NEW PATH OPENS AT BOTANIC GARDENS

The volunteers at the Botanic Gardens have completed a major upgrade to one of its greatest attractions, Sooty Owl's Creekside Trail. A new path leads visitors through this magical space – with no steps.

The initial path continues to be a favourite while the alternative path with a series of timber bridges across Charlie's Creek allows mums with prams and some of the less able, to enjoy the trail with much greater ease.

Both pathways have also been upgraded, with pavers replacing the bitumen, offering a smoother surface on which to walk.

All of the surprises and activities in Sooty Owl's Trail, including the "thong gong", the water pump and mill and the megaphone Q&A are still fully accessible.

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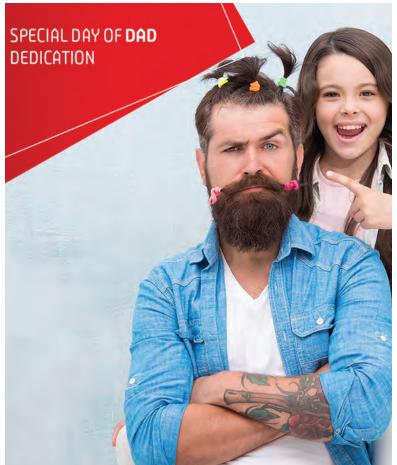

Physio Talk

THE OSTEOARTHRITIS TRAP

Have you heard of the osteoarthritis trap?

It is far too common, especially around retirement age. And it is devastating. Let me tell you what the trap looks like.

You begin to get joint degeneration. That degeneration begins to get arthritic and inflamed. That inflamed and irritated joint begins to make peculiarly clicky and crunchy sounds. It begins to get a bit sore and swollen ... almost puffy.

You don't walk and move as much because it is so sore. You lose fitness and gain weight. The cartilage degeneration worsens from the increased weight and less movement.

It makes more sounds, gets puffier and more painful.

You move less and put on more weight. Joint osteoarthritis > pain > less exercise > weight gain > worsening arthritis ... and you are stuck in the osteoarthritis trap.

Sound familiar? If you are like most people, you will probably find it quite daunting when stuck in pain and your fitness is worsening. It can be so frustrating when even basic movements like walking are so painful.

Some people may think that the only way to deal with osteoarthritis is medication and a joint replacement.

The reality is that there is sooooo much you can do to manage osteoarthritis and I want to share five things you can do:

 Lower your intake of pro-inflammatory foods like dairy, alcohol and sugar. Or think of it the other way around - eat more vegetables, nuts and good fats. Some vegetables like nightshade vegetables can contribute to symptoms, so it is worth seeking dietary advice and experimenting with different foods.

- 2. Seek medical advice on how to sustainably lose weight. To lose even a couple of kilograms will drastically reduce the load on arthritic backs, hips, knees, and ankles.
- Begin strengthening your knees. If you were to do just one thing
 from this list, strengthen your knees. I cannot stress enough how
 important this is. By strengthening your knees correctly not only
 will you obviously get stronger, but your pain will reduce and you
 will be able to walk with much more confidence and fluency.
- 4. Aim to get into a pool weekly to move pain-free. One of the best things you can be doing for arthritis is swimming, exercising and moving around in the water with the relief that the buoyancy from water provides.
- 5. Strengthen the rest of your body, especially the hips and core. The number of times I have seen people's pain improve tremendously because they strengthen up the rest of their body. They stop walking wonkily, it takes the strain of their hips and back, and the knees are much better supported.

By escaping the cycle, you can at the very least manage the arthritis better. You won't be able to get your 21-year-old joints back but you can prevent worsening of your current arthritis.

This means less puffy knees, no more hobbling around, no more waking up at night with pain and more time doing what you love. It is great getting some freedom from pain and physical improvements, but what's really special is the impact this can make on your life.

It is so rewarding to see someone get not just relief but be able to do the things they love again without pain.

Many years of bad Labor government has led us to a situation where there is a \$6 billion backlog on repairs and maintenance on State roads across Queensland. BAN ON PLASTIC STARTS THIS MONTH

Starting 1 September, some single-use plastic items will be banned in Queensland. Half of all plastic produced in the world is designed to be only used once — and then thrown away. This is a huge contributor to the 300 million tonnes of plastic waste created every year, almost equivalent to the weight of the entire human population.

Single-use plastic items included in the ban are:

- Straws: regular straws, flexible straws, straws with a scoop, cocktail straws and bubble tea straws (I admit, I'm going to struggle with cardboard straws for some things including thickshakes)
- Stirrers: hot or cold drink stirrers, swizzle sticks and hot or cold food stirrers
- Plates and bowls including single-use expanded polystyrene plates
- Cutlery: knives, forks, spoons, teaspoons, sample tasting spoons, soup spoons, chopsicks, splayds and sporks
- Expanded polystyrene takeaway food containers and cups.

PASSED: SURVEILLANCE LEGISLATION AMENDMENT (IDENTIFY AND DISRUPT) BILL

The safety of our local community has received a boost with the passage of legislation that gives Australian law enforcement agencies new capabilities to identify and disrupt serious criminal activity occurring online. The dark web is the gateway for crimes like child exploitation, drug trafficking, and illegal firearms. Police will now have the tools they need to target criminals hiding behind the anonymity of the dark web.

EXPANSION OF SME RECOVERY LOAN SCHEME

With lockdowns impacting millions of Australians, the Morrison Government is ensuring businesses are given every opportunity to adapt and recover. That's why we're expanding the SME Recovery Loan Scheme, so that all SMEs dealing with the economic impacts of COVID-19 can qualify.

Small and medium businesses with a turnover of less than \$250 million can now access up to \$5 million from participating lenders, with the Government guaranteeing 80 per cent of the loan amount.

This will keep more businesses in business, with lenders able to provide cheaper credit and allows many otherwise viable SMEs to access vital additional funding to get through this crisis, recover and invest for the future.

This announcement comes on top of our ongoing and targeted economic, business and income support, with around \$4 billion in COVID-19 Disaster payments being made to about 1.6 million Australians since 1 July this year.

In Queensland, we are working with the Queensland Government to deliver more support in the form of a \$600 million business support package.

The package is split 50/50 between the two governments and will be implemented and administered by the Queensland Government.

As part of the package, additional support for businesses that have had a decline in turnover of more than 30 per cent will include a \$1000 one-off grant to non-employing sole traders across Queensland that have had a decline in turnover of more than 30 per cent; and payroll-based support for all businesses across Queensland that have had a decline in turnover of more than 30 per cent:

- a \$10,000 one-off, top-up grant to small business with payroll of less than \$1.3 million
- a \$15,000 one-off, top-up grant to medium sized business with payroll between \$1.3 million and \$10 million
- a \$30,000 one-off, top-up grant to large sized tourism and hospitality focused businesses only with payroll of greater than \$10 million.

This package will help to keep businesses in business and Queenslanders in jobs and builds on the almost \$30 billion in economic support the Morrison Government has provided Queensland households and businesses during the pandemic.

STUDY ON BULK WATER EXTRACTION NOT YET PUBLIC

Whilst I support the views expressed by Amanda Hay (Commercial Water Extraction Issues Just Won't Go Away, Scenic News 26/08/21), I would suggest that they don't go far enough.

Bulk water extraction by local business for sale off-mountain to multinational

bottlers is unethical and greedy practice on multiple fronts. Our local aquifers significantly support local domestic water need and it is unacceptable for local business to tap into a local resource which costs them nothing and sell it for profit.

Such practice is emblematic of a broader philosophy in which those that can exploit our global natural resources for profit and are substantively responsible for the wider issue of climate change. Furthermore, support of the bottled water industry is yet another example of exploitation, promoting and providing a product which no one in the developed world requires.

The QUT study on local aquifers, part funded by SRRC, is yet to be made publicly available, although the work was completed and delivered to Council some time ago. I would contend that it is unacceptable for Council to argue, as they have, that a business approval, once given can never be rescinded.

At every level of government, laws and statutes may be modified or reversed depending on current circumstances. Climate change is with us and requires urgent measures to address it. None of us can fully predict local conditions in the future, and to allow the sale of millions of litres of water annually is dangerous and iniquitous behaviour.

I would call on Council to do the brave and right thing, end local commercial water extraction for off-mountain sale.

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RIP GARY STEWART - TMCCA's in-house Professor par excellence

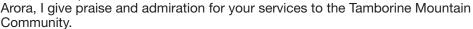

Councillor's Comment

COVID-19 RATES RELIEF

RETIREMENT HOUSING APPROVAL

I know the recent approval of this housing facility has caused concern to some in our community and I am very happy to talk with any residents who wish to share their views. However, I am unable to respond to comments or dialogue on a Facebook site.

This application, which may not be popular with all residents, has been assessed by the planning officers and it complies with the Scenic Rim Planning Scheme which is the legislative document approved by the State Government. Legally it ticks all the boxes. A number of conditions have been included and community input can be attributed to a number of these.

In the Scenic Rim, water supply and State-controlled roads are the responsibility of other agencies, not Council. Their approval and conditions give Council no opportunity to deviate from them.

I wrote in this column some months ago regarding the ongoing water issues in Canungra (which I, too share) and about a large development application in town some years ago, which the council of the day refused on grounds of inadequate water. It then went to the Planning and Environment Court, at a cost to ratepayers and the decision was then approved. Had this recent application been refused by Council, the outcome would undoubtedly have been the same. These are the challenges a councillor faces when representing their community views; it is very easy to make the popular vote which is not always the right vote in the interests of all our ratepayers or the legislation that governs elected members.

As has been the case in the past, I will continue, along with Council officers, to advocate with the external agencies (Urban Utilities, Seqwater and Department of Transport and Main Roads) to ensure our community views are heard and the infrastructure delivered in a timely manner.

With the challenging and uncertain times our communities are facing due to snap lockdowns and attendee restrictions, it is even more vital than ever that we all consciously support our local retailers, trades, suppliers and tourism operators.

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The Mountain Midwife

RAINBOW BABIES

Recently, you may have seen pictures of rainbows being posted on social media or people referring to 'rainbow babies' and wondered what they were talking about. A rainbow baby is a baby who is born after the loss of a child, whether that child was a miscarriage, a stillborn baby, or a baby who died soon after birth. When families suffer these losses and go on to have another baby, they may refer to that child as their 'rainbow baby'. This is acknowledged every year on August 22 on Rainbow Baby Day.

The loss of a baby is a complex and saddening time for many families and the circumstances around these losses are often varied and not as black and white as you may think. To be pregnant again can be a source of great anxiety for women and also for their partners. Many women struggle to 'allow' themselves to feel excited about the pregnancy until they are actually holding their baby earthside.

Anniversaries during the pregnancy can also be particularly stressful. Dates such as being pregnant at the gestation when the last baby was lost, the date of birth of that baby, or the due date for that baby are also times when women and their partners may feel a heightened sense of stress. Siblings too can also feel that stress. Sometimes parents want to protect their other children from their own sadness and pain, but many children are aware of what is happening and need that additional support too - whether that is from the school, from a counsellor or through a referral to another organisation through the GP.

If you know somebody who is expecting their rainbow baby, try to remember that they will be going through many emotions and that the way people react to loss is individual. There is no right or wrong way to feel when going through loss. It is complicated and sometimes hard to explain. The best thing you can do to support that person is acknowledge how they are feeling, listen to them, and ask them what they need you to do to help them through it.

There are lots of services out there for people who have experienced pregnancy loss. SANDS are a well-established organisation who help people through counselling and support. They also have a 24-hour bereavement support line you can call on 1300 308 307. If you have other children who are struggling with the loss of a sibling, there is a wonderful service called Paradise Kids in Arundel. They assist children and also their parents through counselling, both on a group and individual level, and many parents find this can help their children to work through their feelings. If you are currently pregnant with a rainbow baby, you can talk to your midwife or other health care provider about your concerns. If you need additional reassurance or if you feel you need allied health involvement, please reach out so we can help you to find tools that work for you to ease your concerns.

If you are not currently pregnant but are reading this, please also remember that a huge proportion of women have been through a pregnancy loss, whether that be a termination of pregnancy or a miscarriage. Some people are still struggling to fall pregnant, or they may have had to make the heartbreaking decision to terminate a pregnancy because the child had health problems that were late to diagnose because of their complexity, or because they made a choice that was right for them at that time. With Father's Day coming up, this can be a very triggering time for people.

Many well-meaning friends or acquaintances may ask couples when they are going to have children, or if they are going to have any more and this can be confronting if they have experienced pregnancy loss. We obviously don't want to live in a world where people are too afraid to ask each other anything, but to be mindful that people will have a different experience to your own, and of how what you say may make them feel is one of the simplest forms of kindness.

A MESSAGE FOR DADS

Happy Father's Day to all our dads! You are playing a crucial role in the life of your kids, regardless of what age or stage of life they are at. Trying to balance work and family commitments can be challenging but fortunately of late there has been an increase in the level of discussion about flexible work practices and the need for parents to spend time with their children.

When parents are looking for advice on parenting there are many books on offer, but very few are specifically written with fathers in mind. A couple of great books for dads written by Australian authors are *Manhood* by Steve Biddulph and *Father Time* by Daniel Petre.

Petre was managing director of Microsoft Australia at a time when the company was taking off, and has

experience in what it means to trade your life for a company.

Petre's observation is that most dads lean toward a belief that they have insignificant impact on the lives of their children. He is amazed that parents



in general undertake little study when it comes to what it takes to be a good parent. It seems we believe we are inherently programmed to be good parents and we rarely stop to reflect on our behaviours or motivations. Petre claims that if we were to put the same focussed energy we dedicate to our careers into our goal of producing well adjusted, caring, competent and confident offspring, we could fundamentally make the world a better place.

So, what makes a great parent and what do our kids need the most? First and foremost, is unconditional love. Scott Peck (*The Road Less Travelled*) says that if you have not experienced unconditional love as a child then you are forever damaged or scarred. Unconditional love is not hovering over every aspect of your child's life. Your child should feel that as they experiment and explore the world and occasionally fail, home is where they will find support and acceptance, regardless of their achievements or lack of them.

Another important aspect of parenting is demonstrating to your kids that they matter. Your child must observe your conscious choices to put their interests and needs first in order to feel that they are important and that they are worthy. When a child constantly feels that they are an annoyance to their parents who have better things to do, they develop a deep sense of lack of worth.

Equipping your child with life skills is the responsibility of every parent. Model what it means to care for others; respect every person; take responsibility for your actions; stand up for what you believe in; stay true to who you are - these are attributes that will set your child on a path to a well-functioning adult.

One of the keys to becoming a good dad is to pull yourself out of your daily grind and see your life with clear perspective. Give yourself time to reflect on how your family relationships are going and adjustments you may need to make. Your children will reap the benefits.

Anthony Rigg specialises in residential building design, having moved to Queensland after finishing his studies in Newcastle, NSW in 2002. He has lived on Tamborine Mountain for the past three years.

What inspired you to start your business, and what do you have planned in 2021?

Design, particularly residential design, has been something that I have grown to love. Initially, I worked for a high-end building company on the Gold Coast, helping senior staff draw up homes on Sovereign Island, Sanctuary Cove, and Hope Island. About a year-and-a-half in, a colleague asked me to design a home for his ageing parents on a oneacre block in rural Casino, NSW. It was to be the first time that I would only be answerable to the client. The budget for their home was tiny compared to the mansions we created on the Gold Coast. However, the joy I felt in aiding the clients create something special was immeasurable. With that first home complete, I quit my job at the Paradise Point building company and began to work for myself. In retrospect, it was way too early to go out on my own, as I was still learning the fundamentals of construction, yet this is how it happened. One begins in a very modest fashion. In 2005, I registered my company Bleuscape Design. Since then, 16 years have passed, and I am as passionate about this industry as ever. I still run a very humble operation, however, we have a steady flow of exciting work, much of which is here on Tamborine Mountain.

How did COVID-19 affect you and your business in 2020/2021?

As COVID began to emerge in 2020, we had several projects placed on hold; however, around June-July of the same year, most of what we had in the pipeline kicked off again. It felt like due to the restrictions and lockdowns, people simply recognised they had more time on their hands. As a result, momentum began again in the form of building projects. This, combined with a steady migration of Sydneysiders and Melbournites to Old, has seen a flourishing of opportunities for designers. We are very busy, with some exciting new homes and renovations in the works.

What did you do before opening your business?

I grew up in Cooranbong, a small town 20 minutes south of Newcastle, NSW. Before moving up here for work in the design industry, I was working odd jobs to support myself during study, the main one being Weet-Bix packing at the local Sanitarium Health Food Company.

How would you describe your business?

We are primarily focused on residential design. We work with clients wanting something special, something tailored to a desired lifestyle. Having said that, I would class our work as style-less in that we don't have a preferred aesthetic. Design brief, client budget and context or location are the three critical areas to set the parameters to work

within. Parameters in residential design are essential to make the project relevant. Each opportunity is different and deserves a fresh perspective. If you look at our work as a whole, the greatest compliment someone could give would be to see each project as individual, unrelated to the previous in aesthetics, space, and form.

What is it about your business that you love? What makes your business stand out from other, similar businesses? Is it a business that gives you satisfaction?

Our company is inherently designfocused. We are not just draftsmen. To get the best work out of us is to give us creative licence within defined parameters. All of our clients have been thinking and dreaming about taking ownership of something that is uniquely theirs. To help them realise this dream is an extraordinary honour.

What challenges have you had in business over this period of time?

The most significant challenge is the time it takes to achieve a portfolio of built work when starting from scratch. Gaining this initial momentum takes time, extraordinary discipline, and a period where one works for minimal financial reward. However, if you stick to it, a tipping point inevitably comes where things take hold, and the ball starts to roll

What is the most bizarre or funny thing you have encountered in your business?

I once had a developer contact me for an initial meeting on a project he was planning in Vanuatu. We sat down and went through the design brief and his desired outcomes. At the end of the meeting, I began to discuss a potential fee proposal. He looked at me strangely and proceeded to say that I should be paying him for the privilege of working on such a unique and career-defining project. I had to do everything I could to not laugh out loud. He was stone-cold serious! Inevitably, the relationship ended there. To this day, I don't know if he convinced anyone to get involved, yet



driving away, I had to admire the sheer audacity. There are some sharks out there that prey on young designers to achieve their goals.

If you were not doing this what would your ideal job be?

I would be a chiropractor. It's very different from what I am doing right now, but for some reason, it intrigues me.

Interesting facts about yourself?

I am very dyslexic. While this was an issue in high school, I rely on it now to do what I do. Dyslexic people are highly visual. My 'seeing' is as easy as breathing; the challenge is to reverse engineer what one sees into a distilled combination of practical and memorable space.

What do you do for fun?

I love spending time with my family. Our weekends are generally spent caring for our horses, hanging out with friends, and going on family outings. At 43, it's the simple things that mean the most

Do you take holidays and if so, is there a favorite destination or activity?

We have a favorite holiday destination that is relatively close to home. It's staying on the beach at Tugun. As a family, we generally head down there for a few weeks in the year. In the last few years, the council has constructed a concrete pathway from Tugun to Coolangatta. I love to ride my electric skateboard along it with the kids when we get the opportunity.

To do what one loves in life is something worth pursuing. I believe strongly that we all have something to offer. 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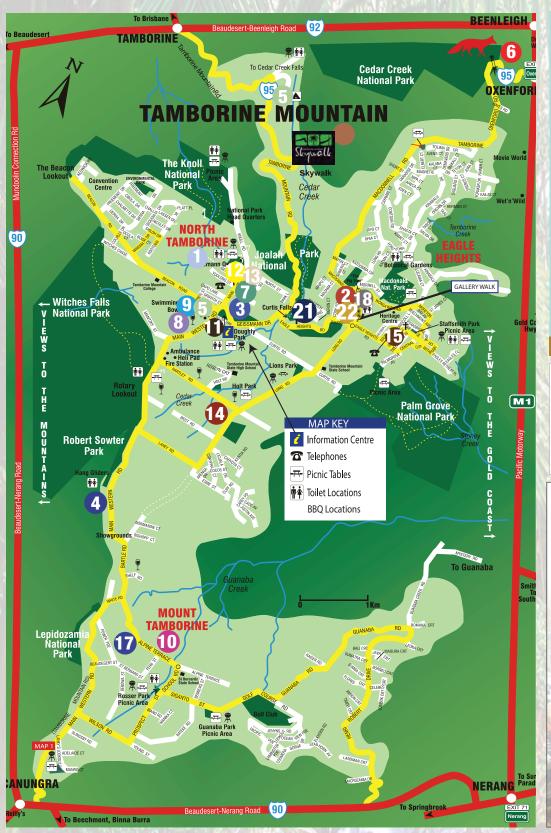
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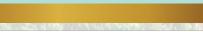
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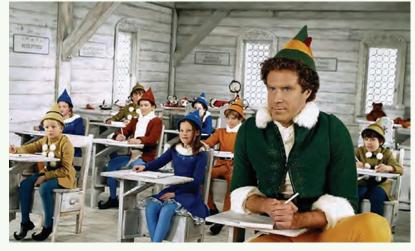

ARGENTINIAN SALMON SKEWERS

With spring on our doorstep why not fire up the barbecue and get some of these super easy, healthy and delicious Argentinian inspired salmon skewers on the go. They present very well and are a wonderful way to get some fish into your diet. You can easily have these made in under 30 minutes, even including the time taken for marination. It's important to marinate these as salmon can dry out quite quickly on the barbeque so don't skip this step and you will have juicy tender mouthfuls of delight.

We never had a gas barbecue growing up. My father would place a set of bricks on the ground five long and four high. They were the old school type of brick, not like the ones today filled with holes. My Dad would salvage them from old demolition jobs as he was a plumber. We had to unload them from the van one by one and then set about scraping the mortar off for him. Once the bricks were down, we would all grab a corner of a tremendously heavy steel plate. There we were straining our backs like at some Siberian labour camp.

Dad would say, "A little to the left, boys. No! your other left! That's it, a little more ... OK hold it there." Dad would give the bricks one last look and say, "OK, let it down gently boys." He would then proceed to give it the wobble test; if it stood, we would all cheer and begin to get the fire ready, but if it collapsed, which it often did, a collective groan would fill the air and we'd all start blaming each other as to whose fault it was and then proceed to start all over again, much to Dad's dismay.

Ever since our ancestors discovered how to master the flame, they instantly enriched their diet with a variety of new and nutrient-dense food. Meat. As one of the earliest recipes for preparing meat was roasting it over coals, people later discovered that the easiest way to accomplish that was to skewer pieces of meat in a line to cook evenly. The invention of cooking food on sticks, swords and skewers over open fires formed the beginning of life for this popular eating style. The success in the style of cookery enabled it to remain one of the most popular utensils for cooking over an open fire and has been used regularly by nearly all the major civilisations and nations throughout history.

Did you know? That there is evidence of the prehistoric use of multi-

purpose wooden tools as far back as the Lower Paleolithic found at a 300,000-year-old site in Schöningen, Germany. They are confidently attributed to an early Neanderthal population who used sticks as part of their toolkit and the site contributes even to the present debate on when humans first controlled fire. Excavations of the Minoan settlement of Akrotiri on Santorini unearthed stone shaped blocks ('fire dogs') or fire andirons which archaeologists believe were used to mainly cook

meat way before the 17th century BCE. Indeed, the skewered meat recipe 'obeliskos' existed as a favourite in Greece during Archaic times and later during the Byzantine era; the selling of souvlaki demonstrates the new meat-cooking methods that had evolved in Greece over time.

One of the most well-known skewered foods around the world is the shish kebab. The earliest literary evidence for the Turkish word Şiş ('shish') as a food utensil comes from the 11th Century Diwan Lughat al-Turk, attributed to Mahmud of Kashgar. The story is often told of Medieval Middle Eastern soldiers, usually Turkish or Persian, depending on the storyteller who cooked meat skewered on their swords. Today, shish kebabs have expanded into most cultures in some form or another. In several Asian countries, there's satay or sate, which is roasted skewered meat, usually chicken served with a dipping sauce that's often made from peanuts. In France, shish kebabs are called 'brochettes', meaning on a small spit or skewers.

While our ancestors and different cultures have chosen different ways to use fire to skewer meat, I've used my Gaucho marinade to bring an Argentinian flair to this dish.

INGREDIENTS

- 700g Tasmanian salmon fillet, cut into cubes about 3cm
- 1 green capsicum, cut into 2cm squares
- 1 red capsicum cut into 2cm squares
- 1 yellow capsicum cut into 2cm squares



1 small red onion, cut into 1/8th wedges

FOR MARINADE

- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 1 lemon, zested and juiced
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 tbs Gaucho*

METHOD

- In a small bowl, mix the olive oil, lemon juice and zest, garlic, and Gaucho marinade.
- Place salmon pieces, capsicum and red onion in a large mixing bowl and toss briefly.
- 3. Pour the marinade over the salmon and toss again to make sure the salmon is well coated with the marinade. Let the fish marinate for about 15 to 20 minutes.
- 4. Assemble skewers beginning with salmon; thread salmon, different coloured capsicum and onions onto skewers (if using wooden skewers, be sure to have soaked them in water for 30 minutes before using.)
- 5. Heat the barbecue on high then turn down to medium heat.
- Arrange salmon skewers on top and cover the grill. Grill salmon skewers for 3 to 4 minutes, lid down to get the smoke circulating. Turn skewers over and cook for another 3 to 4 minutes depending on how you like your salmon cooked.
- Serve with a simple side salad and roasted potatoes and a nice glass of SSB or Sauvignon Blanc.

FIVE VARIETIES PERFECT FOR SPRING SIPPING

Read on for our guide on what to drink as the days get warmer and news regarding the return of Sunset Sips.

The first few weeks of spring bring subtle changes to our everyday lives. You find yourself rationing the last of the firewood to see you through lingering chilly nights. That old woolly jumper of



yours is peeled off and thrown on again several times a day. At dawn, we're freezing. By midday, we're sweltering.

The days are slowly but surely growing longer, and everyone seems to have a little more pep compared with this time last month. The changing of the seasons is most evident in our backyards. Everything is green and teeming - a new set of blossoms bursting forth each day; birds and insects humming away with more than usual gusto. To celebrate the start of spring in all its glory, we've rustled up a list of five wines to suit the season.

A glass or two of *Rosé* is practically mandatory come springtime. This warm-weather classic is perfect for picnics and soirées alike. The colour alone - reminiscent of peach blossoms and fresh strawberries - never fails to make me smile. However, the best thing about rosé is that a multitude of different styles exist - something to suit every taste. If you like your wine with a touch of sweetness, perhaps try a *Zinfandel Rosé*. If you prefer a dry style, opt for a *Provincial Rosé*. These are typically made from a blend of *Grenache*, *Syrah*, and *Cinsault*. Pair either style with charcuterie, seasonal fruit, light pasta salads and fresh cheeses like mozzarella and burrata.

The flavours of *Gewürztraminer* exude the essence of spring. This variety is famous for its perfume that brings to mind rose petals and citrus blossom. While some *Gewurztraminer* ages well, I prefer a more youthful style that boasts a bright, zesty acidity. With notes of lychee, tangerine, apricot, and grapefruit, this scrumptious, easy-drinking variety is a winner for the warmer months. Pairs beautifully with Middle Eastern or Moroccan cuisine.

What about reds? I find light bodied reds, such as *Pinot Noir* or *Garnacha* perfect for middling seasons. These styles often share a lush fruitiness with earthy or spicy notes. Combined with softer tannins, these varieties are great for when you're craving a red, but don't want anything overbearing.

Last - but definitely not least - why not shake things up with a sparkling red? There's nothing better than *Lambrusco* for spring and summer. Brimming with delightful notes of strawberry, rhubarb, and plums, this bubbly, vivacious Italian red is best served chilled. Pair with good company and wood-fired pizza for optimal results.

In other exciting news, what better way to relish the longer days than with *un apéritif* on a Friday night? Witches Falls' inaugural Sunset Sips will take place on 3 September. This Friday and each thereafter, our doors will be open until 7pm for you to graze and sip at your leisure. Can't wait to see you there!

The Bull Arab Dog

Their appearance varies because this Australian bred dog derives from a mix of three to five different breeds. A hybrid bred dog with supposedly 50 per cent English bulldog, 25 per cent greyhound and 25 per cent short haired pointer.

Bred by an Australian breeder, Mike Hodgens, who started the breed in 1972, they were developed to hunt wild boar, by having a high



prey and hunting drive, and being able to scent and locate wild pigs up to four to six kilometres away. When they seize, they take the pig to the ground and hold it down by its ear.

In more recent years the Bull Arab has been bred with larger breeds like the Mastiff and Great Dane, which increases their strength and guard dog qualities. This breed is not recognised by major kennel clubs. However, they are generally calm, very smart and trainable; they are known for their love of people. There is little hard data to support some claims of aggression, problems caused by people who own such dogs and do not train, socialise or desex their dogs.

The RSPCA recommends not having this breed as a first dog because they need a firm, experienced owner who will continue to train and regularly exercise and socialise the animal. Keep in mind this breed may be prone to chase and attack smaller animals, similar to the greyhound dog; it is a part of the genetic make-up.

According to the RSPCA the three most common dog breeds surrendered are the "bully" breeds: English Staffordshire Bull Terrier cross, American Bull terrier cross, and Bull Arab cross.

The most common reason these dogs are surrendered is because of unwanted litters. Many people mistakenly believe a dog's performance is altered or decreased by desexing, but if anything, it could improve a dog's abilities because the dog is not distracted by the mating instinct and associated behaviour; a dog can smell a female in season seven to eight kilometres away.

Vicky Krenauer, one of the managers at St Bernard's Hotel, took some time with us to share her morning work routine, setting up the busy hotel and the morning routine with Molly, Syrah and Cooper.

St Bernards have a grand history – as does this hotel – but did you know they originally were bred as guard dogs, specifically to protect an 11th Century hospice, run by Saint Bernard and the monks? The world-famous pass was constructed by the Romans in 69AD, linking Italy to Switzerland. This mountainous passageway gained a dark reputation, known as the escape route for thieves and marauders, so these huge dogs were bred to protect the local hospice. Before long, the monks realised the large, strong frames, thick coats, keen noses and loyal temperaments made them an asset to any rescue crew. So for countless travellers stranded by a snowstorm on 'The Pass', the sight of these gentle giants meant they had been saved.

During the early 19th century, England and Germany began to import the breed. It wasn't until 1880 that the breed officially gained recognition as the 'Saint Bernard'. Other names include Alpine Mastiffs, Hospice Dogs, Barryhunds, and Alpendogs.

They are a social dog breed, great for families, and known as the 'gentle giants' – and these three are no exception. They are calm, patient, and loyal, but as puppies, will whiz around like a giant furry pinball, as Cooper does. They mellow as adults, with a calm and relaxed demeanour, like Molly and Syrah. Vicky also shared that Cooper is currently quite shy, and this change is typical of the breed as they grow.

All three have very different personalities. Molly (who is 10) loves sitting at the entrance of the hotel and relaxing. Syrah (or Princess, as she's commonly known), is five, loves sitting on Anita's lap, and is not your usual lap dog, weighing in at around 90kg. The 19 monthold Cooper however, is more adventurous. "He is quite a rascal. We love him" said Vicky. "He recently had an adventure where he got onto the wrong side of the cliff fence, and had to be rescued."

Syrah and Molly eat two standard cups of Kibble a day, and Cooper eats five, as he's still a puppy. They all enjoy the occasional pig's ear treat. They can't have bones, as their large mouths allow them to swallow bones whole. All three can be seen lying in their foyer enclosure, havng small garden strolls and toilet breaks during trade hours, or on their morning walks in the area. Much loved and well kept, these beauties have also had heated flooring installed for them by Sam from 5 Star Electrical.



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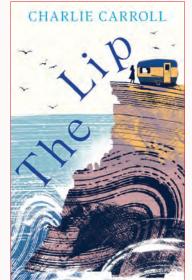

Our Book Choice: The Lip by Charlie Carroll

However, when a stranger enters her life, she is forced to confront not only him but the terrible tragedies of her past.

The Lip is a novel about childhood, isolation and mental health, told in the unique and unforgettable voice of Melody Janie.

'All of this is Bones Break. All of this is mine.

I know every inch of it; I know it as intimately as the seagulls. I stand at dead-centre, my feet teetering on the edge of the lip. Below, the thundering tattoo of waves on rock. Wind catches the tips of my hair, lifting them above my ribs: less force than it takes to knock me down; enough to make me right myself with a step to the left, and then another back again. Here on the lip, it is vital to know where my feet are.
