TUSSOCK MOTH CATERPILLAR

- Iropoca rotundata, Joalah National Park.



This eye-catching caterpillar was filmed on the handrail of the viewing platform on the way to Curtis Falls, in March 2011. It caught my attention as I was going through my video frames and I sent the image to the expert who has created Australia's most accessible *lepidoptera* (moths and butterflies) website. He loved the caterpillar but couldn't identify it. I then sent the frame to Peter Hendry, who thinks that the caterpillar is too similar to *Iropoca rotundata* not to be at least in the same genus, except that *Iropoca rotundata* is the only species in the genus. The moth occurs in Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria. Wingspan is 3 cm.



SCENIC RIM COUNCIL BACKS VISIONARY ARTS PRECINCT PROJECT ON TAMBORINE MOUNTAIN

In a landmark decision on Wednesday, November 22, the Scenic Rim Council unanimously endorsed the Tamborine Mountain Arts Precinct's ambitious project, temporarily halting the auction of the iconic winery at 122-128 Long Road, Gallery Walk. This pivotal move opens the door for the not-for-profit to raise funds in order to bid at auction to secure the site and transform it into a vibrant community Arts Precinct.

Since its inception in February 2023, the Tamborine Mountain Arts Precinct (TMAP) has been vocal about its vision, within the arts community, for the venue, garnering substantial support. A crucial meeting held with Council on November 1 saw TMAP co-founders John Tardy, Ashley Tardy, and Glen Pittock, align their goals with regional and state Arts, Creativity and Culture strategies, emphasising the precinct's potential to bolster the local economy and community spirit.

The trio's inspiration stems from a personal tragedy – the loss of Kate Tardy, a key figure in the Tamborine Mountain arts and theatre scene, to breast cancer earlier this year. Her legacy fuels their dedication to creating a space that celebrates and nurtures local talent.

TMAP's plans are comprehensive, aiming to feature and promote local artists and serve as a central hub for local creatives. Their community-first approach also includes promoting local goods and services, thus stimulating the local economy and generating employment opportunities.

With an official launch scheduled for early next year, TMAP is planning an informative community event to engage and update residents on the project's progress. Councillor's Comment

These are my own personal views. I do not purport to speak on behalf of Council. Decisions of Council are made only by majority vote, legislative authority or under authority delegated by Council.

Please note my comments are written several days prior to the printing of this paper.

Sale of Council-owned surplus property: Gallery Walk winery. I moved a motion at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 22 November 2023 that the auction of the property be deferred until late May 2024 and this motion was approved by a unanimous vote of Councillors. This will not result in a "non-competitive process" but will potentially enable a proposed not-for-profit local organisation to raise the funds to purchase the property at auction (if the bidding reaches the reserve price).

Request for Special Meeting: A majority of Councillors have called for a Special Meeting which is set down for 9.00am on 06 December 2023 (at the time of writing).

The single purpose of this meeting is:

"Consider the return of the Chief Executive Officer into the workplace and to review the mechanism for the performance management of the Chief Executive Officer [Closed s.254J(3) (f) and (i)]".

Development Applications of interest: (Source: DAP Online – when it works). Information requests have been issued in respect to applications for 125-127 Curtis Rd and 197-207 Long Rd, and a new application MCU23/177 for an "Other Change to Approval – Impact" at 104-144 Hartley Rd. No documents available yet – Cedar Creek Estate Vineyard & Winery. Plenty of applications for boundary setbacks – why not purchase a property which will accommodate what you want to do?


Planning & Environment Court appeals:

Natasha Organ -v- SRRC. Court has ordered that by 15 Dec 2023 the appellant provide the respondent (SRRC) with its "without prejudice" report addressing flooding issues. Review date: 18 Dec 2023.

On 10 Nov 2023 Judge Kefford handed down her judgement in the appeal 137 of 2020 (Hoffman et al. -v- Gold Coast City Council and Australian Rainforest Conservation Society Inc (represented by the Environmental Defenders Office Ltd) and GECKO Environment Council Assn Inc and 2 individuals). This appeal relates to an application for the extraction of 16 megalitres p.a. at 263 Repeater Station Road, Springbrook. The outcome was that extraction of 8 megalitres p.a. was approved with onerous conditions. GCCC was represented by Corrs Chambers Westgarth.

Supreme Court – 13762 of 2019 – Scenic Rim Developments P/L -v- SRRC (filed 11 Dec 2019) – listed for review on 14 Dec 2023.

State School and Tamborine Mountain State School Grade 6 graduation ceremonies – great to see so many students receive awards and all graduates' efforts acknowledged; Tamborine Mtn Community Care - Volunteers' thankyou morning tea; opening of the new Lions Club native garden at Club Tamborine (proudly sponsored by the Tamborine Mtn Garden Club via proceeds from Springtime on the Mountain); Destination Scenic Rim AGM; fence and drainage issues; one Ordinary SRRC Meeting; one Special SRRC meeting; TMAC (Tamborine Mountain Artists Collective - not Tamborine Mountain Auto Clinic) strategic discussions; the commemorative service to open the new Canungra Vietnam Memorial site at the Land Warfare Centre (I was the Dept of Defence paymaster in Canberra for several years); and last but not least – in an event which surpassed Barbie the movie – the very well attended and free Tamborine Mountain Orchestra Christmas concert. They have improved considerably since last year's performance and the eclectic playlist covered works from Tchaikovsky to the Goons ("I'm Walking Backwards For Christmas") - the latter caused some stunned expressions on the faces of the younger members of the audience!

The plight of the residents of Shelf Rd was given significant coverage in the weekend edition of the *Gold Coast Bulletin* 2-3 December 2023 (front page, pages 4-5 and page 82).

A NAME IS ANYTHING BUT A GAME

Ask a local where they live, and the answer is Tamborine Mountain. Ask a lowlander heading up here for a break in our cool semi-rural ambience, and the answer is – probably again – Tamborine Mountain. And almost everybody would know exactly where they mean. It is our iconic town, almost entirely on the plateau. As its important assets, it includes the Witches Falls, Knoll, Joalah and Palm Grove parts of Tamborine National Park. These are only accessible from the plateau, and spill over the edges.

But to a potential visitor looking at a map, or a planning bureaucrat bound by what the document actually says, their conclusions could be quite different. "Tamborine Mountain" could have several different interpretations. The first is obviously the geographic Tamborine Mountain. Then there are the plateau and escarpment area, originally defined in the early Development Control Plans. For something really odd, look at the area defined in the Growth Management Strategy.

But then Council went too far with Item 11 of a batch of twenty planning amendments proposed in 2022. It depicted a Tamborine Mountain community sprawling from the eastern and northern Shire boundaries, to the back fences of Tamborine Village and Canungra, and even reached Mundoolun Connection Road. Going even further, it completely obliterated any recognition of our plateau township. That carefully planned entity within its escarpments

houses 20% of the Shire's population. Inevitably, it has its own problems and priorities. Gone at the whim of Council managers. That was just not on, and objections from many including myself, caused that Amendment to be withdrawn for further consideration.

This difficulty could result in seriously flawed Development Application approvals, and the problem must be resolved. I don't see that plain "Tamborine Mountain" is viable, due to confusion with the geographic Mount. We must have a name, and it should incorporate "Tamborine Mountain". In my submission I took the simple way and suggested "Town of Tamborine Mountain" or "Tamborine Mountain Township". However, those lack some magic and I don't think either would be regularly used. Then I had an inspiration. It fits, is memorable and raises a smile. Our plateau locality is sometimes referred to as our Island in the Sky. So how about "Tamborine Mountain Island"? I couldn't take myself seriously, but there must be something suitable out there. Any thoughts?

TRAVELLING PLACES with Sienna

I am freshly returned from a three —week holiday in Italy (during which I have became a complete and committed adherent of La Dolce Vita) and while the memory of Persimmon Gelato and Aperol Spritz are fresh I thought I would share some of the highlights from the trip.

My adventure began into Rome — the Eternal City. Nothing quite prepares you for the feeling of standing beneath the domed ceiling of the Pantheon, or brushing up against 2000 years of history in a Roman archaeological site. All those layers of history stacked in one place — and you a small part of it even now.

I was then lucky enough to spend a week sampling the many delights of Tuscany with Collette. Their tour, Spotlight on Tuscany, differs from the traditional coach touring format by taking a spoke and wheel approach. From our base in Montecatini Terme — a famous resort and spa town, we spent seven days discovering the surrounding region. From day trips to Siena, San Gimignano, Florence, Pisa and Lucca, to visits to local wineries, cheese makers, farms and cooking classes — we traversed the sprawling hillsides soaking in the history, culture and beauty with which Tuscany is so richly endowed. Good food, good company and lots of good wine made for a wonderful introduction to Toscana!

At the end of the tour, I reluctantly parted ways with my group of newfound friends but excitedly made my way to Bologna. Bologna is the capital of the Emilia – Romagna region (home of Parmigiano cheese, Modena Balsamic vinegar, Parma ham and much more). Best known for its elegant medieval architecture and rich gastronomic history – Bologna thoroughly charmed me. I spent days wandering the covered walkways of its city centre, sampling the many restaurants and food stalls tucked into its winding streets and stumbling onto all sorts of hidden treasures along the way. And of course, I ate so much

pasta, pizza and prosciutto that I don't know if I will ever be able to so much as look at them again (a condition which is guaranteed to pass).

From there I ventured north to Lugano, a beautiful town perched on the edge of a lake and ringed by towering snow-topped peaks. Lugano is in the Italian-speaking Ticino region of Switzerland and it was fascinating the see how the two cultures were enmeshed. The entire region was perhaps one of the most visually striking and spectacular places I have had the



opportunity to visit thus far. While I was there, I was fortunate enough to be able to visit Valle Verzasca and to hike alongside the jade green waters of its glacial rivers, through autumnal forests and winding paths set against the magnificent backdrop of the Alps.


Drawn south to the cradle of the Renaissance, I ended my trip in Florence. I stayed in Oltrarno — a neighbourhood just across the river which is home to countless artisan bottegas and studios where you can watch leatherworkers, stonemasons, jewellers and artists working as you wander the streets. A study in May 2023 has indicated that even though pure dingoes vary in appearance, results from over three and half thousand wild dog DNA samples from across Australia have shown that the percentage of hybrids in the wild is not as widespread as previously thought, according to Dr K. Cairns, a conservation biologist from UNSW Science.

While some dingoes have a dash of domestic dog in their genetics, as a population they are retaining their genetic identity. In the picture above, all these dingoes are mostly pure. More remote areas inland and to the west have higher levels of dingo purity, with 87% of wild dogs in the NT being pure. Research also found there are four dingo varieties.

Understanding which areas have pure dingoes, and which have hybrids, is important for conservation and understanding the ecology of wild dogs on Australia's ecosystem.

The old testing methods relied on a smaller number of genetic markers and a limited reference population which over-estimated the amount of dog ancestry in dingo samples – sometimes by over 30%. This meant it often identified an animal as crossbred when it was a pure dingo. But with the new test we can look at 195,000 points across the genome compared to just 23 previously. So, it is a huge improvement in reliability and accuracy.

The term "wild dog" is widely used in policy; it includes the dingo, dingo-hybrid and feral domesticated dogs, all considered invasive species under biosecurity legislation and subject to eradication measures like aerial baiting, trapping and shooting. This includes national parks where native animals are supposedly protected. No other species is treated the same way as the dingo - when they should be protected! Environments without dingoes can become overrun by kangaroos, foxes and feral cats that threaten other native animals and can significantly change Australia's fragile vegetation. Dingoes can be a threat to some livestock but they are not a pest, they play a crucial role as apex predators. There is a real need to find a balance in management and ensure we mainain local populations. Some farmers are using trained donkeys to protect livestock with success.



REKINDLING FRIENDSHIP

The Ending Loneliness Together research organisation recently released a landmark State of the Nation report. It found that one in three Australians feel socially isolated, concluding that we are in the grip of a loneliness epidemic. The report cites long work hours, rising cost of living, diminished neighbourhood connection and a general shrinking of social circles as contributing factors.

How do you increase your social circle? In addition to making new friends, consider rekindling former friendships. Think about why you drifted apart in the first place. Friendships typically fizzle out rather than dissolving because of a fight or a shift in shared values.

Proximity is a typical cause of friendship drift. If we don't live within a reasonable distance to a friend, we tend not to make the effort to visit them. Sometimes lifestyle-related reasons are the cause. Camaraderie is built in sporting teams, mutual hobbies, interests or shared working environment. The majority of friendships don't survive when the common denominator is gone.

It can be difficult to know where to start reconnecting. It requires an active effort to reach out. Sending a message or calling someone lets them know you are thinking of them. Take a slow and steady approach. The reasons a friendship paused are sometimes different for either person. There may need to be a repair before a reconnection can take place. Be willing to apologise even if you feel you didn't do anything to intentionally hurt your friend. Sometimes that which we neglected to do can hurt more. Don't take it personally if you don't hear back or the response may not be what you anticipate. It may not be rejection; it could mean that the opportune time to reconnect is not necessarily now.


One of the most common ways people reconnect with old friends is at shared social gatherings. Be receptive to attending events such as reunions, social get-togethers, weddings and other celebrations. The unforced nature of these events can help those who have drifted apart reacquaint in a comparatively low-stress environment.

Sometimes, people seek out old friendships because they miss a part of who they were back then. Be honest with yourself about whether you're wanting to reconnect with a particular period in your life, rather than seeking to reunite with a specific friend. You can't go back into exactly the same friendship you had decades ago. Expecting your friend to be the same, idealised past version of themselves is not realistic. You have to rebuild a new relationship on the foundation of shared history, shared memories but different friendship.

Friendships change over time and it's normal for longstanding friendships to go through periods of disconnection, but that also provides an opportunity to reconnect. There's more to friendship than having things in common. Friendship is an investment of our time, energy and self. Whether old or new, true friendship is the connection we create when we invite someone into our world, and they invite us into theirs.

CAPTAIN MARVEL JUST CAN'T RUN!

It's not easy being a physio.
No matter where you go, no
matter what you are doing,
you are always looking. Always
checking how people are sitting,

always watching people's posture and always checking out how people are moving. The other day, I realized that maybe I had a problem when I told the young girl at the IGA to make sure she stood up straight and try not to reach so far over the counter. When she just looked at me blankly, I realized that I really need to work on switching off my physio brain.

The one thing I find that I take the most notice of is how people move, their biomechanics. A person's biomechanics is extremely important. It impacts how much energy it takes for them to run or cycle. It can even predispose a person to injury or pain with activity. In my 20 years of experience as a physio, it is something I have come to love assessing in people and my analysing people's biomechanics is just something that I can't turn off.

Unfortunately, this can sometimes be to my detriment. I love watching the Marvel movies. I love it when the good guys win. One of the favourite Marvel movies in our house is the *Captain Marvel* movie. Regrettably, the very first time I watched this movie, I noticed immediately that the actress playing Captain Marvel had a particularly poor pattern of running. It is something that I can't unsee. My poor family get sick of me talking about it.

But, I can't help it. I want people to move well. To move in a way that makes them less likely to suffer an injury. Besides, I tell my kids, a superhero really should be able to run like Usain Bolt surely?

How this actress runs predisposes her to having kneecap pain, hip bursitis, shin splints, low back pain, Achilles tendinopathy and much more. And it is something we see everyday at Physique. The way we move is just so very important.

Physiotherapists are experts at evaluating biomechanics and the impact it may be having on a person's pain. We love helping people at Physique and we will always address a biomechanical problem if we feel it is stopping our

patient from getting better. Our biomechanics can be changed. With the correct exercise and progression of loading, we can actually teach our body to move in a better way, thereby decreasing our likelihood of developing pain.






