# Over 18 and considering AstraZeneca? This may help you decide...

If you are 18 or older, and in an area where there is a COVID-19 outbreak, the best vaccine for you is the one you can get right now. That possibly means you should get the AstraZeneca vaccine, as Pfizer is still in short supply.

This updated advice was given by ATAGI (the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation), the government's expert vaccine advisory body, on July 24. Why would it change to recommending either AstraZeneca or Pfizer, after months of preferring Pfizer for younger people?

More young people are being hospitalised, in ICU and dying during this current outbreak in Australia, where the Delta strain is dominating.

Whether this is a function of the Delta strain being more dangerous to young people, or because older people are (as a group) more likely to be protected by already being vaccinated, remains a subject of debate.

There is little argument, however, that the Delta strain is more infectious, which is why we want to vaccinate our population as quickly as possible.

So if you are 18 or older and have not been vaccinated yet, you may be asking whether getting an AstraZeneca vaccine right now is the right thing for you to do. To answer this we need to consider the benefits and risks of the AstraZeneca vaccination.

### What do vaccines achieve?

When thinking about what any COVID-19 vaccine should achieve, there is an order of priority.

First, it should stop people who catch COVID-19 from dying.

Second, it should reduce risk of severe disease (symptoms bad enough to need ICU treatment).

Third, hospitalisations should go down.

If a vaccine is doing more than these three things, it is a bonus.

We are very lucky the AstraZeneca and Pfizer vaccines not only achieve all three, they also decrease numbers of people suffering illness of any sort (including mild symptoms), and possibly even reduce transmission (making people who have caught COVID-19 less infective).

### Do vaccines work against the Delta variant?

Since Delta became the dominant strain of COVID-19 worldwide, researchers have been working hard to see how well current vaccines perform against it.

So far, the news is good. Let's look at the evidence.

In the United Kingdom where the Delta strain is the cause of the majority of infections at the moment, there were 229,218 COVID infections between February and July. Of these, 12.5% were in fully vaccinated people. These are known as "breakthrough infections" (because they "broke through" the protection of the vaccine).

Of those breakthrough infections, 3.8%, required a visit to ED. Just 2.9% required hospital admission, and less than 1% died.

This means even though the vaccines didn't fully protect people against disease, they did achieve their primary purpose: to save lives and keep people out of hospital.

Another study in the UK that narrowed down to look at just hospitalisation with Delta strain concludes AstraZeneca is 92% effective against hospitalisation, after two doses.

Other studies have shown a 60% to 67% reduction in symptomatic disease.

Although AstraZeneca works to reduce infectivity of the Delta strain, vaccinated people can still transmit it to others.

That's why it's so important for vaccinated people to still observe all the other evidence-based ways of reducing spread, including wearing masks, social distancing, and lockdown restrictions – at least until we have enough people in the community vaccinated.

### But what are the downsides?

Of course there are potential risks from the AstraZeneca vaccine: injection site pain, tiredness, headache, muscle pain, fever and chills are the most commonly reported side effects.

Most of these are mild and temporary, going away within one to two days.

There are also rare but severe side effects: anaphylaxis (two to five per million people), and thrombosis with thrombocytopenia (TTS) – known colloquially as "clots". The only risk factor that has been shown to predict how likely you are to get TTS after an AstraZeneca vaccine is age.

TTS clots are very different from other blood clots you may hear about. In the same way that having a basal cell cancer removed from your skin does not make you more at risk of getting a brain tumour, having a blood clot in your medical history (or family history) does not make you more at risk of TTS.

In addition, we have effective treatments for TTS now, so the death rate is low.

To keep it in perspective, your risk of getting a blood clot from TTS is still far less than your risk of dying in a car accident in the next year, and most people still don't think twice about getting into a car.

Obviously, if there is no COVID-19 in the community, then the risk from the



vaccine will outweigh the risk from the disease – even a tiny risk is bigger than zero.

The reason ATAGI changed its advice to recommend the AstraZeneca vaccine to younger age groups in areas of outbreak is because as soon as COVID-19 starts to spread in the community, the risk of serious disease and death skyrockets. Which makes the vaccine suddenly become a very sensible option in Sydney and other high-risk areas.

### How can you get it?

If and when you decide to have the AstraZeneca vaccine and you live in NSW, you can simply book in with any place that is giving it in your area. This may be a GP or state vaccination clinic.

You are not required to see a GP first, but of course you should only book once you've had your questions answered and are ready to go ahead with it.

Apart from contacting local providers directly, you can register for vaccination via the eligibility checker https://covid-vaccine.healthdirect.gov.au/eligibility (you fill in your details after completing the checker).

Pharmacies will not be administering AstraZeneca vaccines to people under 40 at this stage.

Finally, I have had in my practice many young people express frustration at being unable to get a vaccine before now, because they see it as a vital step forward for our community and the world.

Their lives have often been hugely disrupted by COVID-19 and they believe the risk of any vaccine is better than continuing with the status quo.

As one patient told me: "I'm young, I live a risky life. Getting this vaccine is the safest thing I have done all week."

# Councillor's Comment

These are my own personal views. I do not purport to speak on behalf of Council. Decisions of Council are made only by majority vote, legislative authority or under authority delegated by Council.

### **AUSTRALIA POST INVESTIGATION**

Many of you may be wondering about the result of the Australia Post plebiscite investigation which was inconclusive as to where all the votes went. It could have been several scenarios and we may never know the full answer. Australia Post has made a full refund of the postage costs, acknowledging the process was below their standards, which I have accepted in settlement of the claim. Despite the delivery shortfalls, opportunity was given to all those households who missed a ballot to get one, and the response was very high.

I do note the occasional commentary in letters to the editor on the interpretation of the results. The experts in this field ensured the process was statistically sound and, from my experience in community surveying in local government populations, the Tamborine Mountain response was the best I have ever seen, with 51 per cent of households responding and delivering a calculated 99 per cent degree of statistical confidence.

Just by way of comparison, the most recent customer sentiment survey conducted in a less conventional manner, conducted by consultants in 2020 for Scenic Rim Council was a two-question email survey. It was sent to 8732 Scenic Rim customers and after bounce backs, effectively was successfully delivered to 8252 computer mailboxes. Just 1879 responded i.e., 22.7 per cent, and 6373 did not respond. It was considered to be an outstanding result with a very high level of engagement, indicating that Scenic Rim customers wish to be actively involved in shaping the activities and improvements at Scenic Rim Council.

It is nonsensical to suggest that with this more statistically accurate household plebiscite, all those in the 49 per cent of households who failed to vote have an opinion that is 100 per cent biased one way or another as has been suggested. What is more likely, and borne out by probability theory, is the responses most likely would reflect in the same proportion as the plebiscite survey results. This is what the 99 per cent degree of statistical confidence reflects.

#### **LOCKDOWN**

A report last year indicated that the greatest impact of COVID-19 last year in the Scenic Rim was on the tourism industry on Tamborine Mountain.

Council is to consider a COVID response plan similar to that introduced early in 2020 to assist businesses affected by lockdown. It is expected that this plan, which will be under consideration in the coming weeks, will be announced as soon as possible after Council next meets. It is a plan relating only to Council functions and within its legislated powers.

### **CHECK FOR FIRE ANT NESTS THIS WINTER**

The National Fire Ant Eradication Program is reminding everyone to keep an eye out for fire ants during the cold weather winter, when their nests can be easier to spot.

While many species like to hibernate in colder months this is not quite the case for fire ants.

National Program General Manager, Graeme Dudgeon, says fire ants build their nests higher in cold weather to gather warmth, making them more obvious.

"Fire ant nests can sometimes be tough to spot because they can look like a flat patch of dirt. A mounded nest is much easier to spot," he said.

"While our aerial, field and odour detection dog teams are out looking for nests in areas across South-East Queensland, the community plays a vital role in spotting fire ants in their own yards, parks and local neighbourhood.

"We're asking everybody to keep their eyes open and report any suspicious ant mounds to us.

"We also suggest caution. Fire ants have a nasty sting and disturbing the nest could see you meet them up close and personal."

Fire ants are copper brown in colour, very small and unlike other ants can vary in size at anything from 2–6mm.

Report suspected fire ants within 24 hours of finding them via **fireants.org.au** or call 13 25 23.

# QuickSmarts Seatbelts and Restraints



### It's a simple action that could save your life.

Wearing a properly adjusted restraint reduces the risk of fatal or serious injury by half! On average, 31 people are killed and 166 seriously injured on Queensland roads each year as a result of not wearing a seatbelt or an appropriate restraint?

### The facts

- Drivers and passengers are around nine times more likely to be killed in a road crash if they are not wearing a seatbelt?
- The latest research shows 7% of Queenslanders drive on our public roads without wearing a seatbelt4
- Children aged up to 7 years must use an approved child restraint suitable for their height and size.
- The driver of a vehicle is responsible for the proper restraint of all passengers. This does not apply to buses or motorbikes.
- The penalty in Queensland for not wearing a seatbelt is \$400 and three demerit points for drivers and passengers aged 16 years or older.

### What does the seatbelt do?

Put simply, a seatbelt could save your life. The main functions of a seatbelt are to:

- cause the occupant to decelerate at the same rate as the vehicle in a crash, maximising the distance over which the occupant comes to a stop
- spread the force of the impact over the stronger parts of the occupant's body (pelvis and chest area)
- prevent the occupant colliding with the interior parts of the vehicle
- · reduce the risk of being thrown from the vehicle
- reduce the risk of being thrown through the windscreen.

# JON KRAUSE MP State Member for Scenic Rim

The LNP has called more than 100 times for the State Government to support small and family

businesses – and finally, they have buckled to that pressure in early August by announcing there will be some limited support for those businesses.

After 18 months of COVID-19, you would expect that the details of this support would be all ready, packaged up, ready for applications. But no, applications don't even open until mid-August, the package excludes businesses with turnover less than \$75,000 (for Labor, these people don't seem to exist) and it is estimated that only one in nine small and family businesses might be able to access support. Too often, Labor's "support packages" sound great on the surface, but the fine print means very little actual support is delivered. We all welcome supportive words from the Government, but I'll wait and see how these measures actually help small and family businesses.

In the meantime, another lockdown in the past week or so has placed even more stress on families and small and family businesses. While that lockdown has now been lifted, the uncertainty created by this entire situation is something that I know is affecting many people in our community. I will continue to advocate for constructive outcomes that balance precautions that are required owing to COVID-19 with other pressures that bear down on people due to those precautions. One practical example of this is my recent request for community sport to be allowed in Scenic Rim when the Chief Health Officer has banned it for two weeks across the entirety of southeast Queensland — we haven't had any cases of COVID-19 here, and no contact points either. Recreation is a very important part of the mental health equation and I hope this request will be taken up, pronto.

### **SCENIC RIM ATHLETES**

A huge congratulations to equestrian competitor Kevin McNab from Tamborine for taking out Olympic Silver in Eventing in Tokyo. And what about Riley Day (pictured at right) in the 200m – she has done herself, the Scenic Rim and Australia proud. Making



an Olympic semi-final – in fact, making the Olympics – is an amazing effort, but her determination to be the best was on display as she ran faster than ever before in that semi-final. What an inspiration to younger athletes as we look forward to future Olympics. The entire community is rightly bursting with pride for Riley and Kevin for their achievements.



### **CLOSING THE GAP IMPLEMENTATION PLAN**

Delivering the annual Closing the Gap Statement, the Prime Minister unveiled \$1 billion in funding to underpin the Government's first Closing the Gap Implementation Plan. This is the first time any government has worked with Australia's Indigenous groups, known as the Coalition of Peaks, to build a real partnership. The plan places an emphasis on giving back responsibility, listening and empowering.

It outlines a major investment in health infrastructure and support to ensure Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders can access health services, when and where they need them. Measures include greater support for new mothers, including greater access to antenatal care and more support for the first year of a baby's life.

### SUPPORTING THE AVIATION SECTOR

The Government has extended a range of programs to support the domestic aviation sector, to keep Australians moving and to ensure this critically important sector continues to operate. This includes the Domestic Aviation Network Support (DANS), which has been extended until the end of the year to maintain a minimum level of services on key air routes.

The Regional Airline Network Support (RANS) program has also been extended. These two programs have allowed more than 1.8 million passengers to continue to travel across our country, including essential workers in health care and other frontline services.

The Retaining Domestic Aviation Capability (RDAC) initiative announced last week will also help to ensure airlines and their staff receive support through this challenging period and are ready to ramp up flying again as soon as possible to support our economic recovery. # SRRC FOISTING ISSUES ON BEECHMONT WITH NO CONSULTATION

The blind ignorance of Scenic Rim Regional Council with regards to the residents of Beechmont recently is disappointing in its banal tobe-expectedness, and extremely infuriating in its clumsy, bureaucratic heavy-handedness. There are currently two issues the SRRC has seen fit to foist upon us, with absolutely no consultation or regard for what the people of Beechmont want, or indeed need.

The first is a proposed-and-all-but-Council-approved private school to colonise our Community Centre when we already have a perfectly good school that has been regularly used by local real estate agents as a prime reason to buy and live on Beechmont. Not only does this school stand to lose teachers (local Beechmont residents among them) if they lose students to this private school, but residents will lose our Community Centre to accommodate Gold Coast school children. A real lose-lose for Beechmont.

The second is a "not-proposed-but-apparently-already-decided" footpath forming a giant ring around the school and taking in the only two kerbed streets on the entire mountain – Acacia and Jervis Courts. As part of a street community, I of course have no issue with Council installing an all-weather track through the two easements that lead to the school, but I very, very, very strongly object to being told Council will be removing trees from Acacia Court to make way for an unwanted and unnecessary Gold Coast-style concrete footpath.

We were invited to a "consultation" with Council representatives on Thursday 29 July at our home, but even they (engineers, as it turned out) agreed it was in no way a consultation and the decision has already been made. What on earth prevented Council from sending representatives who are actual consultants BEFORE deciding what they thought the people of Beechmont wanted? Of all the possible good projects Council could have chosen, ramming a concrete footpath through Acacia Court is not one of them.

The funds for this great white elephant

have been provided by way of a Federal Grant. According to the council engineer, the grant is \$600,000 to fully cover the cost of the entire footpath project, which is about 3.5-4km long by rough estimate. There is something deeply suspicious about this figure, as other sources have suggested that the Acacia Court section alone (approximately 650 metres) is either \$450,000 or \$425,000, depending on which source you read.

Cr Derek Swanborough, in his Scenic News column, reveals that the cost of the Acacia Court section is \$425,000 and the Jervis Court side is \$625,000 – more than a million dollars on an unwanted footpath! What is this so-called grant? When was it submitted? What were its terms? What is the money supposed to be for and, importantly, how much is being taken out of our inflated rates to waste on this project? And curiously, why did the engineer lie to us when asked for the full cost of the whole project? What other untruths are we to uncover?

We began the purchasing process of our block on Acacia Court in 2007, as an 'expression of interest'. There was never any mention of a footpath then, or in fact, since. Nothing on any of the plans, no indication from Council that a footpath was ever a consideration. The developer of the 'estate' planted young street trees on the newly kerbed avenue as a requirement of Council. and even before we started building, we tended those trees, often with water we'd brought with us from home. We've pruned them, carefully mowed around them, protected them from idiots, and even replaced one in 2009 when we couldn't. We've nurtured those trees for at least 13 years and I for one will not be standing back and allowing Council to simply chop them down to make way for a monstrous concrete strip.

We all in Acacia Court are beautifying our quiet little street, and Council plans to turn it into Little Robina for no reason other than a Federal Government grant has been issued. This is the least intelligent reason to spend money - just because "it's there". After the appalling waste of the last Federal grant to plant \$100,000 worth of seedlings along the creek bank behind the Acacia Court houses, I'm frankly surprised any further grant application was successful. Hundreds and hundreds of plants, at least 150 on our creek frontage alone, were planted during the heat of that December, in a drought, and they are all long dead because the Council didn't allow for any ongoing care of the plants.

Meanwhile, for the want of funds, the

Beechmont Progress Association is chasing ill-fitting tenants to ensconce in our Old School.

Council must reconsider the plan to press on with a footpath on Acacia Court, at the expense of a single tree. I happen to know at least 50 per cent of the residents of this street are strongly opposed, despite the false information the engineer tried to have us believe. Not one councillor in Scenic Rim Regional Council lives on Beechmont, so to decide what we want without even bothering to ask is insulting, to say the least. We live here because we like it how it is - we don't want our quiet, rural street looking like a Gold Coast suburb. We don't want a footpath and WE DON'T WANT OUR TREES CHOPPED DOWN.

### COUNCIL ASLEEP AT THE WHEEL – AGAIN

The "cabins" larger than my house saga: Scenic Rim Regional Council's Planning Section needs a shake-up.


One of the two new court cases lodged recently (there are currently 11) against Scenic Rim Regional Council has arisen because it failed to make a development application (DA) decision by the negotiated extended decision date of 31 July 2021. This gave rise to a "Deemed Refusal" to which the developer has appeal rights, now exercised.

Whilst the recommendation to refuse the DA (MCU20/050) was contained in the agenda for Council's 3 August 2021 meeting, this was outside the decision period. As Council's meeting was not held due to COVID lockdown, the decision had still not been made at the time of writing (6 August).

This DA has been highly controversial and resulted in 232 objections submissions. This was the same site upon which Council approved a "tennis court" and consequent clearing of koala habitat on a steep slope whilst being aware that the developer was planning to construct "disability cabins" on the same portion of land. Asleep at the wheel? Ratepayers are paying twice – once for staff who have not carried out their roles and again by way of legal fees to defend their failure to do so.

There was also a second instance where Council requested an extension of time in which to issue an Information Request and then missed that date,

resulting in the developer (of the "Nature-Based Tourism" onsens at 713-735 Main Western Road) treating the request as "informal" as it was made out of time. This DA has attracted - at the last count -310 submissions, overwhelmingly opposed to the development on Rural Residential A land. Facebook friends and potential contractors have made submissions in support of the development.

The second court matter was filed by commercial groundwater extractors located at 2-20 Holt Road and 82-90 Hartley Road and seeks a change to an order made in the Planning and Environmental Court in 2016. The applicants seek to amend court-ordered limitations of truck movements from 12 x 28,000lt and 40 x 14,000lt truck movements per week to 52 truck movements of up to 28,000lt with a maximum of 896,000lt per week (no change) transported from the site. That's a hell of a lot of bottled water.

The 14.000lt tankers are used primarily for local delivery. Economic need of the operators is not a consideration in planning applications, and as no provision has been made for local delivery (i.e., by limiting the size of the tankers), ratepayers expect Council to fight this one, given the costs incurred in obtaining the original order in 2016.

### SCENIC RIM'S EKKA HOLIDAY RESCHEDULED



### MUDRAS IN YOGA

We are practising some beautiful meditations in yoga class over the next couple of weeks. Meditations to open our hearts give us courage, identify with the hardships of others and to bring us joy.

And we need lots of joy right now with the moving feast of COVID-19 and its impact on families, businesses and our way of life. And because of the coronavirus lockdown, all classes are online. What was once extraordinary (stuck at home, only leaving home within a 10km radius, teaching yoga online and reaching students in Victoria, New Zealand and Tasmania) is now ordinary. We're a pretty adaptable species, humans. And last week in yoga class we were using some wonderful mudras (hand gestures) to enhance our classes and meditations.

Holding the hands in a certain gesture is not unique to yoga. Look how you hold your hands together to pray, the peace sign we make with our fingers at activist rallies, or the clenched fist of an angry demonstrator. Did you know that during the Renaissance period, hands were as important a focus of attention as the face was, because they were the only other visible area of the body? Hence, representation of the position of the hands became a decorative element that was almost as important as the face, and the hand gestures in paintings were an effective way to convey secrets, codes and messages. And for those of you who like to talk with your hands: According to research, the least popular TED Talkers used an average of 272 hand gestures during the 18-minute talk and the most popular TED Talkers used an average of 465 hand gestures, almost double.

But mudras in yoga are a little more subtle and we use them to activate certain meridians in the body, specific organs and to calm our nervous energy. Since hands contain all the acupuncture meridians, they are considered to be the control panel of the body. According to Ayurveda, these energies are required to be in harmony for the body. When we move our fingers and hands in a specific manner, either we bend, press, cross, extend or touch our fingers with other fingers, we are actually altering the flow of energy, prana, through these acupuncture points, which in turn, influence and stimulate specific areas of the brain and helps in bringing an elemental balance in the body. Mudras help connect brain to body.

Everything you do with your hands is an expression of your heart. Try to imagine: blowing a kiss, a high five in triumph, or cuddling a pet are all ways you express the feelings that you hold in your heart. Conversely, are you rudely gesticulating or gripping the steering wheel? Yoga's hand expressions are said to shift energies from what we might be experiencing to how we want to feel.

Success is rarely an individual effort but is achieved through input and encouragement from those around us.

The Olympics highlight teamwork, competition, victory, defeat, growth, endurance, strength, intelligence, passion, inspiration, desire, motivation and honour. We may never make it to the Olympics but these are qualities we can all pursue.

Here's a hint: this is an arithmetical puzzle as well as a linguistic one. Ngkolmpu does not have a base ten system like English does. In other words, it doesn't count in tens, hundreds and thousands. Beyond its different base, however, it behaves very regularly.

# with the Scenic News

Donna McKillop is the owner of Wisteria Sewing Services, specialising in bespoke sewing alterations and manufacturing, serving, Tamborine Mountain and its surrounds.

## What inspired you to open your business and what do you have planned in 2021?

I started working in a Sunshine Coast surf wear manufacturing factory at age 16. There I learnt sewing, cutting and basic pattern making. At 18 I went out on my own and started my own clothing label, learning more about children's wear. As the years went by, I brought three children into the world. I became a single parent at 30 and moved to the Noosa Hinterland where I opened a shop and sold my Sandpit Kids clothing attire whilst offering an alteration and manufacturing service.

Over time, the alterations component of my work took over. I met my now husband Vince, a long-time Tamborine Mountain resident, and made the decision to move as my youngest was 18 and had his own place.

Sandpit Kids was relocated to the Eagle Heights shopping centre above FoodWorks and morphed into Wisteria Sewing Services when I stopped making kids clothing. We then moved our workplace to our home studio. During the spring months we have an amazing floral display of wisteria that has been on the premises for over 30 years.

This year we added an embroidery service to our mix of work, with Vince taking responsibility for the technical and design side of this aspect of the business.

### What did you do before opening your business?

In addition to working in the clothing manufacturing sector I have worn 'other hats' - parenting my three kids, a lawn mowing and gardening service, a house cleaning service, and as a barista and attendant in a bookshop.

### How would you describe your business?

Anything that needs stitching - from clothing to curtains, cushions to bags - the list is endless.

### What is it about your business that you love?

Being creative, coming up with ideas with a customer to make a garment work. The sewing is the easy bit.

Is it a business that gives you satisfaction?



I get a real buzz when customers are satisfied. To be in a trade for 33 years (whoops, giving away my age) and still loving it. What's that old saying? Do something you love and you will never have to work a day in your life.

### If you were not doing this what would your ideal job be?

When I was at school, I wanted to be a vet but I hated studying, so that went out the window; in my mid-twenties I wanted to be a midwife but that meant studying, so that went out the window. Can you see a pattern forming here (IoI)? Sitting here writing this I'm actually stumped. I honestly think I have the ideal job for me.

Interesting facts about yourself?

Got married for the first time at 47. I owned miniature goats and had to deliver a baby when it got stuck - midwife and vet desires came into play. Started drawing one-and-a-half years ago and have had four commissions - you can see my art in my studio.

### What do you do for fun?

My kind of fun is considered pain for others - six-to-12-hour adventure racing, navigating, mountain biking, kayaking and running. A holiday for me is hiking in New Zealand and pitching a tent each night.



### **NATIVE BEES**

When bees are mentioned, it is always the European honeybee with its distinctive yellow and black stripes which comes to mind. This species has been spread extensively by humans beyond their natural range in Europe, Middle East and Africa. However, bees are a numerous, widely distributed, and diverse insect superfamily (Apoidea) with an estimated 16,000 species distributed throughout the world.



Australia has around 2000 species of native bees. They are diverse in habitats and appearance and range from 2 to 26mm in size. They come in a wide range of colours - red, yellow, orange, green, blue, black and white. Some are fluffy and covered in dense fur while others are smooth, shiny and hairless. The vast majority of Australian bees are solitary, only around 14 species are social bees that form large colonies and produce honey.

Regardless of whether bees are solitary or social, all bees develop in four distinct life cycle stages – egg, larva, pupa and adult.

For solitary bee species a single female builds, weaves, burrows or excavates a nest in which she lays her eggs. Some species are semi-social, with several females cooperating to build a nest in which all their eggs are laid.

Native social bee species live in colonies which can be situated in a tree hollow, burrow or cavity and may be occupied by thousands of bees - a single queen, infertile female workers and male drones. Worker bees construct waxy structures to store pollen and nectar and also create brood cells stocked with honey and pollen to nourish the young. The queen bee lays a single egg in each brood cell, after which worker bees quickly seal the cell. Native bees have complex social behaviour.

Bees are vitally important pollinators – 90 per cent of wild plants and 75 per cent of leading global crops depend on animal pollination. Some Australian native bees use a special method to collect nectar, known as buzz pollination - they vibrate a flower so vigorously that the pollen capsules explode and are attracted to the bees by a static charge. Other native bees have highly evolved highly specialised adaptation such as long tongues, bristles, shiny faces to harvest nectar from native wildflowers.

Attract native bees to your gardens by planting flowers in clumps or layers which provide nectar and pollen all year. Provide a "bee hotel". Leave some undisturbed ground for burrowing bees and avoid pesticides.



Did you know that the Cockatiel (Nymphicus hollandicus) is the smallest member of the cockatoo family? They're also known as the Quarrion or the Weiro, and the species was first recorded in 1770 during Captain Cook's first voyage to Australia.

This week's pet is a very special cockatiel named Ziggy, who I learned a lot about from his best friend, Savanna Lange, a grade 6 student at St Bernard State School. Ziggy is one and a half years old, and a much loved member of the Lange family. This little bird man is bursting with character: he loves people, is highly adorable, and already at such a young age has quite a repertoire of words.

Savanna shared many stories about his antics and his talking abilities. "When you walk into a room he always says 'hello', and he also likes saying 'peek-a-boo'. It is very cute. If he is wanting your attention, he starts singing tunes and then will say 'I'm not singing' if you ask him. He is very funny."

"Ziggy is very clever and loves learning new words. Through repetition we teach him new words all the time and it is really easy," shared Savanna. "We have started teaching him the Happy Birthday song, but he likes to add his own tunes to it too." Ziggy is quite the DJ, and enjoys the attention his antics bring. "He has such a huge personality for such a small bird."

Cockatiels are a wonderful Australian native bird species, easy to care for, and many people enjoy having them as pets because of their friendly nature. Savanna tells me: "Ziggy is easy to look after. He really likes to sit on his house or help out Mum when she is on her computer working. He just likes chilling".

Hearing the family stories, you know Ziggy is a much-loved and well cared for pet, blessed with a wonderful family. "Ziggy has a harness, so he can go outside with us. He likes to sit in trees. He loves going on family holidays with us, on outings to shops, and every night at 7pm, he is placed in bed with a cover." Ziggy's diet is a daily mix of small parrot seed mix with sunflowers seeds, and pellets. He loves fresh fruits and vegetables, with spinach and peas being his favourite. "He will eat anything we eat" laughs Savanna, "especially croissants if we let him."

Ziggy is very social, loves people and works at *Plant Homewares* and *Lifestyle* on Gallery Walk in the Whistling Duck Village. This is a new local Mountain family business that sells plant home wares, terrariums, cacti, airplants, succulent pots, kokedamas and dried flower arrangements created by owner, Carol Lange. 


