

Councillor's Comment

These are my own personal views. I do not purport to speak on behalf of Council. Decisions of Council are made only by majority vote, legislative authority or under authority delegated by Council. Please note my comments are written several days prior to the printing of this paper.



More on the "water issue": A code assessable development application has been submitted for a Utility Installation (Groundwater Extraction for water supply) at 45-63 Hartley Road, diagonally opposite the water extraction site at 2-20 Holt Rd. **Refer MCU23/143**. The proposal is for 4 x 45,000lt water tanks, a new bore and will require a Property Access Application. Supply is stated to be for "local water carting contractors to have access to supply the local domestic market" (not defined) 6 days/week and a maximum of 70 loads per week. The site is zoned Rural and mapping indicates it is "in or adjacent to Cedar Creek".

Meanwhile, Canungra residents who rely on tank water have been advised (18 Oct 2023) by Urban Utilities to prepare now, as Canungra Creek flows fall below three megalitres per day. Canungra's drought response plan was activated in August 2023 when flows fell below seven megalitres per day, and Canungra will move to the next phase of the plan "drought response" – when flows fall to one megalitre per day. Ref: Residents advised to prepare now as Canungra Creek flows fall - *Urban Utilities*

... yet more and more subdivisions continue to be approved.

Development Applications of interest: (Source: DAP Online). In summary: building envelope amendments, setbacks, second dwellings, short-term accommodation (2 applications still pending).

Council has one development application which has been on the books since lodgement on 11 August 2020 (yes, 2020), in excess of 1,150 days and no decision imminent.

Out and About: I attended the Annual Conference of the Local Government Association of Qld in Gladstone 16-18 October and returned with the gift that keeps on giving – COVID, so apologies if my responses to emails and messages have been slow recently. The conference was an opportunity for Councillors from all 77 local councils across Qld to be updated on topics as diverse as savage dog legislation to cybersecurity issues which have previously brought two councils to a standstill. It was also an opportunity to share innovative tourism projects undertaken in far-flung places – have a look at Cunnamulla Hot Springs – Cunnamulla Tourism. Cunnamulla has a population of approximately 1,140 and its tourist season is determined by the wet season.

I also took the opportunity to make a verbal and written submission on 16 October to the State Development and Regional Industries Committee – Public Hearing Program in relation to the proposed changes to *Local Government (Councillor Complaints) Other Legislation*

Amendment Bill 2023. My submission, which mentions the OIA complaints issues faced by my two predecessor Division 1 Councillors, can be accessed here (QR code):



Topics of concern raised recently: Many complaints received about the large number of "Tattoo Expo" signs plastered all along Gallery Walk and MacDonnell Rd on virtually every post with no consideration for the amenity or appearance of our main tourism location. Always good to be opportunistic, but how about some consideration for those local businesses that do the right thing? I have tried (unsuccessfully) to have Council force the removal of these signs, however Gallery Walk is part of the State-controlled road network. I imagine that someone at State level will look into this in about 6 months. I ask the expo organisers to voluntarily please remove their signs immediately.

Also, I have received a complaint about a properly made submission to a development application which was not

recorded by Council. I know it was

properly made as I submitted it on behalf of the submitter who had no internet access (before I was elected). The development was recently approved, however the submitter's appeal rights were not made available to him. This has now been rectified. Please check DAP Online to verify that your submission has been recorded if you make a submission, either in support of or against a proposed development.

CANUNGRA WATER AND THE LABOR GOVERNMENT'S FAILURE TO PLAN

This Labor Government's failure to plan - and get their priorities right - is on display every day in and around Canungra. Without even mentioning the traffic and road issues, as the community again faces water restrictions, and the imminent trucking of water into the town by Seqwater to keep the town in water, the warnings delivered to the Queensland Government by me and so many in the community about water shortages, over many years, spring back to mind. We warned that the development proceeding in Canungra was not backed by water security, that it should be slowed down and more done - and urgently! - to improve water security. This lack of water security impacts Canungra town residents, those outside who rely on standpipes for water, and also farmers and other residents downstream who will soon run short of water for their properties.

Unfortunately, the State ignored my calls, and those of locals, and we now face ongoing water security issues when there are dry periods, which in this part of the world there will be from time to time.

The only positive in all of this is that, after lots of work lobbying them, Seqwater has this year finally made some effort to put planning for better water security in Canungra back on the agenda, about 15 years after Beaudesert Shire Council did preliminary work on options and then had the State Government under Anna Bligh take away their responsibility for water. This has taken many years of lobbying, and the fact the Government has not made this happen much sooner – despite lobbying by me, the Council, and many locals over a long time – shows this Government's priorities are all wrong. There's no easy solution to this issue, but I will continue to work towards better water security for Canungra – and better planning for the future as well.

WELL DONE TO CANUNGRA STATE SCHOOL P&C AND TAMBORINE MOUNTAIN LIONS

Well done to all involved in the Canungra State School's Family Fun Day last Saturday. The weather was kind, the town was buzzing and it was great fun to drop in and see the school community putting on a great community event. RESULTS ARE IN: WRIGHT SAYS A RESOUNDING 'NO' TO LABOR'S CANBERRA VOICE



Federal Member for Wright, Scott Buchholz said the voters of Wright have had their say on the Voice Referendum, with 78 percent of voters in Wright voting NO.


The defeat of this referendum is a missed opportunity by this Albanese Labor Government, who used what should have been a unifying moment for Australia, to divide the nation, house by house, street by street, town by town; it is a disappointing outcome for the cause of reconciliation with our first nations.

The result in Wright was overwhelmingly NO, with all 76 polling booths returning a negative result of 78.09%, as of 3pm on Sunday. This result will continue to have minor updates as the postal and absent votes are counted, however it represents the definitive position of not only our communities, but also Queensland who were united against Labor's divisive and flawed Canberra voice.

Whilst there were a couple of minor incidents at the pre-polling; the vast number of people conducted themselves in a professional, courteous and polite manner. And for that I'm grateful.

While the Prime Minister and the Labor Government have done all they could to divide Australians, this is not a time for us to remain divided, it is a time for us to return to the drawing board and work out a pathway to true recognition for Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islanders in the Constitution. In the months and years ahead, our challenge is to win the hearts and minds of Australians, and to offer a way forward, in spite of the language the Prime Minister has continued to use. We need to be able to plan a pathway that we can walk together to create the change needed for future recognition.

We will need to put our shoulders to the wheel and start to bridge the divide that this referendum has created in our nation. We need to walk and work together; only then can we build a better Australia.

HOW DO YOU DEFINE MADNESS?

Another commercial groundwater extraction business on Hartley Road!

Dear residents of the Mountain: are vou aware that Council has before it an application for a fifth water extraction business focused on the Hartley/ Holt Road portion of Cedar Creek? How could you have possibly missed such a significant material change of use? Super transparent Council systems? I wonder if any of you can think of a reason or two why this is possibly not the best idea you have heard today. I have a few, and if you do, you should express them to our Council and our Council representative. It may take you a while to find the objection form on their website.

Initial enquiries have indicated that the Council's determination process does not have to consider residents' representations before making a decision. Sounds like a very reasonable approach to a proposed business (NOT) which has a few impacts for all the community, not to mention the wellbeing of Cedar Creek. By the way, apparently the area in question is called a "minor tributary", not on any Dept. of Natural Resources map I've looked at.

The ongoing appalling situation where the groundwater here is an unregulated resource for those with the finances to extract it, is a shameful situation that both Local and State Governments should be constantly challenged on.

If you feel as if the Council is treating you like a mushroom, you may have a point. Make your thoughts known to our community leaders. Maybe they may develop a genuine and principled approach to this application.

One more thing: I urge all organisations to review their marketing images of Cedar Creek, like Curtis Falls, and replace these with images of the extraction sites less than a kilometre upstream to reflect their true relationship with Tamborine Mountain.

BASIC PRINCIPLES

Successful local governments don't just happen. They are probably living happily with the five legislated

Principles of Local Government. The latter can be found on half a page in Section 4 of the *Local Government Act.* The Principles are defined as necessary to ensure the system of local government is accountable, effective, efficient and sustainable. It is also made clear that these Principles are legal requirements and are not simply lofty aspirations to be adopted if convenient.

There is widespread concern about the management of our Scenic Rim Regional Council. Things are getting worse and, so often, no adequate explanations are given. Everything is hidden under opaque clouds of confidentiality.

I wondered whether failure to adhere to the basic **Principles of Local Government** could be a cause. I carried out a short review, with startling results as below.

Principle A. Transparent and effective processes and decision-making in the public interest. First and foremost, 'transparency' is the fundamental basis for a properly operating local government. However, in the last two terms, the Council has imposed very broad confidentiality restrictions. These inhibit communication at all levels but particularly between Councillors, their constituents and the media. Decisions in the public interest cannot be assured, since the reasons for decisions and their consequences are so isolated from public scrutiny. The complete failure to implement this provision is enough, by itself, to prevent normal and proper operation of the Council.

Principle B. Sustained development and management of assets and infrastructure and delivery of essential services. Tamborine Mountain's plateau and upper escarpment is a major Shire asset. This sustains 20% of the Shire's population and is the Shire's major tourist destination. The area is less than 0.4% of the Shire's total. This has required decades of informed resident input into Planning Schemes. This factor is disregarded by Council, and the critical ambience is at risk.

Principle C. Democratic representation, social inclusion and meaningful community engagement. Too much Councillor authority in policy making has been delegated to Council Offers. There is inadequate recognition of Tamborine Mountain priorities.

Principle D. Good government of, and by, local government. As above, good local government is not happening.

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MYMEDICARE AND WHY YOU SHOULD REGISTER?

In the 2023 Federal Budget, the government announced some changes to Medicare to be rolled out from October 1st this year and over the next few years. The reasons for the changes were triggered by a crisis in the provision of general practice services in Australia that has left patients struggling to access the care they need.

What crisis and why ?

During the past two decades, the Medicare rebate that the Federal Government provides patients for their primary health care in General Practice, has not kept pace with inflation and



the changing nature of health provision in our modern society. Health care advances have meant general practices have had to do more with less. For years, practices have absorbed these costs to avoid placing the burden on patients, but it has reached a point where it is no longer viable due to:

- 7 years of Medicare rebate freezing
- The remainder of the last two decades, the Medicare rebate has been indexed at half CPI.
- The same rebate in the last 25 years has had to fund newly introduced computerisation of practices and accreditation requirements, which were never factored into the original Medicare formula.
- 185 Medical practices around Australia have closed since just the beginning of this year (including Mountain Medical) due to non-viability.
- As a result of this crisis in the financial viability of general practice, most Medical Graduates are avoiding a career in General Practice and choosing other specialties instead. To sustain the health system, Australia needs about 45% of Medical Graduates to choose General Practice. This is currently down to 13%, with a projected shortfall of 10,000 GPs by 2030. As a result, it is going to be increasingly difficult to find doctors' appointments and there will be even longer queues at emergency departments and higher pressure on hospital beds.

MyMedicare is a small step to try and improve this situation, though it is going to take a lot more on the part of governments to undo 25 years of neglect.

What are the first changes?

- 1. Bulk Billing Incentive From November 1st, the bulk billing incentive to doctors will triple, but only for certain consultations and not for other services. Currently GPs receive a small fee of about \$6.50 if they bulk bill healthcare card holders, pensioners and children aged 15 and under this will triple. While this on its own is not enough to sustain practices, it may halt the plummeting rates of bulk billing for concession card holders.
- 2. Voluntary patient registration From October 1st, patients may choose to register with their usual practice and doctor. This does not mean that they cannot see another practice if they choose to, or if travelling, but it means that they will then gain access to the option of longer telephone consultations and triple bulk billing incentive payments for longer video consultations.

In time, the government is likely to link access to more services and funding to patient registration.

Why should patients register?

- To access a wider range of telehealth services
- To keep the doors of your local practice open so they don't become another casualty of the crisis.
- Because continuity of care is good for your health. Seeing the same doctor over years has been shown to reduce the need for hospital admission by up to 30%.

TM PROGRESS – The road ahead

I agree with sentiments regarding the sad demise of the Tamborine Mountain Progress Association, a 108 year old community cohort that has played a pivotal, albeit sometimes contentious, role in how the Mountain has developed. Community involvement at any level is important and to be cherished and encouraged.

Although advocates for the TMPA lay the blame for the winding up process on the actions of our Council in a recent Land and Environment Court appeal, TMPA's demise was clearly self-inflicted.

A recent letter written on behalf of the TMPA perpetuates their myth the Council flouted convention by not only reassessing its position during the Appeal process, it left its co-respondents stranded, and its actions have forever severely restricted the ability of residents to challenge Development Applications. They suggest the TMPA and residents, have been badly done by on many fronts, and longstanding precedents have been upturned.

I suggest the facts show otherwise. Remember, in this particular Court judgement against the TMPA, the Judge cited numerous errors in law in their submission, which he also found to be a 'groundless and vexing case... devoid of merit' and 'a waste of public and private resources'. The Council, presumably with legal advice, decided to abandon their challenge and thus spare ratepayers ongoing costs. That seems prudent. That the developer chose to seek recompense for their legal costs in this appeal, is entirely fair.

Precedence has not changed, it fact it's been reinforced! Those with legitimate claims will be fairly heard; those with spurious claims will be dismissed and admonished, as they should.

I'm not anticipating a public apology from the ex-TMPA office holders regarding its waste of public and private resources, but to publicly respond to the judgement of Judge Williamson KC as merely 'only one man's opinion' is a clear case of hubris. It's also clear, under recent leadership, TMPA's planning appeals have lacked form and substance, have added nothing to local amenity, and have put unnecessary cost and time burdens on ratepayers and developers.

It's now up to the community, collectively and individually, to scrutinise Development Applications and test them against sustainability, lowering the environmental footprint of development, and its impacts upon social wamenity. That is a key intent of the recently released Tourism Strategy, which adopts a forward-looking sustainable ecotourism policy.

Maybe now, we will see Tamborine Mountain Progress As-It-Should.

The SRRC released the following media statement on the $17^{\rm th}$ October 2023:

RESPONSE TO CONCERNS SURROUNDING COUNCIL STAFF ABSENCES

Scenic Rim Regional Council is concerned by allegations that groups within the community are spreading salacious stories that call into question the integrity of Council and its officers.

Many other organisations, on many occasions, have found themselves in similar circumstances in which staff members have been unable to perform their duties for a range of reasons.

The Council officers who are currently on leave, and who are facing the same challenges as the rest of us, are human beings who are simply not able to perform their respective duties at this present time.

When situations like this arise, Council's job is to support valued team members in their personal journeys, and has put measures in place to ensure that Council can continue to deliver services to our community whilst protecting the wellbeing of its officers.

Council asks that our communities please respect these individuals, their privacy, and allow them the rest and space to deal with their personal circumstances. This request extends to online platforms.

Council has a continued focus on delivering the many exciting projects currently in the pipeline and a demonstrated commitment to delivering a sustainable future for our region.

On 5th October the SRRC held a Special Meeting motioning the appointment of Oliver Pring as Acting CEO from 7th October 2023 to April 2024 should the CEO be absent or unable to perform his duties. Discussion surrounding the motion of his appointment was held in session closed to the public. All councillors voted in favour of the appointment with one exception, Councillor Hay, Division 1.

Talking to the motion, the Mayor stated, "this is something we had in history, had available of preapprovals to provide this insurance cover for the Chief Executive Officer and thank you that we have now been able to put this in place."

If it was not for the action of Councillor Hay, this Special Meeting may not have generated the interest from the media it has since been afforded.

The CEO, David Keenan, did not return to work on the $7^{\rm th} {\rm October},$ and has been absent since.

Word on "the street" is that the Mayor has suspended the CEO.

If this rumour is true, this action poses a number of questions and concerns:

1. Does the Mayor have the power to suspend the CEO?

Under the *Local Govt*. *Act* 170(2)(a) the Mayor cannot give direction to suspend the CEO if it is inconsistent with a resolution, or a document adopted by resolution, of the local government.

In this instance, the resolution to appoint David Keenan as CEO by the elected council, under a binding contract.

In addition to that, I note the following extract from a blog by Patrick Quinn of Gilshenan & Luton Legal Practice dated May 25, 2020, titled *Mayor and councillor responsibilities and obligations*

Mayor's dealings with the CEO

Two of the additional responsibilities ((c) and (d)) of the mayor surround the mayor's dealings with the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). Recently there have been a number of investigations into mayors (and in some cases, councillors) in Queensland relating to their relationship and interactions with a Council's CEO.

Section 12(c) of the LGA gives mayors powers to direct the CEO and to conduct the performance appraisal of the CEO. However, it is important to recognise that those powers and responsibilities have limits placed upon them, including the power of direction in: providing strategic direction to the CEO in order to achieve the highquality administration of the local government; and/or directing the CEO in accordance with a resolution or document adopted by resolution of the Council.

In relation to the employment of the CEO:

the Council is the entity that is charged with appointing the CEO and as such, Council has the power to remove and suspend the person in that role.

The appointment, removal or suspension of a CEO is not a power that can be exercised by a mayor without a decision of Council;

whilst the mayor has the additional responsibility of conducting a performance appraisal of the CEO, the mayor's power is not absolute and must be done in the way decided by Council.

2. How is it that the elected councillors have not acted and nipped this in the bud?

If the Mayor had suspended the CEO on his own volition, he in turn had a serious conflict of interest at the $5^{\rm th}$ October Special Meeting, and should have not been able to participate in the discussion or been able to vote.

3. Why did the councillors not introduce the status of the CEO as a motion, given this is allowable under standing orders as the matter relates directly to the special purpose matter being called via a Special Meeting?

The notice of the meeting did not take place as required by the rules, which essentially makes the special meeting null and void.

4. How did the councillors not know the meeting notification was not in accordance with the rules?

I ask this question. Is the media release, stating that council is concerned at allegations that groups within the community are spreading *salacious stories*, a form of gaslighting?

If any of the above is true, people have every right to be concerned about the performance and delivery of services and projects by this council.

If any of the above is true, where is the honesty and transparency?





ASSOCIATION ARE YOU FIT TO DRIVE?

As we age, many aspects of our health and wellbeing alter over time. If you still drive, it would be good to consider if you are truly fit to drive. Even on a

temporary basis following an illness, it may be safer to allow someone else to take the wheel and chauffeur you to your medical appointments or grocery shopping.



If you have a permanent or long-term medical condition, you could talk to your doctor about your concerns, and the impact your medical condition could have on your ability to drive safely. Health professionals are qualified to check if you are medically fit to drive. If required, they will provide you with a medical certificate reporting on your fitness to drive. This certificate will either state that you are fit to drive, or that you are able to drive under certain conditions. You must inform Queensland Transport if you have a medical condition that could affect your ability to drive safely. Failure to report medical conditions can be dangerous on the road, and the penalties are high.

Some common conditions that may affect your ability to drive safely include:

- diabetes
- epilepsy
- heart disease and stroke
- arthritis and joint problems
- eye and hearing problems
- sleep disorders
- dementia and Alzheimer's disease
- depression and other mental health problems
- lung disease
- injuries and disabilities

This is not a complete list, so it would be wise to consult with your health professional. At the same time, ask whether any medications you are taking for your conditions could affect your ability to drive safely. Many medications have side-effects that can affect your responses putting you, other road users and pedestrian traffic at risk.

Living OGS

Originally from China, this ancient breed dates back to around 700 BC, when Pugs were kept by emperors, and owned only by royal families and not the general public. Pugs were served the finest foods and human guards were placed to protect them; anyone attempting to steal or harm the

dogs were punished by death. As it was, most citizens struggled to eat well and could only dream of such luxuries that Pugs received. Later, the breed was kept by Buddhist monks in Tibet.

This 'over-protectiveness' and high regard of dogs by a few various Chinese emperors could be one of the reasons communist leader Mao Zedong, banned pet dog ownership in the 1960's.



He encouraged inhuman and cruel treatment of dogs, and their consumption as food. Dogs are eaten in many parts of China, most Asian countries and some African countries. The Yulin dog meat festival (started only 30 or so years ago) is still celebrated every June in the city of Yulin, however, many Chinese want this barbaric practice stopped. Dogs were never domesticated as food but for hunting, herding, guarding and companions, even in China.

By the 1500's, the popularity of the Pug dog began to spread all through Europe. Traders from Portugal and the Netherlands were so enamoured of the Chinese Pug dogs that they brought them back to Europe. There, they became favoured members of the European courts and were bred by the wealthy. King William the 3rd of England in 1688 had a beloved Pug. Before Josephine married Napolean Bonaparte, she had a Pug. The breed was still popular in the 19th century, due in part to the English Queen Victoria's devotion to the breed – she owned and bred many. That love of Pugs was passed on to her grandsons, King George the 5th and King Edward 8th.

What makes the Pug breed so popular and enduring? Well, the most obvious is their small size, big eyes, short muzzled and wrinkled face. They have a fine, short glossy coat in a variety of colours, with square compact bodies and thick muscles; they live for 12-15 years. Bred to be a companion and lap dog they have an even, stable temperament and are very loyal to their owners. Because of those traits they are generally easy to train, yet their feelings are easily hurt, so harsh training methods should never be used.

Pros of owning a Pug – their affectionate character, low maintenance, good with children and other animals and they need minimal exercise.

Cons – notorious for health issues, they snore and are noisy. Pugs are not good at regulating their body temperature. They are prone to obesity, fart a lot, and they are moderate shedders all year-round. Good, ethical breeders do not produce offspring with extremely short muzzles.

BEEF AND MUSHROOM UDON BROTH

Tantalisingly tender sirloin steak with savoury sautéed garlic mushrooms floating in an umami-rich broth, sitting on slippery slurp-erlicious udon. This minimalistic broth is so good, it has me making up words just to describe it!

The foundation of any good noodle dish is the broth, and the secret ingredient to this flavour sensation of a broth is a good splash of my Luck Dragon Asian Sauce, which gives it instant complexity, deep umami flavours and just the right amount of heat, without having to laboriously layer ingredients and simmer for hours. Which means this beauty can be on the table in under 30 minutes.

Did you know? Udon literally means 'wheat noodle' in Japanese, so when you hear someone say Udon noodles, it's like saying 'wheat noodle noodle'. Udon is a favourite choice in Japan for its quick cooking and characteristic texture. They are thick noodles with a firm yet supple elasticity and a chewy yet soft bite, which is called a 'mochi-mochi' texture in Japanese.

Chef Dylan's tips. 1. Make sure you do use Luck Dragon to flavour the broth otherwise it will be bland and boring. 2. Take your time to really sauté the mushrooms with the butter to make them nice and browned. 3. Don't add the garlic too soon or it will burn; you want the mushrooms to really soak up the buttery goodness, then add the garlic. 5. Buy guality sirloin so it is tender and delicious. 6. You can get fancy with the mushrooms if you like by adding king oyster, enoki, shiitake and shimeji. 7. Cut the bottom 1/2 of the stems off the coriander and discard, place the remaining stems in a glass of water in the fridge with the leaves exposed to keep the leaves from wilting and they will stay nice and fresh for up to a week.

Memory Lane - Gran Canaria, Canary Islands 2004

The early evening heat still clings, the temperature a stifling 28°C. My stomach grumbles, looking forward to the Japanese Udon meal arriving soon. I clutch two crimson dice, their edges digging into my palm. "Vamos, Dylan!" David's voice, a fervent battle cry, echoes through the room. His dark curls cascade down his shoulders, his blue eyes shimmering with determination. "¡Defensa, amigo!" he urges, his enthusiasm infectious. I glance down at the sprawling world map spread across the worn dining table, amidst the remnants of the evening - half-filled ashtrays and discarded bottle caps. Regiments of red and yellow toy soldiers, miniature horses, and cannons lay siege to different countries. "Venga!" Antonio's voice, rich with anticipation,

fills the air as he hurls three azure dice into the small plastic arena. "Cinco, cinco, dos," he says, a mischievous glint in his eyes as he rubs his hands together. I offer the dice a superstitious blow, then release them into the arena.

We all lean in, our collective breaths held, watching the fate of empires teeter on the edge of chance. "Cinco, cinco - a tie!" David's voice booms triumphantly. "Dios Mio," Antonio grumbles, placing both palms on his forehead, invoking the heavens for mercy. "Por favor, Padre," he pleads, his eyes fixed on the dice, already preparing for another throw. I reach for some solace - a sip of calimocho, the local concoction of chilled coke and regional red wine that seems to fuel the spirits of the young in this far-fetched outpost of the Spanish colony. Calimocho's sweet tang revitalises me, preparing for the climax of a four-hour battle. It's come down to this moment, where I, with only three soldiers left, must stop his three soldiers and thwart Antonio's ambitious plan of world domination. "Seis, seis, cuatro!" Antonio exclaims, his fist clenched, confident of victory, then transforming into a silent prayer of gratitude. "¡Defensa, defensa!" David's voice rises, urging me to hold my ground.

I blow on the dice for luck and cast them into the arena - four, three. "¡Vamooooooooos!" Antonio shouts, his tone echoing a triumphant roar. My forces in Oceania dwindle: a single red warrior stands against the impending yellow tide. I reach for the dice, but now, there's only one left. One die against three - the odds, it seems, are insurmountable. Antonio begins his ritual, cupping the dice between his hands and blowing softly. David quickly rises, his hands begin massaging my shoulders, his words a soothing whisper in my ear. "Esta bien, hermano. Don't panic. You can still win this." Antonio, his eyes skyward, mumbles a prayer, hands now tracing the sign of the cross upon his heavily tattooed, naked chest. With a flick of his hands, the dice spin into the arena. "¡Cuatro, cuatro, cinco!" he declares, his voice laced with tension, hands sliding up and down his face. He pulls on his cheeks stretching the bottom eyelids, exposing his eyeballs. Time slows, the room seems to pulse, and I release the die. It bounces, ricocheting off every corner of the arena. Wide-eyed, I watch, my breath caught in my throat. We all lean in, our gazes fixed, and finally, the dice settle. Suddenly we all turn to the loud sound of the buzzer coming from the intercom to inform us our food delivery has arrived.

Prep 15 Cook serves 4

Ingredients

400g Udon noodle



- 1x 300g Sirloin
- 200g mushrooms, chopped
- 3 tbs butter
 - 3 tbs oil

•

- 1 tsp salt
- 1/2 small brown onion, diced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 litre beef stock
- 100ml Luck Dragon Asian sauce*
- 1/4 bunch chopped coriander

*Chef Dylan's Gourmet Food Co. Luck Dragon Asian sauce

Method.

- Heat a large frypan on medium heat and add oil and butter. As the butter froths, add in the mushrooms and turn up the heat to medium high. Let them cook without moving them for ~2 mins to give good colour on one side, add salt, then toss to flip them over. Cook for another min.
- 2. Push the mushrooms to the side of the pan, add some oil to the pan and add the onion, sprinkle the garlic on top of the mushrooms while the onions sizzle for 1 min, then stir to combine onion, mushrooms, garlic and cook for another 1 minute, stirring until cooked.
- Scrape out the onion, mushroom mix into a big enough saucepan placed on the heat and add in beef stock and Luck Dragon Asian sauce and turn the heat down to medium.
- 4. Bring broth to a simmer then turn down to low.
- While the broth simmers clean the frypan and heat to medium high and season and cook the steak to your liking. Then let rest.
- 6. Add Udon to the broth and turn up the heat to medium high to bring to a boil then turn back down and simmer for 5 mins.
- 7. Slice up the steak in thin strips and add juices to the broth.
- 8. Use tongs to remove the noodles onto serving bowls then ladle the broth on top
- Add sliced beef and chopped coriander and serve hot.
- 10. Add some fresh chopped chilli if you like a bit more heat. ¡Buen povecho! enjoy!

BELONGING

We humans are hardwired for belonging. From the neurone pathways in our brain, to the social bonding hormone, oxytocin, our biology drives us toward social connection. We want to be a part of something, to feel connectedness to others. However, it should not come at the cost of personal authenticity.

A group of teenagers were recently asked the difference between 'fitting in' and 'belonging'. Their profound answers included: "Belonging is being somewhere where you want to be and they want you. Fitting in is being somewhere you want to be but they don't care about you."... "Belonging is being accepted for you. Fitting in is being accepted for being like everyone else."

True belonging doesn't require us to change who we are, it requires us to be who we are. Any belonging that asks us

to betray ourselves is not true belonging. Belonging is not passive and simply joining or going along with others. We can feel belonging only when we have the courage to share our most authentic self with people. It's a process that requires



us to be vulnerable about our ideals and our values and learn how to be present with people without sacrificing who we are. If people don't know what we genuinely believe or think, there's no true belonging.

Belonging is tied to social identity–a set of shared beliefs or ideals. To truly feel a sense of belonging, you must feel a common sense of character with and among members of your group. It is not enough to be bound together by shared fear or disdain. This only creates a disconnected culture of "us and them". This doesn't mean that this is at the heart of every protest group. However, for protest groups to have a strong sense of connectedness, they must focus on the values and ideals that unite them, values and ideals that generate shared respect and trust.

While belongingness is an individual pursuit, it is also a community's responsibility to create a culture where others are offered opportunity to belong. Before moving to our Mountain community, my husband and I heard several comments about how many years it would take before we would be considered "locals". Thankfully, those remarks proved to be untrue and we felt welcomed and embraced by our new community from the moment we arrived.

The cultural history of our nation is stained with stories of isolation and exclusion. However, when we consider the current chaos and division facing many nations in the world today, we can take stock. We may have more improvements to make, but we are on a journey toward discovering how we can foster diversity and belonging through a more sensitive and inclusive society. I'm thankful that I live in a nation that works through this by consultation and discussion rather than war.

Belonging is not about conformity. Belonging is authenticity. It looks beyond diversity to the shared values and ideals that unite our friendship groups, our communities and our nation.

EXERCISING SMARTER

I saw a short video the other day that reminded me how completely brilliant physio and exercise can be. The video was of an older man setting up some makeshift weights in his back garden and shed and practising a squat and lift. Over the course of the video, which is set over a year, you watch his mobility improve, his posture becomes steady, and he becomes stronger. It culminated in this man walking into a house where his grandchildren were setting up the Christmas tree. He picks up his young granddaughter and lifts her to place the star on top of the tree while his daughter watches on with tears in her eyes. It was a perfect demonstration of why it is actually important to remain strong and mobile.

When we see someone for the first time we ask about goals - what you normally like to do and what you aspire to do. At Physique we like to go one step further and ask, why is that important? This is my absolute favourite question to ask. The answers we get really put into perspective why people are taking time and effort to get their pain, injuries or limitations seen to. It's often met with emotional responses and often revolves around the desire to spend quality time with family in the way they want - to carry, lift, play and participate. 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
