"I have to say the teachers are doing a fantastic job with their student' civics lessons, as not one of my questions to the students went unanswered.


"Although I'm not certain, we may have broken a record for fitting 56 students into my office to see where I work and to get a group photo.

GEISSMANN OVAL USE COMPROMISED BY NEW EFFLUENT TRENCHES

Both Councillors Jeff
McConnell and I have asked
the General Manager of
Infrastructure to find a
solution to and rectify this new
work which has been carried
out, encroaching onto the
main oval playing field, limiting
the possible width of the field,
and therefore rendering it
unplayable for
A grade competition.

I took some measurements last weekend. There's up to 120 metres in length possible, with a five-metre runoff, but now at the northern end, the maximum width with the bollards in place is just 50 metres of playing field, with a five-metre runoff on both sides. Most A grade sized ovals require 68 metres, plus a five-metre runoff on both sides.

The aim of various football codes is to have a full-size playing field, achievable with the current removal of the cricket practice nets, and with the lights positioned back off the oval to accommodate the full field.

Council recently upgraded the toilets and added a canteen to facilitate A grade competitions, at a cost short of \$500,000. The change rooms were retained to facilitate home and away games.

This is a repeat of the mistakes at Staffsmith Park, where the transpiration trenches, surrounded by bollards, took away nearly a third of the park's open space for active recreation.

Once again, without consulting either Cr McConnell or myself, a decision was taken to place bollard trenches encroaching on the playing field on Geissmann Oval.

The Mountain has a deficit of space for active recreation for the current population. During the years prior to 2005, when the population was just 5,500, studies were commissioned by the Beaudesert Shire Council, using ROSS planning consultants to determine the right amount of active recreation land needed for the Mountain community population and the available land that could be purchased. Taking into account all the existing recreation land at the time, which included St Bernard's Oval, Geissmann Oval and Staffsmith Park, the figure was 40 acres of land. That was the basis of purchasing the 50 acres of land, now the TMSA site. The population is now 8,500, and we cannot afford to sacrifice our existing active recreation land for other purposes when there are still other active recreation groups in search of suitable land.

Our swimming pool is recognised as being totally inadequate for our population, and land at the TMSA is set aside in a new master plan for a new aquatic centre, one additional oval, indoor sports centre and room for sports to have their own club space.



I am often reminded that not one sports code on the Mountain using the TMSA grounds has a clubhouse to call home. This is a major problem, and after nearly 14 years of the development of the site, it is a disappointment to me that this clubhouse stage of the site's development, proposed at inception as stage 2, has not been achieved. This has in my view, hindered the realisation of the ground's full potential. It's a lost opportunity for the social development of our sporting codes, the socialisation of participating families, and for our children's shared history.

We have lost St Bernard's Oval, which is now fenced off from the public, which was once the home of Australian rules and was developed with funding from the Beaudesert Shire Council, Education Queensland, (when Kevin Lingard was a Shadow Minister), and the community who did all the design and construction at cost price, including \$25,000 of rock blasting.

All of this means we are several ovals short of our required recreation infrastructure requirements based on our population increase, and we cannot afford to lose more facilities because of what has occurred at both Staffsmith Park and Geissmann Oval.

We await a response from Council as to how this is going to be rectified.

THREATENED SPECIES ADVICE AT ODDS

A report from SRRC has advised that the 7th of September was 'National Threatened Species Day' and that, "Our iconic and precious koalas are one of those species."

"In February this year, the increasing threats to koalas resulted in them being listed as endangered." the report says.

Ironically, an application for a development at Harrisville is presently being considered by SRRC.

"During the development, some of the mature native trees that are scattered across the property would be felled. This includes the mapped core koala habitat in the northwestern corner of the property.

Yet another large housing estate is planned for Canungra. The company proposes to subdivide a 124ha property, 100ha of which is zoned rural, into 117 residential allotments, 90 of which will range in size from 600sqm to 1,200sqm.

Small allotments of 600m² will mean that, after clearing, and building, little open space is left for the displaced wildlife to survive. Numbers have already been affected by the bushfires.

There are three large properties on Tamborine Mountain at the moment for which SRRC is considering development applications. The DAs are in conflict with the zoning and Council's own planning scheme.

All applications plan to clear land, some including core koala habitat, for cabins.

Where is Council's concern for our threatened species?

Not only are koalas at risk. Birds may live in trees but many feed on the ground. Open space is needed for our birds, mammals and marsupials to graze and to travel.

Council's report goes on to say that "Koalas need our help, so here's what you can do: control weeds around your blue gums so koalas can access them.

Council might follow its own advice. For some time now, I have been trying to raise issue of the planting of lomandra grass around the base of trees, and in open spaces on council land. This is threatening our wildlife, not only by preventing marsupials from accessing trees but also by depriving mammals, reptile and birds of the open spaces they need to graze and access their food source.

When will this council heed its own advice?

PLEASE EXPLAIN – RATE CHARGES

My friend, I'll call her friend A, lives on the same size block of land as I do in Eagle Heights on half an acre, except she is just inside the Gold Coast Council demarcation line. Her annual rates are \$829, mine are 3.5 times higher at \$3,000.

Friend B is living on Tamborine Mountain with two acres, land which has large established trees and some native wildlife: his rates are \$4,800 annually. Friend C lives in Boyland near Canungra; she also lives on two acres, yet pays \$2,400 per year in rates, half the cost of B. We all receive the same services from the same Council. Pensioners receive a larger discount with the GC Council as well. Apparently land valuation is just one of many factors taken into account; there are 92 rating categories in QLD.

Another issue is that the Scenic Rim Council receives \$150,000 annually from the government's Environmental Grant Program, an increase of \$50,000 this year. It is given as an incentive for conservation and protection of wildlife, so WHY is there so much development on the small Tamborine Mountain plateau, and why are larger block owners penalised? Many people struggle with the excessively high rates; they should be encouraged to hold onto larger blocks of land. Council gives away two free, young trees to ratepayers, yet are okay with removing mature ones for development. The free trees sound like a 'smoke screen'.

The only logic is by the description of the Mountain as "boutique" – small, unique and sought after. Making it appealing to the wealthy who can afford the high cost of rates. Let us support the Progress Association, whose main concern is for this environment, and not profit and development.

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LOVING OUR PETS

It was a podcast that caught my attention, talking about the correlation between stressed human owners and their stressed pets.

They were interviewing an animal naturopath and pet whisperer, and one of the statements that really stood out in the podcast was when

the naturopath mentioned that it's easier for humans to care for their pets than to spend that same time and money caring for themselves. It's a fact backed by many social science studies; the natural affection we feel for animals can be compared to the affection we feel for our children. We impulsively care for them and desire to help them because they are unable to help themselves easily. We don't seem to extend this unconditional love to ourselves as readily. The podcast interviewee went on to say that the downside of this pet—human empathic relationship was how, in times of stress, many pets take on their owner's stress. The stressed pet can then exhibit behaviour issues or even illness.

Researchers proved this hypothesis by analysing the hair of dogs and their owners and assessing both dog and owner personalities through standardised personality questionnaires. Researchers measured the hormone cortisol in the hair of dogs and their owners over a year-long period.

Cortisol is a measure of physiological stress, which can be raised during mental distress. Hair cortisol is a good way of measuring long-term trends in stress levels, as hair grows slowly and absorbs circulating substances from the blood. The results showed a significant correlation between human and dog cortisol levels across the year, and for these dogs, their cortisol levels rose and fell in unison with their owners'. This correlation was not influenced by dog activity levels or dog personality but was influenced by owner personality. Owners with higher stress levels tended to have dogs with higher stress levels too. According to this naturopath, this study applies to pet cats as well.

Animals are sentient beings and they can experience both positive and negative emotions, such as pleasure, comfort, fear, and anxiety. The impact we have on our pets' stress levels goes both ways - positive and negative. If we reduce our own stress levels, it's likely we will also reduce our pets' stress levels.

So, if you find it too hard to work on decreasing your stress levels for your own sake, perhaps you will do it for your pet. Come to yoga and learn to chill out. My little dog Smudge is a yoga/meditation addict. He's always first on my yoga mat and can't get close enough to anyone meditating. He basks in that meditative energy field, instinctively knowing how good this healing energy is. And of course, try exercising in nature. That daily walk is good for you and very good for the mental health of your pet.

PARADIGM SHIFT

A paradigm is a basic set of assumptions from which we function. They make our processing of information and responding a more streamline process. Paradigm shift occurs when we make a change in our usual way of thinking or doing, replacing it with a new and different way. We sometimes experience significant situations where we suddenly see our priorities in a different light. It could be a life-threatening crisis, a life transition such as becoming a parent, taking on a new career, beginning retirement. In these events our fundamental paradigms can change significantly.

Minor paradigm shifts, however, occur when we take the opportunity to hear another's perspective. Stephen Covey, in his book *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, tells the story of a mini paradigm shift he experienced while travelling on a New York subway.

"People were sitting quietly – some reading newspapers, some lost in thought, some resting with their eyes closed. It was a calm, peaceful scene. Then suddenly, a man and his children entered the subway car. The children were so loud and rambunctious that instantly the whole climate changed.

"The man sat down next to me and closed his eyes, apparently oblivious to the situation. The children were yelling back and forth, throwing things, even grabbing people's papers. It was very disturbing. And yet, the man sitting next to me did nothing.

"It was difficult not to feel irritated. I could not believe that he could be so insensitive to let his children run wild like that and do nothing about it, taking no responsibility at all. It was easy to see that everyone else on the subway felt irritated, too. So finally, with what I felt was unusual patience and restraint, I turned to him and said, "Sir, your children are really disturbing a lot of people. I wonder if you couldn't control them a little more?


"The man lifted his gaze as if to come to a consciousness of the situation for the first time and said softly, "Oh, you're right. I guess I should do something about it. We just came from the hospital where their mother died about an hour ago. I don't know what to think, and I guess they don't know how to handle it either."

"Can you imagine what I felt at that moment? My paradigm shifted. Suddenly I saw things differently, I felt differently, I behaved differently. My irritation vanished. I didn't have to worry about controlling my attitude or my behaviour; my heart was filled with the man's pain. Feelings of sympathy and compassion flowed freely. "Your wife just died? Oh, I'm so sorry. Can you tell me about it? What can I do to help?" Everything changed in an instant."

Perhaps you can relate to Stephen's encounter. We've all had occasions where our assumptions about a situation have proven false. In those moments we have the opportunity to listen to another's story and change our attitude and behaviour. Make sure you don't miss the opportunity!

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








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
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ENERGEX STATE-OF-THE-ART DRONES TAKE TO THE AIR IN PREPARATION FOR SUMMER STORMS

Undoubtedly, we'll see severe weather descending on Queensland in the coming weeks and Energex have crews ready on the ground and now in the air thanks to the company's new highly advanced drone fleet.

While Energex has been using drones for a number of purposes for the past few years, the technology has advanced significantly in recent times and this summer the drones will allow crews to locate damage undetectable with the naked eye through thermal imaging cameras to installing lifesaving markers on powerlines and help keep people safe during flooding.

Energex Technology Manager Rob lbbs said the latest drone fleet is helping the organisation prepare the power network for summer and will help crews undertake tasks much safer and quicker than ever.

"For a number of years, we've been using drones to investigate damage in hard-to-reach sections of the power network after storms, and helping to string powerlines between power poles," Mr lbbs said.

"This week we will have specially equipped drones installing 'rotamarkers' along flood-prone waterways to make powerlines more visible for emergency service workers such as the State Emergency Service volunteers who use the waterways to ferry stranded people to safety.

"We'll also be trialling drones equipped with state-of-the-art thermal imaging cameras that provide our crews images showing damage to sections of the power network that have traditionally been difficult to detect from the ground or though the naked eye.

"Together these new drones are helping us prepare for the upcoming severe weather in a way we've never been able to before and allowing us to do it much faster and safer than ever."

Mr lbbs said while Energex's drone fleet is now an integral part of preparing for summer, the electricity distributor is undertaking all its traditional pre-storm season activities to ensure the network is as resilient as possible.

"Over the cooler months our crews have been extremely busy upgrading and maintaining the state's power network to ensure it is in optimum condition for when the severe weather season commences," he said.

"Where required we have been replacing powerlines, uprating transformers and testing our network control systems so when the inevitable happens and storms hit, our crews will be ready to go at a moment's notice."

Mr lbbs also said the coming weeks were a good time for Queenslanders to get their family and properties ready for summer.

"There are some very simple steps people can take to prepare for summer storms and a quick tidy up around the yard can save a lot of angst once wild weather hits," he said.

"During a storm, items such as outdoor furniture, toys and fallen branches can become lethal missiles which could seriously injure a family member or damage your property.



"These projectiles can also become caught in powerlines, causing outages or bringing powerlines down, so start your preparations by taking a walk around your property and securing any loose items.

"Next trim any overgrown or loose tree branches, but don't cut any trees near powerlines. If you're concerned about tree branches being too close to powerlines, contact your local tree contractor or call Energex.

"Finally, move inside the home and check that you have a storm kit with items such as a torch, battery powered radio, portable power bank to charge mobile phones, a first aid kit and fresh batteries in an easily accessible place. Make sure the whole family knows where the kit is located.

"This will give everyone the best chance of handling whatever the weather throws at us this coming summer."





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FOOD FOR THOUGHT

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SPICY BBQ BAKED DRUMSTICKS

These sticky, sweet and spicy, melt-in-your-mouth chicken drumsticks are a surefire way to win the hearts and tummies of anyone who likes a bit of spice in their life. Use your imagination with this dinner, as you can simply serve it up alongside any of your family favourites. Think salads, rice, baked potato wedges, coleslaw, mash, steamed seasonal vegetables or even quinoa.

This dish is perfect to feed a gathering such as large family group, or for a backyard BBQ party. These lovely legs are first marinated in my Creole and then baked to crispy perfection, before smothering them in lashes of my Captain Kidd spiced rum BBQ sauce. They can simply be cooked then placed on a tray for guests to delight in helping themselves. For those who don't like spicy and prefer mild flavours, simply substitute my Creole seasoning for my Gaucho, and it'll be winner-winner, chicken dinner.

Did you know? The humble oven was an instrumental invention in our development as a species. We used this tool in a makeshift way, to increase our mobility, and it also provided the ability for substantial nourishment for brain development, in order for us to thrive. The remnants from the earliest known ovens were found in Central Europe dating back to 29,000 BC. Inside an ancient yurt, archaeologists discovered a fire pit where hunter gatherers had wrapped mammoth meat in leaves and then cooked it buried underneath hot coals and earth. This type of cooking is remarkably efficient and is still done by indigenous peoples all around the world to this very day, particularly in the Pacific islands.

Chef Dylan tip: Be sure to turn the legs over halfway during the cooking process to ensure even cooking. If you don't have a pastry brush, simply pour a tablespoon of sauce from the bottle and carefully drizzle it over the chicken. I would recommend doubling this recipe, as these lovely legs are as delicious cold as they are hot, and an easy lunch for hungry workers who want to save some money instead of buying lunch.

"Want to meet for some lunch?" says my newfound friend Ken, a 6-foot-6 gentle giant of a Texan who is built like 'The Rock' Dwayne Johnson. "It's a Texan BBQ-style restaurant in town". I let out a giggle as he adds lightheartedly: "Don't get me wrong the last 2 weeks at the retreat listening to Francis talk about the science of awakening sure has been enlightening but I need to get me some meat! I'm starving!". "I've really enjoyed the vegetarian meals" I say wholeheartedly. "Well, you can have a salad then while watching me devour the house specialty: a giant platter of smoked spicy barbecue chicken drumsticks" he says excitedly. Are you coming or what?". "Count me in buddy!" I reply enthusiastically. "Sweet, man... I'll pick you up in an hour then." he adds before hanging up the phone.

As I wait outside for my ride, I notice that most of the neighbours have in the front yard, a large American flag, gently flapping in the wind. I hear Ken before I see him come around the bend, the roar of his brand new bright yellow

Ford Mustang GT comes to a halt. I open the passenger door while the massive V8 5 litre engine continues to purr like a lion. Ken puts out his giant calloused hand to greet me – "Get in and buckle up partner," he says as we take off like a jet from where I was staying. We spend the next 20 minutes winding our way through the incredible scenery of hillsides and vineyards, before finding our way into the city of Temecula.

As Ken pulls into the parking lot, I can't help but notice the place feels like we are in a movie set. "This it so surreal" I say to Ken. As we continue down the street "The buildings all look like they are straight out of a 1960's Western movie" I say in amazement. "Ya'll don't have this kind of themed set up in Australia?" asks Ken genuinely shocked. "Nah mate, this is some straight up whacky stuff, ha-ha" I joke. "Welcome to America man! The land of the free. If you build it, they will come" he says proudly as we arrive to the stylish saloon-looking restaurant. "Get ready for some serious flavour, my friend, Texas style!" says Ken as he pushes through the saloon style doors.

If you're craving a drool-worthy spring barbecue dinner, give this super easy recipe a go.

Prep Time 10 minutes Cook Time 50 minutes plus 30 minutes Total Time 1 hour 30 minutes

Ingredients

2kg Chicken drumsticks, about 12



4 tbs oil

 1 cup Captain Kidd Spiced Rum BBQ sauce*

Method

- In a mixing bowl, add Creole and oil and combine.
- Add drumsticks, Using your hands, generously coat the seasoning all over the drumsticks.
- 3. Set aside to allow the Creole seasoning to marinate the meat ~20 minutes.
- Meanwhile preheat the oven to 180°C and line a roasting tray with baking paper for easy cleanup, if desired.
- 5. Transfer the chicken drumsticks to the prepared roasting tray arranging them on the wire rack with a little space in between.
- 6. Bake, in the middle of the oven, for 40 minutes, flipping half time.
- When the time is up, remove from the oven and brush each chicken drumstick with BBQ sauce.
- 8. Return to the oven and bake for 10 minutes, then flip the drumsticks and repeat the process once again.
- Serve immediately and enjoy with your chosen accompaniments.

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
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
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
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
