PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES ON THE GOLD COAST

The real story – a story of pride

We've heard so much recently about the challenges facing the health system. Ramping and emergency department (ED) wait times continue to be hot topics of discussion. While the challenges in healthcare are real, politically motivated news stories do not always paint an accurate picture of the worldclass care offered by Gold Coast Hospital and Health Service (GCHHS).

I am concerned that the unrelenting media negativity on public health not only misleads the public, but it can also be demoralising for staff who are absolutely giving of their best and it is this concern that motivates me to write this article. As Chair of GCHHS, I am incredibly proud of our staff, their skills, compassion and dedication and I'm appreciative of the government support we have received.



As a Mount Tamborine resident and Chair of GCHHS since 2012, I believe it is important to put the negative media commentary into context. I will only comment on the public health system on the Gold Coast, which encompasses Gold Coast University Hospital (GCUH), Robina Hospital plus a range of community-based centres. Mt Tamborine is inside the catchment area of Gold Coast Health.

Current media focus is on the need for more health funding. While there is not a major health service

in Australia that would not appreciate additional funding, the increase in investment into the health service since my appointment as Chair of the Board has been extraordinary and should be recognised. The following are the facts:

Between 2012-13 to the current 2022-23 year:

Total annual revenue has increased from \$863 million to about \$2 billion. That's an average of well over \$100 million per year.

- The total number of inpatient beds has increased from 861 to 1,169
- Staff numbers have increased from 5,100 to 8,900 (fulltime equivalent).

In the process, the health service moved from the former Southport location to a \$1.7 billion new hospital, opened a \$200 million Allied Health community facility at Robina, benefitted from a \$275 million Robina Hospital expansion, as well as a day surgery hospital at Varsity Lakes.

Over the next five years, more than 600 beds are scheduled to be added, at an approximate cost to the taxpayer of \$2 billion. This is made up of:

Additional beds to be added between 2022 and end of 2024:

- 72 beds at GCUH
- 40 mental health beds at GCUH
- 114 beds at Robina
- A further 400 beds at Coomera by 2027 in a new \$1.3 billion hospital.

No one could legitimately argue that the Gold Coast has been neglected in relation to government funding support for public health services.

Alongside this very considerable investment and expansion over the past 10 years, a range of clinical services have been added that previously required public patients to travel to Brisbane. Some of these include:

- Radiation Oncology
- Level 6 Cardiac Surgery
- Neonatal Intensive Care
- Nuclear medicine
- Stem Cell Transplants
- Maternal Foetal Medicine Service
- Children's Critical Care Service
- Children's Cardiology Specialist Services
- Children's Hospital in the Home services.

Population growth, declining participation in private health insurance, difficulty in accessing a General Practitioner (GP), and the increased range of clinical services available for Gold Coast public health patients have led to a rapid increase in demand.

Despite the rapid expansion of the health service bed numbers, we still see about 95% bed occupancy rate, and not surprisingly, this leads to delays in admissions. Overwhelmingly, the new services provided are for non-

elective surgery, thus putting pressure on elective surgery wait times.

This is why 600 beds are being added over the next five years.

On average, 160 ambulances arrive at GCUH and Robina Hospital EDs every day. For every patient arriving by ambulance, another two (on average) arrive by private means; in total, an average of 520 presentations per day. It is well known that GCUH has the busiest ED in Australia. Every patient who attends our ED goes through a triage process. Regardless of the method of transport by which a patient arrives, we treat the sickest patients first.

In the past financial year, the health service had more than 190,000 presentations to our EDs. All of the Category 1 (i.e., the sickest) patients were seen within the clinically recommended two-minute time. Our ED staff work hard to ensure that anyone having a medical emergency is provided life-saving treatment and support, and they do a wonderful job.

Media stories often misinterpret what ramping looks like, and as a result, the public assumes it means that patients are forced to wait in the back of an ambulance for care. At Gold Coast Health hospitals, all patients are brought into the hospital, immediately triaged, and kept under the watchful eye of a nurse.

Skilled paramedics stay with the patient until they can be transferred to an appropriate hospital bed or chair for treatment. When you see photos of ambulances "ramped" outside a hospital, please know there are not people languishing in the back of those ambulances at Gold Coast Health hospitals.

Recent media has focused on lengthy waits of patients on stretchers. At times, our EDs experience surges in ambulance arrivals and there can be short delays in transferring patients from the ambulance stretcher on to a bed. By way of example, over the past 10 weeks, the average ambulance handover time was 39 minutes. This is just nine minutes longer than the 30-minute target. Reports of patients waiting on stretchers for five or seven hours are simply not accurate and are usually the result of data errors due to hard-working ambulance staff prioritising their next patient pick-up over the paperwork.

Adding pressure to the hospital system is the diminishing availability of GPs and GPs who bulk bill. In previous decades, more than 40% of medical graduates became GPs; today, only about 14% of medical graduates pursue this as a career choice. Many of those patients who can't get a timely GP appointment end up seeking treatment from a hospital ED.

There is also diminishing private health insurance coverage in our community. Each year, a smaller percentage of people choose to pay for private health insurance, and often, even those who do pay prefer to attend our public hospitals to avoid the gap fee.

As the Board Chair of GCHHS, I'm reminded daily of the crucial role public health services play in caring for the most vulnerable members of our community. Our workforce of nearly 9,000 has shown agility and resilience, on the frontline and behind the scenes, to keep our community informed and safe in one of the most difficult times in living history to be a healthcare worker. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, we have stood up extra services and continued to adapt the care we provide in a rapidly changing environment. Babies have continued to be born, people have continued to sustain traumatic injuries in all sorts of accidents, and patients have still required treatment for the usual array of illnesses and medical emergencies we treat every day.

Each weekday, our clinicians deliver more than 3,280 outpatient appointments. In the past financial year, clinicians

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST ARGUMENTS IN LOCAL GOVERNMENT

I was concerned to see reports of a council resolution not being debated recently because a majority vote of Council (with one councillor absent) put it aside on the basis that all councillors had a conflict of interest on the matter. That conflict, apparently, stemmed from the fact that matters to be debated had been reported on in the media, and some locals had advocated to councillors in a particular way. It seems to me that almost every issue of contention – perhaps even every issue whatsoever – could give rise to such a "conflict". Media write reports. Voters lobby their representatives. That's democracy.

The laws that enabled this "conflict of interest" to stop debate are State laws. Having received correspondence from a number of residents, I will be asking the Minister for Local Government to fix this system.

Our summer can bring storms, floods and bushfires – this past week has been a timely reminder of how hot and dry conditions can lead to perfect conditions for fires in our local environment. Some handy tips for the season include:

- Keep important personal documents such as birth certificates, passports and other legal documents in a handy folder in case you need to evacuate quickly. Scenic Rim Council has in the past provided handy document folders for this purpose.
- Download emergency alert and news apps such as BOM and ABC News and enable push notification services so that you are alerted with weather changes, road closures, and local updates.
- Keep an eye on the weather and changing conditions.
- Back up your data and important information such as contact details and personal photos via the cloud or online services.
- Save emergency phone numbers such as your local Police, Fire, SES teams, friends, and family on your phone and somewhere safe
- Consider buying a phone charger that is not dependent on a power outlet.
- Enable Wi-Fi calling and Wi-Fi SMS (if this works on your phone) so that you can send and receive messages and calls if your mobile network signal is down.
- Make sure your phone is charged.
- If your mobile network is displaying SOS instead of signal bars, you can still call 000 and receive emergency assistance.

provided more than 892,000 specialist and nonspecialist appointments. More than 200,000 inpatient stays were recorded at our facilities.

Additionally, on an annual basis, the health service provides about 200,000 clinical visits to patients in their own homes, rather than having such patients occupy hospital beds.

More than 5,300 babies were born last year at GCUH; an average of 15 births every day. Our Waijungbah Jarjums service is an Australian first, co-designed with the First Nations community to give Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander mums and bubs equity in access to culturally safe, high-quality care during pregnancy. Our Midwifery Group Practice provides continuity of care for mums, from the start of pregnancy through to postnatal care, and recently expanded to include a service specifically for Culturally and Linguistically Diverse families. We are one of only three hospitals in Australia offering Maternal Foetal Medicine screening in the first trimester for the early detection of issues for mother and baby.

Our Interventional Neuroradiology service is known across the globe for its life-saving work with patients who have severe and life-threatening brain aneurysms, stroke, and other serious disorders of the brain and spine. It's one of many innovative services that the health service offers, which has contributed to your local hospitals being recognised for world-class care.

GCUH and Robina Hospital were recently named in Newsweek's 2022 World's Best Hospitals in the World list. Recently, GCUH was named in Newsweek's 2023 World's Best Smart Hospitals – 218 in the world and the fourth best in Australia.

The saleyards have been a place for

social connection in the rural community

since the early 1900s.

BEAUDESERT SALEYARDS DOOMED

The SRRC's legal team has won an appeal against the community action to protect the Beaudesert saleyards from destruction, under the protection of the Qld Heritage Council.

This is at unknown legal cost to the ratepayers, but is at the ratepayer's expense.

This Listing was approved on four points that were relevant for a Heritage building in Australia. And which the judge has now overturned.

One of those points was that it was in continual use, and still in use today.

The Council bowled that one out by not renewing the lease to the auctioneer who conducted the sales.

Another point was its rarity. It is now even more so.

The connection a place has with community is not something an outsider can claim to understand or adjudicate on.

There has been no logical reason given for the removal of the saleyards.

It has been a much-loved, traditional meeting place for locals for over a century.

The fortnightly sales were attended by generations of people, many elderly, who saw this as social event, to catch up with old friends and an opportunity to exchange news.

It has brought business to the town.

More than that, it has given young farm stock a second chance at being adopted and raised in a caring environment, possibly by a kid wanting to learn about farm animals or a family starting a hobby farm.

The importance of these cultural outcomes was not considered.

Saving the Saleyard was the subject of many petitions and appeals to the Mayor, which were ignored, prior to the successful attempt to list it with the Heritage Council.

This was met with jubilation. The Council's decision to appeal was met with disappointment and even disdain.

Yet, a city judge can overturn the Heritage Council's decision.

Just as this judge can overturn our planning scheme and allow 10 cabins to be built on land that occupied core koala habitat trees, or land that is zoned rural residential into a licensed function and tourist attraction.

I trust the SRRC Mayor, Greg Christensen is very pleased with himself.

BINNA BURRA MARKS MILESTONE ON ROAD TO RECOVERY

One of Queensland's most loved tourist destinations has been given a new lease of life, with the completion of new facilities at Binna Burra Lodge, co-funded by the Australian and Queensland governments.

In September 2019, a bushfire ripped through the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Lamington National Park in the Scenic Rim, razing the iconic lodge. It destroyed the main lodge, kitchen, dining room, library, reception and retail areas, along with 42 of its 43 cabins.

\$500,000 was provided to the Scenic Rim Regional Council through the jointly funded State and Commonwealth government Local Economic Recovery Program for the extension of Binna Burra's Tea House deck and construction of showers, toilets, a first aid room and storage areas.

Four safari tents have also been built at the camping ground and a new amenities block – at the base of Mount Roberts.

In addition to the funding awarded to the Scenic Rim Regional Council, an initial \$900,000 was provided to Binna Burra Lodge Ltd as part of a \$2 million Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grant. The grant will be used to build a welcome/reception/admin building and construction of dedicated back-of-house facilities for housekeeping and maintenance.

Federal Minister for Emergency Management Murray Watt (pictured below right with SRRC Mayor Christensen) said he was pleased to see the historic lodge, which has been on the map since 1933, now back on its feet and welcoming guests.

"Binna Burra Lodge is an iconic destination for visitors and locals alike, and it was devastating to see the fire rip through.

"I've stayed at Binna Burra with my own family and I know

how distressing it was for people to see this ecotourism jewel's natural environment destroyed.

"This investment in tourism plays a key role in supporting regional recovery from natural disasters and we will continue to stand with communities as they recover from the devastating 2019-20 bushfire season."

Minister for Environment and the Great Barrier Reef Meaghan Scanlon said last Saturday's milestone achievement is

thanks to the efforts of everyone from the Binna Burra Taskforce, Scenic Rim Regional Council and the Queensland Reconstruction Authority.

"The hard work put in to fast-track Binna Burra Lodge's recovery has paid off and I'm sure it will quickly return to one of Queensland's most iconic tourist attractions," Minister Scanlon said.

"To get to this point, Binna Burra Lodge has undertaken master planning to inform its recovery and restoration needs.



HUMANS AND TREES

I spent some time recently mountain biking in the forests of Derby, Tasmania. Derby is an ex- tin mining town which is now centred on mountain biking. And mountain biking is like an adrenaline fuelled version of yoga. It's yoga on speed:

one pointed focus, great use of core strength and good flexibility is an added bonus. So many things make Tasmania breathtaking: the coastline, the flowers, the sandstone buildings, and the wildlife and of course the trees. Trees of such grandeur and such reverence, these ancient, old growth forests were like stepping into a cathedral filled with wisdom, peace and timelessness.

So why do humans love trees so much, and love being in the presence of trees? Forest bathing, known in Japan as *shinrin yoku*, has made popular the calming effects of being amongst the trees and observing nature. A wonderful way to de-stress and boost health, a big part of the benefits of forest bathing are the phytoncides, volatile organic compounds (VOCs) or "essential oils" given off by trees. These chemicals have natural antimicrobial and insecticidal qualities that protect the tree from germs and parasites. These same chemicals like $\alpha\text{-pinene}$ or d-limonene to name a few, encourage natural killer (NK) cell activity in the human body. NK cells are cancer-fighting proteins in our bodies.

The 1984 Biophilia hypothesis explains mankind's desire to interact with nature and our inherent love for trees and green spaces. This theory has its roots in evolutionary psychology and proposes that environmental pressures have shaped humans to evolve with biological predispositions that draws them to be around natural stimuli. Like forest bathing, the biophilia hypothesis showcases how positive exposure to nature can bring about an abundance of desirable benefits for mankind, such as improved self-esteem, better cardiovascular health and reduction of stress levels.

The opposite also holds true. A lack of interaction between man and nature can negatively impact physical health, mental wellbeing and social wellbeing. Called the nature deficit disorder, a lack of time spent in nature, especially for children, results in a wide spectrum of behavioural problems.

Urban planners use trees to reduce crime in suburban areas. Using the city of Chicago, researchers found that for every 10% increase in tree canopy cover, crime rates went down on average by 10% for assaults, narcotics crimes, robbery and battery. These findings held after controlling for factors like the socioeconomic status, poverty, unemployment, and education of the residents. Why would this be? Well, more trees and more exposure to nature reduces the stress hormone cortisol. Time in nature also enhances oxytocin levels and dopamine. Anxiety decreases and happiness increases. Little wonder humans adore trees and tree-filled spaces and we should all be motivated to protect and revere these giants of the world. For now, and for future generations.

HANDLING THE TRUTH

If you have watched the movie A Few Good Men, you will no doubt recall the iconic court room scene where, under cross examination by Tom Cruise, Jack Nicholson shouts out "You can't handle the truth!" Underlying this statement is an assumption that covering up the ugliness of reality is the honourable thing to do. While it enhances the drama of the movie, when it comes to real life, this assumption creates unwanted drama in relationships.

There are various reasons why people withhold information from those in their inner circle. Parents justifiably need to filter the information they give their kids. Children do not have the cognitive maturity to process adult themes. They do not filter information through the prism of education, socialisation, and life experience as we do. Often times, they blame themselves because they have no other point of reference of why these events occur. Their brains go into emotional overdrive or even shutdown when exposed to the 'uglier' aspects of reality. That's why it's important to protect our children when it comes to what they view on media and the internet.

Exposure to trauma in childhood leads to significant changes in the developing brain. Structural changes alter the size of specific brain regions. A proven structural change that trauma produces is the enlargement of the amygdala, the alarm centre of the brain. This means the brain is constantly alert, wired for danger. Into adulthood it continues to anticipate and be sensitive to any hint of physical or emotional danger, including perceived criticism or rejection. Functional changes in the developing brain alter activity of certain brain regions. These include overproduction of stress hormones in childhood that leads to depletion in adulthood of hormones necessary to tolerate and recover from stressful situations encountered in daily life.


Within adult relationships, sensitivity to a perceived attack combined with a reduced capacity to tolerate a stressful situation is a recipe for unhealthy conflict. It creates an environment where others don't feel free to share their perspective for fear of how it will be received. They believe that the honourable thing to do is to withhold their truth and avoid any drama. This prevents authenticity and creates a barrier that can leave us feeling isolated and alone in our struggles.

If you experienced a traumatic childhood that has left you struggling in your adult relationships, the good news is that change is possible. Previously presumed to represent irreversible damage, neuro-scientific research is discovering that changes to the brain caused by exposure to trauma can be reversed. Trauma-based therapy can support you to create new neural pathways that increase your brain's resilience to threat.

The journey to healthier relationships begins with awareness and understanding of how we are all impacted by our past experiences. Emotions that arise are frequently not about what is happening in our present. Realising your triggers opens opportunity to respond to another's truth in a way that grows understanding and brings a new closeness.

Physio Talk



INFORMATION OVERPOWERS DISTRESS

A few weeks ago, I participated in the annual women's health research update for physiotherapists. Every year that I participate, I am blown away. It's a

lot of time spent sitting at a computer, a lot of concentration and a lot of brand new information to digest and ready to implement at the clinic.

The passion and dedication of the physios working in the women's health field is amazing and it is awesome to know that around the country hundreds of other physios are sitting at home, tuning in and also saying... wow. I always finish these updates exhausted but inspired and feeling eager to pass on all the new information I have just received. This year's research update focused on childbearing and post-partum years. This is an area of women's health that I love, and have been blessed to assist many women with over the past few years.

One research article from this year's update caught my eye as it covered the topic of antenatal education, another one of my favourite things. Maybe surprisingly to some, antenatal education can be a controversial topic in women's health. Historically, there is fear that talking about pelvic floor trauma antenatally can cause undue anxiety, distress or discomfort to a woman who is about to experience childbirth. This fear has led to avoidance and minimising discussion around the potential of injury in childbirth. If pelvic floor injury is to occur this can result in lack of planned and practised coping strategies, deepen distress, belief that significant pelvic floor injury is 'normal', as well as confusion - "why did no one tell me?"

Unfortunately, recent research has found that the rates of significant pelvic floor trauma are actually higher than what is reported and it is now termed a 'hidden epidemic'. When you add that women can also feel blindsided by their injuries or symptoms, to the fact that this is an extremely vulnerable period of their life, it is not surprising that distress may be amplified. Women who reported high levels of difference between their expected and actual birth experience had the strongest associations between pelvic floor and mental health symptoms (you may remember

Bec's recent article on birth trauma).

Gladly though, it's not all doom and gloom. This study showed that while not all pelvic floor injuries can be completely avoided, antenatal pelvic floor education

is key, and significant in reducing risk and mitigating distress if it does occur. This is great news and counters the approach that information begets fear. If we can provide information focused on the pelvic floor during pregnancy and discuss potential for birth-related injury we can improve overall well-being of those affected across the fourth trimester.

Women's health physiotherapists like Bec and myself can provide individualised education and advice to women regarding pregnancy, labour, delivery and reducing the risk of pelvic floor trauma. Having the information and knowledge to make an informed decision is a critical aspect of having a positive birth experience and receiving this information with the absence of alarm is crucial. Even postnatally there are many options to reduce symptoms, manage injury, prevent long-term issues and even just chat through the birth. 












The Repair Café Tamborine Mountain which operates in the TMCCA Shed down the driveway at 42 Southport Avenue, Eagle Heights is fully functioning, and can assist you repair, rebuild, refinish, refurbish your favourite piece of furniture/wooden object, handbag, bicycle, clothing/textile/beads, even sharpen your knives/secateurs...

The concept of the Repair Café was initiated in the Netherlands in 2009 by Martine Postma, an Amsterdambased journalist/publicist. Funding to start this initiative was provided by successful grant applications through the Gambling Community Benefit Fund which funded a new shed/workshop to operate from, and the Federal Government Stronger Communities Program which has funded fit out of the shed with workbenches and storage facilities. BEST HUMMUS EVER

This dreamy, creamy hummus is lusciously light, with bright zingy lemon, a little bite of garlic, cracked pepper, finished with fluffy nutty tahini and extra virgin olive oil.

My hummus is silky smooth, and pairs perfectly, smeared generously over warm pitta bread, toasted Turkish bread, or use it as a dip, with fresh raw carrot sticks or as a snack with some sea-salted crackers. However you use it, rest assured this is the only hummus recipe you will ever need.

Did you know? Hummus is the Arabic word for chickpea. Chickpeas have been around for thousands of years due to being one of the earliest crops grown in Mesopotamia and which was commonly eaten on the streets of Ancient Rome. Greek philosophers Plato and Socrates even made reference in their writings to hummus and how nutritious it is. Modern nutritionists tend to agree, and have found them to be low in fat and yet high in protein, and chickpeas have huge amounts of dietary fibre. They are also rich in minerals, vitamins, B vitamins especially, and amino acids as well as manganese.

Chef Dylan tips. 1. The chef secret is to 'overcook' the canned chick peas until super tender but not too mushy though. 2. Baking soda raises the pH of the water which helps break down the chickpeas for a delightfully smooth purée. 3. Rinsing the chickpeas after cooking removes the baking soda flavour and stops your hummus getting a film on top. 4. Use ice cold water. 5. Allow the lemon and garlic to sit for 10 minutes, as this takes the sharp heat out of the raw garlic. 6. Buy good quality tahini.

Memory Lane – Surfeit Café – Cronulla, Sydney 2003

I pull the docket from the rail and place it next to the plate of the last order for the morning and ring the little bell which lets the waiters know food is ready to leave the kitchen. It's 11am, which means I have 3 hours to start getting the prep done for the next day. I pick up my clipboard and glance at my long list. The first cab off the rank is my version of hummus. The kitchen door swings open, and the owner Megan comes swanning in — she is in a good mood, and is wearing a beautiful smile.

She picks up the plate, and as she spikes the docket, she turns to me and says "The customers have really been enjoying your food since you took over, Dylan". "Thanks Megan" I say, cheeks blushing red. "Can I have a quick chat in the office once you deliver those plates please?" I say softly. "Sure" she says, now with the smile gone "You'd better not be leaving me." she adds half-jokingly, but her eyes say she is serious. She returns and opens up the office and waves me in. As I sit down, I can

feel my heart racing and my palms are sweaty. I try to wipe them on my pants, but they clam straight back up again.

Megan takes a seat. She can tell I'm nervous. "Ok, don't just sit there like a church mouse. Spit it out. What do you need to talk to me about, Dylan?" I clear my throat and try to speak, but nothing comes out; looking down at the floor I cough again "Well umm, I've ahhhh, as you know, I've been working here as the head chef for the last 3 months". "Yes, go on" says Megan. "Well ahh, it has gotten a lot busier and ummm, well you see I'm still on a 3rd year apprentice wage". "Yes, that's right". "Well I was thinking that since I have a bit more responsibility now and people seem to like the few tweaks I've made to the recipes". "Uh huh".

My is heart pounding it feels like it's about to explode... "I was thinking I could get a pay rise". "A pay rise!" she says surprised". "Well. I don't know about that, it's a pretty tight ship at the moment. What sort of a rise are you thinking?" I take a deep breath, this is it. The moment I have been dreading. "Say, 50 dollars a week?" I mutter. "50 more a week!" she says raising her eyebrows. "Ok well, let me talk to my sister, I should be able to let you know tomorrow. Is there anything else?". "No that's it" I say rising to leave. "Ok then, I'll let you know tomorrow". "Thanks Megan". As I close the office door I feel relieved, like the world has just been lifted off my shoulders. I go to the store room to get the food processor out to start making the hummus.

Makes 2 cups Prep time 5 min, Cook time 20 mins

Ingredients

- 1x 400g can chickpeas, rinsed and drained.
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- lemon juice from 1 ½ to 2 lemons,
- 1 medium clove garlic, roughly chopped
- 1 tsp Spartan*
- 1/2 cup good quality tahini
- 2 to 4 tablespoons ice water, more as needed
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 4 tbs tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
 *Chef Dylan's Gourmet Food Co. Spartan

Method

- Place the chickpeas in a medium saucepan and add the baking soda. Cover the chickpeas by several cms of water then bring the mixture to a boil over high heat.
- 2. Reduce to low and continue gently boiling for 20 minutes (or until the chickpeas look bloated, their skins are falling off, and



they're quite soft).

- Drain the chickpeas in a strainer and run cold water over them for about 30 secs to a minute then set aside to drain excess water.
- 4. Meanwhile, in a food processor whack in the lemon juice, garlic and Spartan.
- Process until the garlic is very finely chopped then let the mixture rest so the garlic flavour can mellow, at least 10 minutes.
- 6. Add the tahini in next and blitz up on high until the mixture is thick and creamy, stopping every now and then to scrape down any tahini stuck to the sides and bottom of the processor.
- 7. Keep the food processor running and carefully drizzle in 2 tbs ice water. Scrape down the food processor, and blend until the mixture is ultra-smooth, pale and creamy. (If your tahini was extra-thick to begin with you might need to add 1-2 tablespoons more ice water.)
- 8. Add the cumin and the drained, cooled extra soft chickpeas and blitz till smooth.
- While blending, drizzle in the olive oil. Blend until the mixture is super smooth, scraping down the sides of the processor as necessary ~2 minutes. Add more ice water by the tablespoon if necessary to achieve a super-rich and ultra-creamy texture.
- Taste, and adjust as necessary I always add another ¼ teaspoon of Spartan for more overall flavour (because us chefs love seasoning) and another tablespoon of lemon juice for extra zing.
- Scrape the hummus into a serving bowl or platter and use a spoon to create nice swooshes on top.
- Top with garnishes of your choice and serve. Any leftover hummus keeps well in the fridge in an airtight container for up to 1 week.

Local resident Janis Bailey wrote a splendiferous play in her honour entitled "M for Mabel", which was performed at the Zamia in 2021.

From Mabel to Jo Morgan, who created The Mountain's original fairy shop; 'Flights of Fancy', on Gallery Walk. Jo's shop is remembered as a favourite for patrons of all things 'fairy'. Kristy Starbright was blessed to have worked and trained under Jo, in Wing and Wand Making. This magic is now displayed at Objects D'Art Fairy Studio, which we must say... "Only opens up on Fairy Time."
