# TAMBORINE MOUNTAIN STATE SCHOOL WINS QUEENSLAND P&C OF THE YEAR AWARD 2022

### STORY WALKS MARK THE BEGINNING OF A NEW CHAPTER FOR SCENIC RIM LIBRARIES

#### The installation of a series of colourful storyboards in parks at Boonah and Beaudesert has marked a new chapter for Scenic Rim libraries.

Proudly funded and supported by the Queensland Government and State Library of Queensland, the Story Walks at Springleigh Park, Boonah, and Jubilee Park, Beaudesert, aim to encourage children's early literacy through play while strengthening family connections and the Scenic Rim's links to its Indigenous heritage.

Mayor Greg Christensen said the Story Walks would provide another vibrant addition to Scenic Rim parks for residents and visitors to the region.

"The Story Walks are an innovative and delightful way for children and adults to enjoy reading and the outdoors at the same time," he said.

"Each Story Walk is a book and each storyboard a page so that, by following the path, the reader moves through the story at their own pace.

"This is a great way to encourage children's love of reading from an early age and for families to spend time outdoors together."


Beaudesert's 10-page Story Walk, nestled in garden beds, is based on the *Jarjum Gurema* children's story book, which was launched in September 2021 and was Highly Commended in the Community category of the 2022 Queensland Reconciliation Awards announced in June.

Created in partnership between Council and the Mununjali Housing Development Company, the publication was funded by the Queensland Government's **First 5 Forever** early literacy program.

"This beautifully illustrated book, based on local Yugambeh greetings and totem animals of the Mununjali area, has brought the wider community together through the sharing of stories, cultures and values and strengthened relationships between the Indigenous community and education providers," Cr Christensen said.

"Scenic Rim libraries have already distributed 1500 free copies of the book to families with children under five years of age and the Story Walk is another way of sharing *Jarjum Gurema* with the wider community."

The 14 storyboards which have been placed within the enclosed playground at Springleigh Park, Boonah, are from the pages of *Koalas Like To...*, one of 12 Stories for Little Queenslanders picture books published by the State Library





of Queensland.

Each page has a QR code that can be scanned through a smartphone so the story can be heard aloud.

The *Jarjum Gurema* storyboards are also linked by a QR code to video of the story being read by footballer Jamal Fogarty.

A Beaudesert local as well as a proud father and Mununjali man, he has championed the *Jarjum Gurema* project's aims of inspiring all parents to read, sing, dance and play with their children and encouraging pride in the culture, language and history of the Indigenous community.

"The Story Walks project highlights the changing role of our libraries and the use of technology in connecting with the community," Cr Christensen said.

"Like Jamal, I hope both Story Walks will inspire parents to read, sing, dance and play with their children and for everyone to take pride in the culture, language and history of our Indigenous community."

First 5 Forever is an initiative of the Queensland Government, coordinated by the State Library of Queensland and delivered in partnership with local government.

# HOWARD CREEK CROSSING WORKS UPDATE

I know that many locals are keen to see the completion of this crossing, particularly with summer approaching again. The latest update received from Main Roads informs us that "the team [contractor Allroads] is still working to complete the overall project by the end of 2022, weather and construction conditions permitting."

Further, the contractor aims to reduce the length of the road under traffic control in coming weeks, to minimise delays. I understand that these types of upgrades can cause delays, but the road should be in better condition and much more able to withstand rain events when it is all complete. I acknowledge the patience of all residents while this has been ongoing, and also the funding contribution (80% - \$8 million) obtained from the Federal Government through the past advocacy of the Member for Wright Scott Buchholz MP.

#### LACK OF PLANNING FOR OUR REGION

Last week I again raised in Parliament the huge impacts that residential growth in parts of Logan City and other parts of Scenic Rim can have on roads in and around Canungra. There's been an influx of new residents at Yarrabilba, Flagstone, Jimboomba and places around there in the last decade, and without a doubt this growth is seeing more traffic flowing through Beaudesert Nerang Road to/from the Gold Coast each day, not to mention when the M1 is closed and traffic is diverted. The State controlled and signed off on much of this new growth (in fact, all of Yarrabilba and Flagstone is state-controlled development), but the State has clearly failed to anticipate and plan for new road infrastructure in this area to deal with it. Cr Virginia West and I have argued with Main Roads for years in order to get them moving with work for new road infrastructure around Canungra to improve this. Main Roads simply refuses. They appear to be in denial about the scope of this problem, which will only grow as (a) parts of Scenic Rim grow (b) the Jimboomba area grows significantly - another 60,000 odd residents by 2041 according to the State and (c) there is further new housing in around Canungra. I have again called on the Minister and Main Roads to pull their heads out of the sand and get on with work to rectify this problem, starting with admitting there is a problem.

There is a planning problem here too though, and both Scenic Rim Council and the State should recognise this when it comes to any future changes to the Scenic Rim's planning scheme and put the



brakes on new development zones until road infrastructure is up to scratch.

#### **GETTING THE MESSAGE TO MAIN ROADS**

A reader asked recently about who is responsible for communicating road issues to Main Roads. We all can play a part, and by emailing southcoast@tmr.gld.gov.au any concerned person can make their voice known to the department. As your State MP, barely a day passes without me sending correspondence to this department about issues that need fixing. I also meet with Main Roads on a regular basis to push particular issues and make it clear to them the needs of this Electorate. Some issues (normally easier and minor matters) are dealt with immediately, others not. Unfortunately, the list of issues that need fixing is getting longer. While bad weather is often blamed for this, the fact is that this Government has allowed a near \$6 billion backlog on road repairs and maintenance to open up. That's a gigantic blackhole. It didn't just happen overnight either, but over a considerable time of neglect and underfunding. The Government - now, and any future government - must make it a priority to cut this backlog because not only are roads in a state of disarray bad for locals and their vehicles and bad for such a tourism-focussed area, but they are also dangerous. In this column, I often devote space to outlining road issues and that is because it is a vital issue - for the economy, for individual residents and for road safety overall. I will keep on beating this drum well into the future.



Last weekend's Beaudesert Show met with challenging weather, so organisers on Saturday opened the gates before lunchtime to encourage visitors. Congratulations to the Show Society, volunteers and community for putting on a great show over two days.

It disappoints to see how often the small, basic solutions elude our road maintenance decision makers.

The newly reopened Goat Track will, with warmer weather approaching, soon see hundreds of visiting motorcyclists each weekend gambling their safety on hairpin bends riddled with tar snakes and untreated, slippery white lines. A few buckets of sand or grit, sprinkled on, or mixed into the line markings can literally save lives. How about it, then?

# TRAVELLING PLACES with Gina



Today I went to see "Where the Crawdads Sing" - have you seen this film, set in the Carolinas on the East Coast of the USA? This tale was set in extraordinary country where the skies are blue and the coastal waters merge from marshlands to open ocean, a string of waterways and lakes behind the sand dunes, reminiscent perhaps of Storm Boy country in South Australia?

It took me back to trip to we enjoyed a few years ago. Flying into Charleston, South Carolina and driving south through Savannah, Georgia and on to Florida. An extraordinary part of the States, this is Southern Belle country, land of Gone with the Wind and the Civil War.

The cities themselves are delightful, a feel of yesteryear and oldfashioned values. Charleston's historical buildings and avenues are still intact and it's a joy to potter down these boulevards and imagine the residents sipping a mint julep on the porch. The broad verandas are closed to the street so that the elegant ladies of the house could sit in their crinolines in the hot, humid summer and draw up their dresses to cool their legs: how scandalous! Pop into the cathedral: you may be lucky and hear the choir practicing and raising their voices to the heavens.

The inner-city streets are still cobblestone, and you can ride in a horsedrawn carriage. Catch the ferry to Fort Sumter on an island in Charleston Bay to discover the Civil War history, visit the intriguing museum and don't forget to try 'shrimp and grits' in a local restaurant.

Head inland to Atlanta, the capital of Georgia; this sizeable modern city also reflects its history, both the Civil War history and the 1960's Civil Rights Movement. Don't miss the museum dedicated to Martin Luther King Junior. One time I was there and it was prom night - think of our year 12 formals. All the belles of the ball were out this night, all couples dressed in matching-colour outfits (yes, girls' dresses pink, boys' tuxedos pink; girls' dresses yellow, boys' tuxedos yellow). It would seem there were hundreds of couples parading around town mostly in open horsedrawn carriages. We are talking the 1990's, so not that long ago!

Head south to delightful Savannah - this charming city also reflects the history of days gone by. You can almost see the Civil War soldiers defending the township and the culture they fought so hard to protect. The beautiful parks come alive in spring and provide cooling shade in the hot, humid summers. You can feel the pace of life in these states is not so frenetic but rather calming.

Be sure to stop in the small towns off the highways and capture a sense of the real south. The weather is similar to Brisbane in this part of the world - so, not bitterly cold in winter, but warm and sticky in summer.

This is an area of the States not often visited by Australians, but I can happily recommend it as an authentic part of this diverse country to explore. There are several options - join a tour group to discover the area, drive yourselves around or take a cruise along the coastline, calling into these picturesque cities.

# **SPEAKERS' STORIES ENGAGE AND FASCINATE**



#### At their August monthly meeting at Vonda Youngman Community Centre, members of the Probus Club of Tamborine Mountain were privileged to listen to two high quality speakers.

Our Guest Speaker was retired District Judge, the Hon Brendan Butler SC, AM. Brendan, a Tamborine Mountain resident since 2018, retired as a judge of the District Court of Queensland in 2018, following a long career as a criminal lawyer. Admitted to the Bar in 1976, Brendan commenced duty as a prosecutor in the Queensland Solicitor General's Office before, in 1987, joining the Fitzgerald Inquiry as counsel assisting the Commission. In this role Brendan examined bookmakers, sex workers and police officers on oath to establish corrupt relationships between the vice trade and law enforcement in Queensland. Brendan was appointed Chair of the Criminal Justice Commission, forerunner of the present-day Crime and Corruption Commission, which he held for four years. He went on to be a Chief Magistrate for five years and later District Judge for a further five years, presiding in criminal proceedings including jury trials. Brendan was appointed Senior Counsel in 1994 and a Member of the Order of Australia in 2006. He regaled members with accounts from his time as both defence and prosecution counsel while also explaining the criminal lawyer's cab rank principle — to accept a brief from a client's solicitor, no matter the case. A measure of how well Brendan's presentation was received was the many questions it elicited among the members.

The Members' Talk segment was given by retired physician Howard Stevens. During the 70s and 80s Howard was a Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) Senior Medical Officer in Far North Queensland. As such, he travelled by RFDS Cessna aircraft to remote Aboriginal communities and outback stations administering to the sick and dealing with



life-threatening emergencies. During his talk, Howard held his audience's attention and fascinated them with examples of cases he encountered, which he illustrated with a PowerPoint display. Additionally, members were intrigued by his insights into the lives of the indigenous communities.

# DOG POUNDS & RESCUE CENTRES OVERRUN WITH SURRENDERS

Nearly all Australian state and territory pounds and rescue centres are currently being swamped by animals being surrendered, most commonly dogs.



There were warnings from Dogs Australia that

the record surge in dog ownership during the pandemic would result in "pounds and rescues overflowing" when people returned to work. The recent downfall in the economy and the difficulties with housing and renting has intensified the problem. Even purebred and designer dogs are being surrendered, often in these cases it is simply because people cannot cope with the dog's energy and behaviour; they lack knowledge about the breed, the time needed for training and exercise, and owners feel they have no control.

Part of the problem is, it is too easy for anyone, suitable or not, to buy or get a pet, and often, almost as easy to give it up. People do not think it through and believe their ex-pets when surrendered will find another home with nice people and 'live happily after.' But the truth is many will be euthanised, as the cost of feeding, vaccinations and treatment is only met short term. The more time a dog spends in a pound environment, the more it has a negative impact on that animal. I have seen dogs adopted and returned a few times: some just go crazy and lash out, which means they will be put to sleep. Yet that does not mean depression and unwanted behaviour is permanent: most dogs will improve once adopted into a caring home.

Staff at these centres and the general public are urged not to be judgmental about people surrendering pets. Yet if legislation cannot protect dogs and cats from exploitation, overbreeding and impulse buying, if it is left up to common sense and caring human beings, then we are in trouble. The problem of too many dogs and too much suffering is likely to escalate.

Domestic violence is exposed and on the increase. RSPCA has a program that can assist with temporary accommodation for pets, which includes some treatments. The goal is to reunite families and pets once they have found accommodation. The Palaszczuk government has committed \$200,000 to expand The Pets in Crisis program; a partnership between RSPCA and DV Connect. Studies have revealed that approximately 50per cent of women and children in violent relationships reported that their violent partner had hurt or killed one of their pets; 33 per cent of domestic violence victims delayed leaving the relationship because of concerns for their pet's welfare. Pets are often used as a part of coercive and controlling behaviour aimed at intimidating a partner and children.

# *WAIT* BEFORE SHARING

For the past few weeks, I have gone through the process of applying cancer-killing cream to my face. While the end result will hopefully be worth it, the journey is confronting. Besides the discomfort, walking past a mirror is a scary experience! When it comes to venturing out in public, face masks irritate and makeup stings, so covering up is not an option. The fiery mess of what looks like contagious sores draws notable attention. Not wishing to explain to every person I encounter, I'm faced with the continual decision, do I explain to this person or politely smile?

The dilemma of when and with whom to share personal information is a common experience. We vacillate between sharing information too soon or struggling to open up at all. Sharing is a way to increase emotional connection in a relationship, but it can also lead to regret that you opened up too much about personal details. Likewise, those who find it harder to open up about themselves may desire more than superficial connections. It's important to find the optimal balance in which you share the right amount of information which is received as you hoped. W.A.I.T. is a helpful acronym to consider before sharing.

*Want*. Do you actually want to share the information with this person? If you are having any doubts, or if there is any part of you that feels uncomfortable with the idea of sharing the information, don't feel like you have to disclose something personal. There are certain exceptions. Accountability within a relationship requires that we may be required to uncomfortably disclose things we're not proud of. However, as a general rule, if another person will not be harmed by keeping the information to yourself, it's okay not to share.

**Appropriate relationship, time and place.** Make sure you keep within the relationship's boundaries. Disclosing intimate details of your marriage problems with your boss at work will result in a sharing hangover. Sharing within an appropriate relationship also requires choosing the right time and place so that the other person is receptive to hear what you have to say.

*Immunise the person.* No, this doesn't involve jabbing them with a needle! Just like a vaccine slowly builds immunity, providing a low dose of information will help you gauge how they are likely to react. It also prepares them for discussing the topic. It gives them the option to ask you questions or to change the subject, indicating if they are ready to hear.

**Trust**. Time is a crucial factor in establishing a trustful relationship. You might meet someone and feel an immediate connection, but sharing too quickly before really getting to know the person may result in regret. Saving personal information can actually increase intimacy and provide the best context when you are finally ready to share.


Whether you are explaining the condition of your face or disclosing much deeper issues, the **W.A.I.T.** principle can be a helpful guide to consider.

A few weeks ago, I was telling a friend about a winery I once visited in South Australia. She listened as I described the various wines and the irresistible selection of cheeses, meats, bread, and other provisions that our party grazed on all afternoon. From the balcony, one could see rows upon rows of century-old grapevines—leaves green and heavy with ripening fruit. For those who have never set foot in a cellar door, the whole "wine world" can feel intimidating. But there's really nothing to be nervous about. I believe cellar doors and wineries are little sanctuaries for life's everyday joys and pleasures—there's something for everyone (even if you're not the biggest fan of wine!)

Here are four reasons I love visiting wineries that are separate from actually tasting wine.

**1. If you love learning,** winery cellar doors tend to double as a sort of laid-back classroom (where your tutor permits the odd

tipple). But in all seriousness, the staff tend to be uberpassionate people who know a lot about winemaking, food, viticulture, and sustainability.



They live and breathe wine, and love sharing their knowledge with visitors.

**2. If you love food,** you're in good company at a winery. Most cellar doors offer some kind of fare to enjoy alongside wine. Sometimes this comes in the form of a lengthy five-course degustation, and other times as a rough-and-ready ploughman's platter. Either way, you're going to be eating something utterly delicious as what you're consuming has been hand-picked by people who make a living off paying close attention to flavour.

**3. If you love nature!** Winemakers have great respect and appreciation for the natural world. Some wineries boast hectares of estate vineyards to marvel over, while others lure you outside with well-tended gardens and al fresco seating. Either way, it's great to get outside and soak up some vitamin D.

**4. If you love good conversation.** There's something about sharing a new experience that facilitates some great yarns. Add music, sunshine, food and drink to the mix, and you may find a couple of hours have passed in the blink of an eye.



# **MILD MEXICAN 'LASAGNA'**

This heavenly tortilla bake is a tasty twist on a traditional lasagna. It has all the flavours of Mexican baked enchiladas but without the hassle. Full of succulent roasted chicken, sweet red capsicum, black beans, layered with tortillas with my homemade epic enchilada sauce, all held together by gooey melted cheese.

This may sound outlandish but trust me, this recipe is incredibly easy. For ease, I simply grab a roasted chicken from the supermarket. This dinner can then be assembled in under 20 minutes and just popped into the oven to work its magic. For variety, you could fry up and add some mince or sauté some button mushrooms and eggplant for a delicious vegetarian option. For anyone who likes it spicy, simply substitute the Gaucho seasoning for the Creole seasoning. The secret sauce in this recipe is in my homemade epic enchilada sauce.

Did you know? Combining different flavours from around the world is not new to us chefs. Fusion cuisine could be defined as food that mixes components of various culinary traditions from other nations, regions, or civilisations to create new and wonderful dishes. Haters of fusion cuisine, or so called 'traditionalists', however, have never approved of the latest ideas of combining foods. Instead, they cleverly coined it 'con fusion cuisine' though in my opinion this only comes about when a chef scatters different components haphazardly together like confetti, which leads to disorientation and conflict on the plate. On the contrary, a seamless and flavourful dish is the end result when a chef has a full grasp of the types of cuisine he or she is trying to fuse .... as is usually the case with any successful innovation, change, or progress.

Chef Dylan tip: Refrain from reheating any leftovers in the microwave, as this will make it soggy but you can make it just as good as the first time by just reheating them in the oven at 180°C for 5-10 mins.

#### Memory Lane, Mooloolabah 2014

"What restaurant should we eat at tonight?" asks my wife, as we sit in the jacuzzi of our hotel room, high up, overlooking the Pacific Ocean. I take a sip of Champagne, savouring the rich brioche flavour. "Well, I've heard excellent things about Spice Bar. It's a cool fusion restaurant and it's just a few hundred metres from our hotel" I reply. "Is that the Asian fusion place?" "Yeah, and you can get a sort of set meal degustation-style too" I say. "I'll give them a call to see if I can make a reservation then." "Sounds perfect" she agrees.

As the sun slowly sets, we amble along the esplanade. Meanwhile, hundreds of rainbow lorikeets are wildly screeching overhead in the tall pine trees. It's a Tuesday night and the place is bustling, with many a sunburnt tourist siting alfresco at the numerous fast foodstyle restaurants designed to lure them in. The dog walkers are out in force, being pulled along by their hounds who only stop to frantically sniff new scents. Continuing on the ocean side, I overhear a group of energetic middle-aged power

walkers in tight shorts and sports bras gossip as they pass by.

We arrive at the restaurant and head up a narrow staircase to the second floor, and I notice straight away the chefs busily dancing between each other along a long, slender open kitchen. The dining area is three-quarters full; "That's a great sign for a Tuesday night" I think to myself, as a small, mousy looking girl with dark hair and an arm full of sailor tattoos heads over and asks, "Reservation sir?". "Yes, Gittoes. Two for 6.30 please". "One moment" she says while turning to head over to a pew with a laptop computer. We are seemingly approved, and she waves us over and guides us to our dark chestnut-coloured table, and I pull out one of the mahogany chairs with bright red cushions for my wife, who smiles as she sits and remarks "Thanks. Comfy,". "You guys are having the set menu, so I'll just let you know the first course is a carpaccio of 'Cape Grim' eye fillet beef with pickled radish, toasted sesame seeds, drizzled with a light Asian-style dressing" says our waitress as she pours us a glass of water each. I'll be back to take your drinks order in a moment" and leaves.

I smile and say "We are in luck! Our table is right in front of the kitchen." My date playfully rolls her eyes "Ha-ha, Chef life. Knew that'd make you happy!"

#### **EPIC ENCHILADA SAUCE**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup plain flour •
- 700 g passata •
- 1 1/2 cups chicken stock •
- 2 tbs Gaucho\*

#### METHOD

- 1. Heat stock in microwave or stove until boiling
- 2. Heat oil for 30 seconds in a separate saucepan over medium heat.
- 3. Add flour and whisk until well combined, about 1 minute.
- 4. Add passata, Gaucho and hot stock, then whisk to combine and bring to boil. Reduce heat to low



5. Simmer for 10 minutes, until thickened, stirring occasionally.

### **MEXICAN 'LASAGNA' INGREDIENTS**

- 2 tbs olive oil •
- 1 brown onion, chopped
- 1 red capsicum, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced •
- 1 tbs Gaucho\*
- 1 can black beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 cup frozen corn
- 3/4 cooked chicken, roughly shredded
- 1 Itr enchilada sauce •
- 18 flour tortillas
- 4 cups mixed cheese (or pizza cheese)

\*Chef Dylan's Gourmet Food Co. Gaucho seasoning

#### GARNISH

- Sour cream •
- Coriander, freshly chopped •
- Ripe avocado, diced
- 1/2 small red onion, diced

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180° C.
- In a large frypan over medium heat, add 2. oil then add onion and capsicum and cook until soft, 5 minutes.
- 3. Add garlic and cook until fragrant, add beans, corn, chicken, and gently mix and warm through ~5 minutes. Keep 1/2 cup enchilada sauce aside then pour remaining sauce into skillet, stirring to gently combine.
- 4. Spread reserved 1/2 cup enchilada sauce into a large baking dish then layer 6 small tortillas in pan, overlapping so they overlap a bit and cover the entire dish. Scoop 1/3 of mixture over tortillas spread evenly and top with about 1/3 of pizza cheese.
- 5. Top that with another layer of tortillas and then repeat to make 2 more layers, finishing with cheese.
- Bake for 30 minutes or until sauce is 6. bubbling and cheese is golden and melted.
- 7. Garnish with red onion, avocado, sour cream and coriander.
