
### AIMING FOR THE STARS.... AND FOR THE MOON

"Two years ago I could not believe that I got up at 3 in the morning to look at the moon," a mother of two told us during our weekly TM Universe session at the Visitors Information Centre (VIC).

"There I was with my girls looking at the eclipse with hundreds and hundreds of other people. But I have to admit that it changed our interest in the night skies forever. We're very dedicated members of TM Universe."

The eclipse was a great event indeed, and the good news is it's going to happen again. Write in your diary now: Wednesday 26 May 2021; a full lunar eclipse will be visible from the Tamborine Mountain between 7pm and 12 pm. The Team of TM Universe will keep you informed closer to the event.

And if you can't wait that long, on Monday 30 November a partial lunar eclipse will occur early in the evening,



low over the north-eastern horizon. The moon will rise at 6.20 pm, reach the maximum cover as depicted in the figure at 7.42pm and will end around 9.45pm. A location with a view to the northern Gold Coast should do the job (unless it's cloudy of course).

The girls who came with their Mum to the VIC, became fully immersed in the Virtual Reality demonstration – so excited to see the stars, and the rockets, and ... so much more.

Each Saturday between 11am and mid-day members of TM Universe can enjoy the demonstration there. Our volunteers also give

information about the project and have merchandise for sale – the T-shirts are selling well.

This exciting community-driven project is rapidly gaining momentum. In the major fundraiser – Buy a Block – there are fewer than a third of the 200 blocks left. For \$200 you can still become a Founding Member of TM Universe

## CANUNGRA CREEK FLOWS ARE CONTINUING TO DROP

Despite the welcome rainfall in October, flows in Canungra Creek are continuing to drop and are currently sitting at just under three megalitres per day.

With no good rainfall predicted over the next fortnight, the move to level two drought response, which is triggered when flows in the creek fall below 0.5 megalitres per day, is imminent.

As part of drought response, Seqwater is tracking flows in Canungra Creek daily and Urban Utilities is closely monitoring water usage in town, which has been around 165 litres per person per day in October. This was an increase from 130 litres per person per day in September.

Urban Utilities spokesperson, Michelle Cull, said they were working with Seqwater and preparing for level two drought response.

"Drought levels can progress in quick succession in Canungra. If the creek stops flowing and Seqwater needs to take their water treatment plant offline, Seqwater will tanker drinking water to Canungra to maintain the town supply," she said.

"If the treatment plant goes offline, we plan to maintain direct access to the Canungra tanker filling station for local off-network households. Commercial carting operators will be directed to use alternative filling stations, with the closest being in Beaudesert.

"Those who rely on tank water should consider their circumstances now and top up their tanks or plan ahead for a potential increase in delivery times from commercial carters."

While the Bureau of Meteorology advises that an active La Nina weather cycle is still in effect across Northern Australia, Canungra Creek, which is the raw water supply for Seqwater's Canungra Water Treatment Plant, requires regular rainfall in order to maintain flow year-round.

"We are providing as much notice to the community as we can, and we understand drought is a challenging time," said Ms Cull.

Panels in the display, included with the permission of family members and participants, are from the council's 2015 Black Diggers exhibition and 2016 Kinship exhibition.

Mununjali Elder, Aunty Roslyn Yuke, whose late mother, Joyce Yuke, features in the display, said it was a meaningful tribute to the Mununjali people of Beaudesert.

"We're very proud of our history, and to see the old photos of the kids brings back lots of great memories of growing up in Petersen Street," she said.

"We'll always remember our Mununjali history, our culture, our land and our families - that's what it's all about."

# **HERITAGE DECISION A SETBACK FOR COUNCIL**

The historic Beaudesert calf and pig saleyard has been recommended for inclusion on the Queensland Heritage Register.

If listed, it would give legislative protection to the saleyard and block moves by Scenic Rim Regional Council to redevelop the area as part of a proposed town revitalisation project.

On 12 November, the Department of Environment and Science recommended to the Heritage Council that the saleyard be entered in the Heritage Register as a State Heritage Place.

The Heritage Council has 60 business days from the heritage recommendation date to decide whether a place is or is not entered in the Heritage Register.

Entry in the register would prevent Scenic Rim Regional Council from proceeding with its plan to demolish the



saleyard and close the popular, fortnightly sales that have been conducted there for more than 100 years.

The department received more than 35 community submissions, all of which supported the yard's historical significance.

A Scenic Rim Regional Council spokesman said Council was aware of the Department of Environment and Heritage's recommendation to the Heritage Council.

Council was respectful of the process that was being undertaken and would await the final outcome before any further comments were made.

Darlington cattle farmer, Sue Harrison, who started a petition to save the yards, said the news was encouraging.

"We still have a way to go but this is a positive step in the right direction," she said.

"There are a lot of passionate rural people around here who used the saleyard back in the day and still do today.

"I really want to thank all the people who signed the petitions or put in a submission. We had more than 1200 people sign the petitions."

The saleyard site was slated to be developed into a park as part of Council's proposed Vibrant Towns and Villages project.

There was significant public objection to this due to lack of adequate community consultation by Scenic Rim Council prior to the project's plans being adopted.

Council voted to oppose any heritage listing and to not open further consultation with the community.

"Since opening three weeks ago I have really appreciated all the





# A WEEKEND IN ITALY

Of course, right now a weekend



Australia, however, is starting to traverse a void when it comes to Italian wines. More and more commonly, the vineyards of Australia are being planted with the likes of Sangiovese, Vermentino, Nebbiolo, and Fiano. The list certainly doesn't stop there, with more than 3000 different varietals of *vitis vinifera* being traced back to the hillsides of Italian vineyards. This certainly makes Italy one of the powerhouse countries for classic wine production, traditional values and techniques, and home to some of the most famous and rarest wines in the world.

So why are we only just starting to discover some of these Italian varieties?

The answer lies in the demand for diversity. This diversity is in large part being driven by changes in consumer tastes but also by climate change as viticulturalists look for varieties that can survive and flourish in increasingly warmer growing conditions.

Australia's vineyards are dominated by French grape varieties largely as a result of history. When the first cuttings



were imported, French varieties, and to a lesser extent some Spanish, were recognised as producing some of the finest wines at the time.

Italian grape varieties are considered more savoury than their French counterparts and this coupled with their higher acidity and greater structure generally makes them more food friendly.

The Australian wine industry also has a history of experimentation. As a New World wine region, it is not bound by the same constraints and regulations as an Old World wine region like France. This gives flexibility to plant grape varieties wherever they are most suited and to dig up varieties and plant new ones to replace them based on changes in demand and tastes.

Climate change is also a major factor. With the average temperature throughout the summer ripening period increasing, Australian viticulturalists are looking for varieties that can survive and flourish in warmer conditions. Italian varietals maintain good levels of natural acidity in warmer climates, making them extremely suitable.

So, it's really not surprising that these Old World Italian varietals have started making waves in the area. With their vivacious character, ability to age, complexity, classic elegance in the glass and food-friendly nature they are the new playthings of Australian vignerons. Thankfully, many of them have found their way onto our wine list here at Witches Falls and have become some of our most loved varieties.



#### **NATIONAL ROAD SAFETY WEEK**

National Road Safety Week (15 to 22 November) is a joint annual initiative of the Safer Australian Roads and Highways (SARAH) Group, road safety organisations and all levels of Government.

Such an important week, National Road Safety Week highlights the impact of road trauma and deaths on our roads. In particular, the week focuses on vulnerable road users and those affected by road trauma in their daily lives, such as traffic managers, heavy vehicle drivers, police and emergency services, roadside assistance operators and road workers.

Mr Frank White has kindly forwarded a copy of his draft Letter to the Editor prior to publication and I advised him I would respond with a reply if it were to be published.

Mr White says the protagonists, meaning myself and others, must be transparent and accountable as to vested interests and sources of funding for this move. Does that suggest some possible hidden agenda or even impropriety? This initiative prior to the election was mine and mine alone, and I funded my own election campaign.

I did it because after 12 years of belonging to the Scenic Rim it has proved the worst outcome for Tamborine Mountain. Enough is Enough. I lost count of how many times Cr Swanborough was interrupted (around 17 from memory), prevented from completing a sentence, let alone permitted to finish a question. No other councillors are treated in this manner. No other councillors bring this seemingly inappropriate meeting behaviour to account. I think this clarifies who is effectively denying us "real and effective representation", and it isn't Division One's councillor.

All attempts by Cr Swanborough to gain clarity and ascertain sufficient information upon which councillors could base an informed vote in the Coles development application matter were effectively stifled by the Chairperson, Mayor Christensen.

One councillor's entire contribution to the agenda item was "I second the motion". Cr Enright and Cr McConnell at least make regular, meaningful contributions in council meetings. Some others could simply be classified as "bums on seats".

At the Ordinary Meeting held on 9 November the majority of councillors voted to continue discussing planning applications in "confidential briefings" rather than in open Planning Committee meetings which were open to the public. On 12 October new Queensland legislation was introduced – which came about as a result of the CCC's investigation into and sacking of Ipswich City Council (Belcarra) – with the intent of increasing transparency in councils. That message is clearly lost on "our" council.

Rather than realigning our Mountain with Gold Coast City Council, there is a third option – Tamborine Mountain "go it alone". Who better to manage our Mountain than ourselves? I am interested to hear from other likeminded locals, who can contact me at: frangipani1956@msn.com

# "Can we PLEASE do Boxing Day this year?"

It is starting to feel like Christmas. We have had the ceiling fans on at our house. A sure sign that summer has well and truly started as there is certainly no other season when our fans get turned on in our Mountain home. There have been some massive storms ripping over our Mountain, reminding us of the fact that with the heat often comes the wild weather. And the real kicker, Christmas beetles have started turning up inside again.

I was discussing this with Owen, my amazing 10-year-old son and I reminded him of something he had done five years ago when he was still only in Prep at school. He had woken me up very early in a very agitated state with a very important question to ask. "Dad," Owen had said excitedly, "Can we PLEASE do Boxing Day this year?" "Ok," I remember thinking to myself, "this should be interesting. "Aaahhhh, yeah buddy," I had said as I tried to open my weary eyes. "Boxing Day? We'll totally do it this year," hoping that I would be able to go straight back to sleep. Not to be put off by my eyes closing again, Owen had happily punched the air and exclaimed "Yes!" Then after a pause he had then asked with a quizzical look on his face, "So do we all just wake

up and start punching each other or what?"

This got me thinking about how our perceptions influence our actions and our beliefs greatly. Owen was excited about Boxing Day when he thought he could go to town on his big sister's head while she was still asleep. He was far less enthusiastic about it when he found out it meant a day of lazing around while Dad and Grandad watched the cricket!

It is the same way with things that are good for us. A lot of us have a perception that the things that help us with our health are hard work, unpleasant and impossible to find the time to fit in. Consequently, our perceptions shape our actions and often lead us to never follow through on our New Year resolutions to eat healthier and exercise more.

However, if a doctor said to you, there is a treatment that has been shown to: decrease the effects of knee arthritis by 47 per cent; reduce progression of dementia and Alzheimer's by 50 per cent; decrease the progression of people at risk of diabetes by 50 per cent; reduce the risk of hip fracture in post-menopausal women by 41 per cent; reduce anxiety by 48 per cent; relieve depression 30 to

47 per cent of the time: lower the risk of death by 23 per cent; and generally improve your quality of life - what would you say?

Most of us would be asking to start treatment immediately. Well, the treatment is exercise. To be precise, the research demonstrates that it is walking just 30 minutes a day.

Just 30 minutes!

It is time to change our perception about this. Rather than how can I fit in some exercise? it is time to ask ourselves, is it possible for me to limit my sitting, sleeping and working to only 23-and-ahalf hours a day? Surely, all of us can find the time to fit in just 30 minutes of walking every day? The benefits are extraordinary.

# **BRIDGES**

The word 'bridge' has a multiplicity of meanings: a card game; part of a stringed instrument; false teeth; part of a song; a structure that spans an obstacle. It can also refer to a relational connection between two people. A relational bridge is built on the same premises as that of a structural bridge.

Bridges are required to span a gap between two separated bodies in order to provide a passage between them. Bridges overcome obstacles. Civil engineers need to be visionary, creating what may be described as a masterpiece of modern engineering. Safety often relies on untried designs or unproven materials as engineers put faith in their own knowledge and expertise.

It is this type of measured visionary faith that is required when we embark on the adventure of building

relationships. We draw strength from our belief that our commitment to each other will overcome differences and bridge the gap that separates us. If we do not believe in the power and safety of the relationship, obstacles will grow in our minds and undermine the foundation of the bridge which will eventually be swept away.



Another aspect of bridge building is that bridges

serve a necessary function. Bridge building requires a huge investment and sacrifice. Sydney Harbour Bridge cost the lives of 16 bridge builders. The sacrifice involved is driven by a belief that our investment will serve a useful purpose.

The Humber Estuary Bridge in Yorkshire was the longest span of any cable-suspension bridge in the world when constructed. It was regarded as an outstanding example of engineering. Problem was, the community did not believe that it was necessary and chose not to use it. It was labelled the bridge from nowhere to nowhere. The same can be applied to the formation of relationships. Once the obstacles have been overcome, transport (communication) can take place. However, if we don't fully grasp the necessity of a relationship it will quickly become obsolete in our thinking and we will abandon it.

A new relationship is like a bridge under construction. It starts out like a shaky rope bridge. It is initially fragile. Saying the wrong thing could mean it doesn't survive. Over time our long-term relationships get strengthened. As obstacles arise, we take a risk and trust the relationship will take the weight. The relational bridge sees an increase in traffic. Over time pylons and cables of trust are added and the bridge is reinforced. We learn to give feedback, risk self-disclosure, and have confidence that the relationship can bear the weight.

Constructing relational bridges begins when we overcome obstacles in our mind. If previous bridges have collapsed, we have to conquer fear of failure. There is always an element of risk. Winning the mental battle requires faith in the project and overcoming fear of the unknown. The fulfilment of genuine connection makes it all worthwhile.

"Sharing discoveries with the people who buy my work or with other potters is something that makes me happy and keeps my enthusiasm for the craft alive," said Nicci.







**Rotary Tamborine Mountain has** just celebrated the presentation of the Charter for the newly founded Tamborine Mountain Rotary Satellite Club of Coomera River.

The Charter was presented by Mr Andy Rajapakse, District Governor, at a dinner event at Eagle Heights Mountain Resort that was attended by past and present Rotarians and community members.

Andy shared a brief overview of the history of Rotary. The first Rotary club was formed in 1905 in Chicago by Mr Paul Harris. Initially it was set up as a platform for networks, friendships and sharing of ideas. The name 'Rotary' derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.

Rotary's popularity spread throughout the United States in the decade that followed: clubs were chartered from San Francisco to New York. By 1921 Rotary clubs had been formed on six continents.

Over time Rotary's reach and vision gradually extended to global humanitarian

The first motto of Rotary International in 1911 was: He/she Profits Most Who Serves Best.

Rotary International was invited by the Unites States to serve as consultant to its delegation at the San Francisco conference where the United Nations was founded and chartered?

Today Rotary International is an international service organisation whose stated purpose is to bring together business and professional leaders in order to provide humanitarian service and to advance goodwill and peace around the world.

It is a non-political and non-religious organisation open to all. There are more than 35,000 member clubs worldwide, with a membership of 1.2 million individuals, known as Rotarians. Rotary also embraced a code of ethics, called the 'four-way test':

Is it FAIR to all concerned?

Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?

# NIGHT AND DAY - INSECT CHORUS

A sure sign that the warmer weather has arrived is the constant chorus of insects.

Higher ambient temperatures trigger increased activity in insects, including calling. During the day we are serenaded by cicadas and in the evening the Orthopterans – grasshoppers, locusts, crickets and katydids, take the stage. We can only hear the calls within human audio range and much of this insect chorus is above or below the auditory sense abilities of humans.

The well-known song of the cicada is a mating call, which is made only by males. A broken erratic distress call can also be emitted when an individual is captured.

There are more than 200 species of cicada in Australia, each species has its own distinctive mating call. Australian cicadas are the loudest insects in the world; large species such as the double drummer and greengrocer can produce noise intensity in excess of 120 decibels.



Organs called tymbals, which are ribbed membranes at the base of the abdomen, produce the cicada's song. Contracting and relaxing the tymbal muscles produce a pulse of sound.

Male and female cicadas can hear through a hearing organ known as a tympana, but the male also has the capacity to crease his tympana when he sings to prevent being deafened by his own song. Some cicada species only call at dusk; usually these are weak flyers which do not sing during the day as they would be vulnerable to predators.

As darkness falls, the Orthopterans start their chorus. This is a blend of many species producing different sounds for a variety of purposes including courtship, territory, communication and distress calls. Each species creates and recognises its own distinct calls and can discern very small change in vibrations.

Orthopterans create their calls by stridulation of specially adapted parts of their legs and wings which act as files and scrapers to make sounds. They have hardened upper surfaces of their forewings and a row of pegs on their legs which are scraped together, or they may produce sounds by scraping edges of their wings together.

In both methods the fine membrane of the wings vibrates, thereby amplifying the sounds. Some species also produce sounds by grinding their jaws. In order to hear the calls, these insects have a range of sound receptors including sensory hairs, sensory cells in antennae and tympanal organs on their abdomen or front legs.

**Banana Bush** – *Tabernaemontana pandacaqui*, property, North Tamborine.



This Australian tropical rainforest plant occurs in Queensland and north-eastern New South Wales. Its fruit sufficiently resembles a banana to give the plant one of its common names, the other being windmill bush. The plant is also native to China, Thailand and Papua New Guinea, inter alia. It grows to a height of six metres or more.

Most people who have ever been to an Indian restaurant know about tandoori lamb cutlets, but I bet you have never had a butter chicken flavoured lamb cutlet.

Last Sunday I had one of my old apprentices come up from Tasmania where he is the sous chef in a one hatted restaurant. His love of fine dining food came after I sent him on a threemonth stay at my friend's two Michelin starred restaurant in Holland.

I created this hybrid dish as part of a seven-course degustation I cooked for him and his new partner.

When I think back to my childhood, there were three restaurants we went to - a Chinese, a Sizzler and an Indian. Just before I left to go to Oxford to start my two-year working visa, my father invited me to a leaving dinner at his favourite Indian restaurant. We had been going there for years and knew the owner very well. We would always order the same thing: a butter chicken, garlic naan, rogan josh (mild) and rice to share. In this particular restaurant all diners would get some papadums, mango chutney, raita and diced red onion served as a gift to whet the appetite (this is the reason my father came here).

My father had never been overseas and was quite anxiously finishing the last of his papadum when he asked: Aren't you worried you won't find a job?" Just as I was about to answer I got the very distinctive whiff of tandoori lamb. It's a wonderful smell as you



may well know. Anyway, suddenly the owner placed a beautifully presented rack of six tandoori cutlets down in front of us, garnished with some cucumber and lemon; the protruding bone was beautifully wrapped with foil. "We didn't order this," said my father suddenly worried (they were the most expensive thing on the menu hence the reason we had never had them). The owner looked at my father with kind eyes then looked at me and said: They're from my wife and I, as a farewell gift. A good luck blessing has been placed upon them he said proudly.

My father sat there googly eyed with his mouth open like a like a Venus fly trap, his brain not quite computing what had just taken place. "WOW, that's very kind of you both; thank you so much," I blurted out. "Please enjoy" said the owner, smiling and wobbling his head in the Indian fashion.

My mouth instantly began to salivate. I picked one up and tenderly squeezed on a little lemon and took my first bite. OMG! The lamb was beautifully charred on the outside from the intense heat of the tandoor oven and the succulent meat was super tender but the flavour was what blew me away. The acid from the lemon balanced out the crispy fat that boarded the fillet perfectly. It was truly magical. I nibbled on the bone like a starved hamster getting every skerrick of meat from the little morsel of the gods. I had found my new favourite Indian delight. Tandoori lamb where had you been all my life?

I've tried to make it at home but it's very hard to recreate the intense heat in the oven

The trick is you have to cook it on a Weber style BBQ; leave it on high with the lid closed for about 20 minutes, then very quickly place the lamb cutlets on the grill and close it up before too much heat escapes. They only take 5 minutes, and they taste amazing. And the great news it they are super easy to prepare. I got the lamb from Jo the butcher down at Canungra, one of only a few butchers who open on a Sunday.



Did you know lamb is a fantastic source of Iron? As a red meat, lamb inherently has a lot more iron than other protein sources like chicken or fish. It's also a Vitamin B powerhouse and is loaded with immune-boosting zinc. Lamb does contain fat, but a significant portion of that fat is anti-inflammatory Omega-3 fatty acids. Grass-fed lamb meat provides its consumers with conjugated linoleic acid (CLA). CLA has been shown to help aid fat loss and improve lean muscle mass.

#### **INGREDIENTS (SERVES 4)**

- 12 lamb cutlets
- 3 tbs Greek yogurt
- 4 tbs Mudgeeraba spice butter chicken paste

#### **METHOD**

- In a bowl mix yoghurt and butter chicken paste together.
- Coat each lamb cutlet and marinate for 2 hours or overnight.
- Heat BBQ with lid down for 20 minutes until screaming hot and grill for 3 minutes with the lid closed, then only 2 minutes on the other side (if you like it pink).
- Serve with fresh lemon wedge.

### Our Book Choice: Do Not Say We Have Nothing by Madeleine Thien



In a single year, my father left us twice. The first time, to end his marriage, and the second, when he took his own life. I was ten years old."

- The dark parts of the Moon are dark for the same reason the night side of the Earth is dark they're facing away from the Sun. As the Moon orbits Earth it is at various angles to the Sun.
  But we only ever see one side of the Moon because it takes 27 days to fully rotate, which is
  the same time it takes to orbit Earth once.
- In 1928, the International Astronomical Union decreed that there would be 88 constellations.
  The constellations were the same star groupings that had been recognised since antiquity,
  but some minor groupings that had fallen out of use were incorporated into the major
  constellations.
- 3. Proxima Centauri is our closest neighbour. It is roughly 4.25 light years away from us. It is the dimmest star in a three-star system called Alpha Centauri. The other two stars in the system Alpha Centauri A and Alpha Centauri B are around 4.35 light years away. The star system, which is in the constellation of Centaurus, is the brightest of the two "pointer stars" that lead to the Southern Cross. Io is the third largest of Jupiter's moons. Altogether Jupiter has at least 67 moons. The other three largest are: Ganymede, Callisto and Europa.
- 4. The Geminids meteor shower, produced by debris from the asteroid 3200 Phaethon happens in December. The Eta Aquarids meteor shower, produced by debris from Halley's Comet, is one of the most reliable meteor showers in the Southern Hemisphere.
- 5. The 'saucepan' is in the constellation of Orion the hunter. It's actually Orion's belt, but because Orion is upside down in the southern hemisphere it looks like a saucepan. You can see Orion in Australia from November until mid-May
- 6. The centre of the galaxy is located in the constellation of Sagittarius or the 'teapot' as you might know it.
- 7. Just above the spout of the teapot, at the boundary between the bright star clouds of the Milky Way and the dark dust lane, is the heart of our galaxy.
- 8. Unlike the more familiar constellations, the Emu is a "dark constellation" made up of dust clouds that form the dark lanes of the Milky Way so it is really only visible away from urban light pollution.
- You'll have a hard time finding the Southern Cross in the evening skies in December if you
  live in Darwin. But it's not that much easier further south, where it just skims the surface of
  the horizon from Sydney.


