Council's libraries will host Fairy Tale Science events, as well as releasing weekly themed activity packs, complete with materials and instructions to take home for kids to get creative. Children can also take part in a Summer Reading Challenge where they can compete and earn badges.

Children aged seven years plus will create their own mini artist books from brown paper bags, which have been screen printed with patterns from Madame Weigel's journals and add their collections of paper patterning using decorated swatches, cut paper patterns and writings to form their own art books. Bookings are essential for the workshops, which cost \$12, and will be run on 14 January at The Centre Beaudesert from 10am to 11.30am and Boonah Cultural Centre from 1.30pm to 3pm.



QUEENSLAND BUDGET FOR 2020/21

The Queensland Budget delivered recently by the Government – the one that should have been delivered before the election but wasn't because the Government chose to hide the truth about the state of Queensland's finances from voters – saddles us all with \$28 billion more debt than the Government let on about throughout the year.

Voters were informed, before the election, there would be \$4 billion additional borrowing to pay for commitments; the budget, after the election, delivered seven times that amount of new debt. Queensland's total debt is projected to reach \$130 billion in this term of government. This is a major breach of trust, and one that we will all pay for in the future. Independent analysis shows that two-thirds of this additional \$28 billion borrowing is simply for day-to-day expenditure, not for investment in assets that generate income. Hence, we are very much back to "borrowing to keep the lights on", as we were during the Anna Bligh days of yesteryear.

Notwithstanding, I am pleased there is an allocation of funding (\$2.3 million over four years) in the Main Roads program for Henri Robert Drive to undertake some safety works. It's about time, especially with all that extra borrowing the Government is undertaking on your behalf. This is a road I receive a lot of feedback about, and because there is a \$5 billion backlog of repairs and maintenance on Queensland's state-controlled roads, investment in those repairs and maintenance can be a long time coming. There is also a small allocation (\$400,000) for works on Tamborine Mountain Road. There are plenty of other projects that also need to be advanced, and I'll carry on pushing for them.

Public transport for the Mountain, a guaranteed future for our Independent Public Schools, further investment in TMSA's Long Road recreational facilities, security of water supply for locals on Tamborine Mountain, and additional police resources to combat hooning and after-hours incidents are matters I will continue to advocate for to government, along with others.

LET'S CONTINUE TO BUY LOCAL

In the Scenic Rim we have thousands of small businesses that are run with dedication and hard work. They are the backbone of our local economy. There's been so much great support for these businesses from locals lately, and as we move further down the path in the COVID-19 era, I encourage everybody to keep on supporting your locals whenever possible. Government at all levels needs to make it easier for these businesses to grow – get rid of the red tape, the costs and the regulations – so they can create more jobs.

CHRISTMAS ROAD SAFETY

With Christmas and school holidays approaching, motorists are reminded to slow down. The festive period means more cars, caravans and holiday makers are on the road and drivers should be more alert than ever. Many people are unaware that around half of all speed-related crashes, resulting in injuries or fatalities, happen at just 10 km/h or less over the speed limit. Every extra kilometre over could cause harm or damage to others on the road – speeding to shave a few minutes off your journey could lead to consequences that last a lifetime. Stay safe on the roads this festive season.

ECONOMIC RECOVERY

The National Accounts have confirmed that Australia's economy is fighting back. The accounts show that in the September quarter, real GDP increased by 3.3 per cent, ahead of all expectations.

Australia has performed better on the health and economic front than almost any other country in the world. We are the lucky country, but we also did the hard yards to get there. Government, industry and, most importantly the community, have all worked together. As Government, we have put in the health response and economic support measures. Industry has responded, adapting and implementing COVID-Safe arrangements. But the heavy lifts, by you, the community, have kept each other safe, kept businesses going and adapted to the 'new normal'.

Over the last five months, 650,000 jobs have been created and added to the economy. As a result, 80 per cent of the 1.3 million Australians who either lost their jobs or saw their working hours reduced to zero are now back at work.

Over the next few weeks you will hear commentators say that technically speaking Australia's recession is over. However, our economic recovery is not.

Many Australians continue to do it very tough. Here in our community many small businesses still need our support. Shop local, eat local, stay local. Wherever you can — buy local. It will support the small businesses here; it will support local jobs and our economy.

I am proud of the Morrison Government for being focused on keeping Australians in work and helping them find jobs. The Reserve Bank of Australia estimates our JobKeeper plan has saved at least 700,000 jobs. That has ensured many jobs and businesses were saved in our local industries, particularly for the hospitality and tourism sectors.

Together with the Cash Flow Boost, Coronavirus Supplement, and payments to pensioners and others on income support, our measures have cushioned the blow. By cushioning the blow, we're positioning businesses for a stronger comeback, particularly important as we see borders open, restrictions ease and with the Christmas/New Year holidays are upon us.

The road ahead will be long, hard and bumpy. However, the Australian economy has demonstrated its resilience as have Australians.

Let's stick together and keep supporting each other.




Peter Kuttner also delivered more stock of his beautiful book *One Small Place on Earth* and will be attending the morning, ready with his pen to sign his books.

FAMILY DAY CARE PROGRAM IS PLANNED FOR MOUNTAIN

Start Right Education, a family day care kindy program will open on Tamborine Mountain in the New Year.

It will be operated by Denise Flory and aimed at children between the ages of four and five.

"I have a Bachelor of Early Childhood Studies and over 28 years' experience in the field of early childhood education. I am thrilled to be able to run a quality educational and enriched care giving program, with the support and professional guidance of the YMCA Gold Coast Family Day Care Service," said Ms Flory.

"It will be an approved family care service, meeting the National Quality Standards and the curriculum will be guided by the Queensland Kindergarten Learning Guidelines."

She said that through the YMCA Family Day Care Service, the kindy program was supported by childcare subsidies for eligible families. It would operate from Monday to Friday, 7:30am to 5:30pm, with each child attending a core number of hours per week (with additional hours if required for working parents), with a maximum of four children per day and seven children during the school holidays (three of school age).

MENTAL HEALTH AND PARENTHOOD

As we draw a close on 2020 and what has been a considerably challenging year for most, preserving our mental health has never been more important. In a society that is already largely fragmented, where extended families most often do not live in close proximity, the additional isolation many people have felt during lockdowns and the implementation of social distancing has had a significant impact on their lives.

This has left many to wonder how this will affect their children in their development and understanding of interpersonal relationships.

The impact of distancing rules has been noted in maternity services also. There are many women who are pregnant who have extended family interstate and so have not had the additional support during the newborn months that they were either expecting, or have had previously. Tighter restrictions to visiting in hospital has meant many women have not been allowed to have their other children visit them in hospital.

Often the visiting rules in hospital have changed quickly with little notice, increasing anxiety. Some women had to birth with staff in face masks. All of these precautions have meant that we have had very low numbers of COVID-19 in our State and throughout the country, and all of these precautions have been necessary and kept us safe. However, the fact is that for many people these restrictions have placed additional strain on them at a time when their world naturally alters and shifts with a new baby.

Many people have experienced mental health issues in their lives, but for some, 2020 may be the first time they have experienced them. Some people's mental health struggles have been there a long time, while others are transient and due to circumstances, for example being separated from loved ones through the pandemic, or a result of the adjustment to parenthood. There are many ways these incidences can impact your mental health, but one of these may be depression.

Some signs of depression may be:

- Not able to find joy in things anymore
- Unable to get out of bed and wanting to sleep all day or conversely, insomnia
- Lack of appetite or overeating
- Feelings of loss or loneliness
- Not wanting to go out anymore.

However, you may be experiencing other symptoms or just not feeling yourself. Your mental health is individual and issues can be experienced differently by different people. The important thing to remember is if you do not feel yourself to seek help. There are many health professionals out there who can help you.

One of the hardest things can be to take that first step and discuss how you are feeling. We live in a society where people want to show how well they are doing often through social media, and saying out loud that you are not doing so well can be challenging. However, speaking to a GP can be your first port of call because they can then refer you to other health professionals.

There are also many websites and apps that offer support such as Beyond Blue, Black Dog Institute, Headspace, and particularly specific to pregnant women is Mind the Bump – an app which gives you mindfulness exercises throughout your pregnancy and after birth.

If you notice that a loved one is showing any of these signs, please speak with them about how they are feeling. A simple "are you ok?" can be enough to open a conversation and you can help by listening and then referring them to a GP or other health professional for further assistance.

This festive period I do wish you all a happy and healthy time with loved ones and families. If you are feeling down or lost, you are not alone; help is out there. Please seek it. Health professionals want to help; it's why we chose these careers. It's never a waste of time.

He played on the world's most expensive violin worth US\$4 million. One thousand and ninety people failed to notice or appreciate the gift given to them that day. Their attention was focussed on other matters and they were robbed of a rare opportunity. As we enter the Christmas season let's ask ourselves what important things are we failing to notice or appreciate? Maybe it's the smile of the person behind the counter or the playful laughter of your children in the backyard. Perhaps you have forgotten the simple joy of taking a walk or a long coffee with a friend. Often in the rush to purchase the right present for a special someone, we neglect being fully present for that special someone.

Christmas might be a time of hustle and bustle, but it should also be a time to pause and reflect. What is the real meaning of Christmas to you? What are you truly thankful for? How can your life be an expression of those things you hold dear? How might you spread a bit of Christmas cheer this time of year?

Set yourself a Christmas challenge to step out of your comfort zone. Introduce yourself to a neighbour you haven't yet met. Make amends with the person you fell out with. 

Tamborine Mountain Rainfall



November 2020

This November was, again, a very dry month.


The rain which was part of the last rainfall event in October and fell on October 31 was recorded on the morning of November 1. If it hadn't been for that rain, everywhere on the Mountain would have had the driest November on record. As it was Fern Street's recording was, indeed, the lowest for November since recording began in 1888 and even lower than last year, the driest on record up to then with 13.2mm. The previous driest was 16.3mm in 1967, 17.3mm in 1951, and 21.2mm in 1919.

The only other rainfall event of any significance in November was recorded on the 18th. It was due to a trough moving north up the coast and was associated with a thunderstorm.

The variability on the map is entirely due to that recorded on the November 1.

Thanks to all recorders and best wishes for a happy Christmas and a New Year with some rain.



'Isaiah' means 'Yahweh is Salvation'

In 701 BC the Assyrian King Sennacherib marshalled his troops to begin the invasion of Judah, the remaining half of the divided kingdom of Israel. The northern Kingdom had already been conquered and taken into exile.

In this turbulent time of Israel's history, when the nation would soon disappear from the geopolitical scene, Isaiah sees a glorious vision of God in the temple and is moved by the Spirit of God to write his prophecy.

Isaiah is given the big picture by God. He interprets the present times of Israel's disaster as God's judgement on them for their continued rebellion against him. He speaks of God's power and might to redeem his people even though there may only be a remnant left. He particularly begins to draw back the curtain on how God is going to accomplish this divine work of rescue and redemption.

It will be through the 'suffering servant'. God will himself take on human flesh and come to dwell among his people (Immanuel means 'God with us'). The suffering servant will give his life as an offering of atonement to satisfy the wrath of a holy God. Yet he will live again and bring full salvation to God's people (Isaiah 53). The geographical kingdom of Israel will yield to the kingdom of God that will extend to the ends of the earth. 'The earth will be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea.' (Isaiah 11:9)

What does the Christmas season have to do with this ancient prophet? You have probably already made the connection. Jesus is God in the flesh, the only begotten Son of the Father, the image of the invisible God, the fullness of the deity dwells in him in bodily form. 'Veiled in flesh the Godhead see, hail the incarnate deity.' What incredible thoughts!

God's words reveal his thoughts, and his thoughts are full of love and grace and mercy. God acts in history according to his plan and in the fullness of time his Son was born to a virgin. He comes in fulfillment of the words of Isaiah written over 700 years earlier. He comes to save his people from their sins. I hope that this Christmas season you will take the opportunity to think again about the wonders of salvation in Christ. I hope that you will be moved to trust in God our Saviour, that you will know his peace and love even in these turbulent times, and that you will set your heart and mind on growing in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Have a good Christmas season.



FICTION TO FILMS

Toto started as a fictional dog in Frank Braum's Oz series of children's books. He was drawn as a small terrier for The Wonderful Wizard of Oz in 1900 and he re-appears in The Wizard of Oz, the book in 1939, and Return to Oz in 1985. There were eight other Oz books written.

In the 1939 movie The Wizard of Oz ,Toto was played by a female Cairns brindle terrier called Terry. She was paid

\$125 a week which was a very good wage back then for a human, let alone a dog. She was born during the great depression in 1933, owned and trained by Carl Spitz, a Hollywood dog trainer who had trained military and police dogs in Germany.

Terry started out life abandoned and rescued by a German couple living the USA. She was a nervous and shy wreck that would urinate on the carpet. That is when Spitz adopted and worked

with the dog; he was apparently a kind and gentle man

and soon gained her confidence.

Her first film was Ready for Love in 1934. Then she appeared with Shirley Temple in Bright Eyes as a dog called Rags.

Terry did her own stunts and had her foot broken in the middle of making the Wizard of Oz and there had to be found a stand-in, which Spitz managed, but they needed Terry back.

Terry's name was changed to Toto in 1942 and she had a total of 16 film appearances. She

became the mother of Rommy, who became another movie dog actor and appeared in Reap the Wild Wind in 1942 and Air Force in in 1943. Toto died at the age of 11 years and was given her own memorial.

MINCE TARTS

These delicious little pockets of Christmas are easy to make and a muffin tray can be ordered online and be at your door in a few days, well in time for Christmas if you haven't got one in the cupboard.

Trust me, it's money well spent; the difference between the store-bought mass-manufactured variety and these little pockets of Christmas joy is like a candle to the sun.

As a kid, Christmas was one of the best times of year. School had finished which meant I got to spend my summers adventuring with my brothers.

I was about seven before I realised the big fat bearded man we had our Christmas photo taken with down at the local Westfields shopping emporium was not the guy bringing me a wonderful array of thoughtful practical presents on Christmas day.

A memory related to food and Christmas was when I was about five years old. I'm in the front room of my grandmother's house and I'm excited. It feels wonderful; then I feel a refreshing gust of ocean air as her house sits perched above a sheer cliff face in the Eastern Sydney suburb of Bronte. The expansive view of the ocean is shimmering rainbow jewels of light from the sun; its long blade-like rays penetrating a plume of bellowing cigar smoke. I see a table made of small jade tiles covered with bowls of goodies, toothpicks skewered with cheese cubes, cabanossi and green and red pickled baby onions, pretzels and nuts of all kinds, a plate of white dusted pies and a lolly bowl. I went straight to the lolly one first but after that I made my way to the plate of what I now know are mince pies.

My initial hope was that it was a meat pie, so you can imagine my surprise as I picked it up and had a sniff - it smelt sweet. I nibble at the pastry cautiously like a curious rabbit. Delicious! I go in for another bite, bigger this time. I taste an explosion of caramelly mixed spice with orangey, lemony raisins with a kick of brandy encased in a crispy soft pastry. My grandmother was an awesome cook.

Don't be afraid to having a go at making pastry - the food processor does all

the work. It takes minutes to make the pastry and rolling out the dough is fun; and the kids can get involved cutting out the shapes and even filling the pies as it's a tablespoon per pie I'm talking about; a four-year-old could easily do it with a bit of help from you. And when you smell them cooking you will realise you have made something delicious. Who knows - it may even become a family Christmas joyful tradition?

(Serves 8)

INGREDIENTS

- 360g (2 cups) dried mixed fruit
- 200g (1 cup, firmly packed) brown sugar
- 1 Granny Smith apple, peeled, grated
- 40g butter, melted
- 2 tablespoons brandy
- 3 teaspoons finely grated lemon rind
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon mixed spice
- 1 egg, lightly whisked
- Icing sugar, to dust

PASTRY

- 300g (2 cups) plain flour
- 70g (1/3 cup) caster sugar
- 160g chilled butter, chopped
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 tablespoons iced water

Step 1

Finely chop half the mixed fruit. Place in a large bowl. Add the brown sugar, apple, butter, brandy, lemon rind, lemon juice, cinnamon, mixed spice, nutmeg, and the remaining mixed fruit. Stir until well combined. Leave overnight to marinate.

Step 2

Transfer the fruit mixture to a sieve over a bowl and squeeze out excess liquid.



Step 3

To make the pastry, place the flour, sugar, and butter in the bowl of a food processor and process until mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add the egg yolk and water, and process until the mixture just starts to come together. Turn onto a clean work surface. Shape into a disc. Cover with plastic wrap. Place in the fridge for 20 minutes to rest.

Step 4

Preheat oven to 180C. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface until 5mm thick. Use an 8.5cm diameter round pastry cutter to cut 20 discs from the pastry. Use a 5cm diameter starshaped pastry cutter to cut 20 stars from the remaining pastry.

Step 5

Line twenty 80ml (1/3 cup) capacity muffin pans with pastry discs. Divide the fruit mince among the pastry cases. Top with pastry stars. Brush the stars lightly with the egg and sprinkle with white sugar. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until light golden.






