

of black and white artwork. He worked for many years as a political, editorial and strip cartoonist for major newspapers, was a three-time finalist in the Walkley Awards and, in recent years has built upon his foundation skills of life drawing to transition into printmaking etching and drypoints.

Carol Forster has been a professional ceramic artist for over 25 years. She has exhibited in China, Korea, Japan and Croatia, as well as extensively in Australia. Her work is held in multiple public and private exhibitions worldwide.

This exhibition, "Inspired by Nature", is influenced by her love of nature. Time spent observing the minutiae of forest life is replicated on her ceramics using a variety of techniques, including relief printing.

Carol lives on the Sunshine Coast but has a deep connection with Tamborine Mountain. Carol's aunt, Pamela Mary Crawford, was an artist and founding member of the Miya Studio in Brisbane. She married the playwright and Communist Party member, James Crawford (Jim) on 22 December 1949, and they settled on Tamborine Mountain after buying several acres of land on the corner of Lahey and Long Road, (now known as Crawford's Corner). Enterprising people, Pam and Jim lived in the converted box that their VW car arrived in while they built their modest, four-room home, according to family lore. Pam became a member of the Queensland Women's Historical Association in 1977 and, upon her death in 1997, Pam bequeathed her house and land to The Mount Tamborine Historical Society in the hope that her land would be preserved. It is now a

BANG THE TABLE

Dear Reader,

A number of you have kindly reached out over the last months asking what has happened to my column.

In short, I have been challenged by a few life experiences that have included family health, work commitments, and lo and behold, a direct intrusion into our lives by none other than Council. The latter being addressed by an Ombudsman investigation into Council and which will hopefully be concluded at the end of August. I will speak further on this matter once the investigation is finalised.

Enough of my woes, let's turn to you, the people of the Scenic Rim, and some of your issues. No doubt you will have received your rates notice and will be forced to write a hefty cheque to Council, handing over hard-earned money in exchange for municipality services.

The first question you would ask: are my rates being applied to services the community needs? Are they being applied effectively, and are they efficiently deployed?

Council during their budgetary process introduced what they called a "community budget consultation" whereby Council claims they are on an "ongoing journey towards becoming a more customer-focused organisation, that values and responds to community feedback".

Yet, the draft summary budget put up during the "consultation period", which came with a suggested 'around 8% overall rate increase' appeared to be identical to the budget handed down.

By my observations, I could not find anyone remotely interested in an 8% increase, and who were far from satisfied with the proposed works given the past history of not delivering projects on time, or on budget, with special regard to around \$75m in capital underspend. This underspend will be carried forward, and a great many projects will be incomplete from the previous year's budget... as this underspend has occurred in the budget before.

How can Council ask for more money when not delivering in previous years? Quite simply, a budget increase should not be built around CPI (inflation) or complaints of other funding sources such as Federal Grants drying up. A major component of formulating budgets should be around past delivery i.e., the question to be asked is: have you completed all works forecasted in the previous years, and what is the capability and likelihood of delivering what is proposed going forward?

In terms of waste and efficiency, there is zero transparency by this Council in determining whether or not we are getting any bang for our buck! A simple example is the wage and staff bill – around \$37m. How many? How often? Capability? Delivery? More simply put – one big black hole.

Not so long ago I stumbled across a SRRC survey titled "How Easy Is It To Do Business With Us".

There were 21 questions ranging across various subjects from Waste Services to Council-run events. The first five questions related to age, gender, ethnicity and connection to the Scenic Rim. As a sample question, Question 19 reads: "From recent experience, how easy was it to interact with us using the following methods?" To answer, tick boxes followed, offering a range from Very Easy to Very Difficult for varying services – telephone, email, Face to face, Let's Talk Scenic Rim (platform) etc.

I can only say: "If the telephone is not ringing, it is Council calling!"

My understanding of this style of survey is that it's generated by a programme that offers a range of services provided by a company/ organisation called "Bang The Table" see **www.bangthetable.com**. It is also my understanding that we are paying thousands of dollars in a paid subscription for this software service.

Councillors: are you serious? We are not Brisbane CC, with millions of constituents... we are only 40,000 people living in a regional setting. Councillors: paying private consultants or using a paid subscription for a senseless survey is one inefficiency wasting thousands of dollars a year. How many more senseless court cases, private consultants or paid-for subscription surveys are there? Residents are not informed, and these outgoings could ultimately add up to hundreds of thousands, if not millions. Councillors: *Please Stop Wasting Our Money!*

People of The Scenic Rim: I think it is time YOU banged the Council table!

clark granger DESIGNING THE PERFECT SWIMMING POOL

It is widely known that swimming pools have become a fundamental aspect of the Australian outdoor lifestyle, with roughly 2.7 million Australian households possessing a swimming pool. In fact, Australia builds more domestic swimming pools per capita than any other country in the world.



Therefore, if you have plans of constructing your own backyard oasis, I have put together a few tips and trends that you can draw inspiration from to optimise your investment.

Now obviously here on the mountain you would be advised to heat your pool to

maximise its use throughout the year. Hey, when I lived in Cairns, I heated the pool to 30 degrees, almost warm enough to make a cup of tea. Ideally, the pool should be in a sunny spot that receives at least six hours of direct sunlight per day, as this will help keep the water warm and reduce heating costs. A cover would also be a good idea. If you don't mind going a bit out there, darker shades and tones can make your pool more sustainable, as dark tiles absorb heat from the sun, naturally warming the water 5 –10 degrees more than light-coloured pool tiles. Dark pool tiles will add dramatic aesthetic value to a pool's design: think black, dark grey, and dark blue for a chic, modern take on outdoor design.

With so many acreage lots and magnificent views, an infinity edge is an obvious choice, but if you're looking for a cheaper option, consider a blade edge. This will give you the feel of an infinity edge, without the price. A tiled blade edge creates a stunning visual line between the water and the horizon. These tiled edges are very cost-effective and a very clever design feature to add that extra bit of 'wow' factor to any pool project.

What's in a tile?

There are a lot of natural factors that can change the appearance and colour of the water in your pool. The water will look different first thing in the morning compared to later in the afternoon because of how the sun hits the surface. Additionally, landscaping around the pool can cast shadows on different parts of the water to change the overall colour, and even the deep end is likely to have a hue that varies from the shallow side.

However, the biggest way to change the water's appearance is to choose a pool finish with a unique hue. Traditionally, pool interiors and liners were either white or blue. However, you no longer need to limit yourself to just those two colours to achieve your perfect pool.

- If you want water that looks bright and spring clean, choose a light grey liner.
- For blue water that is translucent or crystalline, go with an interior tile or liner that's pale blue or shades of white.
- Accent the natural design of your pool with green, tan, or brown colours that will create soft green tones in the water.
- For a deeper blue, choose a dark blue liner or tile.
- For that classic turquoise pool? Beige or cream interiors reflect the light to create turquoise water.

Striking colour contrasts are a massive trend in pool design in 2023, notably checkers and stripes. The stark contrast between colours can create interesting geometric patterns and emphasise the scale of the pool. Factor in refracting light from the pool water, and you have a genuinely captivating swimming pool design. Even patterned pool tiles are making a comeback. Think Moroccan 'Zellij' tiles in dazzling repeats, and you have a more unique pool design giving strong Mediterranean styling notes to any project.

If you are feeling brave, the retro trend is for you. Combine colours like turquoise, mint, and pink in bold, geometric patterns for a modern vintage look that creates a classic yet trendsetting pool design. Perhaps due to 'Barbie Mania', pink tiles are trending, from kitchens to bathrooms to fireplaces, and pools aren't any exception. Pink tiles are just stunning and



give pools a boutique 1950's motel character.

For the less bold of you, mix and match may be the trend for you. This trend combines different tile finishes and sizes to create a unique look in your pool area, mixing tiles of the same colour with different textures or patterns for an eye-catching design.

Whatever direction you go with when selecting pool tiles, there are a few things to consider:

- Pool tiles come in various shapes, sizes, colours, and finishes. Make sure to choose pool tiles that complement the overall scale and style of your pool. Don't forget that the pool should also be in harmony
- As pool tiles experience constant exposure to pool chemicals, water, and accessories, ensure you choose high-quality, durable tiles that will withstand the wear and tear of pool use.
- Select a non-porous and slip-resistant pool tile to ensure safety and easy maintenance.
- Consider choosing a matte finish instead of a glossy one, as this will offer a better grip when wet.

A Splash Deck

Don't let the name fool you, the shallow entry design of a splash deck. also known as a sun shelf, offers plenty of entertainment and options for adults as well as kids. For families with young children, splash decks offer babies and toddlers a place to splash and play without having to be fully submerged in the pool. It also gives little ones an easier entryway, since pool steps can be difficult for young swimmers. For the adults, a splash deck makes a great spot for pool loungers, and a great space for relaxing under a pool umbrella.

Thursday, 31 August 2023 – from 5pm onwards at The Cauldron, 89-123 Hartley Rd Tamborine Mountain. Entry is free, hosted by volunteers of the TMU.

An incredibly rare super moon can be seen from the East Coast of Australia on 31 August at 5:44 pm.

Tamborine Mountain Universe is inviting all to attend a special viewing at the Cauldron Distillery on Hartley Road.

Although the moon is set to rise above the ocean at 5:44 pm, on the Mountain, it will not be seen till it climbs the horizon.

The Super Blue Moon is considered rare, appearing about once in a decade.

The Blue Moon occurs when there are two full moons in one month. There is usually only one full moon per lunar cycle in each month

The Super Moon is due to the closeness of the orbit of the moon in its eliptical circuit of

the Earth.

According to NASA, "A supermoon can appear 12 to 14 per cent larger at its closest orbit than a full moon at its farthest point, and about 7 per cent bigger than an average full moon."

If you miss out on this event, you won't have another chance until May 2026 to see another Blue Moon, and until 2029 to see a Super Blue Moon.



Please note my comments are written several days prior to the printing of this paper.



Congratulations: Gwen (Gwenydd) Curtis celebrated her 100th birthday amongst many friends at St George's Anglican Church on the 12th of August. Gwen has seen changes in her lifetime many of us cannot begin to imagine: the early years - she was 16 when WW1 commenced, and she served in (then) Princess Elizabeth's unit in the Auxiliary Territorial Service as a lorry driver, remembers doodle bug bombs being dropped, rationing and coupon books. Married to George in 1956, the couple emigrated to Australia as "ten-pound Poms". Long term residents of the Mountain (since 1973), Gwen was very involved in the local community and was an inaugural member of the Garden Club and Creative Arts, as well as a long-term member of the Tamborine Mtn Progress Assn Inc and a life member of the RSL. I had the pleasure of reading the congratulatory message from King Charles III. What a wonderful life!

Australian Local Government Women's Assn Qld Branch state conference. I attended a 2-day conference on 3-4 August – "Perils and Possibilities of Local Government". Guest speakers covered topics including AI, technology, legal matters – Councillor conduct, ethical decision making, "life after Council" – apparently you can check out, but you can never leave (apologies to Hotel California), the relevance of local Government, mental health and economic and demographic trends. Possibly the best conference I have ever attended.

Development Applications (DAs): Fairly quiet on the application front recently: 86-88 Cliff Rd - Dwelling house Establishment or extension second - Secondary Dwelling.

Current court appeals involving SRRC: For those interested in reading the court docs relating to the current court matters, go to <u>Search Results (courts.qld.gov.au)</u> and scroll through the listings, then click on "View File Details" and then open the individual docs. All Planning & Environment Court documents can be viewed.

Reminder: Have your say: Council's *Draft Scenic Rim Region Biosecurity Plan 2023-2028* – Council is seeking community input via Let's Talk Scenic Rim from 28 July – 25 August 2023 (letstalk.scenicrim.qld.gov.au). This Plan provides guidance on how to reduce biosecurity risks associated with invasive plants and animals and their impacts on the community, economy and the environment.

Council Ordinary Meeting – 8 August 2023: OIA complaint against former Cr Swanborough. I did not participate and declared a conflict of interest, given the level of interest in my voting participation of late. Sadly, the majority of the meeting involved this matter. He was found to have engaged in inappropriate conduct and a penalty of 100% of the investigation costs of \$4,950 was moved. This was reduced to 30% with the comment "some of the earlier findings against former Cr Swanborough... that we didn't follow correct procedures there... I think there's a big question mark over some of the others (decisions)". These comments can be heard at the 2hr 26-minute mark of the video recording of the meeting (available at Scenic Rim Regional Council Ordinary Meeting 8 August 2023 - YouTube)

Topics of concern raised recently: more boundary disputes (QCAT matter), graffiti, unapproved advertising signage, blocked drainage pits, Shelf Road issues, operation of homebased business impacting on neighbours, dog attacks, council prunings left uncollected, rubbish on roadsides. Re: white lines on roads to assist safety: line markings must meet minimum road width requirements and most of our local roads are not wide enough for a centre line, let alone lines on each side.

Award of the Week goes to the most innovative use of a living tree as a power pole.

PRANA -VITAL LIFE FORCE

The foundation of all life, of the whole universe, is the subtle life force energy that yogis call *prana*. You can't see it or touch it or taste it, but prana is the subtle

energy that flows through every living thing. Prana comes into the body from the food we eat, the air we breathe, and from absorbing the energies of the earth and heavens. A processed junk food meal has low prana. An organic, plant-based meal of real food of animal and plant origin is high in prana. Dirty, polluted cities have low pranic energy, and pristine, wild areas are high in prana. A healthy person with high digestive fire and a calm, pleasant disposition is of higher pranic energy than a person struggling with feelings of apathy, depression, anger, addictions and fear. Our thoughts and emotions translate into different vibrations of energy within our bodies and the lower the emotions, the lower your pranic energy.

Nurturing your inner Prana is the essence of all yoga practices particularly Pranayama (yogic breathing). For students of yoga, as we calm and deepen the breath through Pranayama we develop our connection with our inner Prana and spirit. Prana is not unique to yoga. The Chinese healers call it Chi, the Polynesians call is Mana, the Africans call it Nyama, the Russians call it Aura and our own Aboriginal people call it Alcheringa.

We share prana through the shared breath. Humans breathe about four times a minute, so we are continually inhaling air that we and other human beings have exhaled. Our atmosphere causes a total mixing of air molecules within six years. As humans, we breathe and rebreathe the same air as it circulates around the globe. So, a tiny fraction of air molecules that were exhaled by a person climbing up say, Mount Everest six years ago, will find its way into your lungs. For each of our breaths, we inhale 100 million atoms that were once inside Moses, the Buddha, Jesus Christ, Mohammed and Adolph Hitler. The memory or vibrational imprint of that life force, that prana, of these famous figures, is still there in the shared breath.

We are cultivating our prana in Yoga class over the next five weeks through a Yoga/Breathwork Intensive. As we increase our personal pranic energy, we will move into the season of Spring. Perfect timing.


Relationships



Last issue we looked at the Johari window. Now we consider how to achieve a healthier balance of open and hidden areas within the context of our relationships.

All of us have blind spots. They may be assumptions, behavioural patterns, biases, reactions. Driving blind spots occur when our vehicle's structure gets in the way of our vision,

with the possible result of a collision. Likewise, we carry baggage that gets in our way of seeing situations clearly, often resulting in damage to relationships. One way to avoid driving blind spots is to adjust our mirrors. In life we often have our mirrors pointing



in the wrong direction. Before scrutinising another's bias, it's wise to adjust your mirror so you can examine your own. What assumptions have you made? What have you overlooked? Is there another valid perspective? Where has your bias originated?

Feedback from others is an effective way to expose blind spots. Who are the people whom you trust to have your best interests at heart? They are a valuable resource for feedback. Sometimes we have to give our friends permission to critique us. It requires humility and openness to change. It's not a comfortable process but the result is a more authentic self with less hindrances in connecting with others.

Our facade exists for varying reasons. A facade can be a valid means of protection; for example, you wouldn't want to divulge all about yourself to a scammer. Trust needs to be built before we reveal certain parts of our personality to another. In a healthy relationship our facade reduces at a comfortable pace and depth, resulting in a deeper understanding of each other. However, barriers can get in the way of our vulnerability, keeping us locked into a superficial persona that prevents us from feeling truly known and accepted.

Where do barriers to connection stem from? They originate in the Unknown area. Much of what is hidden here is a result of things done to us, rather than things we are responsible for. It's impossible to get through life without being wounded. We store up the effects of our unprocessed, painful experiences in our hidden territory. They leak out in how we view the world, our attitudes, our beliefs about ourselves and others. They hijack our communication and sabotage our relationships. They are the motivators for our facade and our blind spots.

Exploring our facade and blind spots are opportunities to access the Unknown. We can do this process through self-reflection or in discussion with a trusted person. When we take time to explore why we behave, respond or think in a particular way, we shine a light on things hidden. In doing so, we stop the cycle of reactivity and become more intentional in how we live our life. The result is that our unknown area diminishes, and our blind spots decrease, as does our need for facades. Our interactions become authentic rather than superficial. We are able to more fully enjoy life in the open arena – a healthy way to live!

SOUTHEAST QLD'S TOP PERFORMING IGP GERMAN SHEPHERD DOG

Lauren - owner/handler/trainer with Xora, IGP3 x 6 (pictured)

Congratulations to this top working team: Lauren Bucksath and her beautiful working line GSD Xora, (pedigree name 'Almost Legal') who recently achieved their IGP title for the

6th time in a row!

IGP stands for "International Gebauchshund Profung": it is a dog sport that ensures that working breeds continue to function as strong, all-round utility dogs. IGP encompasses three disciplines: tracking, obedience and character work. The sport originated in the late 1800's, specifically for GSDs to ensure that the breed working standard was maintained, IGP really tests the handler's and dog's skills and genetics, and also



teaches us so much about canines; their drives, predicting and reading body language.

IGP is an important sport because many of these trained dogs are either bought for or used for breeding programs in the police, military, special services, etcetera. IGP is not easy and takes a lot of time, precision training and teamwork, especially for the higher and more difficult levels. The entry level test is BH (a 'good citizen' test for the dog) and once passed, the dog is permitted to compete for IGP titles. You can choose to compete in the full program (all 3 phases of IGP=IGP levels 1-3) or specific phases. IGP3 is the highest level of the sport and the most prestigious title to attain.

Xora was rehomed to Lauren as a "washed" young dog who had not long turned 12 months old. Ideally, most trainers seek a malleable 8-week-old pup to begin training with — "a clean slate." Lauren began training IGP in her early twenties, just four years ago. Only a month after, the team attaining their BH, they then achieved their IGP1 title at the WMA Nationals with Xora barely two years of age. In 2020 they achieved their IGP2 title and obtained their first IGP3 title in 2021. Since then, Lauren and Xora have accumulated six IGP3 titles in a row under four separate judges (both international SV and Australian judges) in QLD and interstate with many of those being High-in Trial.

The team qualified to compete at IGP3 at the 2022 WGSDCA Nationals, which was a World Qualifier. Most recently in July this year they entered the BSDC trial under an interstate judge and achieved; 96 points in tracking, 87 points in obedience and 80 points in character work (totalling 263 points) where Lauren and Xora were awarded High-in-Trial overall, High-in-trial tracking, Helper's choice protection and Best IGP3!

TEX MEX BBQ PULLED CHICKEN BURGER

These burgers, me hearties, with juicy, slightly spicy, smoky, sweet and tangy tender chicken lathered in my Captain Kidd BBQ sauce and topped with creamy coleslaw stacked in between a toasted brioche bun, are impossible to resist.

This is a perfectly simple recipe to make for Dad or the father figure in your life this Father's Day. Let this dish be a testament to the power of simple, quality ingredients intertwined with love, made as a tribute to the irreplaceable role of a father. This easy recipe is done in one pan in 30 minutes or less, and most of the cooking time is totally hands-off. Get the little ones involved, and surprise Dad with a delicious meal made with care served up alongside his favourite icy cold beer.

Did you know? In the shadowy realms of the ocean's edge, the enigmatic Scottish pirate, William Kidd, unfurled his sails and embarked on a saga of piracy. With a swashbuckler's charm and the thrill of the unknown coursing through his veins, Kidd plundered and pillaged his way across the seven seas. His ship, a dark silhouette against the horizon, became the embodiment of both fear and fascination, leaving ports abuzz with tales of his audacious exploits and misdemeanours that danced between fact and folklore. Yet, beneath the veneer of a ruthless pirate, Kidd was said to possess a code of honour that set him apart. Whispers of buried treasure and secret maps only added to his mystique. But as the tides of fate turned, Kidd's adventurous spirit led him down a treacherous path. Accused of crimes beyond his legendary pursuits, he faced a reckoning that would forever etch his name into the annals of maritime folklore, leaving behind a legacy that continues to beckon to the bold-hearted and curious souls who yearn for the thrill of the

Chef Dylan's tips: 1. I like using boneless, skinless, free-range chicken thighs in this pulled BBQ chicken recipe, since they're more flavourful and stay really nice and juicy through roasting. You can swap them out with breasts if you prefer: just slice them in half (lengthwise) or pound the breasts out flat to ensure they cook up evenly. 2. Brown the chicken nicely for depth of flavour. 3. If the sauce becomes too thick just add a few tablespoons of water. 4. Don't like spicy? Simply substitute the Creole seasoning for my Gaucho seasoning.

Memory Lane, Hat Head NSW - 1997

As I recline in the plastic chair, a sudden sting of sunburn jolts me upright. Around the spacious table at our holiday abode, my four brothers and sister gather, ravenous after a morning of seaside exploration and swimming. It's 11:30 am, and the blazing sun only intensifies our hunger. Dad, his back a deep golden tan, stands before the barbecue, tongs in one hand, a cold

tinny in the other. He takes a swig, the moment almost poetic, the condensation on the can glistening like rainbow coloured dew at dawn. The chicken on the grill sizzles and pops, an auditory prelude to the feast ahead. The air is thick with anticipation, the heady aroma of grilling mingling with the promise of joy. It's more than just food; it's love on a plate.

As the thighs dance on the grill, Dad gazes off into the distance - his mind reminiscing like an echo of a lifetime of laughter and dreams, precious time with his children a testament to a father's love. Beside him, young Kirk, the son with an irrepressible grin, adds a playful spark. "Hey, Dad, reckon these burgers will rival Uncle Trevor's fishing tales?" he jests, igniting laughter that ripples around the table like a chorus of waves. Burgers assembled, the table falls silent as we savour the first bite. "Speaking of fishing" Dad interjects, breaking the hush, "After lunch, we're headed to the creek to pump for yabbies at low tide. Whiting and flatties for tomorrow's dinner, kids." Excitement bubbles as Mitchell cheers, "I'll nab the biggest one!" Not to be outdone, six-year-old Rosy declares, "No, I will!" Later, by the creek's edge, the sun dips below the horizon. Stars twinkling like scattered gems above, footsteps approach and Uncle Trevor emerges. His surfer hair cascading, a cigarette dangling between his fingers, and a VB longneck in hand. He cups his mouth, "Heard the Gittoes boys are here! Figured the 'Mayor' of Hat Head should pay a visit." A grin stretches across his face. "Even heard someone's aiming to break my record for the biggest lizard caught?" Laughter erupts. "It's true" he insists, winking. "I glimpsed it come up; it was longer than me!" Arms now high above his head. Ryan raises an eyebrow, dubious. "I'll get a bigger one, Uncle!" Rosy exclaims, wrapping her tiny arms around his sturdy leg. Uncle Trevor's tales continue and seamlessly meld into the symphony of the creek's gentle whispers and the chorus of crickets. The night embraces us, like a guilt woven from shared memories and familial bonds. Under the vast southern sky, we revel in the moment, a tableau of love and laughter of siblings with Dad and the 'Mayor' against the backdrop of Hat Head's coastal charm.

Prep: 15 minutes Cook: 25 minutes Serves 4-6 Ingredients

- 1 kg boneless, skinless organic chicken thighs
- 1 tbs Creole seasoning*
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 tbs oil to fry chicken
- 1/2 bottle of Captain Kidd spiced rum BBQ sauce*
- 1/4 cup water
- 6 Brioche burger buns
- 2 cups coleslaw, homemade is best
 *Chef Dylan's Gourmet Food Co. range



Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 180°C
- Mix the Creole with the oil in a large bowl, add in the chicken and coat evenly using your hands to really work the mixture into all the nooks and crannies of the chicken.
- Add the oil to a medium sized oven-safe frypan or casserole dish, and heat over medium heat. Once the oil is hot add the chicken to the pan.
- Cook ~2-3 minutes per side, until nicely browned. The chicken will not be fully cooked yet – this is normal and totally fine. Work in batches, if needed, to avoid overcrowding the pan (which prevents browning).
- Meanwhile, as the chicken browns, add the Captain Kidd spiced rum BBQ sauce and water in a small bowl and mix together. Set aside.
- Once all the chicken is browned, remove the pan from the heat. Pour the BBQ sauce mixture over the browned chicken, turning to coat all the chicken in the sauce. Cover with a lid or alfoil.
- 7. Transfer to the oven and roast for ~15-20 minutes, until fully cooked.
- Remove pan from the oven and place chicken on a plate. Set aside to cool slightly.
- 9. Once cool enough to handle, carefully shred the chicken into pieces using 2 forks.
- Add chicken back into the pan and coat evenly with the sauce. Gently warm on the stove on a low heat.
- 11. Toast the buns, add chicken on the bottom and top with coleslaw. Add the top of bun.

Serve up with an extra splash of BBQ sauce and devour!





Some Interesting Stats...

CoreLogic has released their monthly chart pack for June, which covers off on the Australian housing market data until the end of July 2023. Some key statistics in the below report:

- National home values rose 2.8% in the June quarter, which is the highest quarterly movement since January 2022. On a monthly basis, the pace of growth eased from 1.2% in May to 1.1% in June.
- The combined capital cities dwelling market value rose 1.2% in June, easing from a 1.4% lift in May. Values across the combined capitals are rising at more than twice the pace of the combined regional market, which saw values increase 0.5% in June. The high end of the Sydney housing market continues to lead capital growth, up 5.7% for the three months to June.
- Over the past financial year, Australian home values declined -5.3%. The highest growth result was a 8.7% gain across the regional SA dwelling market, while the lowest annual capital growth was a -12.7% decline across Hobart.
- CoreLogic estimates there were 35,523 sales in June nationally, compared to a previous five-year average of 39,180 for June. The six-month moving trend suggests sales volumes are stabilizing, despite being down from recent highs in 2021.
- The amount of time it takes to sell property trended slightly higher through the June quarter nationally, with the median days on market sitting at 34 days, up from a recent low of 30 days in the three months to April. However, vendor discounting suggests selling conditions continued to improve. In the four weeks to 2 July 2023, new listings totalled 32,568 nationally. New listings saw a slight uptick in recent weeks, which is unusual for this time of year. However, listings volumes remain -7.9% lower than the historic five-year average.
- There were 130,950 listings observed over the four weeks to 2 July, 2023. Total listings are trending lower than the previous five-year average due to the relatively low volume of new listings, against a normalising in sales volumes.
