# AMENDED SCENIC RIM COUNCIL PLANNING SCHEME 2020 TO BE PRESENTED TO MINISTER FOR REVIEW

A draft major amendment to the *Scenic Rim Planning Scheme 2020* endorsed at Council's Ordinary Meeting on December 6 will be submitted for approval for adoption by the Minister for State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning.

The draft amendment covers a range of planning issues across the region, and received 28 submissions during the community consultation between 18 May and 3 July 2022, although nearly 100 matters were raised in the consultation process.

Submissions were considered, and resulted in a number of improvements to the amendment items, which included:

- facilitation of small-scale craft breweries and distilleries in the Minor Tourism Zone, Township and Centres Zones;
- enabling of groundwater extraction in the Tamborine Mountain Rural Precinct to support opportunities for the provision of bulk water, strictly for domestic purposes only;
- amendments to the Dual Occupancy provisions in the Low and Low-medium Density Residential Zones to enhance amenity and neighbourhood character;
- enabling of sub-division of land in the Rural Zone where it is dissected by a State-controlled Road in limited circumstances, and
- inclusion of an administrative map and definition for the existing Mountain Community area defined in the

Planning Scheme to more clearly define the land where the special outcomes that seek to protect the unique qualities of Tamborine Mountain in the Planning Scheme apply.

At the request of Cr Derek Swanborough, it was moved to change the 'Mountain Community' definition to 'Tamborine Mountain Community' in order to better represent the mapped area in the Scheme.

Amendments were meant to align with Council's commitment to the community, in order to ensure that the Planning Scheme remains current and reflects the changing region.

"A strong campaign to encourage feedback was promoted through Council's *Let's Talk Scenic Rim* online community engagement platform," said Mayor Christensen.

"Let's Talk Scenic Rim enabled members of the community to provide properly made submissions, and its ready availability of supporting information, including a Fact Sheet, provided the key information needed to inform their decision.

"Council's Strategic Planning team reviewed all 28 submissions and have used the information to make recommendations, which we will now submit to the Minister, so that the proposed amendment can be adopted in line with the *Planning Act 2016* and the Minister's guidelines and rules."

Aiden looks forward with enthusiasm to a successful career in the law.



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
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# **OUR TALENTED** YOUNGSTERS

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
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# TRAVELLING PLACES with Gina

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# UPGRADES REDUCING OUR CARBON FOOTPRINT AT ST BERNARD STATE SCHOOL

A recent necessary upgrade of our water resources

at St Bernard State School led to the investigation of how we could better utilise updated technologies as we upgraded our facilities across the school.

As the school is not connected to a reticulated water supply, like all properties on the Mountain, the school relies on tanks and a bore for its water requirements.



As our bore pump at

the school required an upgrade, the decision was made to investigate the use of wind and solar to power the pump, which is located a significant distance from the school buildings. Rather than digging a significant amount of trenching and laying a large amount of copper cable, a green energy solution was sourced instead.

Students will also utilise this station as a component of their sustainability studies at the school. They will be able to monitor and track the power output that the wind and solar panel generates through a remote app connected to the 'green energy' station, and analyse its effectiveness at any time of the day. They can then relate this to the weather of the day, and how wind and sunshine might increase or reduce the power output of the station.



If you drive along Siganto Drive, you will see our new wind turbine and solar power station standing tall at the end of the oval. This has reduced our carbon footprint, will add a realworld experience for our students in their science studies and will allow the school to still access water if there is a power outage across the Mountain.

# **COURT AWARDS COSTS**

SRRC utilised Delegated Authority to file an application for a costs Order against both the Tamborine Mountain Progress Assn Inc and myself personally in the matter of SDA Property Nominees Pty Ltd -v- SRRC & Others (the Eagles Retreat Place "Disability Cabins" appeal). The decision of 09 December 2022 is that we are each to pay 50% of Council's and the Appellant's (developer's) costs PLUS the costs of seeking a costs Order. Council had sought a "jointly or severally" award which meant that if one could not pay partially or in full, the liability fell partially or entirely on the other.

Time for a review of Council's Delegations Register perhaps?

As Cr Enright stated in the Ordinary Meeting of 25 October 2022, in relation to Council seeking the costs order (ie after it had already been done), "I think given the circumstances it is reasonable to progress this action for the benefit of all our ratepayers". Commendable indeed – but where was this noble stance when Council had the opportunity to seek a costs order against the Developer/Appellant in December 2021 for its waste of 8 weeks of court time and the legal expenses incurred by Council (ratepayers)? The Judge in that matter made scathing comments and the following quotation reference in his decision in favour of TMPA Inc: "Wetting the saliva of lawyers with one hand on the guillotine can only frustrate rather than meet the ends of justice" and made the comment that '.....[8] The TMPA seeks such a relief to the extent it requires it and the appellant's counsel sensibly obtained instructions not to oppose such relief. I can think of few stronger cases for the exercise of the discretion" and yet Council did not pursue a costs order against the Appellant.

In fact, I doubt that the option to do so was ever raised by Council's legal representatives with its bureaucrats, let alone our Councillors for a vote. Delegated Authority was not utilised in that instance, yet Council incurred legal costs for which it could have sought recovery. Precedent case: <a href="https://www.queenslandjudgments.com.au/caselaw/">www.queenslandjudgments.com.au/caselaw/</a> qpec/2019/9 Sincere International Group Pty Ltd v Council of the City of Gold Coast [2018] QPEC 53. I mentioned this in the evidence I gave under oath.

A level playfield? Perhaps not, but that is what we have come to expect from the current regime.

I suggest that the actual costs not pursued or recovered in that part of the appeal be deducted from the total of the as yet to be determined quantum of costs against us. This would seem to be the ethical and moral way forward, yet I have a "suspicion" that this may not go down well with some Councillors.

You seem to react badly to any dissent from your view of how things in the Scenic Rim should be run. It appears that you try to silence Cr Swanborough by continually referring him to the Office of the Independent Assessor in what can only be described as a vexatious and frivolous attempt to sidetrack and politically emasculate him. For those not in the know, Mayor Christensen seems hell-bent on crushing two other sources of dissent in the Scenic Rim. These are the 107-year-old Tamborine Mountain Progress Association (TMPA), which provides a conduit by which concerned ratepayers can voice objections to Council's often ill-considered decisions, and a very articulate Ms Amanda Hay who, on occasion, altruistically represents a number or other ratepayers at proceedings in the Planning and Environment Court.

In what can be described as an outrageous attempt to (a), have TMPA disbanded, and (b), bankrupt Ms Hay (and therefore be made ineligible to nominate for Council elections), the Scenic Rim Council is pursuing an award of court costs, which could amount to many, many thousands of dollars, for their participation in a recent Planning and Environment court case where they represented a great number of adversely affected Tamborine Mountain residents. Costs awarded would become a dangerous precedent and deterrent for any citizen who tries to go against a guestionable decision by Council.

Truly reinforcing the concept that one can obtain only as much justice as one can afford... This pursuit of costs against TMPA and Ms Hay, and not against the developer, makes the bias and vindictiveness of Council's actions glaringly apparent.

Both Ms Jeanette Lockey (president of TMPA) and Ms Hay have been nominated for an Australia Day award for selfless service to their community, and for Council (perceived as directed by Mayor Christensen) to try to silence and render impotent these two courageous women is an abomination! I say once again, Mayor Christensen, GET OUT OF THE KITCHEN.

## **COUNCIL AT IT AGAIN**

I attended the Scenic Rim Regional Council Meeting on 6 December. As seems to be the norm for the Gallery these days, I came away angry and depressed. How could our Council Meetings have been permitted to sink into dysfunction for so long and so deeply? Inevitably, serious doubts arise about the whole organisation. The State Government only now promising an advisor.

There was a small but very significant incident at the start of the Meeting. Council's new Chief Executive Officer will play a critical role as Manager of the whole Administrative arm of the SRRC. The Mayor had delayed the appointment of a new CEO for months. At long last, the new CEO, Mr David Keenan, was attending his first SRRC Meeting. The Mayor failed to formally introduce Mr Keenan to the Councillors or the Gallery. Not a good start.

The first couple of hours of the meeting saw Mayoral manoeuvring to have Councillors barred from voting on a matter, due to his suspicion (and that is all it takes) that they had a conflict of interest due to bias. He seems to overlook that, by strongly supporting his own views, he is, by his own standards, clearly biased. This unaffordable nonsense has gone on for months. Where is the advisor?

The Councillors finally got down to meaningful business. There was a major item in the Agenda detailing twenty proposed amendments to the Planning Scheme. Some time ago, these appeared in Draft form for public comment. A report by Council officers reviewing the submissions was placed before Councillors, with a recommendation all be adopted. Now this is very serious stuff that can have highly significant consequences. Surely, each amendment justified discussion before applying the rubber stamp. Only two of the twenty got any mention at all. Both relate to Tamborine Mountain.

One amendment concerned Ground Water Extraction on Tamborine Mountain for Water Supply. It was confirmed that off-Mountain was included but there was limitation on delivery to wholesale water suppliers, whatever that is. Restraints on putting down new bores were greatly relaxed, but there was no consideration of the sustainability of the resource. When it was pointed out that there is a long running study by QUT, the response that applicants could be given an exemption in the meantime. I can't work that one out. Also, some applications are to be ode rather than Impact Assessable. It was believed that that Council Officers could better identify impacts than those who would actually suffer the impacts! Regrettably, there was no motion for revision.

The other amendment proposed change of a definition from 'Mountain Community' to "Tamborine Mountain Community.' Sounds innocuous, but it manages to wipe out any name or identity of our Plateau Town. We would be absorbed in nameless anonymity into an area extending from the back fences of Tamborine Village, to the North and East of the Shire, to the back fences of Canungra and even touch Mundoolun Connection Road. A weird dismissal of a town housing 20% of the Shire's population while isolated on a mountain top. At least Councillors agreed that that one should be looked at again.

Merry Christmas to all with hope for a happier Scenic Rim next year.

# COOK ROAD DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION



Perspective view of proposed development from Cook Rd

A development application for Short Term Accommodation at the corner of Eagle Heights Road and Cook Road is currently before Council. Whilst it is near Gallery Walk, the developer (DAT Property Investments) is seeking a Material Change of Use (rezoning) in the Minor Tourism Zone of the Scenic Rim

Planning Scheme. Because this development is three storied, it is Impact Assessible and is currently open for public comment.

The block is just over half an acre. The twelve unit complex proposed will contain four two bedroom units and eight one bedroom units. There is also a meeting room or function facility on the ground floor. This is accessible to guests but it is not intended for rental for any functions independent of the guests.

This suggests it could be used as yet another wedding venue. At last count we already had twenty-six such formal venues on the mountain. That is not counting the many other sites that are used for such events from time to time

Access to the complex for short time parking (four spaces) is from Eagle Heights Road whilst the main parking (13 spaces) is from Cook Road. Pedestrian access is from Eagle Heights Road.

With town planning advice, TMPA includes (at right) a pro forma listing some basic planning points which raise issues with this development. Serious concerns have been raised by residents of Eaglebrook, immediately below the subject site and other residents may be concerned with the over-development of the site.

Particulars for submissions and how to lodge are listed in the pro forma on page 13. These need to be in to Council by Friday, 16th December.

# Re: Development Application MCU22/088 – Short Term Accommodation and Function Facility, 84-86 Eagle Heights Rd., Tamborine Mountain

I wish to object to the above development application for the following reasons:

- The proposed development is an overdevelopment of the site. The scale of development, building size and dimensions are inconsistent with that elsewhere in the Minor Tourism Zone. The site is on the outer extent of the Minor Tourism Zone and is not complementary in scale and appearance to nearby residential areas.
- The septic absorption treatment plan does not achieve necessary setbacks from the downhill property boundary.
- The height viewed from Cook Road exceeds the 8 meter limit. The approximately 9.5m building height is clearly visible from Cook Road. The built form is immense and lacking diversity in building character, as an unbroken wall of considerable length and height.

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
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## **CHRISTMAS 2022**

Christmas is upon us. so exciting! And digging through my old posts from this time last year (so I don't repeat my favourite Christmas topics: shopping locally, connecting with loved ones and walking the middle path) I realised that on the 17/12/21, Australia was forced into a two-tiered society. Those of pro-choice status had many of their civil rights removed: barred from

At \$5 trillion dollars, this is the biggest surge in billionaire wealth since records began, and this is the biggest transfer of wealth from the common man to the world's richest people. In 2022, Moderna and Pfizer are expected to make \$64bn (USD) from COVID vaccines alone which we, the world taxpayer, will pay for. Considering the 2022 GDP in

Burundi is expected to reach \$3bn (USD), do you notice the disparity in wealth distribution?

In the world of yoga we are encouraged to embrace tolerance and uncertainty. We attempt to confront the apartheid of our beliefs. As we get to know our dark and light sides, we learn to accept the differences of others. # XMAS CAN BE A DANGEROUS TIME FOR DOGS





Xmas is typically a busy time of year at emergency veterinary hospitals when dogs consume items or food they should not have, whether given by someone, stolen or scavenged left overs. Even the Xmas tree is a cause for a few vet visits, with tummy upsets from chewing pine needles, bowel obstruction after eating tinsel, baubles, ornaments, wrapping and ribbon. Electrocution is a risk if Xmas tree lights are chewed.

Typical Xmas plants such as poinsettias, lilies, cactus, berries, holly leaves and mistletoe are all poisonous. Swallowed batteries can be very dangerous, a common emergency with young children.

Food overindulgence and pancreatitis – just a little bit of Xmas foods can't hurt, right? Well, a little here and there adds up. Eating too much of something outside the dog's normal diet, especially if high in fat, is a very common cause of illness. Overindulgence can cause stomach pain, vomiting, diarrhoea and pancreatitis, which often requires hospitalisation, and can be fatal. Some of the worst offenders are:

**Alcohol** – this is a no-brainer as there is no safe amount, including food products containing alcohol. It can cause vomiting and diarrhoea and lead to abnormal blood acidity, coma and death.

**Ham** – is high in fat and salt.

Onions & Garlic – if eaten to excess, they can cause issues with a dog's red blood cells, which may lead to anaemia

Raisins, grapes, sultanas – can cause vomiting and in severe cases kidney failure. It is unknown what constituent is so toxic.

**Cooked bones** – only give dogs raw bones, because cocked bones are brittle and can splinter, causing internal damage and intestinal obstruction. Don't underestimate your scavenger pooch; a BBQ should not be left unattended, scraps and fat removed.

**Xylitol** – a sweetener found in lollies, gum and some baked goods. It can cause a drop in a dog's blood sugar and lead to hypoglycaemia (dangerously low blood sugar).

**Chocolate** – the darker the chocolate the more dangerous because of theobromine, which can cause abnormal heart rhythm, tremors and seizures.

Macadamia nuts – may cause vomiting, tremors, hyperthermia, in severe cases paralysis. Most nuts including, almonds, pecans and walnuts contain high amounts of oils which can cause vomiting and diarrhoea in dogs and that can escalate to dehydration and electrolyte imbalance.

# **GIFT GIVING**

This time of year brings joy and anticipation but also stress. A common stress is the decision of what to buy for loved ones. There's valid reasons why we feel this pressure. We want to clearly communicate our love and appreciation through our gift giving. Gift exchanges reveal how people think about others, what they value and enjoy, and how they build and maintain relationships. Much research has been conducted on the various aspects of gift giving and receiving. There is, in fact, a whole area of psychology dedicated to the subject of how gifts affect relationships.

When we give a gift, we generally have two goals. The first is to make the recipient happy and the second is to strengthen the relationship between giver and recipient. It may seem obvious, but if you want to make someone happy, give them a gift they would buy for themselves. People sometimes use gifts as jokes, encouragement to change one's ways or to signal something about themselves. These types of gifts rarely bring happiness to the giver.

Relationships are strengthened by a thoughtful gift that communicates 'I know you'. Successful gift-giving is a result of spending time really getting to know the person. Often, it is a lack of intimate knowledge that keeps us in the dark as to what to give. Knowing what someone is like is different to knowing what they would like to receive. You could assume that someone who is into gardening would appreciate a plant but spending time with them might reveal other interests or dreams to pursue a new hobby. Rather than focusing on a gift that matches someone's stable traits, think about the person's multiple varying wants and needs.

Research has found little correlation between the monetary value of the gift and recipient's happiness. It is the thoughtfulness of the gift that counts. Even a gift card can communicate that you know where their favourite things can be found and you want them to have the pleasure of selecting exactly what they like best.

Research also shows that money spent on doing provides more enduring happiness than money spent on having. Giving an experience produces greater improvements in relationship strength than material gifts, regardless of whether the gift is consumed together. According to research, the relationship improvements that recipients derive from experiential gifts stem from the emotion that is evoked when the gifts are consumed, rather than when the gifts are received. Experiences create anticipation, making the days or weeks leading to the event more pleasurable. The event itself can create long lasting memories and emotional attachment.

The most precious gift you can give this Christmas is the gift of yourself. Spend quality time with your loved ones. Sit down, have a conversation and get to know each other more deeply. If you do that well, come next Christmas you'll both know exactly what gift to get each other. Have a blessed season, stay safe and look out for one another.



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# CREOLE CHRISTMAS **PRAWNS**

With Christmas Day steadily approaching, these spicy, southern-style king prawns charred nicely on the BBQ, with a zesty lime mayonnaise, are the easy way to add some soulful seafood to this year's Christmas entertaining.

Adding seafood to Christmas for a lot of us has become a family tradition, just like mangoes and cherries, and for a lot of us, prawns are high on the list and are by far one of my favourite ingredients to use. It takes on flavour well, and the abundance at this time of year means you can get them fresh. Head straight to your local seafood guy and ask for Mooloolaba king prawns. They are large, fresh and are perfect for this dish. Fresh banana prawns or tiger prawns will also work.

Did you know? The ancient tradition of eating fish on Christmas Eve is thought to have come from the Roman Catholic custom of abstinence from meat and dairy products on the eve of certain holidays, including Christmas. After the 16th century in Britain however, the seafood meal associated with Christmas Eve as a traditional Catholic fast day had totally declined, and the festival became a decidedly meatoriented affair. Be assured, fish had no defined role in the menus destined for a Christmas feast the British brought with them to Australia, but rather it was roast fowl, beef and ham which dominated Christmas tables for almost 200 years. Noticeable change did not begin to be seen until the early 1980s; it started to really gather some pace in the 1990s, as an Australian culinary identity developed, increasing in confidence and which embraced new flavours. Also, the influx of post-war migrants, especially from the Mediterranean, helped shape change. too: bringing not just their love and delight of seafood-filled traditional food, but which also taught us lessons in the art of cooking and eating outdoors.

Chef Dylan's tips: The important thing to ensure is that the prawns are fresh, so whilst at the fishmonger, be sure to look at the head of the prawn for signs of any black stains; if that's all clear, then simply ask the fishmonger if you can have a quick smell of one. Don't worry, you won't look silly, you are not the only person who likes fresh seafood, which means they get asked all the time - moreover, the fishmonger will admire your dedication to fresh produce.



Prawns should smell slightly sweet and remind you of a day by the beach. As always, trust your

## Serves 4, prep 20 mins, cook 8 mins Ingredients

- 16 king prawns peeled deveined and butterflied
- 2 tbs Creole\*
- 3 tbs Oil
- Zest of 1 lime
- Juice of 1 lime
- 8 tbs Whole egg mayonnaise
  - \* Chef Dylan's Gourmet Food Co. Creole marinade

## Method

- In a large bowl big enough to hold all the prawns mix Creole with the oil and coat prawns evenly.
- Leave to marinate for 20 mins.
- To make the mayonnaise dipping sauce simply add the whole egg mayonnaise, the zest and the lime juice to a bowl and mix until combined.
- Heat the BBQ grill to high until the grill is nice and hot. Turn down to medium heat and then cook prawns on one side until opaque, a few minutes or so. Turn with some tongs to continue to cook for another minute or so until just cooked.
- Serve with the dipping sauce.
