KEEN COMPETITION SEEN IN 2023 BUSINESS EXCELLENCE AWARDS

The spirit of entrepreneurship and the rising stars of the region's business community were celebrated at the 2023 Scenic Rim Business Excellence Awards recently.

Almost 200 guests gathered at The Centre Beaudesert where veterinary pharmaceuticals enterprise Plasvacc Pty Ltd received the highest accolade, the Regional Prosperity Award, after winning the Excellence in Business Award as an employer of more than 20 staff.

The awards were presented in the categories of: Excellence in Tourism and Accommodation; Excellence in Hospitality - Food and Dining; Excellence in Retail, Excellence in Trades and Construction; Excellence in Agriculture; Excellence in Transport, Logistics, Manufacturing and Mining; Excellence in Professional Services; Excellence in Community Services; Most Outstanding New Business; Excellence in Business (20+ staff); and Trainee/Apprentice of the Year.

The overall Regional Prosperity Award was presented to the business that has achieved outstanding results, exhibited sound management and demonstrated all-round excellence.

Judges Melissa Johnson Morgan, Associate Professor of the University of Southern Queensland's School of Business, and John Hale, the Mentoring for Growth Program Mentor from the Queensland Government's Department of Employment, Small Business and Training, commented on the high calibre of entries in the 2023 awards.

In judging the business nominations they considered a range of factors including outstanding customer service, environmental awareness, understanding of target markets, well-defined and understood business strategies, rigorous systems, effective risk management, financial performance and a clear commitment to excellence in all facets of their operations.

Mayor Christensen said the awards also recognised the trainees and apprentices who represent the future of the Scenic Rim.

"One of the challenges for our region, and indeed other communities, is that we often lose talented young people to larger urban areas once they graduate," he said.

"Our schools and local businesses are to be congratulated for offering our young people an insight into the opportunities available for them to succeed and grow their careers in the Scenic Rim."

Mayor Christensen said he was proud of the contribution of local businesses which has seen the steady growth of the Scenic Rim's economy, whose GRP is now some \$2.09 billion annually.

"As well as showcasing our industry-leading businesses, the biennial Business Excellence Awards send a strong message to potential investors and jobseekers that the Scenic Rim is a region of great opportunity," he said.

"The achievements of our awards recipients should inspire others to strive for similarly high standards of excellence which are building the reputation of the Scenic Rim as a great place to do business."

The winners of the 2023 Scenic Rim Business Excellence Awards are as follows:

Excellence in Tourism and Accommodation: Mount French Lodge

packaging and goal of zero waste, which sees 20 kilograms of kitchen food scraps reduced to two kilos of nutrient-rich compost overnight. An Environ Waste Management system manages all on-site wastewater and supports an on-site vegetable, herb and fruit tree garden.

Excellence in Retail: My Country Escape (pictured at right) From a meticulously renovated historic building in Canungra, My Country Escape showcases a carefully curated range of merchandise supporting local products and artisans, from stylish homewares and body products to sustainable clothing, all in a welcoming and uplifting atmosphere. It was judged an outstanding local business which gone from strength to strength, contributing to the community and supporting local events. Collaboration with Griffith University design students has seen the Canungra store expanded to include an outdoor space for community workshops.

Excellence in Professional Services: Honni Hayton Counselling

Honni Hayton Counselling was established five years ago in response to the need for accessible and specialised mental health services within the Scenic Rim. As a sole practitioner, Honni aimed to create a safe, local haven providing expert counselling and tailored support to enhance emotional and mental well-being. She has grown her business and her business skills during difficult years of the pandemic, successfully pivoting to provide a valuable online counselling service to the community.

Excellence in Trades and Construction: Totally Flooring, Beaudesert

The shrub grows in most of eastern coastal Queensland and the adjoining inland, extending to central coastal New South Wales. It can reach a height of six metres, with white, pale pink or yellow flowers. Council has planted several shrubs in the beds which were created in the park some years ago. At least thirty five species of hibiscus are native to Australia. This flower has attracted hibiscus beetles, something to which the species is prone.



PATHWAY TO BUDGET REFORM AND FINANCIAL DISCIPLINE

Tom Sharp

As a career fund manager, stockbroker and farmer, I understand that good companies populate their boards and senior leadership positions with persons with experience and qualifications in Financial Management. Scenic Rim Regional Council (SRRC) is a large Council with nearly 1.2 billion dollars in assets and an annual operating budget of 100 million dollars.

Financial Management and leadership are sorely lacking at SRRC, as evidenced by exorbitant rates, the need to use consultants for almost everything they do, constant project failures, cost blowouts and mounting unsustainable legal costs. It has a culture of ticking the box on consultation and high spending on self-promotion with glossy websites and brochures. It has a toxic culture and declining customer satisfaction levels.

Its financial statements do not reflect the waste inefficiency and poor decision-making. It is not in the public interest to hide spending, never apologise, make it hard for the media to get answers, or gag Councillors from talking to their ratepayers.

> The answer to poor financial performance is not constantly raising rates above CPI and borrowing more. The solution is not to run existing assets into the ground by neglecting maintenance and not looking after the one billion dollars of assets the community already owns.

Evidence of Poor Budget Performance and Process

- Many communities in the Scenic Rim have the highest rates in Queensland.
- Surrounding Local Government's rates are often half that of Scenic Rim rates.
- The Council Budget process is flawed. Councillors complain about it but are impotent in standing up to the bureaucracy and having more effective input into the process.
- Financial skills and ideas to cope with a strong bureaucracy, that has its own priorities and agenda, are lacking.

For example, things to watch out for in budgets:

- More staff positions if existing positions haven't been filled.
- Excessive use of consultants when existing staff remuneration should account for these outsourced works.
- Using project management companies because they find it easier not to do it themselves.
- Early upgrades to the latest and shiniest phones, computers, and office systems for no new tangible benefit.
- New computer software, when previous purchases have not been implemented correctly and the promised benefits realised.
- Depots and administration buildings being prioritised over more pressing community infrastructure.
- Having the most up-to-date fleet of trucks and equipment, but when utilisation falls below industry standards.
- Tens of MILLIONS OF DOLLARS of unspent money each year that will never be spent but is asked to be provided again in next year's budget.

- Increasing employee benefits, that increased by 1.2 million dollars last financial year.
- Although the Council, for the first time, has attempted public consultation on the budget, it has not been successful, and many improvements are necessary, like increasing disclosure, making more information available and using Councillors to provide feedback from their constituents about their community's needs and wants.
- The organisation must demonstrate its efficiency and effectiveness before generating community trust in spending budget funds.
- A large percentage of expenditure is done by delegated authority and under procurement policy, which is outside the scrutiny of Councillors or the public.

The Solution

- Budgets must be broken down into achievable outcomes, funds allocated to specific capital projects, and operational outcomes that are measurable, accountable, and reported on.
- There must be more information to the public explaining why budget decisions are made and how much they will cost ratepayers.
- A good CEO will challenge his/her Directors and Managers to make capital and operational changes that optimise performance of the ratepayers' dollar. There is no indication this has ever occurred at Scenic Rim, from insiders' reports. The only way structural budget resetting can be done is not by the Councillors themselves but by asking or resolving the CEO to do this.
- There must be audit processes put in place to ensure that tendering and quoting are done to a high level of integrity and that ratepayers get maximum value.
- Councillors are the community-chosen representatives and should be able to make enquiries or use the same IT and Financial systems as Council staff to enquire about funds received or spent by the organisation by their power to be accountable for its performance. This is a minimum requirement of transparency and accountability.
- The Media should be able to make financial enquiries of the Council and receive honest answers; after all, it's the ratepayers' money, not theirs.
- Through his/her employment contract and KPIs, the CEO must demonstrate to the public that through his/her management and decisions, the organisation and its budgets have the ratepayers and community at its heart, not the Administration. It is the responsibility of Councillors to understand they work for the Community that elected them and that they are not employees of the organisation or apologists for it.
- High-functioning councils and High-functioning leadership ensure the community grows and prospers and Customer satisfaction increases.

If elected Mayor, I aim to bring about transformational change to the Scenic Rim Regional Council through experienced, sound financial management and vision. I'm sure my views received to date through liaison with community organisations, local businesses and house-tohouse doorknocking, that we are a long way off what the Community expects.

UPDATE ON DEVELOPMENT 713-735 MAIN WESTERN RD

In your last edition, I provided an update on this development and said that we were going to a hearing, 21-24 November.

Well, out of the blue, we were asked to attend a mediation on Thursday 9 November, nearly one year on from our previous mediation session which was unsuccessful.

The mediation session, which lasted for six and a half hours, was conducted on a "Without Prejudice" basis which means that I cannot report what was said. The session was attended by myself and Cr Hay. The outcome of the mediation was that we have withdrawn from the appeal. The main reasons were a precedent case from 2018 which was not favourable to our position and, because of this, the chances of costs being awarded against us.

Cr Hay and myself were highly disappointed at this outcome.

Let me say at this point that Cr Hay acted with strength and determination. She is an excellent advocate for justice and the Mountain. I hope that she decides to run again in March 2024.

Cr Hay was determined to get the best out of the situation we found ourselves in, and she challenged one of the offers being made to us, which was a financial contribution of \$5000. As a result of this challenge and a long conversation between the developer's barrister and the developer, the financial offer was increased to \$40000. This offer will be used by Cr Hay to pay off her costs of employing a Town Planner, and reimbursing those who made a donation towards these costs.

WATER MINING REARS ITS HEAD - YET AGAIN

I am opposing the application for a new commercial water extraction bore to be built on Hartley Rd, Tamborine Mountain, at this time.

My reasons being that neither Council nor Government have been able to restrict commercial water extraction for local supply only.

Once a commercial permit is in place, the owner has the right to sell their weekly allocation to anyone.

If locals don't need it, they are entitled to sell elsewhere.

The additional bore will further draw on the same underground supply as the four other commercial bores near this location.

This could further affect the water table, depleting water supply to local domestic bores, and could harm our subtropical ecosystem.

Hartley Road needs first to be upgraded to meet the demands of more heavy traffic on an overused public thoroughfare.

A water moratorium is presently in place with the purpose of studying the effect of commercial water extraction from underground aquifers. New commercial bores are banned. A water management Plan is being considered by State Government for this locality in 2026.

It is time State Government acted to ensure Tamborine Mountain residents have adequate water supply and not be dependent on private operators.

A better outcome for all would be a consensual agreement with commercial operators to provide water to local customers, for domestic use, as a priority.

This could be negotiated between Council and operators, with the right people in power.

It would eliminate the need for another commercial water extractor on Tamborine Mountain and the need for water to be brought up the Mountain.

Otherwise, a publicly-owned bore could be drilled, with a fixed charge for local delivery.

There are other options that should be given to the community for consultation, not left in the hands of this Council.



Advertorial Fire ant treatment is safe

Fire ants pose a much greater risk to humans, animals the environment and Australia's economy than eradication treatment

The National Fire Ant Eradication Program has a challenging but important job to do, and we are intensifying program-led and community treatment.

Eradication activities are underway in parts of the Southern Downs, Scenic Rim, southern Gold Coast and Lockyer Valley local government areas.

Eradication treatment is the only proven way to eliminate fire ants and protect the way of life we know and love. It is our one option to safeguard Australia.

Overseas, where fire ant populations are much higher than here, communities have been forced to change their lifestyle to avoid exposure to fire ants.

Fire ant expert and entomologist Dr Ross Wylie says we are eradicating fire ants using the best available methods internationally. "Eradication involves treating targeted areas multiple times, over several years with an insect growth regulator. We can't just treat once or twice, we need to keep coming back and use a systematic approach," says Dr Wylie.

"We need to treat 100% of all targeted properties, whether fire ants are visible or not."

Treatment is delivered between September and June using aerial, utility terrain vehicles and handheld spreaders.

"The treatment we use consists of small pieces of corn grit soaked in soybean oil which contains a low concentration of insect growth regulator.

It essentially acts as 'the pill' for ants, preventing the fire ant queen from reproducing workers.

If she can't replenish her workforce, she and the colony will eventually die," says Dr Wylie.

The product contains pyriproxyfen, which is registered for use with:

- horticultural crops—for treating whiteflies and scale insects
- animal flea collars
- fly control spray
- pest and parasite management for horses and cattle.

Fire ant eradication treatment contains minimal insecticide. With 5 g of insecticide within each kg, the active ingredient equates to only 0.5% of the total product. This means for a:

- 500 m² block, just 100 g of product would be applied containing only ½ g of the active ingredient.
- 10 ac (4 ha) property, 8 kg of product would be applied containing only 40 g of the active ingredient.



This ensures minimal impact on flora and fauna and little chance for animals to source enough of the product to negatively affect their health.

An animal, say a horse, would need to consume every single granule sprinkled on a 3,333 m² block. Even then it is unlikely to have even the mildest of impacts.

On limited occasions when treating near waterways we use a product containing S-methoprene. The product is used at extremely low concentrations, at around one one-thousandth of the concentration recommended as a safe level by the World Health Organisation.





Living OGS **RECENT DOG ATTACKS ON** PEOPLE

Do we really need new dangerous dog laws or a permit for dog owners based on basic knowledge of canine

behaviour, their needs and suitable living requirements, fencing, etcetera? Yes, dogs are domesticated, but we must remember all dogs descend from top predators. Carnivorous predators hunt and kill, like lions, tigers, sharks, wolves and snakes. It is only because humans provide food and shelter for dogs, and utilise their strong bond and pack instinct that they have become, on the surface, lovable pets. Aggression in dogs that comes from nowhere is rare, possibly



a seizure disorder, brain tumour or 'rage syndrome.' Some dogs learn that aggression is an effective tool for stopping uncomfortable interaction or it can be related to predatory triggers like invasion of space and resources.

Why do we never get answers or hear about the conclusions or assumed reasons why some dogs attack, especially when someone is bitten or killed by their own dog? Investigations into dog attacks lead nowhere. And, it is occurring more frequently and is more violent in nature. Always the same repertoire, "this tragic incident is being investigated, Council has impounded or euthanised the dog/s involved."

Pictured above, the door which a pet dog tried to destroy to get to the owners cowering inside a bedroom. On the 14th of September this year in Adelaide, a 6-year-old child hid in a bedroom after seeing his mother and uncle being mauled by the family dog.

The adults, bleeding from arm and leg wounds, managed to escape into another bedroom, close the door and call for help. The dog had been with the family for eight years. The adult male dog owner said after the attack "I hate dogs, I never want a dog again."

On October 16th, a 66-year-old man died after being attacked by his dog in Tasmania. A woman who was with him was taken to hospital with serious injuries to her limbs. They had two other dogs at the home. The attacking dog was euthanised and the other two impounded by Council.

Thursday 2nd November, four people were taken to hospital after they were mauled by a dog at Morayfield north of Brisbane, they were apparently just out walking.

It is obvious that nearly all dog attacks are caused by human error, negligence and misconceptions. Any new laws need to focus more on people, dogs also deserve better, they are not disposable.

SILENCE – IT REALLY IS BLISS

Silence and meditation are all consuming passions for me at the moment. We have a Silent Yoga Retreat coming up soon (22/3 – 24/3/24) and as always, where you put your attention, all sorts of

interesting phenomena start to be revealed. The most obvious, and not unexpected response to this Yoga Retreat, was the early uptake of places by my more introverted, nonconformist students. A whole weekend immersed in yoga, breathwork, meditations and wisdom shared from ancient teachings – all performed in Silence. How divine for some and terrifying for others!

It got me thinking of how exhausting constant communication can be for both introverts and extroverts. All of us need some time away from the 24/7 barrage of incoming noise to regroup and collect our thoughts. Conversation with others is like a game of chess. We correlate and adjust our behaviour according to how others act. This communication dance becomes fairly automatic, but every second we're watching for and responding to others' cues and deciding how to act based on social norms. We must compel ourselves to listen, to show interest, to check inappropriate comments. We must be proactive but also defensive: at any time, someone may insult, embarrass, confuse, or manipulate us, and we must keep our guard up against these potential attacks. And we must do all this, while making our efforts seem effortless! Even when you're around those who allow you to "be yourself," social interaction demands great vigilance and requires a high level of energy and control.

We are social animals, and talking with others is important for fun, community, and mental health, but ceaseless immersion in society is exhausting and drains us. We need time away from the noise to identify what we want and what we believe in, without being influenced by the expectations of society.

Welcome to Silence! When you go silent for a while, it could be a few hours to a few days, it's a little alien in the beginning. You seem to be chatting to the person in your head a lot, usually ruminating on negative thoughts. And then that voice shuts up and suddenly, the sky is bluer, the trees jump out at you in every conceivable shade of green, the birdsong is sweeter, and you start to feel a rising joy as you realise you were part of this technicolour world all along. In fact, it's inside you, you just had to go quiet for a while.

When we can go silent and inwards, we affirm our independent identity and existence, and we temporarily reject the law of the herd. Extroverts may need less, and introverts more, but neither group can entirely do without. It's no wonder the greatest inventors, greatest minds and greatest spiritual beings are huge fans of silence, meditation and going inwards.

STORY STEWARDSHIP

In previous times psychologists held a common belief that by understanding facial expressions and body language we could confidently recognise emotion in ourselves and others. It's true by increasing our self-awareness, we understand our own emotions. However, trying to interpret another's emotion through observation is likely to result in a wrong assumption. For example, there are many emotions that could be the source of someone's tears: grief, fear, hopelessness, anger, even joy. How we express what we are feeling can be as unique as we are.

So how do we truly know what another is feeling? We simply ask. This doesn't mean a robotic, meaningless 'how ya goin'?' which generates the usual response of 'Good!'. When you notice someone looking out of sorts, have the courage to ask what is genuinely going on for them.

When someone responds by telling us how they are feeling

and what happened to them, we become trusted stewards of their story. Brene Brown calls this "story stewardship". Story stewardship means we've been entrusted with something valuable that we must treat with respect and care. We do this by



listening, being curious, affirming and believing people when they tell us how they experienced something. It's only then that we are able to connect, engage and walk alongside.

Responses that get in the way of truly hearing and building trust with another include taking-over and tapping-out. We shut people down when we take over their story and make it about us or our perception of what happened. Narrative takeover occurs when we jump in with our contribution too soon, even with the best intentions. We hijack someone's story and leave them feeling unheard. Narrative tap-outs range from subtle disinterest to complete shutdown. This response is usually due to our discomfort around the topic or feeling that we don't have the energy to take on someone's issue.

It can be difficult to listen to someone's story of grief, harm or injustice. We want to make it better. We want to problem solve. We want to give advice. The best story stewardship in these moments is to make it explicit that you appreciate their courage in sharing their story and you are grateful they entrusted you with it. Secondly, enquire what would be helpful for them. Are they simply seeking a listening ear? Do they need a collaborator in finding a way forward? Would they welcome the contribution of a different perspective? Advice giving is fine if it is asked for, however, unwelcome advice can damage a relationship.

When entrusted with someone's story, check yourself before you respond. Questions to ask yourself: Am I trying to alleviate my own discomfort by jumping in here? Have I heard what this person really needs from me? You can never overstep the mark with good listening skills so remain actively engaged in listening mode until your contribution is invited. Good stewardship of stories entrusted to you results in deeper trust, closer connections and more satisfying relationships.

Physio Talk



TO BRACE OR NOT TO BRACE

In the pursuit of an active and healthy lifestyle, we've all caused ourselves a mischief from time to time and hurt ourselves. It's part of being human! However, the

use of braces can be a game-changer, enabling people to continue enjoying sports and activities while managing discomfort. Day to day, I often witness the impact of braces on clients striving to maintain their fitness and well-being.

Firstly, I think it's important to discuss the predominant fear people have around using braces. The pervasive concern is that bracing will cause weakness of the surrounding muscles, which is an understandable concern to have. However, there is no evidence to support this claim, and, in some cases, bracing has been shown to improve muscle activity surrounding the joint (particularly in the knee, low back and ankle).

Perhaps if you braced for an exceedingly long period of time (continuously for over 12 months) there may be adaptation around the joint. Generally, physiotherapists would only suggest wearing a brace for a shorter period unless there was a very good reason not to.

Ankle Braces:

Ankle braces are the most commonly worn brace to protect and prevent injury. Current guidelines suggest that after you have sprained your ankle, you should tape or brace your ankle for 12 months post the injury to help reduce the chance of recurrence. Be sure your brace has sturdy straps preventing excess sideways movement for optimal protection. Cheap braces often do not have the stability required to prevent injury.

Knee Braces:

Knee pain can stop you in your tracks and prevent you from doing much at all. The two most common issues we would suggest braces for are for osteoarthritis and patellofemoral (kneecap) pain. The two braces differ greatly and act on different tissues. Correct sizing and appropriate type of brace will dictate how much improvement you are going to get.

Low Back Braces:

Low back braces can be an absolute saviour when you have disabling acute low

back pain. These braces work by providing support to your spasming spinal muscles and allowing them to relax and support the painful tissue.

Shoulder Braces:

Shoulder braces can be tricky and ineffective at times as it is such a complex joint which makes it hard to support. While I would generally use tape in clinic, we have found a particularly good brace to help with shoulder pain recently which tends to surpass tape in its effectiveness. Woohoo!

Correct bracing at the correct time for the correct issue is a really important part of healing and returning to activity. Your physio will be able to guide you on what is most appropriate for you at the time. Of course, this isn't an exhaustive list of every brace you could possibly get (there is a multi-million-dollar industry based on providing braces for EVERYTHING!).

FACING FACTS

Hi *Scenic News* readers, welcome back to my health and wellness column. This edition is all about our face health.


