# EXHIBITION TO CELEBRATE THE STRENGTH OF WOMEN

The strength of women forged in the fire of their children's uncertain start to life and of female artists working in a man's world is at the heart of Scenic Rim Regional Council's new exhibition opening at The Centre Beaudesert this month.

Women's Work, which runs from Friday 19 February to 26 March, brings together the exhibitions of Early, by Emma Thorp, and Welded Hearts, by Melissa Carey and Colleen Lavender, in a fusion of artistic styles and expressions of emotion that will both strike a chord with and tug at the heartstrings of many in the community.

Early maps artist Emma Thorp's journey which began with her son's premature birth through to a diagnosis of autism and ADHD, exposing the emotions experienced by parents and honouring those who work tirelessly with families to ensure the best possible outcomes.

Welded Hearts, by Melissa Carey and Colleen Lavender, shares stories of courage and resilience, also with an underlying message of hope.

A digital and mixed media artist, Emma Thorp has drawn on her life experience, combining sketches, photography and memories to create detailed images that provide a glimpse into a world that can often be very insular and all-consuming.

After her son, Alby, was born 14 weeks early, Emma experienced fear, guilt, regret, frustration and isolation and, juggling her own desires and commitments with those of the hospital, her husband



and eldest child, was left feeling inadequate and deficient.

"He was born on 8 October 2010. His full-term due date would have been 9 January 2011," she said.

"When he was born, Alby weighed 1100 grams (2 lb 4 oz), fortunately a good weight for his age.

"He had many of the typical setbacks that extremely premature babies have - jaundice, anaemia, eye problems, brain haemorrhage, heart issues and breathing issues - but battled and became stronger and after 78 days between the Mater Mothers' Brisbane and Toowoomba Base Hospital Special Care, Alby was able to come home.'

Sculptures, art installations and interactive works feature in the Welded Hearts exhibition by Melissa Carey and Colleen Lavender.

"As women, we speak from our heart," Melissa said.

"In hard times, we gather together in community, we share our stories, and we hold space for others to express emotions.

"Art helps us process our thoughts and emotions, that sometimes we don't have words for. It gives us a voice, it helps us, as women, speak our truth and show courage."

Scenic Rim artist Colleen Lavender is renowned for her ability to turn cold scrap metal into beautiful sculptures that radiate warmth.

"By using the technique of welding, which is seen as masculine, we find our own ways to combine our feminine elements and show our resilience through this hard and strong medium," she said.

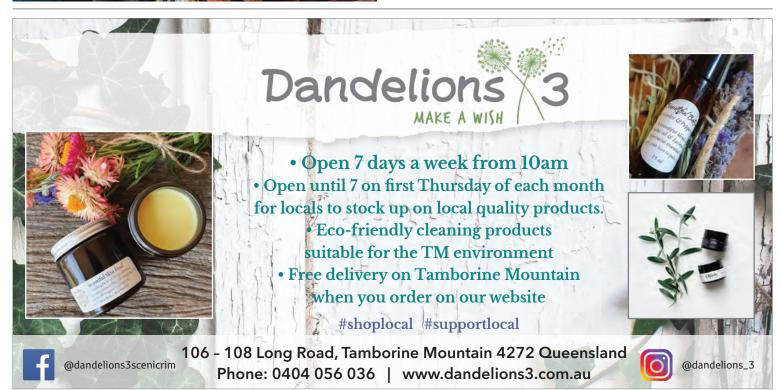
"Through our art, we share our stories of courage, bravery and resilience, and spread our message of hope to the community."

The launch of Women's Work on Saturday 20 February is open to all members of the Scenic Rim community and is presented in partnership with WOW (Women of the World) Australia, a Queensland initiative aligned with the global WOW Foundation supporting action and change for women and girls.

Hosted by Scenic Rim Councillor Virginia West, the launch opens with a morning tea and exhibition viewing from 10.30am, followed by a panel discussion with the artists and WOW Executive Producer Cathy Hunt, and concluding with guided tours of the exhibition by the artists.

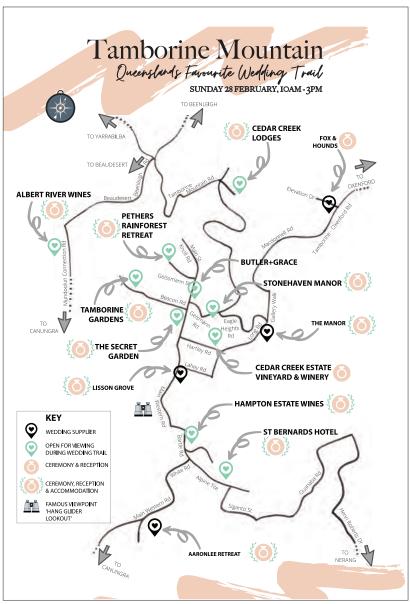

#### ANNUAL TAMBORINE MOUNTAIN TOURISM BROCHURE READY TO ROLL

Work on the 2021 annual Tamborine Mountain visitor guide is well under way with strong opportunities for Mountain tourism and hospitality operators to display their offerings to the hundreds of thousands of tourists who come to the Mountain every year.

The brochure will again promote the best Tamborine Mountain has to offer, including the popular "play&stay", "play&see" and "stay&taste" sections as well as the weddings and shopping guides and the popular bush-walk guide and comprehensive map.

The hexagonal cover design has been retained this year, giving just four operators the chance to exclusively showcase a unique offering.

The Tamborine Mountain Chamber of Commerce and Industry will again utilise its broad distribution network to ensure the brochure is available to tourists all the way from Brisbane to Byron Bay, throughout the Gold Coast and Scenic Rim.

Chamber President Geoff Baldwin said: "We have again arranged for the brochure to be displayed in Visitor Information Centres across the Scenic Rim and Gold Coast as well as the Information Centre at Southbank in Brisbane, at Gold Coast and Brisbane airports, in hotels, on the 10 map boards across Tamborine Mountain - in fact everywhere in our region that tourism information is displayed, our brochure will be there.

"During the height of COVID-19 last year, distribution was limited so we arranged a letterbox drop to 32,000 residences in high-end postcodes across Brisbane. Tourism operators on the Mountain reported a significant result so we will repeat that project this year.

"We expect the new brochure to be published in early April. We still have stock of the 2020 brochure, so operators will have the benefit of continuous exposure."

Geoff said that a particular promotional benefit comes from the volunteers at the Tamborine Mountain Visitor Information Centre.

"We want to encourage all accommodation operators to contact our Information Centre every week with updates of bed availability. The volunteers receive many calls from tourists asking about accommodation and they can only provide details if they know what is available over the coming few days.

"The volunteers also take regular familiarisation trips to venues across the Mountain and across the Scenic Rim so they can answer visitor questions with great authority.

"No other organisation is able to offer Tamborine Mountain operators the value, the distribution and the support that is available through the annual brochure."

#### **GRANT FUNDING FOR COMMUNITY GROUPS**

Community groups in the Scenic Rim Electorate will share in more than \$345,000 of grant funding awarded through round 106 of the Gambling Community Benefit Fund (GCBF).

More than \$18 million has now been allocated to community groups in the Scenic Rim Electorate through various grants since State Member Jon Krause was elected in 2012. On Tamborine Mountain, Beechmont and in Canungra, five groups will share in more than \$95,000.

For Round 108 of the GCBF, not-for-profit groups can apply for grants from \$500 to \$35,000. Applications are now open and close on 28 February.

#### **PFIZER VACCINE APPROVED**

The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has provisionally approved the Pfizer/BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine for use in Australia. The Pfizer vaccine has met strict standards for safety, quality and efficacy. The TGA provisional approval is for individuals 16 years of age and older. Two doses will be required — at least 21 days apart. In Australia COVID-19 vaccines will be rolled out in five phases over the coming months and, over time, will involve more than 1000 vaccination administration sites.

By now, you would have seen the Federal Government's public information campaign to encourage Australians to get a COVID-19 vaccine. The campaign will keep Australians fully informed and up to date about the safety and effectiveness of COVID-19 vaccines as they become available, including when, how and where to get the jab. The information in this campaign, based on expert, and independent, medical advice, will help answer the questions people may have.

#### RECOGNISING EXCEPTIONAL WORK DURING PANDEMIC

We have so many wonderful people in our Hinterland communities who do exceptional work, every day without recognition.

I'm encouraging everyone in our community to think of some local heroes who have displayed extraordinary service and achievement during the COVID-19 response and recovery, for an Australian National Honour.

#### THANK YOU TO SO MANY PEOPLE FOR HELPING SAVE JULIAN

Thank you for your photos and lovely article, honouring the young man Christian Cullen, when he received an Australia Day award for his presence of mind and quick actions, that contributed to the rescue of Julian Nicol after he sustained a serious head injury.

In March 2020, witnessing that cliff fall and responding by climbing down to Julian, then running for help, was extremely traumatic for Christian. He initially did not know if his friend were alive, if he would fall further while he left him, or if he would remain alive. We hope and pray that the so well-deserved bravery award contributes to Christian's sense of closure and that he will move on from that event with continued courage. During the award ceremony, when Christian was asked by Mayor Christensen to say a few words, Christian was very brave once again and attributed Julian's survival to the grace of God and the prayers of many people.

As Julian's parents, we agree. We wish that the terrible accident had never happened, but we saw the grace of God appear that day, in the form of our mountain's incredible emergency service people.

Before then, we could never have known the astonishing work that these people are trained so capably to perform. It was immense.

One of the first on the scene was Christian's dad, Andrew Cullen from the QFR. Regardless of how he was feeling, he quickly set about securing abseiling ropes to the trees at the cliff top, to allow rescuers to reach Julian with life-saving equipment. He is a hero.

We are forever indebted to humble local QAS man, Ben Canavan. He kept Julian alive on the cliff ledge for over two hours, until Julian was winched to safety. He refuses to concede that he did anything heroic that day. He did not notice, until it was pointed out later, that he was bleeding from cuts and abrasions to his own arms and legs. I am equally horrified and incredibly grateful, that this man, who is a husband and father, put his own life at risk for our son's life. Danny Edser from the QFR was completely exhausted after over two hours on the cliff face, working to support Ben Canavan deliver first aid.

We are very thankful to the Tamborine Mountain Police for their efforts on that day and we will never forget the kindness and concern of Scott Geurin. He said they took it very personally when a mountain child was in trouble; they were saving 'their boy'.

Very comforting too was all the familiar Mountain faces; Marti De Bruyn and the Tamborine Mountain SES, who among other duties, shielded operations and Julian from unwanted attention, protecting his dignity.

The Beacon Road/Keswick Road neighbourhood and staff of QCCC, particularly lan Partridge and Donna, were God sent. They made the 000 call and then provided comfort and refreshments to the workers, family and bystanders. Thankyou Debbie Williams for the warm cardigan and for helpfully providing information that led to Care Flight using the convention centre grounds to land their helicopter.

We thank Care Flight for seemingly effortlessly, airlifting Julian to the Queensland Children's Hospital - we were there in 15 or 20 minutes. The staff at the Queensland Children's Hospital were like a well-oiled machine when Julian arrived at the emergency department and was sent to theatre immediately to undergo a craniotomy.

We are eternally grateful to countless many who prayed for Julian's survival and recovery. Christian's mum Julia was massively supportive throughout and without her generosity of spirit, wisdom and love, it would have been much harder for everyone concerned.

Julian was blessed to have all the best of men and women from Tamborine Mountain emergency services, to be in the right place at the right time to attend to him. Our family can never adequately find the words to thank them all for returning our son to us and for contributing to the good outcome. He has made a remarkable and miraculous recovery.

Our gravest fears were not realised and Julian will have a great life.

# AN UPDATE ON THE LONG RD EXTENSION

In April 2020, representations were made to Scenic Rim Council by Jaap Vogel, Tamborine Mountain Blueprint, Bruce Hargreaves, Tamborine Mountain Marathon and Relays, Howard Stevens, a representative for a group seeking an integrated pathway circuit, and myself. We were asking Council to consider including the Long Road Extension Stage 2 in the budget for financial year 2020/21.

At this point, I should remind readers of the various stages.

**Stage 1** is the placement of road base or an equivalent over the two fields in the northern sector to make the extension available as a north-south emergency route in all weathers. Currently it can only be used as an emergency route in dry weather.

**Stage 2** is the construction of a gravel 5D road which will allow for a north-south emergency route in all weathers, plus open

this route for walkers, cyclists, runners and horse riders.

**Stage 3** is the construction of a formal road.

We were seeking funding for stage 2. It is normal practice for a response to be sent to the submitters in a timely fashion. However, Council was unable to send us a response due to things happening in the background and we were asked to be patient.

In January 2021, I sent a reminder and received a response that said nothing that we did not know in April 2020. I sent another request seeking Council's thoughts or plans for the Long Road Extension. I received another response dated 21 January and amongst many words it said:

"While it is realised that a detailed scope for the Long Road Extension project has not yet been identified, of the three options put forward, option 2, being the construction of a gravel track for pedestrian shared access, would be considered most logical".

Elsewhere it stated that it must be considered with all other requests for increased footpath assets and more broadly all asset classes and hence alignment to the annual review of Council's Ten-Year Capital Works programme is necessary.

Long Road Extension is not yet on the Ten-Year Capital Works programme, so that is the first hurdle to overcome. I have been advised that it is on the review list for this year. Let us keep our fingers crossed.

Interestingly, the Eden Estate development has requested access along the northern end of Long Road Extension, and this has been granted. So, Eden development will construct some sort of road over part of the northern route. Council had an opportunity of asking the developers to construct a dual pedestrian/cyclist footpath as well but failed to do so. Instead, Council asked that enough space be left so that a footpath could be constructed later on. I did suggest that the footpath option should be discussed when the application was debated but this, sadly, did not occur. A wasted opportunity in my view.

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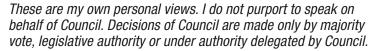

## **AUSTRALIA DAY**

I attended the Australia Day Awards and was very pleased for Christian Cullen and Allan Rosser to be honoured, Christian for his bravery and courage and Allan for his outstanding contribution to Tamborine Mountain over 95 years. Also, congratulations to all our new Australian citizens published in the last Scenic News.

#### **BEAUDESERT PIG AND CALF SALEYARDS SAVED**

I was so pleased for the people of Beaudesert when I learned these historic yards had been saved by a listing from the Heritage Commission. It never made sense to me that they were to be bulldozed by Council for a carpark in its ultra-expensive new library and parkland development. A part of the region's heritage would have been wiped forever.

It just goes to show that even when you are a singular voice in Council, as is often the case, it can all be worthwhile and rewarding to listen to the voice of the people, stick to your beliefs and fight for what the community wants. The reward in this case is participating in shaping the future heritage of the region. I was asked to present the petitions to save the saleyards and I think Council completely misjudged community sentiment on this issue, just as it initially misjudged the community sentiment to save the trees in the Boonah town centre, only compromising after a petition by 1800 people made their plans to remove the trees untenable.

# NEW COUNCIL STANDING ORDERS AND PROCEDURES FALL SHORT OF TRANSPARENCY

These documents determine how Council meetings are conducted. After many hours of clarifications in open Council, over two meeting cycles, and yes, then one in a closed Councillor and Executive workshop, excluding the public and media, a most unsatisfactory outcome has resulted despite a raft of amendments proposed by me that were all defeated.

It is now official that councillors in Ordinary Meetings, cannot have discussions about any topic unless the public and media are excluded from those discussions. Discussion was allowed previously in committee meetings before they were abolished mid-2019. As it is now, councillors can only ask questions and not comment on the answers. However, councillors can have discussions in confidential briefings away from public scrutiny in Councillor and Executive Workshops or when councillors resolve to close items in the public meetings to the public.

How is that transparent, and how is that open decision making and WHY IS THAT? It is counter to local government democracy in my view and below the expectations of ratepayers. Academic studies on transparency in bureaucracies and organisations, and my own experience in local government teach me that when the basis of decisions can be hidden from public and media scrutiny, that maladministration, favouritism, self-interest, bias, inequity, waste, inefficiency, and corruption can follow. The result can be poor services and decision making and increased rates. I think you have all been affected already by unsustainable rate levies.

This is why councils like Ipswich City are moving to have integrity hubs so that the public know everything about future plans and spending and how decisions are made. I briefly spoke to the Mayor of Ipswich recently about this and such transformative thinking in my view is required for Scenic Rim and indeed all Queensland councils. Scenic Rim residents cannot afford its council to have less transparency. I have other concerns about these new standing orders, but they are for another column.

# **KRAUSE WANTS ACTION ON BEECHMONT SPEED**

Member for Scenic Rim, Jon Krause, said he is continuing to press for increased road safety on Beechmont following a number of near misses on **Beechmont Road between Jardine Road and McInnes** Court, as well as ongoing issues with hoons.

Mr Krause has contacted the Transport and Main Roads Regional Director to highlight public concerns, particularly in regard to the 80km/h speed limit between Jardine Road and McInnes Court that locals believe should be reduced to 60km/h.

"Residents have advised me that in this section the current speed limit has caused a number of near misses and a few minor accidents.

"I have requested that the Regional Director inspect and consider lowering the speed limit along this section.

"I also continue to raise with police the need for more consistent presence and enforcement and have made representations to them about acquiring equipment to enforce noise limitations on roads where hooning, speeding and noise from vehicles is an issue. 'Noise cameras' are used in other jurisdictions and can be used to enforce noise limits by issuing penalties where limits are exceeded.

"At the moment people consider they can speed and hoon without any penalty because they are so unlikely to be penalised. A lower speed limit by itself won't stop this, but what we need is more presence and enforcement."

Mr Krause said he had been advised by the Regional Director that a speed limit review of Beechmont Road would be occurring during the 2021/2022 financial year.

# HOW DO I KNOW MY BABY IS GETTING ENOUGH MILK?

The question most frequently asked of midwives in those first few days of a baby's life is 'how do I know my baby is getting enough milk?'

In those early days of getting to know your baby, many new mums can feel overwhelmed at the enormity of caring for another human being, and bound up in that is the worry that the baby is 'hungry'. Especially if you are not blessed with a miraculous child who sleeps for long periods. Often mums of babies who wake every few hours for a feed become concerned that perhaps their baby is hungry, and she is not producing enough milk, when really, it is quite normal for babies to feed at least eight times in 24 hours, and in fact this is a sign of a well baby.

So, let's start from the top. What is normal? As I said, babies feed frequently, especially in those first few days. If you choose to breastfeed, your milk when your baby is born is a tiny amount of very nutrient rich milk called colostrum. When we express with new mums on day one, we are excited if we express 1ml of this - that is how small the quantities are. Babies are not particularly 'hungry', but need little and often, which also stimulates your milk to come in sooner.

So, in the first three to four days of life, it is quite normal for babies to feed often. They do not necessarily feed in a scheduled every three hours routine (although some may), they often will cluster feed during busy periods (usually the night); sometimes with only one to two hours between feeds, and then they will have a break of three to four hours. Feeding approximately eight times in 24 hours is the norm. Babies also do not have a large stomach, so do not need large volumes of milk. On day one, a baby's stomach is the size of a marble, so they do not need large volumes, just the right nutrition for their brain and body development.

Your milk will typically come in on day three to four. The night before this, you will often feel that you are feeding endlessly, and you may become concerned that the baby is hungry and you're not producing enough. What is actually happening is your baby is stimulating the milk production that it needs for your milk to come in. This is normal behaviour. The next day you may feel the difference in your breasts, and you will notice that the baby is satiated for longer. By day four the baby's stomach is still small, about the size of a walnut.

It is important to think about the size of a baby's stomach if you are formula feeding too. If you are aware of the volumes of the stomach in the early days, you are less likely to stretch the stomach to fit in large volumes and this will help not only avoiding vomiting but also reduce the risk of childhood obesity that often is associated with formula feeding for this reason. By one week old, the baby's stomach is about the size of an apricot (45-60ml).

Babies will also show you that they are getting enough milk by their behaviour. At the end of the feed, they may appear 'drunk' and often sleep. They also will have periods between feeds when they are alert and awake, are easy to rouse for feeding, will gain weight, and have plenty of wet and dirty nappies. Breastmilk is a mild laxative, so after most feeds babies will often soil their nappies.

If you are concerned about your baby's feeding, discuss with your midwife, lactation consultant, child health nurse or GP.

#### **INTERDEPENDENCE**

The decade of the 1970s is often referred to as the "ME" decade. Popular culture gave rise to hits such as "I Did it My Way" and "I am Woman". Out of this culture grew a general aversion to dependence while self-sufficiency became the new norm. At the time it was a necessary correction, particularly for women, but the fallout was a preoccupation with independence. The seventies was a long time ago but its message has reverberated through the decades.

The balance between being too dependent and being too self-sufficient is interdependence. Interdependent people are those who are independent enough that they do not find it threatening to depend on others or let others depend on them. Interdependent people recognise the all-important difference between healthy dependency and unhealthy dependency.

Unhealthy dependence occurs when you depend on someone to do for you anything that is your personal responsibility. For example, if you depend on someone else to make you feel good about yourself you will find only temporary relief because no one can provide you with self-esteem. If you compromise your personal standards and integrity to give in to another's demands, you are in an unhealthy dependency. If you fear that you would not survive on your own and feel incapable of self-sufficiency, then you are a candidate for unhealthy dependency.

Only an independent person can enter into a relationship of interdependence. The more secure you are, the more you can risk. Self-sufficiency and intimacy are not opposed to one another; rather they complement one another and form a complete whole. Couples who thrive are not afraid of losing their independence and they are not afraid of sharing themselves fully. They are interdependent. They balance their independence with dependence.

Think about your partnership. What are the areas of interdependence where you share mutual responsibility and mutual interests? What are areas that you are free to individually pursue? Do you have clear boundaries or are there 'border conflicts' over responsibilities and interests? Often these particular conflicts result from a fear of losing oneself. The question underlying border conflicts is "Should I meet my own needs at my partner's expense or should I meet my partner's needs at my expense?"

Become familiar with your default position. When it comes to boundaries, we all tend to err in a direction of either too weak or too strong boundaries, contingent on where we sit on the spectrum of dependence and independence. Do you have a tendency to give in and acquiesce to your partner's needs or are you stubborn and extremely protective of your own needs? If you are able to identify what your tendency is then experiment by choosing the opposite behaviour next time.

Thriving couples find ways to establish and honour one another's personal boundaries and arrive at a balance of interdependence that satisfies both personalities.

## **EARTHWORMS**

There are approximately 1000 native species and 80 introduced species of earthworms in Australia, including giant earthworms. The most famous giant is the Gippsland Giant Earthworm (*Megascolides australis*), which may be three metres long. This species is classified as vulnerable and lives in fragmented colonies.

The giant earthworms found in the Scenic Rim are a smaller species, around two metres long (Digaster longmani). They probably share many characteristics of the Gippsland Giant. However, much information remains undiscovered. These worms live in deep permanent burrows and are not seen, unless they come to the surface when their burrows are flooded by heavy rain, or when excavations or landslips disturb their burrows.

Earthworms' habitat is soil, leaf litter, under stones and logs. Native earthworms are often eliminated by clearing and most disturbed habitats such as pastures and gardens are dominated by European species.

They do not have an external skeleton like an insect or an internal skeleton like a snake; they rely on their muscles alone to maintain their structure. They also do not have eyes but can detect light through light sensitive tissues on their head.

Movement and burrowing utilise the musculature of the segments and body wall and bristle-like front and rear setae. They contract and relax the muscles in successive segments, which produces a wave-like movement; as they extend forward, they grip with their front setae and release their rear setae as they draw up the rear of their body.

Earthworms breathe through their skin which must remain moist for gas exchange to occur. This restricts their activities and area of habitation. Five aortic arches act as hearts and pump blood around their bodies.

The diet of earthworms consists of organic matter and debris. The earthworm uses its pharynx to swallow food which then passes to a gizzard which contains grit (much like a bird) and grinds the food. The food then passes to the intestine where it is digested and absorbed. The waste products or castings are excreted.

Earthworms are hermaphrodite i.e., single individuals possess both eggs and sperm. To reproduce, two worms mate, they then separate, and each produces an egg in a cocoon. The egg cocoon is laid in the soil and after incubation one young worm hatches, then continues to grow until reaching maturity.

The activity of earthworms benefit soil through aeration, drainage, water holding capacity, introducing organic materials, improved soil structure, mixing surface and sub surface soils.

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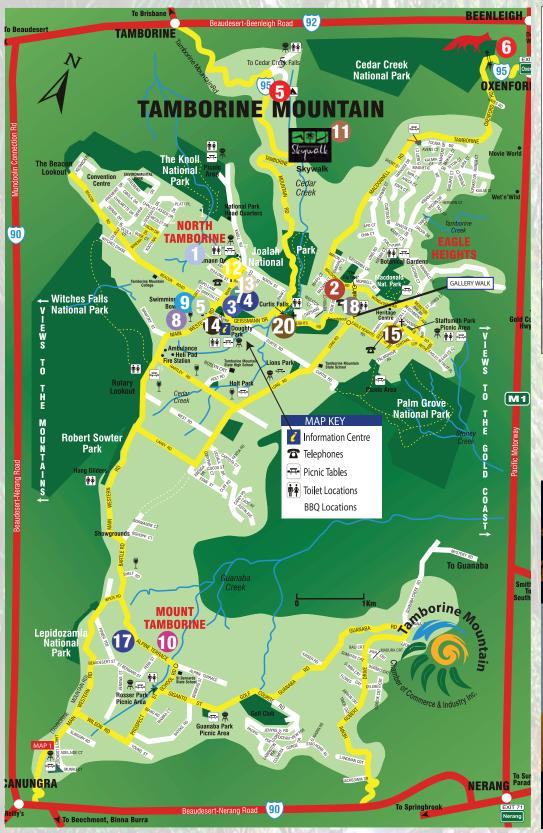
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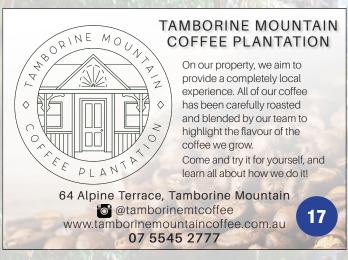


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# LEARNING TO MANIFEST IN YOGA

You have the right to enjoy your home, community and lifestyle in comfort and with a sense of independence. Seniors who are better informed are more confident and likely to be comfortable and happy.

Carers would do well to create a comfortable space for the senior to discuss these matters with a view to hearing their seniors.

All seniors are entitled to being treated with respect and kindness and must be aware that there are avenues to ensure their comfort and wellbeing.

Here are some general guidelines for you to feel safe and heard:

- Limit the amount of personal information displayed in the phone book. List only your initials and surname.
   If you have an answering machine, record your message as "We will call you back..."
- Do not tell strangers where you live, when you will be away or about any of your personal, family, or financial details.
- When shopping, carry smaller amounts of money.
   Avoid leaving your handbag, wallet, or personal items unattended or in the shopping trolley.
- If you have a touch phone, program in the phone numbers of a relative, neighbour, close friend, and the emergency number '000' (triple zero).
- If you receive mail, emails, or phone calls, requesting money for a charity or any other reason make sure to verify the legitimacy of the cause before giving out your banking details. Your local police station could help you with this information.
- If you live alone, consider installing an alarm system

   it will help keeping you safe and protect your home
   and personal belongings. Medical or personal alarm
   systems can be easy to set up and there are many
   options available to you, depending on your needs.
- If you have a carer living with you, be aware that sometimes even your carer may not be aware of what you need. Speak clearly with your carer about your needs. 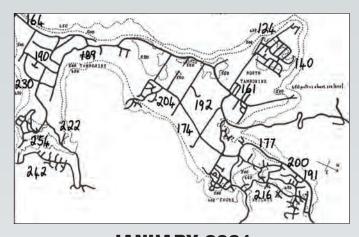
Sphingid Moth - Hippotion brennus, garage, Eagle Heights.



Sphingid refers to the family Sphingidae. I photographed the moth on Australia Day. It was the first I have photographed at the garage since the owner installed LED lights, which did not attract moths, four and a half months ago. I mentioned their absence when I saw him the other day and he obligingly assured me he would reinstall the previous bulbs. The expert had not seen this moth. The species occurs in the Moluccas, Papua New Guinea, the Solomon Islands and in Queensland (where it is more common further north) with a sighting in north-eastern New South Wales. Wingspan is 6cm.

# Tamborine Mountain Rainfall



#### **JANUARY 2021**

Rainfall in South East Queensland in January depends on the interaction between the monsoon, with its rain-bearing northwest winds and troughs, and the southern high-pressure systems bearing coastal showers from the south-east.

This January the southern highs were dominant most of the time. This brought showers on at least 20 of the 31 days although at 'Westdown', on the north-west shelf of the Mountain, Jim Inglis recorded rain or dew on every day of the month. The only heavy fall, recorded on the 19th, was due to an upper atmosphere low.

The rainfall expected at Fern Street in January is 159mm and the long-term mean is 220mm. This January Fern Street recorded 190.2mm.

The chart shows highest totals on the east of the Mountain, but they were variable. This January was also unusually cool due to the dominance of the south-east trade wind and also to extra cloud cover. The latter is due to the increasing strength of the south-flowing east Australian coastal current.

"His ideal new owners would be home with him a lot of the time for company and if they were not home, he would be best with a female dog companion. He feels the heat, so needs a home in the mountains where he will not suffer from heat pain. Tamborine Mountain, Springbrook or Beechmont would suit him just fine. He is a top guard dog and will keep your home safe and protect you if you give him the love he needs, and he needs a lot. He is the most affectionate dog we have ever known. He only wants to please and if you tell him off (which hasn't been much as he is a good dog) he will sulk, so he is very sensitive.

"We ask that any new owners sign an agreement that he will not be sold on to other new owners and that if for some reason you can no longer keep Kaiser you contact us so that we can rehome him ourselves. This is unlikely to occur if you show give him attention and lots of cuddles. We want to keep Kaiser, but we live in a sensitive wildlife area and his ideal home would have lots of space for him to run around with plenty of shade.

"Previous owners used an electric collar on him, so he suffered trauma from this, but he has recovered now and is ready for loving new owners. Electric collars have been banned in other states as it is recognised as cruel".

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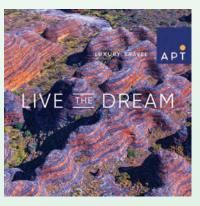

## **VEGETARIAN PIRATE SHEPHERD'S PIE**

Is it a pie? Shepherd's Pie is one of those things chefs always like to have a fight about.

"How is it a pie when it has no pastry" is how it usually starts, but arguing with some chefs is like wrestling with a pig in mud; sooner or later you realise the pig actually likes it. So, I've long since refrained from joining in the debate. Who cares? It tastes delicious.

Now this recipe requires something called TVP, or textured vegetable protein, and it's come a long way since it first came on the scene and edamame is soooo much better than peas. If you don't know where to find them, simply ask Google or head to your local Asian grocery.

If you are a vegetarian, seriously, add this to your arsenal of dishes. Trust me, your meat-eating mates won't even know it's not meat.

When I had Eden Restaurant, I made a point to make the menu almost 50 per cent vegetarian. Why? Because vegetarian food is delicious and nutritious. Most restaurants will do a spinach and ricotta something or a tomato and lentil something. BORING! This is because nine times out of 10 the chef hasn't cooked much vegetarian. Trust me, if you take the time to learn some good vego recipes you will be amazed at the flavour and how you won't even miss the meat.

For many years I was in charge of feeding 300 volunteers for Australia's largest music festival held over Christmas and New Year, something called Woodford Folk Festival. In exchange for eight hours of work, each volunteer was given a ticket to the festival and fed three meals a day for the two weeks it took to create the amazing atmosphere that is Woodfordia.

The ratio of carnivores to herbivores was 40 per cent to 60 per cent, an amazing ratio, as vegetarians usually equate to





about only 10 per cent of the population. Now, some of these guys were like the 'hezbollah' of vegetarians, rightfully voicing that they needed to be rewarded equally to the carnivores; so, if the carnivores got steak, the herbivores wanted something just as special.

Luckily, I was up for the challenge. You see, my mother was a hippie from way back, so I had a list as long as my arm of delicious vegetarian dishes in my bag of tricks and I was the first chef to really win the 'hezbollah' over and this dish was an absolute crowd pleaser.

Coincidentally, Woodford was the place where I met my wife. She had just jumped ship from delivering to New Zealand from the UK the world's fastest bio

diesel-powered wave piercing trimaran and having got the world record for the fastest circumnavigation of the globe.

This recipe uses my Captain Kidd spiced rum BBQ sauce that I've made with Gordon's spiced rum from Tamborine Mountain distillery and my Gaucho - a marriage made in heaven!

Did you know Captain Kidd was a famous 17th century pirate?

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 80ml extra virgin olive oil, plus a bit more for drizzling
- 1 brown onion, diced
- 1 large carrot the size of your hand, diced
- 2 celery stalks, diced
- 4 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 handful of button mushrooms, diced
- 1 zucchini, diced
- 250g TVP rehydrated, or veggie mince
- 375ml vegetable stock (use a cube if you want)
- 6 tbs of Captain Kidd spiced rum BBQ sauce
- 2 tbs soy sauce
- 1 tbs caramelised balsamic
- 2 tbs of gravy powder
- 1 tbs Dijon
- 2 tbs Gaucho
- 1/2 cup edamame (frozen immature soybeans)
- 3 cobs of corn with the kernels



removed (you can use frozen too)

- 1 cup pizza cheese
- 1/4 cup grate parmesan

#### MASH

- 1kg brushed potato
- 90g butter
- 50ml milk
- 1 tbs salt
- 1 tsp pepper

#### **METHOD**

- Preheat oven to 180°C
- Heat oil in a large saucepan over a medium heat and add onion, carrot, celery, garlic, mushrooms and zucchini. Fry until it smells amazing and add TVP
- Add all the remaining ingredients except the edamame, corn and cheeses
- Cook over a low to medium heat for 20 minutes, stirring often
- Boil the potatoes until soft, and mash
- Melt butter and milk in microwave; add to mash, and season
- Fill a deep baking dish 3/4 of the way up with the "meat sauce" then spoon on the mash bit by bit until covered. Use fork to make lines in the mash
- Top with cheeses and bake until golden and crispy 35 to 40 minutes
- Serve with a nice glass of Tempranillo or Shiraz.

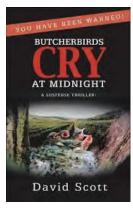

#### **Butcherbirds Cry at Midnight**

David Scott's book is about family, fear, pain and family solidarity. The thrust of the story is eminently topical today - the betraval of children and abuse by trusted adults. The backdrop is a family vineyard in the 1960's: a trio



of older siblings, trying to carve out careers for themselves, come back to the Murray Valley winery for an important anniversary event and have to deal with a dark past. At the centre is much admired husband and wife how are held up as the epitome of cultural success in their country community. The emotional development of the central characters continues as the story develops. There is an element of the thriller as the tale reaches an ugly crescendo, but the strength of daughter Amy and the love she has for her brother Cade, climaxes in a final scene that has a positive outcome.

A book of strength, perseverance, sadness, evil and retribution , not for fainthearted, but certainly one of disturbing truth and relevance.
