A RED-LETTER DAY FOR SCENIC RIM'S NEWEST AUSTRALIANS



Citizenship Day last week had special significance for 13 members of the Scenic Rim community who are now the region's newest Australians.

Scenic Rim Mayor Greg Christensen, who conducted the citizenship ceremony (on Thursday 15 September) at The Centre Beaudesert, welcomed the residents from six diverse nations and acknowledged the milestone in their journey from immigrants to Australian citizens.

The Scenic Rim's newest Australians have come from the United Kingdom, Germany, Brazil, Indonesia, Egypt and the United States and now call Tamborine Mountain, Mount Alford, Tamborine, Gleneagle, Beaudesert and Canungra home.

"Australia is one of the most culturally diverse nations in the world, having welcomed more than five million new citizens to its shores since 1949," Mayor Christensen said.

"Census information shows that half of all Australians were born overseas or have a parent who was and, here in the Scenic Rim, we have a proud history of welcoming people from all over the world.

"Whatever our origins, our Australian citizenship is the common bond which unites us.

"We cherish the values of Australian citizenship - respect for the freedom and dignity of others, equality before the law regardless of race, religion, gender or ethnic background, and a fair go for all."

Mayor Christensen said the passing of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, which had shocked and saddened many in the community, had added a note of poignancy to the citizenship ceremony.

"The Queen embodied the true meaning of duty that was an example to us all," he said.

"Her commitment to public service across the Commonwealth was nothing short of extraordinary and her legacy will live on forever."

The citizenship ceremony had been timed to coincide as closely as possible with Australian Citizenship Day on 17 September and continued as planned during the period of mourning for the Queen on the advice of the Department of Home Affairs.

First observed in 2001, Citizenship Day was established to encourage a celebration of Australian citizenship, with 17 September chosen as the day marking the anniversary of the renaming in 1973 of the Nationality and Citizenship Act 1948 to the Australian Citizenship Act 1948.

"Citizenship Day is an opportunity for us all to reflect on the meaning and importance of Australian citizenship and the responsibilities and privileges we all enjoy as citizens of this wonderful country," Mayor Christensen said.

"As well as being a special day for our newest Australians, our citizenship ceremony was a timely reminder for us all about what it means to be an Australian citizen.

"My congratulations to all of our newest Australians, who I hope will enjoy a happy and successful future as citizens of Australia."

DR. BOB GOUGH, SPEAKER AT "OBSERVE THE MOON"

Tamborine Mountain Universe will be holding two events focused on the Moon. On Tuesday 8 November together we'll watch a full lunar eclipse, but first, on 1 October, another edition of the annual Observe the Moon will take place.

Observe the Moon is a global event, organised by NASA. On the evening, stargazers will share their knowledge with the members of TM Universe. The gates open at 7.00pm and a presentation on the Moon will be given from 7.30pm. This will include a 'quiz' to check your knowledge about the moon. Please bring your mobile phone, as it is an online quiz.

Subsequently our special guest, Dr Bob Gough (pictured at right), will share his extensive knowledge and experience to explain the ins and outs of the upcoming Moon missions. Dr. Gough spent seven years with ESA developing communications systems for satellites, he was responsible for the in-orbit testing of one of the first ever three-axis-stabilised satellites in geostationary orbit (at a 'fixed' location above earth), he is Head of Business Development at Goonhilly Earth Station in the UK and currently responsible for establishing Goonhilly's deep space ground station in Western Australia.

Dr. Gough will describe the planned Artemis-1 mission to the Moon and how the Orion capsule will be sent on its journey to the Moon and back. He will also cover how the satellites will be injected into a special Lunar orbit, which is designed to cover the Moon's poles, where future landings will take place.

Dr. Gough will also describe why it is necessary to have extremely large dishes at the ground stations for lunar and deep space missions, and why their receivers must be cooled down to nearly absolute zero using liquid helium. He will also provide examples and photos of the ground stations and their antennas – both inside and out.

These will include Australia's CSIRO-operated NASA Canberra DSN (Deep Space Network) complex and the ESA deep space tracking centre at New Norcia North of Perth. In addition, he will explain the crucial Goonhilly's 32 metre antenna called Merlin, in the UK, which also tracks and controls Mars missions and the ESA Gaia space observatory.





After the presentations you are invited to have a look at the moon and ask questions of members with a lot of knowledge about the moon. Please, also bring your own binoculars or telescopes if you wish.

In case the weather is not in our favour, the TM Universe team will present an extensive one-hour presentation about the moon, which is part of the lecture-series *Aiming for the Stars.*

- Euprosopia conjuncta, metal railing, Eagle Heights.



I am fascinated by this spectacular-looking creature. It is a great favourite of mine. I was thrilled to encounter it on my morning walk in late February this year at a location which has long furnished a rich variety of subjects. The wings are not only beautifully veined, but they are also strongly patterned and the legs have a striking white banding. This is the second signal fly I have photographed. The first was in 2016. In 2014, I filmed a fly at the garage where I film and photograph nearly all my moths. Scientists estimate that there may be as many as 900 species of signal fly in the Australasian region, out of a global total of around 1,200.

TRAVELLING PLACES with Renee

It was a trip of firsts – my first time to the Mediterranean, first time travelling without my kids and after dreaming about it for so longmy first time on a Viking Cruise. And I am pleased to report, it was an absolute delight from start to finish.

This also just so happens to be my first attempt at writing the *Scenic News* column (so please bear with me).

My return to international travel was aboard the Viking Cruise from Istanbul to Athens. The Ancient Mediterranean Treasury itinerary took us from Troy, to Ephesus, to Rhodes, and finally Crete.

Our vessel, Viking Sky, was tastefully decorated with modern Scandinavian design, and beautifully laid out. The stateroom was spacious and had everything we could need. Holding a maximum of 930 passengers she is just the perfect size – large enough to find your own private nook but small



enough to make meaningful friendships by managing to run into the same people more than once. It never felt crowded – you never would have known it was close to capacity.

The ambiance of the ship is simple and elegant. The people onboard were easy-going and friendly, and shared our interests in travel and passion for exploration. I can see why it is called the thinking person's cruise, with port excursions, daily talks and historians sharing their knowledge of the region. I have to add – the 'no kids' policy suited to a tee... there were quite a few multigenerational families on board, and I could definitely see myself doing this sort of trip with my children and grandparents in the future.

The service onboard was impeccable. The staff were courteous, helpful, and always wanted to know if there was anything they could do to make our trip better. Addressing us by our names and remembering our coffee and cocktail drink orders.

The dining options onboard were incredible, from The Chef's Table dinner, the fine dining Manfredi's Italian Restaurant, the World Café to the Pool Grill. It is also great to note that all restaurants are included in your fare, as well as room service. I must confess – the endless supply of homemade fresh ice cream and gelato was far too tempting for me to resist.

Shore excursion choices were varied and there was always something for everyone. The excursions featured knowledgeable and engaging local guides. It is hard to pick out my favourite excursions but visiting Gallipoli with my husband, an ex-defence member, was an especially moving experience, as was exploring the Ancient city of Ephesus. The *Taste of Cretan Hospitality* tour was also fabulous – it started with a scenic drive to the archaeological site of the Minoan Palace of Phaistos, followed by a visit to a local winery for tasting and all the cheese platters you could dream of, and then to top the day, off our guide, Evan, then took us to his house where his Mama had cooked up a feast (the most amazing Moussaka ever). Every person who did this tour could not stop raving about it once back onboard the ship, we were touched by the Cretan hospitality and will never forget it.

TABLE TENNIS AT TMCCA - KEEPING US FIT AND **YOUTHFUL**

Table Tennis is held regularly on Thursdays from 12:30 pm - 2:30 pm at TMCCA, 42, Southport Avenue, Eagle Heights. Whether a beginner or a seasoned player, you are welcome to join in and enjoy an afternoon of social table tennis and a cuppa for a gold coin donation. A little heads up for the newcomers, often, some of us get fairly competitive...

Table Tennis enhances brain growth and improves emotional well-being, as revealed by a primetime BBC1 programme -'How to stay young' which examined ways to keep our brains healthy.

Scientific tests of players' brain scans (conducted at the beginning and end of the 10-week testing period, twice a week for 1 hour) revealed that playing table tennis was particularly good for keeping the brain active and healthy and slowing down ageing diseases such as Alzheimer's. These tests analysed how the player's brain had changed physically, how their mental and memory functions had improved and how their emotional well-being was enhanced. The tests were supervised by Dr Matthew Kempton at King's College, London, who said, "Table tennis is a very interesting activity to look at because we know it's fast-moving; there's a competitive angle and there's hand-eye co-ordination in there as well. We think that might lead to changes in blood flow to the brain and changes in cognition...'

Results established that table tennis players had improved scores on the cognitive tests conducted at the end of 10 weeks, according to Dr Kempton. The brain scans revealed that the test group had more neurons in the hippocampus, associated with better memory and ability to learn.



Table tennis players showed an increase in the thickness of their cortex - the part of the brain associated with complex thinking and the one which shrinks most as we age. Dr Kempton stated that this was due to connections between brain cells increasing - a result of learning a new skill.

Table tennis participants also had fewer negative emotions and stated that they felt better for having taken part in exercise in a social group."

HEALTH SYSTEM IN QUEENSLAND CREAKING UNDER PRESSURE

In previous columns, I have mentioned QLD Health's major problems with ambulances "ramping" (waiting at hospitals unable to admit patients) and the flow-on effect on patients and those needing an ambulance. It's a big problem at the Gold Coast University, Logan and other major hospitals around our region. In recent days, documents released under Right to Information laws have again shone a light on disasters occurring with our health system, including the death of a patient whom an ambulance could not get to until 9 hours and 19 minutes after they called. Healthcare professionals are just that, and deserve our support. They need a system that works better – and so do all Queenslanders. We in the LNP will continue to hold the Government to account on this matter and put forward proposals to fix the problems.

SPRING IS HERE, AND SO IS THE WARMER WEATHER AND POTENTIALLY DAMAGING STORMS...

I urge you not to wait until you are caught in the middle of a storm to wish that you were better prepared. As well as ensuring that loose objects are secured, make sure plans are made to protect your pets and livestock during a disaster, and that your insurance information is up to date. It is also important that all those with health problems ensure they will be able to access their medication in the event of a disaster, and each family member needs to know what to do in the case of a severe storm event. I believe that getting to know your neighbours and familiarising yourself with storm warnings and action plans is vital for the safety of our community. TIME TO PREPARE IS NOW

Communities across Australia are reeling from the compounding effects of fires, floods, cyclones and the global pandemic, and there can be no doubt that more challenges will emerge. Australian Red Cross is urging people to act now to prepare for the inevitable disasters ahead.

HOW SECURE IS IT?

Energy security is something we have always taken for granted in Australia. We have ample reserves of coal and gas, with some hydro to help out. Generators are reasonably close to where the power is needed and our grid has performed as intended. We could rely on power being available when and where we needed it and, although we whinged about the cost, energy was affordable and generally reliable. That was all very fortunate, since our economy and standard of living depended on it.

Then came the pressures to shift to renewables. In Australia that means sun and wind, since our old worn-down continent doesn't have the topography for much hydro. We are not supposed to talk about nuclear, even though those with significant nuclear have big grins in these difficult times.

We are well aware of the weaknesses with solar and windmills. The sun and wind do their job less than half the time and then produce energy when it suits them. That is often not when we need it. So, we end up having to provide storage for short term fluctuations and backup for longer shortfalls. If you don't provide your own backup, you can be in real strife. Western Europe has learned a very hard lesson. They let themselves become dependent on Russian oil and gas and, when the taps were turned off, energy shortages have become very real. Costs have gone through the roof. Countries' economies are shaky, and previous living standards could become a lost dream.

However, apparently with eyes closed and fingers in ears, we are dancing along making ourselves disastrously vulnerable to our own version of the collapse of energy security.

We are running down our traditional power generators with the pious hope that endless paddocks of solar panels and hills covered in windmills will do the job. Backup has to be available and we don't seem to be planning for that expensive add-on. That paints an unhappy picture, but there is a much worse scenario that nobody seems to want to

think about... Suppose we are at a vulnerable point in the transition where our grand dream is only partly built and our traditional generators are either gone or collapsing due to lack of upgrades or long-term maintenance. Then, a big neighbour flexes its muscles and finds a reason to cut off our supplies of panels and critical windmill components. Hardly bears thinking abou, but we have to. It is a fundamental part of the energy security picture.

BASIC RIGHT TO QUESTION

I endorse the sentiments of Hilary Dale in his letter to the *Scenic News* of September 1.

Further to this, and as stated in my original objection, not only is this area known to be of 'slip' potential but previous applications to develop, on an extremely smaller scale, were denied. I asked, 'Is this discrimination?' and I further ask 'Why is this even being considered?'

The site is question has a very steep gradient, some of which appears close to a 1 in 2, and steep otherwise. As with removal of rocks and trees at a short distance from this site when rocks were taken to stabilise the Southport Spit, this area, like the Goat Track which is nearby, will increase its potential to slip. Whilst we managed, to a degree, the inconvenience of Goat Track closure for in excess of 1 year, slip damage to the southern part of Main Western Road adjacent to this seems to be a very likely possibility and one which will isolate very many of us. In addition, this end of the mountain has seen bushfires which I have seen progress in seconds past my front gate and past Mr Dale's as well. So – the integrity of our road must not be compromised. Nor should any ratepayer bear any expense of **any** damage to it through a singular ambition.

Note: A geological assessment of an area of my property on the other side of the road was declared potentially unstable and is managed accordingly.

That this area is koala habitat can be confirmed by many of us who live near or who have taken an interest in this area. A singular statement to the contrary is ignorant at best. Koalas are, to our shame, an endangered species. The forest needs to stay! (It won't.) Some readers may recall Council imposing large fines for removal of trees. One in Esme Street comes to mind. There is an inconsistency also evident in this area, such that felling with impunity (no fines) appears unnoticed for some yet not for others.

The category 'nature-based tourism' would be more appropriately called 'naturist-based tourism' given that it is proposed to be a venue for Onsen baths.

There were many objections to this 'development', not one of these was fatuous. It is our entitlement to voice our concerns, and threats of financial consequences for exercising this basic right are untenable, to put it mildly. The Tamborine Progress Association's unpaid dedicated members deserve all the support that can be mustered.

THE RHODESIAN RIDGEBACK DOG

This national dog breed of South Africa is strong and muscular, its hallmark is the ridge of fur running down the back. Defined as a scent and sight hound with a temperament described as intelligent and sensitive, they can be strong-willed, mischievous, yet dignified and loyal. They can also be stand-offish with strangers, yet affectionate with their human family. An adult dog's weight is between 30-41 kg, depending on the sex, and they can live up to ten to twelve years. The ancestors of this breed can be traced back to the semi-domesticated, ridged hunting and guardian dogs of the Khoikhoi (South African natives) discovered in 1652.



These dogs were later interbred with various European dogs, including Mastiffs, Bloodhounds, Great Danes and Greyhounds by colonists. The final breed was accepted in 1922 and approved by the South African Kennel union in 1927. The early Dutch settlers used these dogs to hunt and defend livestock on farms from lions. A good dog would corner a lion until someone arrived; sadly, to shoot it. The state of Rhodesia does not exist anymore, the north became Zambia in 1964 and the south, Zimbabwe in 1980.

The "ridge" is just a line of hair growing in the opposite direction to the main coat. It usually has two crowns or swirls, one at each end of the ridge. This ridge is actually a congenital defect, due to an abnormal migration of neural crest cells. It is only a defect of the fur and makes the ridge a unique feature of the breed. In fact, a dog without the ridge and swirls is considered faulty, and disqualified in a show ring. Not only do show judges insist on the fur ridge, but historically breeders agreed that dogs with a ridge tended to make the best hunters.

Their coat colour is only wheaten, from pale to a burnished red. Ridgebacks have two nose colours-black and the less common brown. They are born with beautiful blue eyes which may stay blue-grey or become amber grey. They are a fairly healthy breed, the most common health issues are hip or elbow dysplasia, and occasionally deafness. As with all deep chested dog breeds, they are susceptible to gastric dilatation volvulus (bloat). Ridgeback dogs require a moderate amount of exercise and have minimal grooming requirements.

BE PROACTIVE

Last week I mentioned Stephen Covey, author of one of the world's most successful books, The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People. Covey produced a series of 7 Habits, including The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Families. Over the next few weeks, we will explore the seven habits recommended for families.

Habit one is *Be Proactive*. To quote Covey, "Between stimulus and response, there is a space. In that space lies our freedom and power to choose our response. In our response lies our growth and our freedom". When we are faced with a family situation we can respond reactively or proactively. It's easy to get sucked into overpowering emotion and react in ways we later regret. Alternatively, we can develop our capacity to momentarily pause and respond in a way that influences the situation. For example, parents who react to their child's behaviour with criticism and constant scolding, lose influence with their child, and the behaviour escalates. But if they were to pause and consider what is driving the reaction in themselves, they will begin to discover that they have freedom of choice to respond to their child in a better way.

We are all born with the benefit of self-awareness, conscience, imagination, independent will and humour to support us in choosing our response. Our selfawareness allows us to take a perspective where we observe our own actions and thoughts then step in to make changes. Our conscience or inner voice, prompts us to evaluate our actions. Our imagination gives us the ability to envision a response that is entirely different from our reactions. Independent will is the power to take action. It supports us in resisting the urge to act impulsively and helps us strive for perspective and control. Humour allows us to laugh at our shortcomings and gets us back on track much faster than guilt trips. My children learnt the value of humour when they were very young. They realised if they responded by making silly faces, their father's reprimand would quickly turn into inevitable laughter!

The essence of proactivity lies in taking responsibility. Think about responsible as 'response-able', able to choose your response. We do this by focusing on the things we can actually do something about. Covey describes the circle of concern and the circle of influence. The reactive tendency is to purely focus on our circle of concern, those things we are upset about. This is generally viewed through a victim perspective where blame is externalised. Doing this causes our circle of influence to shrink. In contrast, when our focus is on our circle of influence and the changes we can make within us, our influence grows. We set in motion a transition in our family. We stop the transmission of inherited, unhealthy ways of relating, burning out intergenerational dross. The example we model contributes to the seedbed of family culture. Your commitment to be proactive rather than reactive will cultivate a greater sense of closeness and understanding within your family.

WINE CHAT

WHAT'S THE DEAL WITH 'NATURAL WINE'?

Trends come and go in the blink of an eye. If you have ever dipped a toe into the world of wine, chances are you've heard of natural wines. While the term sounds like it has toppled out of the mouth of a wellness-obsessed indie wine-snob, natural wine is wine in its original form. It's been around for thousands of years long before industrialisation gave us the power to control more aspects of winemaking. Today, we're going to be covering all things natural wine-from how it's made to what it tastes like, to whether it's worth all the fuss...

First things first, what exactly is natural wine?

While there is no one, universally accepted definition, natural wine is the product of minimal-intervention winemaking philosophy. A hallmark feature is that fermentation is facilitated by yeasts that are indigenous to the vineyard. Every



vineyard has its own microbiome with its own unique yeast populations. Many winemakers believe that the use of these yeast populations adds a complexity. depth, and distinctiveness to a wine that cannot be garnered by adding lab-cultured yeasts as is common practice in conventional winemaking.

Aside from the fermentation process, there are a couple of signs to look out for that may indicate what you're drinking is "natural wine". They tend to be produced by smaller, independent wineries that source grapes from organic or sustainable vineyards. Moreover, natural wines are often additivefree, and contain little to no added sulphites (antioxidants that preserve wine). Some natural wines are also unfiltered, with advocates suggesting this adds to the wine's aromatic and textural development. These are easy to spot, as they often appear cloudy in the bottle.

Do natural wines taste different to 'normal' wines? What do they taste like?

The popularity of natural wines has exploded over the last decade. The diversity of natural wines on the market means there is so much range when it comes to flavour profiles and tasting notes. Broadly speaking, natural wines have a reputation for being a little funky-



they often feature gamey or earthy notes more prominently than fruity notes and also tend to be fizzy or more textural to their conventional counterparts.

Are 'natural wines' better than conventional wines?

The answer to this question will vary depending on who you ask. Natural wine advocates claim that a lack of additives such as sulphites means natural wines are 'better for you' and won't cause those pesky wine headaches. However, according to the science, there is no evidence to back this up. Ironically, recent research by Wine Master Sophie Parker-Thomson has illustrated the addition of sulphites to wine reduces levels of compounds such as histamine and tyramine that have been linked to the development of migraines. These compounds also act to preserve a wine and make it age-worthy, therefore most recommend that natural wines sans sulphites should be enjoyed young.

So, what's the verdict? When it comes down to it, the best course of action is drink what you love. If vou love the taste of natural winepower to you, if it's not your thingstick to the conventional stuff.

BEEF ENCHILADAS

These little beauties are a weeknight winner the whole family will enjoy. If they like a bit of spice that is. I would rate this a 5/10 on the heat scale as by the time you load up with avocado and sour cream the heat really dies down. You can always reduce the amount of my Creole seasoning too if you want to tone it down a bit for the kids. I'm a huge believer in giving kids a bit of spice to develop their palates.

The beauty of this dish is you can whip up the whole thing in less than 30 minutes.

I love Mexican food. I find it so comforting and delicious, especially when it's cold outside and when you pull these out of the oven you will have plenty of hovering eyes on you. Enchiladas with their spicy, crunchy, gooey cheesy mouthfeel for me, have it all.

When I first went to visit my now wife in her apartment in Bristol, England this was one of the first dinners she made me, and boy was it good. Her "secret ingredient" that really fills out the beef mixture so you can make big, plump, generously stuffed enchiladas that are nice and juicy is refried beans. Old El Paso is my favourite brand.

This home-made enchilada sauce will beat the pants off any store-bought variety. Also make sure you go to the butcher to get your mince, as supermarket mince is way below par. Trust me, you will notice the difference in quality, water release and most of all taste.

Did you know? Most historians agree enchiladas were invented by the ancient Mayan culture. This delicious dish was first associated with the region of Mexico by the Yucatan in pre-Columbian days. Corn tortillas were a staple of the Mayan people and there is evidence to suggest that the first enchiladas were tortillas that had oven roasted fish rolled inside.

The enchilada is also similar to papadzules, a traditional Mayan dish, which also comes from the Yucatan region. In this creation, corn tortillas are coated in pumpkin seeds and then rolled around chopped boiled egg. They are then smothered in tomato-based sauce. This food was only served to the nobles and elites and was mainly eaten on festive occasions.

As the Spanish conquistadors

moved their way across the newfound continent, they diligently documented the wide variety of foods the indigenous people ate. Tortillas, made from flattened corn bread were originally called tlaxcalli (good luck pronouncing that) so the Spanish conquistadors re-named it the tortilla. Throughout the later centuries, the Mexicans continued to refine and reinvent this dish and the enchilada can still be found in a wide variety of cookbooks to this very day. It was first mentioned in a Mexican cookbook published way back in 1831 titled El Cocinero Mexicano, which translates as The Mexican Chef.

You too can be part of this long tradition of Mexican-inspired chefs and add this wonderfully versatile dish to your repertoire. You won't be disappointed

ENCHILADA SAUCE

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 3 tbsp plain flour
- 1 tbs *CREOLE seasoning
- 500ml chicken stock
- 375 ml tomato passata
- 1/4 tsp each salt and pepper

BEEF

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves minced
- 1 brown onion, finely chopped
- 500g beef mince
- 2 tbs *CREOLE seasoning
- 1x 400g can refried beans
- 1x 400g black beans, drained

ENCHILADAS

- 8 tortilla wraps
- 150g grated pizza cheese, or more if you like melted cheese!
- coriander leaves, roughly chopped (garnish)

ENCHILADA SAUCE

- Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add flour and mix to combine into a paste. Cook for 1 minute, stirring constantly.
- Add 125mls of chicken stock, whisk straight away then it will turn into a thick smooth paste very quickly.
- Add remaining chicken stock, passata and 1 tbs *CREOLE, Whisk.
- Increase heat slightly to medium high. Cook for 3 to 5 minutes, whisking every minute or so until the sauce thickens to the consistency of golden syrup. Remove from stove.



FILLING

- Preheat oven to 180°C.
- Heat oil in a fry pan over high heat.
 Add garlic and onion, cook for 2 minutes.
- Add beef mince and cook for 3 minutes, breaking it up as you go. Add 2 tbs *CREOLE.
- Cook for 2 minutes or until completely brown.
- Add refried beans, black beans, about 1/4 cup of Enchilada Sauce and cook for 15 minutes on low stirring occasionally then remove from heat.

ENCHILADAS

- Whack a bit of sauce on the bottom of a baking dish (stops sliding).
- Place filling on the lower third of a tortilla. Roll up then place in the baking dish, seam side down.
 Repeat with remaining filling and tortillas.
- Pour sauce over the enchiladas, top with cheese, bake for 10 minutes covered, then 10 minutes uncovered. Serve hot.
- Serve with avocado, sour cream, your favourite salsa, pickled jalapeños and a cold bottle of Corona (the beer).
