Range from south-eastern Queensland to Victoria. It is a nocturnal, arboreal, carnivorous marsupial, feeding inter alia, on spiders, beetles and cockroaches, though females do not have a pouch.

## **SPRING HAS SPRUNG**

Spring has sprung which means it's mulberry season. If you have mulberries hanging over your back fence or you're on your walk home, why not grab the kids and get foraging. I use this mulberry compote in milkshakes, on my muesli, spooned over ice cream, or as a sweet braise for pork.

During the spring school holidays Mum would be at her wits' end by 8am, so she would march us outside and simply close the door and say come home at lunch time. "What do we do now?" my youngest brother would ask. With three pairs of beady eyes all staring at me like seagulls eyeing off chips at the beach: "Well boys, let's see if we can find some mulberries to eat!"

"YAY!" they would all cry in unison. "I'm going to climb the highest," the cheeky youngest would say. So off we would go ¬- the motley crew of four to the local reserve a few kilometres away where there were five huge mulberry trees. As the season wore on, we had to go higher and higher for the sweet delicious berries, shooing away the lorikeets that also liked to forage for these lovely berries. We would eat them until our bellies burst and our hands and faces were stained crimson red. Much to Mum's dismay.

When I think back to these times, I'm filled with happiness as there is something magical about picking fruit straight off the tree beautifully ripe and bursting with sweetness, especially for a city kid. So, I invite you dear reader to head out in the spirit of the forager and keep your eyes peeled for the magical mulberry. The tree produces way more fruit than even the most voracious eater of mulberries will ever be able to eat so I urge you to simply knock on the



owner's door and ask if you can pick a few. You can blame me as the instigator and, who knows, you may even meet a new friend.

Did you know? Mulberry leaves can be used to treat extremely dry skin by infusing them in coconut or olive oil for a few days and thereafter applying the oil onto your skin. For best results, repeat the ritual at least twice a week. Like various other fruits and vegetables, mulberries too contain lots of dietary fibre. Dietary fibre helps in improving your digestion by bulking up stool and speeding up the movement of food through the digestive tract. This reduces the occurrences of constipation, bloating, and cramping (especially good for those older readers).

The high iron content in mulberries can significantly boost the production of red blood cells which helps the body to increase its distribution of oxygen to important tissues and organ systems, hence, helping to boost metabolism and optimise functionality of those systems.

Vitamin C is a great weapon against any infection and foreign pathogens because it makes you stronger from within. As it is not stored or produced in the body, you need to get it from your diet. A single serving of mulberries is almost the entire requirement of vitamin C for the day.

They also contain a high amount of Vitamin A which is good for strengthening your eyesight and relieving eye strains. It also protects eyes from free radicals which is generally the cause of eyesight loss and retina degeneration.

### INGREDIENTS

- 750 grams mulberries
- 1 and a 1/3 cup of sugar (castor or raw)



- Juice and zest of 1 orange
- 2 tablespoons of honey

### METHOD

Take stems out of the mulberries and put into a stainless-steel bowl, breaking the berries up with your hands as you go.

Sprinkle with the sugar and let sit for at least an hour or up to 12 hours.

Put the berries in a saucepan, with the orange juice and zest and the honey. Put on a low heat and stir until the honey and sugar crystals have completely dissolved. Simmer for 20 minutes or until berries have really broken down.

Taste for sweetness. At this stage you can leave the compote as is or you can use a hand blender to puree it further. Mulberry seeds can often be quite tough and don't break down during the cooking process.

Makes 600 ml.


