

NOMINATIONS BEING SOUGHT FOR AUSTRALIA DAY AWARDS

Scenic Rim Council is calling for nominations for its 2021 Australia Day Awards as a shout-out to the quiet achievers of the Scenic Rim community.

Mayor Greg Christensen said the awards provided an important opportunity to shine a spotlight on the community champions who work behind the scenes to make the Scenic Rim Australia's best place in which to live.

"Our Australia Day Awards program is a fantastic way to acknowledge and celebrate the many selfless and hardworking people who give of themselves and their time to making a difference in the lives of others and their communities." he said.

"We all know someone worthy of recognition and I encourage everyone to make the most of this opportunity to nominate a friend, a family member, a work colleague or a community leader for their contribution to our region."

Community members who responded to the 2019 bushfires which devastated the region featured in the 2020 Scenic Rim Australia Day Awards and the 2021 awards will be presented against the backdrop of the global COVID-19 event and local impacts.

"Although our community has been disciplined in practising social distancing, it has come together to support one another through what has been one of the most challenging times for our region," Cr Christensen said.

"Floods, droughts and bushfires have made us a strong and united community and we are meeting the challenge of COVID-19.

"Recognising the innovation shown by individuals and community groups in response to COVID-19, the Community Event of the Year Award this year has been broadened to include online events."

The 2021 Scenic Rim Australia Day Awards will be presented across four categories:

- Community Event of the Year Award, for the individual, group or organisation which has staged the most outstanding community event, including online events, in the Scenic Rim region between 30 November 2019 and 30 November 2020.
- Citizen of the Year Award, for an exceptional young person who is accomplishing great things in all walks of life and making an outstanding contribution to the Scenic Rim community. Nominees must be between 16 and 30 years of age as at 26 January 2021.
- Citizen of the Year Award, for someone who has been an inspirational role model to the Scenic Rim community over a number of years. Nominees must be between 31 and 65 years of age as at 26 January 2021.
- Citizen of the Year Award, for an inspirational person aged 65 and over,

who continues to provide outstanding service to the Scenic Rim community and presents a positive image of ageing. Nominees must be 65 years or older as at 26 January 2021.

The 2020 Citizen of the Year in the over 65 years category, Frank White, was nominated for his outstanding contribution to the Tamborine Mountain community, and throughout the Scenic Rim region, as a volunteer minister and local State Emergency Services member.

Mr White said that simply being nominated for an Australia Day Award was an honour and a privilege.

"My greatest delight is being with people and serving others, but the recognition of an Australia Day award was exciting, both for myself and my extended family, and came as a great surprise," he said.

"I encourage people to take the time to nominate someone and I look forward to seeing this year's list of nominees."

DRIVER WARNING AFTER POWER POLE ACCIDENTS

After a horror run on Queensland roads, Energex is warning drivers to take more care around power poles and to stay line aware to help save lives.

This year there have already been hundreds of instances where vehicles have been involved in electricity network accidents.

With more Queenslanders than ever opting for road trips these school holidays, Energex is encouraging drivers to be aware of what to do if they're involved in a vehicle accident that brings down powerlines.

"When someone's in a car accident, often their first instinct is to get out of the vehicle and move away from the scene," said Energex spokesman Justin Madsen. "But if there are powerlines down over the vehicle, the safest place to be is inside your car. Remember these steps - STAY in the vehicle, CALL 000 and WAIT for help.

"Inside the vehicle is the safest place because there's a good chance the electrical asset you've struck or the powerlines over your car are still live and, if you try get out, the moment your foot touches the ground the electricity will run through your body, potentially killing you instantly.

"In the unlikely event that a vehicle catches fire, carefully jump from it, being very sure not to touch your car and ground at the same time. Then, hop or shuffle away for at least 10 metres, ensuring both feet remain together and in contact with the ground at all times," Justin said.

He said it was also human nature to want to help others who've been in a vehicle crash.

"However, if the accident involved electricity you have to keep your distance, keep others away and leave it to the experts.

"If you come across an accident scene where there are powerlines over a car, or it is touching anything electrical, never approach and try to touch the vehicle. The ground surrounding the vehicle may be live for up to t0 meters from the car or any downed powerlines.

"If it is you who's stuck in the car and you see people approaching to help, urge them to stay at least 10 metres away.



18 HOURS ON AN ICE FLOE AFTER ARCTIC PLANE CRASH

For 18 hours Oliver Edwards and his friend Troels Hansen clung to life on an ice floe in the dark depths of the Arctic winter, fearing they would succumb to the elements.

It was December 2008 and the two were on their way home to Sweden after buying a Cessna Skymaster aircraft in America, when the twin engines failed within minutes of each of other.

"There was an eerie silence of no engine power," Oliver recalls.

"We sent a distress signal and issued a mayday, and in five to seven minutes we were ditching in the water."

As the plane made a controlled crash landing near an ice floe off the southern coast of Baffin Island shards of ice smashed through the windscreen. Knowing they would die within five minutes in the icy waters, they had managed to direct the plane next to the small ice floe before it sank seconds later.

One wing rested on the sheet of ice allowing them to precariously climb onto it

"We were lucky to get out. By the time we got out the water was up to the ceiling."

It was 5pm but darkness had descended hours earlier in the Arctic winter.

Within a couple of hours their hopes soared as they heard and then saw choppers and planes flying back and forth and eventually overhead. However, all their equipment had sunk and with no flare gun or light they couldn't be seen.

As the long Arctic night stretched on, the task of how to survive in Minus 20 degrees, unable to sit down on the ice and without food or water became paramount.

"I started to think we wouldn't be found. We held out through the night for the morning air search to begin, but there was nothing because we were assumed dead.

"We knew we couldn't survive another night on the ice so decided to try to hop across the ice sheets to the shore we could see in the distance.

"The shore was about 10km away beyond the fragile ice sheets.

"There was no option - it was either lie down and die on the ice sheet or try to get to the shore and possibly die trying."

As they began the dangerous journey a light caught their eyes - a Danish fishing vessel was approaching.

"The captain was actually on the phone to the rescue centre asking if they could turn back and resume fishing after travelling for 15 hours and searching for three hours to find us," Oliver explained.

"We felt disbelief and it wasn't until we were sitting in the dinghy that we realised we had been saved. Even the walk to the dinghy across the ice was precarious. One fall into the icy water could have been catastrophic.

"The smell of humanity was something I will never forget. The massive diesel-powered ship."

Oliver's trials were not over once he reached Canada. Frostbite had attacked both feet and doctors feared he'd lose his toes.

"It took a number of weeks to know if the blood was going to return to my toes and thank God it did, and the doctors had the patience to wait and see."

One of the many news stories on the pair that spread around the world

caught the attention of a young Swedish woman.

"Martina was amazing. Her messages really hit my heart and it felt like we had a connection from the beginning.

"We continued messaging and ended up having our first meeting in Malaysia as we were both travelling the world," Oliver said.

Once back in Sweden their relationship blossomed and now they have three young children.

After years as a commercial pilot travelling the world, COVID-19 has taken Oliver's life in an exciting new direction and brought him to the mountain paradise he now calls home.

Oliver is following in his father Paul Edwards' well-trodden footsteps as an estate agent with Professionals Tamborine Mountain.

"Following in dad's footsteps is not an easy task, but my previous experiences on the ice and as a pilot have taught me that with the right enthusiasm, attitude and fighting spirit, the sky's the limit.

"Tamborine Mountain is a special place and I know more and more people will want to call it home in this new COVID-19 world."

with Witches Falls Winery

WILD FERMENTATION

Minimal intervention and wild fermentation are the cornerstones of our signature style at Witches Falls. By using as little interference as possible, we create wines rich with character, depth, and complexity. As one of Australia's pioneers in wild



fermentation, and the first of our kind in Queensland, our 2005 Wild Ferment Chardonnay marked the beginning of our venture into minimal interference.

The biggest of our three collections, Wild Ferment wines tend to exhibit a much

greater depth and complexity. As we like to say, wild fermentation leads to 'wines with character'. But what does it actually mean to 'wild ferment' a wine?

Fermentation is a natural occurrence that sees live yeast cultures source energy by converting sugars into alcohol. Simply put, these tiny, living particles take a modest grape juice, and elevate it to the complex and diverse delicacy we know as wine.

A freshly harvested grape already contains most of what is required to make wine. Sugar, to allow yeasts to produce enough alcohol to stabilise the wine; and acidity, to preserve and provide a fresh taste. Tannins, which exist within the skins of red grapes, can be used to make a wine bolder and more robust. What is arguably the most important element of a freshly harvested grape, however, is its natural inoculum of indigenous yeasts.



One of winemaking's most divisive areas, fermentation may be facilitated by either wild or commercially sourced yeasts. Each method imparts a separate and distinct influence upon the ways in which our wines can taste, smell, feel, and even look. These two divergent processes are defined by a complete reliance on what nature already provides, versus the expedience and consistency afforded by the addition of a commercial catalyst.

As a result, wild ferment wines will vary quite significantly between vintages, with each batch producing a fresh and unique flavour that distinguishes itself from its predecessor.

By contrast, our 'co-inoculated' wines incorporate the addition of active dried yeasts, a modernisation first popularised in the 1960s, as it removed the risks associated with relying solely on natural yeasts. Co-inoculation as we practise it, introduces two yeast strains, affording us greater control over our end product, as well as a much quicker, more efficient fermentation.

One of the best ways to discern the difference between a wild ferment and a coinoculate is to try them side by side. We have several varietals here which we produce under both methods. The resulting wines are always exceptionally diverse.

In the midst of COVID-19 and economic upheaval, the terrible bushfires last season, and no sign of solid, real drought-breaking rain in the region, local businesses in many sectors are still doing it tough. Please buy from and support local businesses – let's keep dollars in our communities.

Local businesses need our support, not only for the jobs they provide but for the contribution that so many give back to our community through sponsorships and support for great causes — whether by donations to sporting clubs, other community activities or community service organisations. Small businesses are the engine room of the Scenic Rim Electorate, driving innovation, employment and economic progress. When you shop locally, your money stays locally, with one dollar spent at a local business returning up to five times that amount through employee wages, rates and the purchase of materials and supplies. PUBLIC TRANSPORT FOR TAMBORINE MOUNTAIN

While there is a very limited FlexiLink service subsidised by Queensland Transport to Beenleigh Railway Station, that's it when it comes to public transport options for Tamborine Mountain. When similar communities to ours in the Sunshine Coast Hinterland – like Maleny and Montville – have regular TransLink services, the question needs to be asked as to why similar options are not available here.

A detailed briefing about a possible bus service has been put together by the Rotarians of Tamborine Mountain. I met with them last week to discuss this submission and their plan for presenting the submission to TransLink and the Government.

A lot of work has gone into this. Two years ago, hundreds signed a petition to Government calling for increased services — clearly this is an issue that many in the community feel strongly about. The objective in all of this is to enhance public transport options on the Mountain, and that could occur in a variety of ways. Thank you to everyone who is continuing to raise this important issue and I will continue to agitate for better public transport in the future.

WORLD WAR ONE EXHIBITION - YEAR 9 AT TMSHS

It was an absolute privilege to visit Tamborine Mountain State High School last week for the first look at the Year 9 Global Studies exhibition relating to World War One. Clearly, each student had immersed themselves in the topic and made a valuable contribution to the exhibition. One of the comments made by a teacher on the day was that learning about history in a way that brings it to life — especially through taking in personal accounts of those who were involved in the conflict — is much more engaging than reading about the events in a chronological way. Well done to Mrs Gibson and all of the other staff involved in this.

NEW GAMBLING COMMUNITY BENEFIT FUND ROUND IS OPEN

Council will investigate, warnings will be issued, and the events will still continue. On those nights when the music interrupts our peaceful lives, I will make a point of ringing you Derek to ask you what value the so-called stringent Council conditions are.

This is the first article from Cr Swanborough where he has praised the Council and its officers, all because they supported a development that he and not the residents consider will be good for the Mountain. Derek, we are not in the Gold Coast local government region despite your desire for us to be so — you really are a Councillor for the Gold Coast, not for Tamborine Mountain.

Instead of returning to Council and applying for an access warrant, what did the officer do? Well, he managed the "return to Council" bit, but that

The significant, mature trees, in Mapped Core Koala Habitat along the escarpment, were sacrificed for the sake of improving the view.

Unfortunately, the blow-in owner, in an act of sheer stupidity, decided to remove the trees prior to establishing the boundary line and consequently removed trees on the steep escarpment on the adjoining property. Lack of awareness (ignorance) is not a defence.

To compound the issues, the owners were not too keen on granting access to a surveyor to establish the boundary – after the trees were gone. Enter our local police, who, I'm sure, have better things to do other than act as an escort to a surveyor.

It is time our local real estate agents entered into a voluntary code of conduct under which they provide property purchasers with a sheet containing basic information such as their obligations re vegetation clearing.

Relationships

Over the next few weeks, we will be looking at seven principles that have been scientifically proven to be the common denominators of

satisfying, long lasting relationships.

The Gottman institute in the United States has been studying couple relationships for almost four decades and while these principles focus on couple relationships, they are also helpful keys that can be applied to improving our relationships in general.

The first principle is Enhancing Your Love Maps. What does this mean? Many couples fall into the habit of inattention to the details of their spouse's life. In the busyness of life, information is gathered on a need-to-know basis. One or both partners may have only a slight sense of the other's joys, likes, dislikes, fears, stresses. In contrast, emotionally intelligent couples are intimately familiar with each other's world and have made room in their brain to store all relevant information about their partner's life. This intimate knowledge is called a Love Map.

These successful couples remember the major events in each other's history. The anniversary of the death of a parent, for example, prompts an unexpected bunch of flowers. They know each other's favourite meal, what gifts to buy and which relatives to invite to a party. More importantly, they know each other's goals in life, their longings as well as their concerns.

We give our partner the greatest gift when we give them the joy of being known and understood. Not only is love deepened but the old saying 'in knowledge there is strength' proves true for relationships. Couples who have detailed love maps were found to be much better prepared to cope with stressful events and conflict. Love maps protect a relationship because partners are intently aware of what each other is feeling and thinking so during major upheavals they don't lose sight of each other.

Like a GPS, love maps require regular updates. It will be of little benefit 20 years into your marriage if you are still referring to a notebook of your partner's world that you compiled during your courting days. Major events and life stages can result in a metamorphic transformation in how we view the world and what we value. It is important to keep one another updated in what we are feeling and thinking. The more you know and understand about each other, the easier it is to keep connected as life swirls around you.

Expanding your love maps can be a fun exercise. Make a date night where the aim of the date is to discover something you did not know about each other. Yes, it's possible to learn something new even after five decades of togetherness. If you have no idea where to start, there are helpful tools you can access. Gottman Card Decks is a free app with ideas for questions to ask. Deepening your knowledge of another person enhances any relationship, so take up the challenge and reap the rewards.

I AM NO LONGER THE CHAMPION

Four weeks ago, my son beat me... proper beat me. Like, I tried my hardest to win, but he won, beat me.

He says he has beaten me many times before, but I know this was the first time he has proper beaten me. What made it worse was that I even injured myself trying to win, that's how hard I was going to not let him win. And what made it EVEN worse was the fact that I have only just stopped limping due to said injury.

"What happened?" I hear you ask.

Well, you know that game where you jump out of the swing at the park to see how far you can go? I was the family champion at that game. I no longer am. And I have a very sore ankle to back that fact up.

As I looked up from the ground near the swings holding my ankle, I couldn't help but notice that my beautiful baby boy is growing up. Despite the fact that he had just given me a flogging and was laughing at how badly I did on my final attempt to snatch a victory I was proud of him. He even helped me limp back to the car where his mother and teenage sister were waiting for me (you can imagine the

look that THEY both gave me). He is undeniably no longer a little boy.

It's not just that my son is getting stronger and faster and much more emotionally mature, he is also physically growing. He has always been a bit like a puppy with massive feet that seem way too big for him. Lately though, there are signs of the growth spurt that, in our family, tends to come a bit later than others.

To go with his growth, he is also starting to get some aches in his muscles at night. This is fairly common and can often be associated with growth spurts. Most of us label these aches as growing pains. Growing pains are real, but essentially harmless muscular pains that typically hit between the ages of three to five years of age and nine to 11 years of age. Sometimes it even continues into our adolescent years. It is thought that the aches and pains are due to the rapid changes in muscles and ligaments and changes in the way we move when our bones are going through swift growth periods.

Some of the symptoms of growing pains are: muscular aches and pains felt in both legs usually in the calf, behind the knee or in the front of the

thigh; the onset of pain around the late afternoon or evening (usually it is just when they are going to bed and you have had enough of them for they day); the fact that the pains come and go without too much of a pattern and moving the joints doesn't actually help a lot.

This pain can be severe enough to wake a child up, but generally does NOT impact on their ability to run or play sport. That is very important to note. If you think your child has growing pains, but the pain is through most of the day and is making it hard for them to play sport or run, then it is likely that they actually have some other musculoskeletal condition that they need help from the physios at Physique with.

However, true growing pains can be a normal part of getting older. The best way to treat them is with a lot of love, massages and heat packs. The pain will go away I guess a lot like the sting of defeat that I am feeling.

SNAKE CATCHING HELPS LIONS WILDLIFE PROJECT

When council services were reorganised to exclude snake catching, the then Division 1 Councillor, Vanessa Bull, received many requests for help with removing snakes from Tamborine Mountain properties.

Along with several other residents, she attended a snake handling course organised by the council and has coordinated local snake catching services since that time. Vanessa and fellow snake catcher Roger Baker are members of Tamborine Mountain Lions Club; they remove snakes found by property owners and release them in rural locations away from housing. Any injured snakes are taken to Currumbin Wildlife Hospital for treatment and rehabilitation.

Donations from thankful property owners were originally combined with generous funding from former local real estate agent Afra Hall-Beers to establish the Tamborine Mountain Lions Club Wildlife Project. The Wildlife Project is now supported by ongoing donations.

COUNCIL BACKS DOWN ON BOONAH TREE PLAN

Scenic Rim Regional Council announced on Monday it would retain three of the four Himalayan Ash trees in Boonah Town Centre following a review into alternative solutions for their future.

A controversial Council plan to remove the popular trees had been met with widespread community anger and opposition.

Scenic Rim Mayor Greg Christensen said Council had responded to the community's concern and undertook an analysis of several options, some of which were suggested by the local community.

"We were presented with a number of options to keep some of the invasive trees, all which have respective tradeoffs in relation to risk, design outcomes, project costs and ongoing operational costs," he said.

"Council agreed to relocate the power pole on the western side of the southern pedestrian crossing to keep two of the trees, costing an estimated \$35,000.

"This allows for the pedestrian crossing to be retained in its current location and maintains the safety aspects by allowing people to cross the street with visibility.

"The planned Persons with Disability carpark will be relocated closer to the Council offices, which means the loss of one other carpark, and the removal of one tree outside Glen's Diner, which will be replaced with a Golden Penda (*Xanthostemon chrysanthus*)."

Division 5 Councillor Marshall Chalk said it was important to link the redevelopment of the forecourt with the space outside the IGA.

"The aim of the project is to create a vibrant public space in this central area. However, we took on board the community engagement about having access to more parking in the High Street," he said.

"Some of the other options to retain the trees meant the loss of up to four car parks, so we wanted to minimise the reduction in parking numbers.

"To minimise the risk of the invasive tree spreading into waterways, Council will install a gross pollutant trap in the drainage system to intercept seeds, which will cost approximately \$100,000.

"Council will try to find cost savings within the project to cover this initial cost, which will also have ongoing maintenance costs of \$10,000 per year.

"The trap will provide additional benefits of catching other debris from the street, which will also eliminate it going into the waterway."

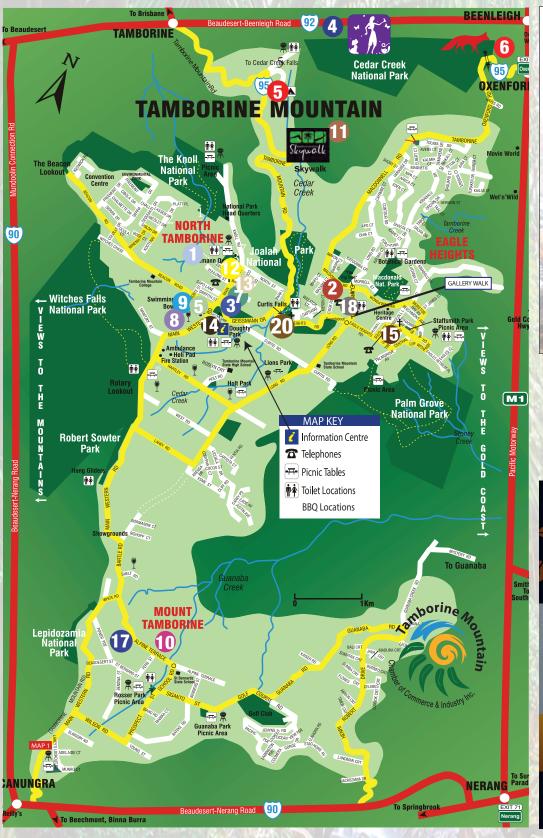

TAMBORINE MOUNTAIN NEW CITIZENS

Last Thursday it was a pleasure to attend a citizenship ceremony in Beaudesert where 21 persons from all over the world were being sworn in as Australian citizens. It was a COVID safe event so social distancing was in place.

Unfortunately, we were not encouraged to mingle afterwards and have afternoon tea or a chat, so I regret not being able to meet in person. Congratulations to all the new citizens, particularly the seven residents of Tamborine Mountain, some of whom have lived here for some time, making the step to become citizens. I was surprised and delighted that our new Mountain citizens came from seven different countries as well: Netherlands, Indonesia, Japan, South Africa, Papua New Guinea, New Zealand and United States.

SCARECROW FESTIVAL

I hope everyone enjoyed the Tamborine Mountain Scarecrow Festival. I know my young grandchildren thought it was pretty good, and from what I observed it generated a lot of media coverage and visitation. Congratulations to the organisers and those imaginative people who spend the time putting together such great variety and creativity into their displays. Ever since COVID-19 travel restrictions, Tamborine Mountain has become a honey pot for Brisbane and Gold Coast tourists, unlike anything seen before in my 35 years' living here. This appeal is obvious to all of us who live here; our village is one of the great treasures of South East

Queensland, offering healthy lifestyle, clean air, magnificent views, fertile soils, unpolluted night sky, cooler climate, and close proximity to the Gold Coast with its world class infrastructure and beaches.

OUR FUTURE - WHERE WILL IT LEAD US?

We need a vibrant economy and our businesses need to prosper and grow, as we enjoy the facilities they provide as much as anyone. Our destination popularity will in time translate to much higher property values, and return on investment, but at the same time we are seeing congestion, traffic noise, parking problems, litter, some anti-social behaviours and our facilities struggling to manage all the extra activity.

I understand residents' concerns about this and know that it's my job to find a balance and solutions. The genie is out of the bottle and we have been discovered. Population growth in South East Queensland translates to more visitors: they cannot be stopped. If our lifestyle is to be preserved, a greater injection of funds into our infrastructure is needed. Our roads are on the decline, our Council buildings and services are aged and depreciating, our drainage needs serious money, we lack pedestrian walkways and bikeways, we desperately need the Long Road extension for community safety against catastrophic fire up the western escarpment and to ease the "cloqged on weekends" Main Western Road. We need new evacuation centres, water security, State Government, cultural, social and community services, and public transport to the Gold Coast where our Community of Interest lies and where our rates would be mostly half of what they are now for an owner-occupied house.

Whilst I believe Council understands the problems, its long terms plans means that the damage will be done long before it can respond or is willing to. Competition for resources in Beaudesert and Boonah to cater for speculative growth in the next 20 years completely ignores the visitation growth and pressures on Tamborine Mountain that is a reality today. It is rarely spoken of; it's not in any overall strategy to address.

I believe Tamborine Mountain has simply outgrown the Scenic Rim and our greatest opportunity is to join with Gold Coast City Council with a billion dollar budget that can afford to respond to our infrastructure needs, environmental and legal protections, bushfire mitigations and our values, and promote us while protecting our lifestyle as a valuable destination in the Gold Coast Hinterland.

Planning is under way for you to have your say on the issue in the New Year.

PUT OFF, PUT ON

No, I'm not talking about weight loss but about biblical transformation. Our culture seems to be consumed with changing our external appearance while the Bible is more concerned about what is going on in the 'heart'. The New Testament uses the word 'cardia', (cardiac, cardiology, etc.) when speaking about the heart, but the word means more than the muscle that pumps our blood.

Jesus says it is out of the heart that the issues of life come. 'For out of the heart come evil thoughts, murder, adultery, sexual immorality, theft, false testimony, slander.' (Matthew 15:19). Jesus was making the point that our problems originate inside us where we think and feel and desire. And that our relationship with God is not something that can be put right by external ceremonies or religious works.

Although we have come to associate the heart with affections, feelings, and sentiments, as in, 'that warms my heart', the Bible gives it more weight in our lives. The heart is spoken of as the centre out of which we speak, think, and act. It is here that we set ourselves to do good or evil.

When we receive by faith the work of Christ on our behalf, it is as if God gives us a new heart, new thoughts, new desires, new commitments, new motivations and affections. It is not a new muscle, but a new orientation of our innermost life.

The apostle Paul encourages us, 'Since then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on things above, not on earthly things.' (Colossians 3:1-2)

VOLCANOES



Volcanoes have played a crucial role in forming our planet's surface, thus producing an environment conducive for life to develop.

The basic reason volcanoes occur is that pressurised molten rock (magma) erupts through a weak point in the Earth's surface. Gases, debris, magma and ash are projected through the rupture.

Most volcanoes form along the boundaries of tectonic plates. Tectonic plates are huge slabs of the Earth's crust which are rigid but float on the hotter, softer layer of the Earth's mantle. These plates move continuously and independently. If the plates are sliding along beside each other the surface is stable, but if the plates are pulling apart (diverging) or pushing together (converging) then weak spots in the surface are created.

This is why boundaries of tectonic plates experience volcanoes and earthquakes, the most active being the Pacific Rim of Fire. Volcanoes can also be found away from tectonic plate boundaries at hotspots where the surface is stretched or thin and magmatic activity can push upward through the crust.

Australia is now the only continent without volcanic activity, but one of the world's largest extinct volcanoes is part of our local landscape. Around 23 million years ago the Tweed volcano erupted and over a period of three million years a vast, complex, dome shaped shield volcano stretching from Lismore to Tamborine Mountain was formed. In its prime the crater rim was estimated to be two kilometres in height and lava flows covered 7000 square kilometres.

Over millions of years the lavas decomposed leaving the distinctive features of Mount Warning which was the central core of the volcano, and the rim of the caldera. Both were composed of hard basaltic rock which was more resistant to erosion. Arthur Groom, naturalist and founder of Binna Burra, described this feature as the Scenic Rim.

There have been many notable volcanic events during the short history of modern humans. The Toba super-eruption occurred in Indonesia approximately 74,000 years ago. This was an eruption of catastrophic proportions, which produced major impacts throughout the world. In approximately 180 AD, Taupo in New Zealand erupted so violently that fiery red skies produced by its ash were recorded in China and Rome.

Volcanoes remain powerful and active. Overall, there are 44 volcanoes with ongoing eruptions and about 20 actively erupting on any particular day. In 2019 there were 73 total eruptions and so far in 2020 there have been 55 eruptions.



This perfect springtime dish could be considered the posh cousin of the carbonara. If you can make a decent carbonara and you like salmon, this dish will rock your world. The key to this dish is to perfectly cook the salmon and if you want to take it to a god-like status, you can use fresh handmade pasta.

I learned how to make fresh pasta only a few years ago as it just wasn't a done thing in our household a when I was growing up. Ninety per cent of the pasta we ate was spaghetti; makes sense as bolognaise was the sauce. The wonderful thing about this dish is the way all the ingredients work so well together – the acid and freshness from the tomato, the crispy soft salmon with the creamy balanced sauce from the wine and lime; now add a bit of peppery rocket to the mix and 'flavour town' is the result.

Did you know salmon is a heavy hitter in terms of Omega-3 fatty acids? Because we're not able to produce the essential fatty acids in our body, we have to look to our diet. Specifically, the oily fish contains EPA and DHA Omega-3 fatty acids, which help to decrease inflammation, and protect your heart and your brain; this helps to keep the integrity of the fattier areas of the brain also. Protein is essential for healing, growth, and maintaining muscle mass and metabolism, and salmon is a lean source of protein which also keeps you full for longer.

Salmon contains nearly the whole spectrum of B Vitamins, which contribute to maintaining energy levels, preventing inflammation, protecting the heart, and bolstering brain function. Getting all those B Vitamins in one source is really important, as it helps with absorption as opposed to piecing them together through many different sources. You'll get around half of your RDI of B12, niacin, and B6 in a 130g serving of salmon. You know how





flamingos turn pink because of all the small crustaceans and algae they eat? Well it turns out salmon is similar, and the hue has some added health benefits. The fish's pinkish, red colour comes from an antioxidant called astaxanthin, which salmon get from their diet. For you, it helps decrease bad cholesterol and increase the good. Studies show it may even work with Omega-3 fatty acids to help prevent inflammation in the nervous system and brain.

This antioxidant is good for skin thanks to its anti-ageing properties. Everybody likes to talk about how salmon keeps our skin and our hair healthy, and it's because of the astaxanthin antioxidant. It can even help combat the signs of UV damage and prevent water loss. That's some good reasons to eat salmon. Be brave and have a go at this.

INGREDIENTS (SERVES FOUR)

- 300g dried fettuccine pasta
- 2 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 x 220g salmon fillets, skinned and seasoned with salt and pepper
- 1 small brown onion, chopped finely
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 teaspoons finely grated lime rind
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- 1/4 cup (60ml) good quality dry Verdelho wine
- 300ml cream
- 1 tablespoon corn flour + 2 tablespoons water in a cup and stir (to make a slurry)

- 1 teaspoon black peppercorns, crushed
- 1 tablespoon capers
- 10 cherry tomatoes cut in1/2
- 1/3 cup fresh baby rocket
- 1 lime cut into quarters to garnish

METHOD

Cook pasta in large saucepan of boiling water for 12 to 15 minutes until tender; drain.

While pasta is cooking, heat 1 tbs oil in large frying pan, and pan fry salmon until nicely browned on both sides 2 to 3 minutes or cooked as desired.

Remove from frypan and gently place salmon in large bowl; and with 2 forks gently flake into large pieces.

Heat remaining tablespoon of oil in same pan.

Cook onion and garlic, stirring, until fragrant 3 mins.

Add lime rind, lime juice and wine; bring to the boil.

Continue to gently boil, stirring, until liquid reduces to about 3 tablespoons, add tomatoes and stir.

Stir in cream, peppercorns, capers and slurry; return to the boil. Sauce will thicken quickly.

Remove from heat, add pasta to cream sauce and mix and coat pasta well.

Serve pasta into 4 bowls and top with warm salmon, then sprinkle with parsley. Garnish with lime.




