



# RE-THINKING 'CHURCH' ON TAMBORINE



In the wake of significant social upheaval and the waning of Christian influence in western societies, the Christian community is long overdue to do some heart-searching on the meaning and expression of the local church gathering in 21st century.

To guide this investigation, local Bible teacher Ray Barnett, who has spent 30 years teaching and equipping church leaders in nations where the Gospel is forbidden and believers are persecuted, will open up the scriptures and help us discover how in a more hostile environment the first Christian communities thrived and became a movement that re-shaped their world.

# QUEENSLAND PATIENTS SICK OF BEING LIED TO

The LNP is demanding the QLD Government be upfront with Queenslanders about what is really being delivered in the months and years ahead to heal the Queensland Health Crisis. The budget has revealed Labor's hospitals plan is severely underfunded. Budget analysis shows that Labor hasn't been upfront with Queenslanders. When it comes to new hospitals, less than 1% of Labor's State funding will be spent in the first 12 months for new hospitals, and nearly half of the newly announced health funding for hospitals is completely missing from the Budget.

Glossy brochures and hollow promises won't heal the health crisis. Queenslanders want real solutions, not hollow headlines. After breaking the health system for the past seven years, Labor wants another seven years to fix the Queensland Health Crisis. That is why the LNP has put solutions on the table, including more resources, better triaging, sharing data in real time and above all, put local doctors and nurses back in charge. Once again, we see big talk and promises from the Labor Government – the price tag of promised assets is \$10 billion – but only 40% of that is actually budgeted for in the budget. It reminds me of promises made in past elections where Queenslanders were asked to vote for the Government based on promises of new hospitals that would only start after the next election after the one people were voting in! There is a huge black hole in the State's hospitals promise and Queenslanders deserve to know the truth.

Earlier this week it was revelated that this Labor Government had forced local Health and Hospital Services – Gold Coast HHS for the Mountain, Metro South HHS for Beaudesert district – to hand back over \$1 billion in funding to central government coffers over past years. These are the funds that get you your emergency doctor and nurse, or your knee surgery, endoscopy, or colonoscopy. These funds were CUT by the Government, taken back to Brisbane and spent elsewhere. A record health budget might come every year – but where is that funding actually going? When we find out that local health districts are having their funds clawed back by a Labor Government and bureaucrats in Brisbane, we know things are not going right. Doctors, nurses, paramedics and allied health professionals deserve more respect and resources from the State. Most of all, we all deserve better from our QLD Government.

### MGA: FROM "SPEED-DATING" DESIGNS TO A MASTERPLAN



COMMUNITY INPUT INTO A REGENERATIVE PRECINCT AND LIVING LAB FOR THE MOUNTAIN

At a recent community consultation, Griffith University Architecture students offered interested locals a set of options for the Making Good Alliance site on Knoll Rd, North Tamborine. In a form of "speed-dating", groups moved from one proposed design to another. This process stimulated participants' imaginations as they shared their ideas for the precinct.

These contributions will ensure the site is a vibrant hub for learning about how we can be more resilient as a community and take action to protect and enhance our natural and social environments.

Given this feedback, the students are returning on 9th July to share with community members the principles that emerged from the consultation. These will guide the design of the masterplan. They will also invite further input into two masterplan ideas that were voted the most popular by the participants.

These proposals offer different but equally innovative plans. One is the "Journey". Weaving through the existing trees, a path leads people on a journey, along which they can pause to explore the exhibits (whether community groups, inventions, artworks, exhibits, structures or technology) and make connections among these. The path leads to the climate café, a point where visitors can connect with others, share their experiences and reflect on the ideas and actions presented along the path.

The other proposal is "Treetops". This concentrates the activities into a central hub based on the existing building. The various components (including community group displays, artworks, exhibits, technological innovations and the like) are to be housed together, which encourages engagement and exchange of ideas and actions.

This second consultation will enable community members to provide more focused, valuable input into the final, detailed design of the hub.

### **CAN WE CLEAR THIS UP NOW?**



I write in connection with the large scale clearing of vegetation at 49 -57 Wilson Road, Tamborine Mountain. Too often we see land cleared on this plateau without regard to wildlife or existing ecosystems. I cite the shameful and indiscriminate clearing of koala habitat trees at Eagles Retreat Place not that long ago. The photograph above shows the extent of the clearing at Wilson Road, and I ask the following questions:

- 1. Was the land clearing approved by Council, and if so on what date (in the past there have been unacceptable retrospective Council approvals for various activities that the Mountain community considers adverse to the local amenity and ambience). If approval was given prior to the clearing, in what form did it take and what was the extent and scope of the approval?
- 2. Was there an assessment made by Council as to what was on site prior to the clearing and what effect such clearing would have on the wildlife and existing ecosystems, as well as what effect it would have on neighbouring properties? Was any assessment made with regard to the potential erosion such clearing could cause? Was pollution, by way of run-off, of existing water courses, however small, ever considered?
- 3. During the clearing of the land, was there any Council-appointed or any privately engaged qualified wildlife assessor(s) on site to determine effect on, and numbers of, animals, birds or reptiles being displaced? And if not, why not, if indeed Council approval had been given?
- 4. In the event that the clearing was not Council-approved, what steps are being taken, or are planned, to remonstrate with those responsible for the clearing and what consequences do they face? Too often in the past those who have not fulfilled their obligations to Council and the community by way of unauthorised development and/or construction and/or flora degradation have faced no consequences of any significance. No precedents of deterrence have been set, which has led to an "open slather" message to all interested persons and/or organisations.

### SVALBARD – AN EXTREME DESTINATION

Why does it seem to be so very cold in the Arctic? Those who venture south to the Antarctic move within latitudes of 50 and 60 degrees South - quite balmy really. Up here, the Arctic Circle resides at latitude 66 degrees North, and I am much further north than that. When I flew from Oslo to Longyearbyen on Svalbard, I was already at 78° N. The expedition cruise circumnavigated Svalbard, a land endowed with hundreds of fjords and glaciers, dramatic in every sense of the word. When we passed across the northernmost part of this land, the ship made a special detour cruising directly north to reach the edge of the polar ice. During winter, the ice meets Svalbard. As we turned the vessel into the pack ice, we were at 81° 23' 11" within the last ten degrees.

My senior Maths students studying Earth Geometry will now have the skills to work out just how far I was from the North Pole! Have a go.

The Bird Group will be curious about the birdlife. There are only 27 resident species on this vast archipelago. Those that I have personally sighted are: Arctic Skua, Pink-footed Goose, Barnacle Goose, Eider Duck, King Eider Duck, Arctic Tern (the world's longest traveller), Black Guillemot, Brunnich's Guillemot (the closest thing to penguins when gathered on ice!), Glaucous Gull, Black-legged Kittiwake, Northern Fulmar, Ivory Gull, Grey/Red Phalarope, Purple Sandpiper (no purple on it at all) and the Snow Bunting (the only song bird). The Puffin and Little Auk were elusive.

And what about the wildlife? I am sure you are curious. On the second day, during a zodiac cruise through brash ice in a sheltered fjord, we sighted Minke whales and came close to a large, bearded seal content on his ice shelf. Day three gave us mamma bear and two cubs on the snowy slopes. Day four, during our venture into the polar pack ice, the crew suddenly shouted, 'polar bear at 11 o'clock". She was extremely curious and romped across the slippery surface to investigate us, nose sniffing the air. A brilliant photo opportunity. We left her there and backed out moving several kilometres south to start the polar plunge from the side of the vessel. About two-thirds of the way through, someone yelled "polar bear in the water!" Maintaining her curiosity, she had chased the ship and was alongside us. Polar plunging ceased immediately! Despite their size, they can swim



extremely fast. As you can imagine, there was a fair share of adrenalin rushing through the veins of the expedition team members.

Only recently has the channel between Spitzbergen and Nordaustlandet thawed and become navigable. Here at Ardneset, we had our first viewing of walrus 'hauled out' on land. Our real walrus experience took place on the island of Kvitova in the far north-east. Known as White Island, 99% covered by ice, this is very remote and not generally on expedition ships' agenda due to difficult access. Here we witnessed scores of walruses on 'bergy bits' (the name for miniature icebergs) and in the water, many with young. At our second call on Kvitoya, we found daddy bear roaming along a promontory adjacent to a walrus creche. The bulls were protective and kept popping up next to the zodiacs to keep us at bay. They have been known to puncture the inflatable craft with their tusks.

Guides always carried a firearm when we managed to land and walk across the tundra strewn with tiny flowers. One day, the plan was to visit a colony of nesting kittiwakes on shore. That came to nought when our team went ahead on a recce only to find mamma bear and cub coming over the rise. Instead, we took to the zodiacs, cruising close to land, and were rewarded with sightings of the Svalbard reindeer and an Arctic fox, albeit a fleeting glimpse.

On our last day, we were lucky to manage two landings, the second at Bourbonhamna where you can find a hut called Bamsebu (home of the bear). As if to bring our ten-day expedition to a brilliant finale, a pod of 50 beluga whales suddenly appeared in the bay before us.

### **GENDER EQUITY IN COUNCIL**

I feel this is too important a matter to not "call out", given the theme of International Women's Day 2022 - *Break the Bias* and similar themes in past years.

As community leaders, we as councillors – and in fact all community leaders – need to be exhibiting equality in all that we do. I found it particularly disappointing that 4 of my fellow councillors overruled such sentiments in a recent Council resolution to seek gender equity on the recruitment panel for the new CEO for Scenic Rim Regional Council. Gender balance on any recruitment panel has been a very well documented and accepted philosophy in Australia that has been sadly overlooked in this situation.

#### COUNCIL BUDGET 2022- 2023

Council has held a series of budget discussions for a number of weeks now and, as with each year, the process is somewhat challenging with such a broad and varied network of towns and villages, our vast road network across the Scenic Rim and the increasing demands that a growing population places on the region.

#### REPORTING OF POTHOLES AND OTHER ROAD CONCERNS

Since the prolonged rain event, potholes are still emerging on many Council roads, as well as State-controlled roads which are the responsibility of the Department of Transport and Main Roads. To report issues relating to Council roads simply phone 5540 5111 or email to **maial@scenicrim.qld.gov.au** and include the road name and location. For State-controlled roads phone 5563 6600 or email **SouthCoast@tmr.qld.gov.au**.

Residents will be seeing increasing emergency recovery works throughout the region and this will be followed up with future works, as assessment and funding becomes available from the Queensland Reconstruction Authority. The damage points have exceeded 2,000 across our 11,756-kilometre road network. Thank goodness for the dry weather we have been experiencing, so crews can perform uninterrupted repair work.

### **BIODIVERSITY STRATEGY REPORT CARD 2015-2020**

Take a look on the Council website for the first report card, which highlights numerous successes and projects that have contributed toward enhancement and protection of the region's spectacular environment. I would like to sincerely thank our Landcare groups and other environmentally focussed community groups who work tirelessly in a volunteer role to contribute to the biodiversity of our region.

# PHYSIQUE 5

### **KOKODA CHALLENGE CARNAGE!**

Why on earth would people
VOLUNTARILY submit themselves to
roughly 30 hours of walking, over
4000m elevation of fire trails, bushy
paths and rocky slopes of the Gold
Coast hinterland? Why would people
sign up to receive blisters, aches and

fatigue-induced delirium? If someone came to you and offered you the above, you would politely decline, wouldn't you? You certainly wouldn't offer to pay money to experience it. Would you?

I did. Three times.

The first time I did the challenge I was 15, and was fairly naïve about what I was getting myself into. I completed the 48km version, which was a little gentler but still difficult. If I'd have known then what I know now about preparation, completing the event itself and what to do afterwards, I would've been so much better off it's not funny.

So, I thought I would share my top tips for those competing in the Challenge this year.

- Avoid blisters at all costs. These nasty little suckers are horrible, and can be the difference between finishing and pulling out. Seriously. They are that bad. The correct shoe size, sock type, pressure area management and appropriate training are all absolutely key to being successful here. (My advice is to get "Injinji" socks – they are the weird socks with toes in them.)
- 2. Wear light shoes. It's a little late in the game to be changing your shoes, however if you are trying to decide between a couple of pairs that you've trained in the decision is easy. Go for the lightest and most comfortable pair.
- 3. Prevent injuries! One of the most common injuries sustained in the challenge is a sprained ankle. It's not hard to do, particularly if you already have 50-60km under your belt and you are starting to get a bit tired. The best way to prevent this is with some minimalist yet supportive ankle strapping. Every NRL and AFL player has their ankles strapped before each training session and game to stop them from spraining their ankle. Treat yourself like an athlete and ensure you avoid these nasty injuries.
  - 4. Make sure you've trained appropriately. This seems like a no-brainer (and it is) but it is the most crucial step in the process. By the time this article is published I would recommend no more BIG training walks before the event, as you will just tire

yourself out. Small walks from here on in only. If you haven't trained yet, then I'm afraid there's not much I can do for you now!

5. Look after yourself afterwards.
Recovery is very important, and is the difference between hurting for 2 days or for 2 weeks. Rehydrating is very important (the average guidelines suggest 1.5L for every 1kg of sweat). Eight hours of sleep is non-negotiable. Book into Physique for your recovery session so we can get you on your way to feeling human again.

We at Physique are running a special Kokoda Challenge clinic where we will be running through all of the above (*plus more*) to help you get through the walk unscathed. For those who have been in for an injury prevention session prior to the Challenge, we are also running a complimentary strapping session the evening before the challenge, so you can be strapped like an elite athlete.

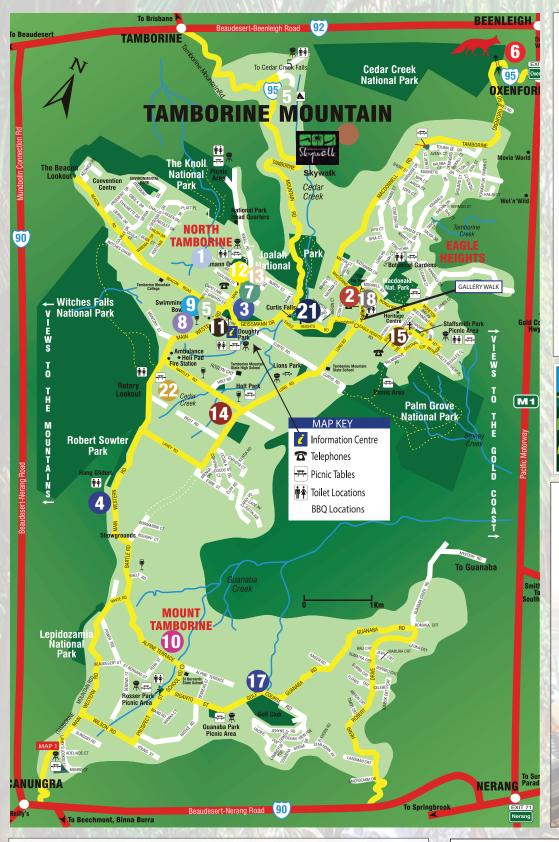

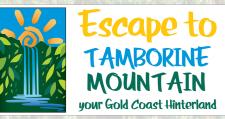

### **COUNCIL ENDORSES SMART TECHNOLOGIES STRATEGY**

At last week's Ordinary meeting, Council endorsed a landmark strategy for investment in smart technologies and commitment to smart collaboration, planning, design and local services, while aligning with the values of the region, to deliver a vibrant and prosperous economy and community.

The first of its kind, the Scenic Rim Smart Region Strategy 2022-2032 will leverage new technologies, innovation and data to enhance the liveability, workability and sustainability of the region.

Mayor Greg Christensen said the strategy was developed following consultation with local residents and business operators to create a shared vision for the region's use of new technologies and data and to allow local businesses and communities to embrace and adapt to changing global digital trends.

"Developing the Smart Region Strategy is part of Council's commitment to long-term sustainability for the region and is outlined in Council's 2020-2021 Operational Plan. It is also an action within the Scenic Rim Regional Prosperity Strategy 2020-2025," he said.

"Tangible outcomes like access to reliable, high-speed internet and mobile reception will allow businesses, Council and the community to take full advantage of new and emerging technologies, enhancing the region's ability to provide rewarding and well-paying jobs, drive business investment and attract future residents and tourists."

Council recently met with NBN's Community Engagement Manager for Southern Queensland, Grant Higgs, to discuss the NBN technologies available to the Scenic Rim region, current improvements to the network and opportunities for Council to partner with NBN to address future needs, identify growth areas, including economic growth of the region.

The strategy positions the region to take advantage of the once in a generation opportunity created by the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games and the South-East Queensland City Deal, and subsequent investment by the Australian and Queensland Governments.

Mayor Christensen said the strategy builds on the region's existing strengths and aims to promote the adoption of technology and innovation to drive economic growth, without changing the structure and charm of the region and Council will continue to lobby providers to advocate for better connectivity for the region.

"Over the life of the strategy, local businesses will be supported through the proposed access to smart coworking spaces, proactive support of innovation, and training in



the skills needed for success in the digital world, such as ecommerce, digital marketing and data analytics.

"The adoption of new technology such as remote sensors, smart digital signage and automated IT systems will improve the efficiency of Council services and enhance the interface between Council and the community.

"It is envisaged that this will allow for increased access to data and information including real-time traffic, facility use, weather, and flood data and will continue to strengthen regional planning and investment decisions and enable more sustainable management of the built and natural environment.

"Residents and visitors will also benefit from the potential to introduce free Wi-Fi across the region's towns and villages, smart digital signage and digitally interactive public art that will promote more connected communities."

The Smart Region Strategy 2022-2032 supports Council's broader vision for the Scenic Rim to be a network of unique rural communities embedded in a productive and sustainable landscape, as outlined in the Scenic Rim Community Plan 2011-2026.

"The Smart Region Strategy is a shared vision for the region's use of technology and to support the region's continued transition to a more prosperous, connected, liveable, sustainable, and innovative place, providing a lasting legacy for generations to come," Mayor Christensen said.

"We are grateful to the Australian Government for its funding through the Building Better Regions Fund, that has enabled us to develop this Smart Region Strategy for the Scenic Rim."

### **IS YOUR LIFE WORTH \$30 ASKS ENERGEX?**

New single electric blankets and heaters can be purchased for as little as \$30, so is using a damaged one worth risking a life for?

According to Energex, each year many electric shocks and fires that could be easily avoided are caused by faulty electrical heating equipment.

Energex's Safety Manager Mick Bobin said for most of the year heating appliances are stored out of sight in sheds, ceiling spaces and in cupboards, but it is here they can suffer damage, becoming a serious safety risk.

"Before plugging in heaters or electric blankets this winter it's crucial people check for signs of damage such as frayed cords, exposed wires, damaged plugs and any other obvious dangers.

"If the appliance does have signs of damage you're best either having it repaired by a qualified technician or simply throwing it away, because it's not worth risking the life of a loved one by using something that can cost as little as \$30 to replace."

Mr Bobin said house fires caused by electrical heating equipment can also occur unless preventions are in place.

"Heaters and electric blankets should always be switched off before you leave the room or go to sleep, and children should never be left unsupervised with these appliances running," Mr Bobin said.

"Never place heaters near combustible items such as curtains, furniture or clothes as they may catch fire, and never use heaters in wet areas such as bathrooms or where they can be knocked over by people or pets.

"Once winter is over heaters and electric blankets should be stored safely away in a dry area and where they cannot be damaged by sharp objects or rodents."

### FUNDING FOR ARTS GRANTS WILL ENRICH SCENIC RIM COMMUNITIES

A performance and a workshop that will produce landmark works of art, and a project to help preserve the region's rich heritage, have been awarded a total of \$32,135 in grants from the Scenic Rim Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF).

Funding for the three diverse projects was endorsed at last week's Ordinary Meeting on the recommendation of the Scenic Rim Arts Reference Group, which is chaired by Councillor Michael Enright.

"Five applications for funding in the second round of grants for 2021-2022 were considered by the Scenic Rim Arts Reference Group and assessed against criteria based on RADF guidelines and priorities identified in Council's Arts and Cultural Policy and Corporate Plan Scenic Rim 2026," he said.

"The RADF grants represent an excellent return on investment for the community, with funding of \$32,135\* set to deliver projects with a total value of almost \$127.000."

Grants have been awarded to: Goat Track Theatre Company for a theatre in the round experience on Tamborine Mountain; the 4275 Collective for a workshop to inspire local 'creatives' to produce murals in the Canungra township and the Canungra and District Historical Association for a digital cataloguing workshop to help preserve its collection.

Councillor Enright said the grants will support organisations which enrich the cultural life of Scenic Rim communities and celebrate the region's heritage and its identity.

"Goat Track Theatre Company's grant will help to mount a production of the Life of Galileo, casting actors in the older youth category of 16 to 26 as they are often left out of projects that tend to favour high school teens and children," he said.

"Funding for the 4275 Collective's Wallflower Project, which provides for a two-day workshop, aims to inspire local artists to create a mural on a Canungra building."

"Training in the MOSAiC collections management system by members of the Canungra and District Historical Society will benefit local historians working across our regional museums to preserve our region's heritage for future generations."

### CAN YOU SOLVE IT? ARE YOU SMART ENOUGH TO WORK FOR ELON MUSK?

The favourite interview question of the world's richest man...

In the early years of rocket company SpaceX, CEO Elon Musk liked to set job applicants the following problem:

You're standing on the surface of the Earth. You walk one mile south, one mile west and one mile north. You end up exactly where you started. Where are you?

The most common response was the North Pole, which is a correct answer. Indeed, the question is an old chestnut. (The earliest known reference to a version of this puzzle is 1821.)

According to Musk's biographer Ashlee Vance, however, Musk would then ask: "Where else could it be?"

### That is today's first puzzle: where else could it be?

The shape of the Earth (and Mars, for what it's worth) leads to many other excellent puzzles. Here are three of them:

#### 1. One direction

You are standing on the surface of the Earth. You head north and travel for ten kilometres in a straight line. After a quick stop, you again head north and travel another ten kilometres in a straight line. You end up exactly where you started. Where are you?

### 2. Squaring the circle

You are standing on the surface of the Earth. You walk ten kilometres north, ten kilometres west, ten kilometres south and then ten kilometres east. You end up exactly where you started. Where are you?

(Note: this is not a trick question. Since the Earth is



spherical, almost all starting points will not get you back to where you started.)

If you think you have an answer, I will Elon Musk it right back at ya: Where else could it be?

#### 3. Brain Fogg

In the Jules Verne story Around the World in Eighty Days, Phileas Fogg leaves London on October 2, 1872. He travels via Egypt, India, Japan, the US and his final leg is across the Atlantic. As the book's title indicates, the trip takes him 80 days. What day did he arrive back in London?

(Note: the eightieth day after October 2 is December 21.)

Clarification for pedantic astronomers, geographers and physicists: assume the Earth is a perfect sphere.



### **PULLED BEEF CHILLI CON CARNE**

This is one of those magical recipes that takes only ten minutes to prepare and then you let the slow cooker do all the work. I've used my Creole blend as it perfectly adds richness and complexity to this dish and delivers a medium kick, a warm hum on the pallet but not too much so as the pallet is destroyed by heat. You can very much taste the delicious flavours all this long cooking process affords.

This is a wonderful way to mix up a family favourite and the pulled beef instead of mince takes it to a whole new level and it's super easy. You could get this going before breakfast and by the time you get home from work, you will have an elegant hearty winter delight. If you are not keen on chilli just add one tablespoon of Creole instead of three and this will also work if you want to tame it down for the kids.

Did you know? Chilli con carne was once called Soup of the Devil? As usual a shroud of mystery surrounds the origins of chilli con carne. Southwestern American lore dates the origin to the 16th century religious trances of the mystic Lady in Blue, Sister María de Ágreda. Strange, because Sister Maria never left her home country of Spain, yet she professed to evangelise the savages of the New World by presenting herself before them in hypnotic visions. History cannot explain why in 1629, 50 Jumano Indians walked out of the desert of unsettled West Texas and headed to the local church to be baptised.

They told stories of an ethereal blueclad woman who had taught them of God. According to Indian legend, the Lady in Blue also taught them of a fiery red stew, which over the next century came to be known as chilli con carne. Spanish priests took a more hostile view of this peculiarly potent stew, declaring that it was the 'soup of the devil' and would often preach sermons against its indulgence. Restrictions only fuelled the fire, and by the 19th century chilli con carne was a staple among cowboys, ruffians and adventurers on the western frontier.

Bricks of dried beef, fat, spices and dried capsicums and chillies were saddle-bagged for the trail and masterfully reconstituted over the campfire. When outlaws wound up behind bars, the prisons started serving chili con carne as well. It just so happened to be the cheapest slop around.

By the 19th century the Texans had all but claimed the dish as their own. Calling it Texas Red or just Chilli. Texas Red is a potent, pungent concoction that touts a no-frills approach to chilli: just meat, spices and as many chiles as you can stand. To Texans, anything else isn't even called chili and if they see any kidney beans in there they will laugh and call it an abomination.

Luckily, we are not in Texas. I personally like to taste what I'm eating and use heat as a light hum to enhance the flavour of my food and I also like the flavour of kidney beans, so I put them in. Once you make this recipe and see how easy it is to prepare and the massive flavour hit you get from simply whacking it in the slow cooker you will be amazed, and this will become a regular dish.


This meal freezes incredibly well and can last for six months in the freezer and will last two weeks in the fridge, but I can assure you it will be devoured way before then.

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 large onion sliced
- 2kg well-marbled chuck steak cut into 4 equal pieces
- 2 cloves garlic finely chopped
- 3 tbs CREOLE
- 2x400g tin chopped tomatoes
- 1 large red capsicum chopped into 2cm cubes
- 400g tin kidney beans
- 250ml beef stock
- 250ml beef stock
- 3 tbsp corn flour + 65ml water = slurry
- 3 cups cooked rice and/or corn chips
- Avocado, sour cream, grated cheese and fresh coriander to garnish

#### **METHOD**

 Heat the oil in a heavy based skillet over medium/high heat. Brown beef well all over - about two and a half



minutes on each side, then reserve onto a plate.

- In the same skillet add a touch more oil if needed.
- Add the garlic, onion and capsicum and fry until well cooked, around 2 to 3 minutes add the Creole mix and tomato paste and cook out for 2 minutes, stirring constantly
- Deglaze the skillet by adding 250ml beef broth; bring to simmer, scraping the bottom of the skillet with a spoon to dissolve brown bits into the liquid. Simmer for 30 seconds, then scrape it all into the slow cooker.

### **SET AND FORGET**

- Add in the slow cooker, the beans, chopped tomato, the other 250ml of beef broth and stir; then add beef - it won't be fully submerged, but beef juices will raise liquid level.
- Cook on low for 8 hours.
- Carefully remove beef from slow cooker and shred with two forks.
- Add slurry to slow cooker and stir in.
- Add shredded beef, stir and cook on low for 20 minutes.
- Serve with garnish and a nice glass of Malbec.


